### PROVIDENCE SCHOOL STUDENTS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. Representative Schemel, do you want to speak about your guests today? I think you have a big group today from a school. Would you like to be recognized on unanimous consent? We have a large group that is here with Representative Schemel, and I am going recognize him on unanimous consent to introduce these fine guests.

### NORWIN HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS SOCCER TEAM PRESENTED

And for all of my friends from the eastern part of the State, I know you have been waiting for quite a while for a championship and maybe next week you will get that. I, too, have been waiting. I have sat on the House floor for the last 7 years without a championship team until today. So my wait is over.

And I am proud today to present a citation to the Norwin High School Girls Soccer Team, who are the 2017 PA 4A State champions. They finished the season with a record of 20-2-1, winning the State championship with a 1-nothing victory over Neshaminy. The lone goal came off a corner kick by Alyssa Victor, which was put into the goal by sophomore Danni Iannuzzo. In addition to being the State champs, they have received a number 15 national ranking by MaxPreps Soccer and a number 1 national ranking by Top Drawer Soccer.

I am joined up here on the rostrum by their head coach, Lauren Karcher; team captain Natalie Durmis, who also I believe is the homecoming queen – is that correct? – team captain Samantha Wexell, who was their goalie and last line of defense who ended her career with 53 career shutouts and was also named All-State; and team captain Emily Harrigan, who is the career leader in goals at Norwin High School. Emily was also All-State and is also a USA TODAY All-American. The rest of the team is sitting in the back of the House, if you would all please rise to be recognized as well.

Thank you. And thank you, girls, for ending my long wait, and hopefully for my friends from the east your wait will end soon too. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. ### STATEMENT BY MR. STEPHENS

The SPEAKER. Go ahead, Representative Stephens.

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I just want to rise and thank my colleagues for unanimously supporting HR 655. That resolution designates February 23, 2018, as "Keith Valley Challenge Day."

And just to give the members an idea of what the Keith Valley Challenge is, the Keith Valley Challenge started in 1977. I attended Keith Valley Middle School, and as an eighth grader, it was a rite of passage. You got an opportunity to play floor hockey for 17 hours overnight at your middle school. Prior to that you went out to the community and you got pledges for donations and helped raise money. And as a young eighth grader, I remember being so excited that we were going to go out, we were going to try to raise money, we were going to raise money for other causes important to children. At the time it was St. Christopher's Children's Hospital. Over the years a number of other charities have benefited from the Keith Valley Challenge.

But I am proud to say that since its start in 1977, at this point thousands of eighth graders have participated in that floor hockey marathon. And you can imagine as an eighth grader how excited you would be. You show up with your sleeping bag at

your middle school with maybe some snacks, a ton of parent volunteers there to help supervise and chaperone the event. But you stay up all night playing floor hockey against your friends, and as an eighth grader, it was just a great experience and it was for a great cause.

And you know, I know last year they raised over \$40,000 at the Keith Valley Challenge. To date, they have raised over a million dollars for different charities, including the Make-A-Wish Foundation and several others.

So I just want to thank my colleagues for recognizing the "Keith Valley Challenge" and wish all those at home that are going to participate in this year's Keith Valley Challenge best of luck and I hope you break the record and raise even more money to help other children in need.

### STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Murt.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I want to echo the remarks of my colleague and my friend, Representative Stephens. We want to commend and recognize the young men and young women at the Keith Valley Middle School for the great work that they have done over the past 41 years with the Keith Valley Challenge.

Mr. Speaker, this program, this event, started in memory of Billy Whitehead, an eighth grade student at Keith Valley who passed away due to a rare congenital heart defect. And in his memory and in his honor, the school community got together and every year run this floor hockey challenge, which is as popular and as well participated in as it has been over the years.

And, Mr. Speaker, the one aspect of this that I believe is important is that since its inception, the program has raised over \$1 million for 14 charities such as the ones that Representative Stephens mentioned. And this year's charity is going to be going to the Make-A-Wish Foundation. Just last year, Mr. Speaker, the young men and the young women, the eighth graders at Keith Valley, raised \$46,000 for these charities. So we commend them and we thank them and we wish them well.

### STATEMENT BY MS. HAHN

The SPEAKER. Representative Marcia Hahn is recognized to speak on HR 654.

Members, please take your seats.

Representative Hahn, the floor is yours.

Ms. HAHN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you to the members of the House for your unanimous support of HR 654, which recognizes Friday, February 2, as "National Wear Red Day."

The purpose of this day is to raise awareness about heart disease and strokes in women. Simply put, heart disease is the leading cause of death among women. One-third of the women who die each year will lose their life because of cardiovascular disease and stroke. Ninety percent of women have one or more risk factors for heart disease and stroke. Sadly, 80 percent of heart disease and stroke events may be prevented by simple lifestyle changes and education. Even if you have no symptoms,

you may still be at risk for heart disease. Nearly two-thirds of the women who die suddenly from coronary heart disease have never experienced symptoms.

HR 654 is designed to raise awareness. While many victims have no symptoms, the best thing you can do remains knowing your numbers. Talk to your health-care provider to learn about your blood pressure, cholesterol, blood sugar, and body mass index. Your heart and your loved ones are counting on you.

I would like to thank my colleagues who wore red today in recognition of "National Wear Red Day" and invite them to meet for a photo at the break.

### STATEMENT BY MS. DONATUCCI

The SPEAKER. Representative Maria Donatucci, on HR 645.

Members, please take your seats.

Representative Donatucci, the girls championship team is going to step out. We will just wait till they are off the floor.

Ms. DONATUCCI. So while we are waiting for them to leave, does anybody object to me going E-a-g-l-e-s, Eagles?

The SPEAKER. No, not at all; not at all.

Representative Donatucci, you may proceed on the resolution.

Ms. DONATUCCI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Many thanks to my colleagues for their support of my HR 645, designating this Friday, January 26, 2018, as "Kawasaki Disease Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania.

Though rare, Kawasaki disease continues to harm and claim the lives of children and young adults in the United States and around the world. Each year more than 4,000 people are diagnosed with the disease—

The SPEAKER. Representative, just suspend for just a moment, please.

Members, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats. Please, if we could, if we could withhold the conversations. If you need to have a conversation, take it off the House floor. Please close the doors of the House. The good gentledady deserves to be heard.

Ms. DONATUCCI. Each year more than 4,000 people are diagnosed with the disease. My son was one of those people diagnosed with Kawasaki disease when he was 15 months old. I just found out that Representative Kortz's son had it when he was 8 months old.

Kawasaki disease is characterized by inflammation of the blood vessels and can be accompanied by the following symptoms: fever lasting at least 5 days; bloodshot eyes; rash; inflammation of the mouth, lips, and throat; swollen hands, feet, and lymph nodes. The disease is more prevalent in boys than in girls and mainly affects children of Asian and Pacific Island descent, though it can impact all racial and ethnic groups.

Mr. Speaker, if left untreated, about 25 percent of affected children will develop heart disease. In fact, Kawasaki disease is the number one cause of acquired heart disease in children worldwide. While experts say the disease is underdiagnosed and they know so little about it, doctors around the world have been tirelessly collaborating their work on researching the cause of Kawasaki syndrome.

We all want to do what is best for our children and grandchildren, so that is why it is so important to spread the word about this disease. Parents need to know the signs and symptoms so they can take quick action and prevent their children from developing severe, life-threatening effects from this potentially dangerous disease.

Thank you to my colleagues for helping to protect and improve the health of our children. And thank you again, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity to speak on this important subject.

And I just want to make mention right here that they are saying that it is still so underdiagnosed and they do not know what causes it. My son is 32 years old, so it has been around a long time and they still do not know enough about it. So spread the word. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Donatucci.

### STATEMENT BY MS. QUINN

The SPEAKER. Representative Marguerite Quinn is recognized to speak on HR 641.

Ms. QUINN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

If you do not mind, I am—

The SPEAKER. Members, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats. Any conversations need to go off the House floor.

Ms. QUINN. Mr. Speaker, I appreciate being recognized and I am going to pause for a couple of seconds because I am delighted to have the support of my female colleagues with this resolution.

The SPEAKER. Yes, please.

Ms. QUINN. I think I am going to take a little liberty here to say that the red not only represents Representative Hahn's resolution, but the red that we are wearing today represents the outrage that we share and we share with our male colleagues for what has become epidemic, is human trafficking.

So, Mr. Speaker, I appreciate your interest as well as the interest from all of our colleagues as we speak about this resolution that recognizes January as "Human Trafficking Awareness Month."

Human trafficking is often thought of as a problem that only occurs in far-off countries, but that is not the case.

Mr. Speaker, may we have a little bit of quiet here?

The SPEAKER. Yes. Members.

Ms. QUINN. And, gentlemen, we ask for your respect because this does not just happen in far-off countries; this happens in the United States, our territories. This happens in Pennsylvania and in the communities that each one of us represents. It is an insidious, not spoken about problem that is basically human trafficking, and basically, women are typically the target.

The average age of the victim is 12 to 14 years old. In the past two decades, this commercial sexual exploitation has grown and the victims are said to be in the millions worldwide. It is a \$100 billion industry. Yes, that is an estimate, but a pretty darn good estimate, and it is second only to the illicit drug industry.

According to the Human Trafficking Hotline, in 2017, 151 cases of human trafficking were reported in Pennsylvania last year. Now, this happens from Bucks County to Lawrence



County, all over. It is all over in Pennsylvania. A case in New Castle resulted in a man being convicted of trafficking when he moved a 14-year-old girl from Ohio to Pennsylvania and then started to advertise her as a prostitute. How many of you have a 14-year-old daughter, niece, neighbor, or grandchild? In late November, two men were charged with operating a ring involving six victims across Montgomery, Lancaster, Philadelphia, and York Counties. Starting to hit home, is it not?

Mr. Speaker, the timing of this resolution is no coincidence. As we look at plans for the Super Bowl, which will be played in just over a couple of weeks, we see an event that is ripe for this type of horrific activity. The large crowd, the partying, the transient customers, and basically an overindulgent atmosphere will make this sporting event a magnet for sex trafficking.

Leading up to last year's Super Bowl, a crackdown occurred across the country. Culminating on Super Bowl Sunday, over 500 would-be sex buyers and traffickers were arrested. In Houston 9 sex traffickers were arrested and 73 adult victims and 3 juvenile victims were rescued. Operation Cross Country, which has now been conducted 11 times, has yielded over 120 arrests of traffickers and associates and rescued 84 exploited juveniles. On one raid, a 3-month-old child and her 5-year-old sister were recovered through the undercover operation.

Colleagues, it is our responsibility, morally and constitutionally, to protect the victims of this insidious crime. We must recognize that it does in fact occur here at home and that our children are preyed upon and groomed by these predators. The Internet is typically the trafficker's first contact with a victim, and no, not all of these victims come from troubled homes.

Raising awareness is the first step and one that each of us can take. I thank you for your unanimous support of HR 641, making January Human Trafficking Awareness Month. By supporting this resolution, you are giving victims – men, women, and most importantly, children – a voice.

### STATEMENT BY MS. DeLISSIO

I just want to take two minutes – one minute to say if you have not noticed, my gal pals number now 40 with the addition of our newest member from the Lehigh County and that is the most number of women in the PA House ever, just saying. And as my colleague from Bucks County reminds me, our goal is to beat Mississippi, one day.

On the topic at hand, one of those human trafficking rings happened in my district and was broken up, and I remember both the surprise and the shock followed by subsequently the outrage of my own constituents because how could this happen at a local apartment complex that actually was an apartment complex where good people live. And they were really shaken to the core to know that that could happen within our community and absolutely that close to home.

So I would encourage all of us to help make our constituents more aware that this happens, how to be more aware to be able to identify it, and most importantly, to report it. There is an 800 number, and I am sure people prefer that somebody's suspicion be reported and investigated rather than ignored. So

I would like us all to make a commitment to help get that information out and not just to hear and support this great sentiment on an annual basis, but that we are actually going to turn this into action.

This act shall be known and may be cited as the Detoxification Bed Registry Act.  
Section 2. Definitions.  
The following words and phrases when used in this act shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:  
"Bed registry." The detoxification bed registry established under this act.  
"Department." The Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs of the Commonwealth.  
"Licensed provider." A hospital-based detoxification or rehabilitation treatment program licensed to provide care for substance use disorder or a licensed nonhospital residential detoxification facility.  
Section 3. Registry.  
(a) Development.—The department shall develop and administer an Internet-based detoxification bed registry to collect, aggregate and display information about available beds at a licensed provider's detoxification and rehabilitation facility for the treatment of individuals in need of detoxification.  
(b) Contents.—The bed registry shall include, but not be limited to, the following:  
(1) Descriptive information for licensed providers in this Commonwealth, including contact information for each licensed provider.  
(2) Real-time information updated at least daily regarding the number of beds available at a licensed provider's detoxification and rehabilitation facility and, for each available bed, the type of patient that may be admitted, the level of security provided and other information that may be necessary to allow for the identification of appropriate licensed providers for the treatment of individuals in need of detoxification.  
(3) A search function to identify available beds that are appropriate for the treatment of individuals experiencing a substance abuse emergency.  
(c) Participation requirement.—A licensed provider shall participate in the bed registry established under this act and shall designate an employee to report information for inclusion in the bed registry. The designated employee shall serve as a point of contact for addressing requests for information related to data reported to the bed registry. The designated employee shall update daily the information reported to the bed registry.

(d) Licensed provider requirements.—In order to be eligible to access the registry, a licensed provider must:

(1) submit the information specified under subsection (b) to the bed registry, including providing daily real-time information; or

(2) arrange for the licensed provider's contact information to be monitored and accessed at any time in accordance with the department's regulations promulgated under section 4.

(e) Private contracting.—The department may enter into a contract with a private entity for the development and administration of the bed registry.

Section 4. Regulations.

The department shall promulgate regulations necessary to implement this act.

Section 5. Effective date.

This act shall take effect in 60 days.

### REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

I just would like to submit some remarks for the record on Tax Identity Theft Awareness Week that was passed in a resolution recently, so I would like to submit those. Thank you.

Mr. MACKENZIE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I would like to recognize January 29 through February 2, 2018, as "Tax Identity Theft Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania.

We in Pennsylvania are not immune to tax identity theft. In fact, Pennsylvanians in their twenties are at the highest risk for tax identity theft but anyone at any age can be targeted.

This type of theft occurs when someone files a fraudulent tax return using another individual's personal information in order to obtain a tax refund or when someone uses another individual's Social Security number to get a job.

Unfortunately, most people find out they have been a victim of tax identity theft by receiving a letter from the IRS (Internal Revenue Service) saying that more than one tax return was filed in their name, or the IRS records show wages from an employer an individual does not know.

We can protect ourselves from tax identity theft by shredding bank and credit card statements, old tax returns, or any other documents that contain personal and identifying information.

We must also use firewalls and antivirus software on our devices, create strong passwords on Web sites, and not open e-mails from unknown senders.

Please vote "yes" on HR 646 to designate January 29 through February 2 as "Tax Identity Theft Awareness Week" in Pennsylvania to raise awareness about this issue in Pennsylvania.
