PRAYER

The SPEAKER. The prayer today will be offered by our good friend and colleague, Representative Brett Miller, of Lancaster County. Immediately thereafter we are going to do a moment of silence, and then we will recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRAYER

HON. BRETT R. MILLER, member of the House of Representatives, offered the following prayer:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and welcome back, colleagues, for this 2018 session.

As we begin, I just want to begin with two quotes, one from Benjamin Franklin, who spoke at the Constitutional Convention in 1787 during difficult times and difficult debate, and at that time he called the group together for a call to prayer, and he said this, in part: "We have been assured, Sir, in the sacred writings that 'except the Lord build' the house 'they labor in vain that build it.' I firmly believe this; and I also believe that without his concurring aid we shall succeed in this political building no better than the Builders of Babel...." And he goes on to say a little bit later: "I therefore beg leave to move – that henceforth prayers imploring the assistance of Heaven, and its blessings on our deliberations, be held in this Assembly every morning...."

I would like to also quote from Matthew 7, verses 7 through 8: "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened."

Please join me as I pray:

Heavenly Father, we begin this session by giving You the first place. Each of us in our own way acknowledges our need of You. We certainly have some skills and abilities, but none are up for the task at hand, so we call to mind what Benjamin Franklin said long ago about asking the assistance of heaven,

and Your Word tells us that we can ask, seek, and knock, and you will hear from heaven. Let Your ears be open. Hear our call. Have mercy on us, Lord, we pray.

In the great issues of our day, we need Your wisdom, we need Your guidance, and we ask You for this, and You have said that You would provide it. I pray that You give all of the colleagues here wisdom as we undertake this great task before us.

And my prayer also is that each of us will be clothed with humility as we take on these difficult tasks, and there are many strong feelings that come about at this time. But we want to, on behalf of the good people of Pennsylvania, advance good policies for the benefit of all, so we ask for Your help. And I pray this all in the name of Jesus Christ. Amen.

The SPEAKER. As you know, Representative Patrick Harkins represents Erie, the city of Erie and Erie County, and many of you may know what that region has endured recently. So I would like everybody to please take their seats. I am going to ask Representative Harkins to start once everybody is seated. The Sergeants at Arms, once the guests are off the floor, will close the doors of the House.

Representative Harkins, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. HARKINS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it all started with a simple wish for a white Christmas by many, and by 2:10 a.m. on December 25, 2017, that wish began—

The SPEAKER. Please suspend. Please suspend.

Members, our colleague has requested the opportunity to speak about something that his region has endured and would like to congratulate those folks that made the crisis up in the northwest more bearable. So I would ask that we would all give him our undivided attention.

Mr. HARKINS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

That wish began to take shape; by 10 on Christmas morning, there was over 1 foot of snow on the ground and signs of it not stopping. What no one realized was that there would be no stopping Mother Nature until days after, and we would accumulate almost 7 feet of snow. The beauty of nature truly was unfolding right before our eyes, but the reality of being able to safely move about and commute on the streets and sidewalks was quickly on the minds of many.

On December 26 we received communication from PEMA, Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency, asking what they could do to help and assist, along with the administration. We advised them that we needed plows and people to operate them. They really came through and they helped us out. We are forever grateful for that. Some of the many who also helped, and really, really helped us out, were the city of Erie Streets Department, the plow drivers, the heavy equipment operators, the city of Erie police officers, the city of Erie Fire Department, PennDOT plow drivers, heavy equipment operators, even the Civil Air operation was called in at the urging of PEMA and the Governor's Office.

Team Rubicon, which is a great group, came in and helped us out. It is a group of veterans who really came out in full force and dug out and stayed for many weeks to help us to dig out the people who were unable to get out of their homes and move their cars so that the plows could get through.

Neighboring areas of Lawrence Park, Wesleyville, Harborcreek, North East, Millcreek, Summit, Belle Valley, Girard, Fairview, and Albion – everyone pitched in, did their part, and kept the region open and moving. Neighbors helping neighbors and people checking on others to make sure that everyone was safe and had enough food to last through the duration of the storm. From local utility companies like NFG (National Fuel Gas) and Penelec, and Erie Water Works, issues came up with downed power lines and service issues, but again, everyone pitched in and made sure things were quickly taken care of and that neighbors were okay. The PA State Police played a pivotal role in making sure that the interstates were kept open and that people were able to move about.

Our hope and prayers now are with Punxsutawney Phil on February 2. We are anxious for an early spring, to say the least. And for the record, I did use my latest copy of the Farmer's Almanac on January 2 to start my fireplace. I could say I was running low on firewood, but there is a section in there that read, quote, "Winter will be warmer than normal, with slightly above-normal precipitation," end of quote. That really put us over the edge.

STATEMENT BY MRS. HILL

The SPEAKER. Representative Kristin Phillips-Hill has some guests and would like to be recognized to speak on HR 638.

It is indeed my honor to have with me today representatives that were awarded project dollars based on the Gettysburg Foundation, which started a program this year called the Great Task: Gettysburg Youth Leadership Experience. This program uses the words of President Lincoln from the Gettysburg Address. "It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us – that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion...."

The Edgar Fahs Smith STEAM (science, technology, engineering, the arts, and math) Academy was selected as one of only 10 schools nationally for this Great Task program. The students were led through activities that stressed the magnitude of discipline, teamwork, courage, integrity, endurance, strategy, adversity, judgment, problem-solving, leadership, duty, and sacrifice. The Smith STEAM Academy students were selected as the proposal winners and accepted seed money from the Gettysburg Foundation to get started on their projects.

LAUREN FREYVOGEL PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. At this time I am honored to bring up Lauren Freyvogel and her mom and dad, Cathy and Brian. Lauren and her parents are constituents of mine, and I am so proud to have her here to recognize her athletic achievement, but she is also an outstanding student, as well, at Pine-Richland High School.

Lauren Freyvogel won the PIAA Class AAA State Golf Championship in the fall. She began her final round in second place but took control of the match on the front nine and played steady throughout to capture State gold. She captured the AAA title with a two-shot victory. She posted a 3-over par, 36-hole score of 147 to win her first State title. We have a fair amount of golfers in this room, but I do not think many of them would match you there, Lauren, including the gentleman right in front of you. She is the first golf champion in the school's history. This championship was especially gratifying, as she has been in the final group the past 2 years. She finished seventh as a freshman and fourth last year as a sophomore; so she has got another year to go, because she is a junior.

She was also crowned the PIAA Class AAA Western Regional Champion and the 2017 Junior PGA (Professional Golfers' Association) Champion. And listen to this: she has a 4.1 GPA (grade point average), and after her senior year she intends to go to the University of Virginia, the very prestigious school, University of Virginia, founded by Thomas Jefferson, where she is going to continue to pursue her academic goals, as well as golf. As a student athlete, it is not easy to balance all of these activities – between school, homework, practices – and your achievement is so special. Lauren, we congratulate you and your parents, Cathy and Brian, because nobody has that kind of success without somebody caring for them and loving them, and you are blessed to have that in your life.
