#### PRAYER

HON. LEANNE KRUEGER, member of the House of Representatives, offered the following prayer:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Friends and colleagues, in preparing for the prayer today in the season of Passover and Easter, I looked through my Bible and chose this passage from the Book of Isaiah. Please pray with me as we listen to the prophet's words. This is from the Book of Isaiah, chapter 58, starting at verse 6.

And the prophet said: "Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and bring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, and not to hide yourself from your own kin? "The Lord will guide you continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones strong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters never fail. Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall rise up the foundations of many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of streets to live in."

Creator God, the one who gives all life, who loves all people and all beings, thank You for the task You have given before us, the charge to us as members of this legislative body and for those of us who call ourselves people of faith, the very clear call to work for justice, to stand with the oppressed, to stand with the folks on the margins of our society.

Creator God, I thank You for the example that You gave us and the direction You give us as well, for the Book of Isaiah says, "Woe to those who make unjust laws."

Creator God, may we heed that this week, as we take on challenging issues that affect all people across this Commonwealth, help us each to discern in our way what is just and what is unjust. And, Creator God, as we have victims of crimes standing in the rotunda today, I ask You most especially to be with those who have survived trauma, who have survived assault, who have survived violence. We know, Creator God, that You have special compassion for folks who have been through the most challenging situations.

Creator God, thank You for the gift that You give us of life and the work that You have called us to do. Help us to work for justice, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with You. Amen.

### STATEMENT BY MRS. EVANS

The SPEAKER. Representative Hill-Evans.

Mrs. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise to offer HR 789, honoring the service of York City Fire/Rescue Services firefighters Ivan Flansch and Zachary Anthony, who were killed in the line of duty on March 22, 2018. Today serves as a solemn reminder of the

sacrifices made by our first responders. Firefighters Flanscha and Anthony proudly served their families, the city of York, and our entire Commonwealth.

Mr. Speaker, today we pause to remember them, especially Ivan Flanscha, born February 13, 1968, in Iowa. A graduate of York College of Pennsylvania and the Harrisburg Area Community College Fire Academy, he began his professional career with York City Fire/Rescue Services in 1999 and was selected as "Firefighter of the Year" in 2004.

Mr. Speaker, we also pause to remember Zach Anthony, born December 15, 1988, in Allentown, Lehigh County. A 2007 graduate of Pleasant Valley High School in Brodheadsville, Monroe County, and a 2008 graduate of Florida State Fire College in Ocala, Florida, he joined the York City Fire/Rescue Services in 2010 and was a leader in education sessions that paired students at St. Patrick Catholic School in York with community leaders.

Both must be as honored for their service, and as role models, heroes, and friends – truly dedicated individuals whose entire lives represent the shining example of what service to others means.

Mr. Speaker, as we stand and reflect on the tragic loss of these two men following the collapse of the former Weaver Organ and Piano Building in York city, let us also pause and remember those who answer the call each and every time there is an emergency in such a selfless fashion. Let us be reminded of how blessed and fortunate we are to know that across the Commonwealth, men and women like Firefighters Flanscha and Anthony are keeping us safe, putting their lives on the line for us every single day.

It is with deepest gratitude we acknowledge and we thank them for the inspiring ability to keep our communities safe with a steadfast and unflinching resolve while in the face of danger.

By adopting HR 789, we honor these two firefighters, in addition to all of those across this great Commonwealth who have died serving others. May their courageous sacrifices never be forgotten.

### STATEMENT BY MRS. HILL

The SPEAKER. Representative Phillips-Hill.

Mrs. HILL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, members, for your support of HR 789.

Our emergency responders are there for us in our time of need, and today we let them know that we are there for them.

On Thursday, March 22, firefighters Ivan Kenneth Flanscha, a resident of the 93d District, and Zachary John Anthony of York City Fire/Rescue Services were killed in the line of duty after a collapse of the former Weaver Organ and Piano Building in the city of York.

Ivan Kenneth Flanscha and Zachary John Anthony are husbands, fathers, cousins, neighbors, and brothers-in-arms, and they always will be. Every time that bell rings, every time that siren sounds, the men and women of our police and fire departments and ambulance services leave their posts, not knowing just what they will be asked to deal with. Sometimes that post is a dinner table; sometimes it is a birthday party or a holiday family gathering, and still, without much thought, they

just spring into action for all of us. It is a task not all of us can do, and to them and for their actions, we are eternally grateful to them. The families of our emergency responders willingly give their loved ones to us, knowing all the while that any call could be their last. On that March afternoon, that fateful realization hit home for the relatives of these firefighters, Ivan and Zachary.

We fail to say thank you often enough to the men and women who serve as our volunteer emergency responders, and frankly, it needs to be done at times other than these.

When we hear those sirens go off, that sound means something so different to them, and we know that they do not do it for the glory, but rather to satisfy a deep desire to help others in need. We also fall short when we do not express our gratitude to their families, and that is why it is so important that we are here at this moment in time.

In a world that so often stresses individualism, there is great fraternity in the emergency responder community. Those of us who interact with them often – our firefighters, our police officers, and our EMS (emergency medical services) crews – we know it; we see it. It shows in the outpouring of emotion when there has been a loss such as this, when their firefighting brethren travel great distances to say goodbye and Godspeed.

And today we are here to express our deep gratitude for the lives and service of firefighters Ivan Kenneth Flanscha and Zachary John Anthony, and we pray God's comfort and peace for all of those who feel their loss.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Members, I would ask everybody to please rise as able, and, guests, if you could, as able for a moment of silence.

(Whereupon, a moment of silence was observed.)

The SPEAKER. Thank you, members, and thank you, guests. The Sergeants at Arms will open the doors of the House.

These members have guests with respect to their resolutions. As I indicated, if you could constrain your remarks to 5 minutes, we would certainly appreciate it. This will be the order that we will be going in: Representative Vazquez will be first on 693, Representative Gainey will be second on 747, Representative Delozier will be third on 785, and Representative Gillen will be last on 790. Those that wish to speak without guests will be at the end of the session day.

### STATEMENT BY MR. VAZQUEZ

The SPEAKER. Representative Vazquez, the floor is yours.

Mr. VAZQUEZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And thanks to Representative Schweyer and my colleagues for supporting HR 693, which recognizes the CTC Wellness Foundation for forming its Don't Stall, Just Call program. This important program aims to educate students and families of the danger of binge drinking, alcohol poisoning, and Pennsylvania's medical amnesty law.

Following the devastating death of her son, Christian, from alcohol poisoning, Mary Ciammetti launched the Don't Stall, Just Call alcohol poisoning education program to save lives.

Each year approximately 88,000 people die from alcohol-related causes. This makes alcohol the third leading preventable cause of death in the United States, following tobacco and poor health. Moreover, each year more than

1,800 college students between the ages of 18 and 24 die from alcohol-related injuries.

This does not have to happen. It is time we educate our children on how to be safe and responsible. This includes: knowing your limit and planning ahead, eating before and while you drink, never accepting drinks from someone you do not know, avoiding drinking games, never mixing alcohol and prescription drugs, and respecting the rights of people who do not wish to drink.

Thank you to Ms. Ciammetti for your courage and your passion, and thank you to my colleagues for supporting HR 693. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I want to introduce the CTC Wellness Foundation guests: Mary Ciammetti, founder of CTC Wellness Foundation, principal speaker for Don't Stall, Just Call; Pat Ciammetti, husband of Mary and father of Christian Ciammetti; Christine Johnson-Hall, recording secretary for the CTC Wellness Foundation; Julia Miller, board of directors of the CTC Wellness Foundation and cospeaker for Don't Stall, Just Call; Chyllene Zakreski, executive assistant for Don't Stall, Just Call; and Patricia DiGiacomo, board of directors of the CTC Wellness Foundation and assistant professor at Temple University.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you very much, Representative Vazquez, and welcome to the CTC Wellness Foundation guests.

Representative Ed Gainey and Representative Roebuck are both recognized to speak on HR 747. We will begin with Representative Gainey. Will he go first? Okay, Representative Roebuck will go first.

Members, I am going to ask everybody to please take your seats. This resolution, we do have guests with us today. It deals with the 50th anniversary of esteemed Dr. Martin Luther King's assassination. So I am asking everybody to please take their seats.

We are going to close the doors to the House. Sergeants at Arms, if you will close the doors to the House. All members and guests, please be seated.

### STATEMENT BY MR. ROEBUCK

The SPEAKER. Representative Roebuck, you may proceed, sir.

Mr. ROEBUCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is indeed my honor to welcome to the chamber today my brothers from Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, and I want just to say a little bit about Alpha. Those who are members of this fraternity, who oftentimes join in college, make a lifetime commitment. It is a commitment to leadership, a commitment to service, a commitment to mentorship, a commitment to making a difference. So the men of Alpha are about trying to use the abilities they have to ensure that the life for their neighbors, their communities, ultimately becomes better. And that commitment is one that leads them through their professions; through the things they do with young people, their mentorship; through the things that really help to improve the quality of life for everyone. And I would note as well that Alpha has many distinguished members and we honor today one of those, Martin Luther King, an Alpha brother, and I think that it is evidence of

the type of difference that individuals who are members of Alpha make in their community and in the world.

So I am glad to welcome them here today. I would ask that the Alphas in the back would stand so that the members of the chamber might see who they are, and I am going to pass the torch to Representative Gainey.

### STATEMENT BY MR. GAINEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Ed Gainey.

Mr. GAINEY. Can the members of the Black Caucus come down, Chairman Harris and many others? Can the members of the Pennsylvania Legislative Black Caucus come on down as we do this resolution for Martin Luther King?

Mr. ROEBUCK. One of my colleagues said I should emphasize that Martin Luther King was an Alpha. I thought I said that, but I wanted to emphasize it again. Martin Luther King was an Alpha— Or I should not say was, is an Alpha.

Mr. GAINEY. I want to thank my colleagues today for giving me this opportunity to say a few words about the 50th anniversary of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King. I want to thank both sides of the aisle because I think that both sides of the aisle know that because of his life, the world is a better place. I always tell people the one thing I love about Dr. Martin Luther King is that he made lives better for everybody; particularly African-Americans, but just everybody across the world.

I always tell people the one thing that we have in common is humanity. It does not matter what color, what creed, what gender, what ethnicity; it does not matter about any of that. What it matters about is how we treat one another and the love that we deposit daily at everybody. And I think if there is one lead that we can take from Martin Luther King, just one lead, is that every day we get up and we get an opportunity to touch somebody's life, that we make sure we do it in a genuine and a true fashion. This life does not say one shoe fits all, but let me tell you what does, it is called love. And if every day we get up with the ability to be able to touch somebody's heart, to do something, as we have been called as legislators, to make sure that our community is a little bit better, then we have created a better place for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and we have created a better place for America and the world.

That is something each one of us could do every single day, and if we did that every single day, then we would definitely be living the dream that Dr. King talked about. If you believe in humanity, if you believe in equal rights, if you believe that everybody is built and born under the leadership of God, then every day you get up, deposit the word that you say that you believe in, then we will leave this world a better place for the next generation.

In honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, I salute his calling and I salute what he did to the world to make it a better place. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Gainey, thank you so much.

### STATEMENT BY MS. DELOZIER

The SPEAKER. I am going to leave the doors closed at this time because we have another very important, solemn resolution. Representative Sheryl Delozier, who does have



guests here, is recognizing the resolution that passed on Crime Victims' Rights Week.

Representative Delozier.

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to speak on HR 785, and I want to thank my colleagues for their support recognizing the week of April 8 through April 14 as "Crime Victims' Rights Week" in Pennsylvania. And we have with us today some folks that know this issue inside and out; some, unfortunately, from personal experience. We have with us today Jen Storm, who is the Commonwealth Victim Advocate, who advocates for all victims statewide. We have Valerie Dixon, who is a survivor of a violent crime, as well as director of family and community support, Center for Victims in Allegheny County. And we have Movita Johnson-Harrell, who is also a survivor and a supervisor of victim services at the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office. And I just want to say thank you for being here today and supporting all victims' voices.

We are also gathered with a number of advocates that we have in the gallery, and I appreciate all of the actions and all of the work that you guys do on a day-to-day basis to make sure that our victims are heard in our system. And as most of you know, I have been a very big advocate for the voice of our victims here in Pennsylvania, and I have been very lucky to be able to use the position as a State legislator to make sure that we get public policy in place that makes sure that our victims' voices are heard in the very entwined justice system that we have.

Working for victims' voices, one of the biggest projects that we are working on right now is sponsoring of Marsy's Law, and that is a bill that we will be working on very hard to get victims' voices on the same level that the people who commit these crimes have. These are rights and the ability for victims to be able to be part of the process and not just thought of as a second thought.

In 2015, the last year statistics were available, at least 750,000 people in Pennsylvania were victimized by crime, and of those, more than 300,000 were victims of violent crime. While realistically we will never get this number to zero, we must do all we can to make sure that those who have been victimized are made whole. Crime touches everyone, and as we stand here today, someone, somewhere in Pennsylvania is becoming the victim of a crime through no fault of their own. Whether it is assault, abuse, harassment, stalking, theft, or robbery, becoming a victim of crime, no matter how serious that crime is, is a very personal and emotional experience. But we must all work together to show would-be criminals that we will not let them intimidate us. We will not let them invade our communities and continue their wrongful acts on our streets and in our neighborhoods. One of the best parts about a community is when a community comes together in times of need, and I urge all of you to be that voice, be that victim's voice, and be that support system for those that have been victimized.

I want to thank you for supporting victims and reaffirming that they are no less deserving of rights, resources, restoration, and rehabilitation than the criminals that perpetrated the crime against them.

The SPEAKER. Thank you very much, Representative Delozier.

## STATEMENT BY MR. GILLEN

The SPEAKER. Representative Gillen is now recognized to speak on HR 790.

Mr. GILLEN. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

When we talk about the Greatest Generation, very oftentimes our minds drift to our own fathers or grandfathers, those that served during the Second World War. But it is probably a little bit less common to think in terms of the women who served during that period, not only in the Armed Forces, but also on the home front. There were 16 million women; ironically, it was about 16 million that went overseas to fight. We think of the Western European, the European conflict, Mediterranean, North African theater. My own dad was on an aircraft carrier in the South Pacific. But there was very little discussion until recent years about what was going on on the domestic front, because if we did not have those Rosie the Riveters putting those Hellcats and Wildcats and Grumman Avengers together, some 15,000 aircraft that went into the South Pacific theater and took down some 6,000 Japanese planes; my dad was on a Grumman Avenger.

And so today we are privileged to recognize "Rosie the Riveter Day," but instead of having a very stale day that we recognize, we are going to issue a challenge today before we introduce some of our special guests. In Berks County, we started Rosie the Riveter Garden behind the Berks Military History Museum. It is a special variety of rose that is going to be planted there. It is going to memorialize and commemorate individual Rosies who served in our own community, with the Penn State Cooperative Extension master gardener program. There is no reason why each of us could not have a Rosie the Riveter Garden in our own statehouse district.

It has gone unnoticed even in our own family because my dad did not talk much. I do not even think he had the capacity to talk much about World War II and his own experience, and I never had the maturity, perhaps, as a youth to ask my mother what she was doing during World War II. And that conversation has been ongoing, including last night on our way back from church. I leaned back, and I had read what Rosies made during the course of a week, and I said, "Mom, how much money did you make?" And I had read the average – it was \$30 to \$50 – and Mom said she made about \$50 a week as a Rosie the Riveter, working 6 days a week, long hours, and she showed up back home. She was the youngest of eight children. She had lost her father in 1939, and she handed that money over to her mother to take care of household responsibilities, and Dorothy Trate, whom I am going to introduce more fully in just a minute, has the same experience in terms of duty and honor and country and faith and family.

Seated in the back of the auditorium, and I am going to ask them to stand. If they would and remain standing, we will recognize them as a group. If you were down in the East Rotunda, you saw Rosie the Riveter statue, and it will be there until this afternoon if you have not had the opportunity yet. It is traveling all over the country. We had the privilege in Berks County to have it for a couple weeks. But Warren Hegg, who is the Spirit of '45 foundation representative who brought that into the bowels of this building early in the morning and helped set it up, is back there, with Jim Eaman, a Marine. I made the mistake one time of saying "ex-Marine Jim Eaman," and he readily corrected me. But we have Jesse, Rosie – let us give it a flex,

okay? – and Christine. And that is her real name, by the way, Rosie, in the middle there. And we have another very special guest I am going to introduce in just a second. But Dorothy Trate has some guests up in the gallery, our real-life Rosie up front here, and I ask them to stand as well.

And joining the group today is John Flemming. John Flemming stopped by the Berks Military History Museum 2 weeks ago. He had a German flag wrapped up that he pulled down from a building on April 25, 1945, at the very end of the European conflict there, when the Russians and the United States troops met at the Elbe River. So let us recognize these very special guests that we have in the hall of the House today.

At a period in our lives, the teenage years and early twenties, where we are contemplating our future and training for what lies ahead, there were nearly 16 million women who decided that "duty calls" meant them taking on some of the very uncertain roles – some of the heavy lifting and some of the dangerous work that was going on in America's factories. And in fact, without these women sacrificing and sweating and putting 6-, and in some cases in critical war industries, 7-day weeks, what was going on in the South Pacific or Europe could not nearly have been as efficacious.

And so while other generations have focused on me and my future and my education and my salary and my paycheck and my family, Dorothy Trate, who is the oldest of seven – and I will ask Dorothy to stand – and Concetta Gillen, who is the youngest of eight, decided that duty, service, honor, and country were the most important things in their lives during World War II. Thank you and God bless you.

### STATEMENT BY MR. MILNE

The SPEAKER. Representative Duane Milne is recognized under unanimous consent. The Representative has a number of guests with us today.

Mr. MILNE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I wanted to formally welcome to Harrisburg a class of political science majors from West Chester University who are here because they are studying Pennsylvania government and politics, and what better place to study Pennsylvania government and politics than, of course, at the Capitol Complex in our good Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

I am very proud to be wearing the purple and gold to help welcome the Golden Rams of West Chester University here today. The group I am going to ask to stand in a moment, but let me just first introduce a couple of my faculty colleagues from West Chester University who have accompanied the class here. We have Dr. John Kennedy – a little wave there, John; Dr. Ashlie Delshad; and our wonderful department's administrative assistant, Tara Easterling. Thank you, Tara. She does a wonderful job, like all the staff here, back at West Chester. And if I could ask the class to rise as well. This is a West Chester University class studying Pennsylvania government and politics.

So I would just quickly add that the reason they are here is because in West Chester University Department of Political Science, we take a lot of pride in educating students to take an interest, obviously, in public affairs and the public sector, and we are trying to encourage them to take an interest particularly in State government, and we have used today as an occasion for

them to see all the activity that we are involved with, all the legislation that is taking place here, and encourage them to think about State government as a public service option.

West Chester University Department of Political Science is I think a well-ranked department because in part, we have wonderful faculty in the classroom who bring their expertise and subject-matter expertise into the classroom to share with students. But I also will share with you, if you can think back to your college days, part of the educational experience certainly is getting beyond the classroom and beyond campus, and that was exactly the purpose of today. Today is just one example of what we do on a regular basis in the Department of Political Science at West Chester University with a wide variety of field experiences, simulations, internships, and expeditions like this to see politics and government in action. We try to encourage the students to see a wider breadth beyond the classroom.

I would just close by noting that at West Chester University, the Political Science Department is 450 majors strong; 450 majors strong that are looking to take their place in the world. I would know at least 25 to 35, and probably more, West Chester University political science major alums that work, actually, here in the Capitol Complex, so we have a great partnership that we formed here with the Capitol Complex area and State government.

Beyond that, our majors go into a wide variety of work in political parties, interest groups, advocacy organizations, business, military, and nonprofit, so we try to encourage the students that political science is an outstanding liberal arts foundation and beginning point for any number of career paths along the way. And we do our part at West Chester University to try to contribute to the university's overall continued success. We are all very proud to know that West Chester is a crown jewel in the education landscape of West Chester University, including being ranked in the top 100 best values in public higher education across the nation; across the entire nation, we are in the top 100 best values in public higher education. And for that reason we all take great pride in affirming what we know at West Chester to be true: we expect excellence.

And again, I am glad to welcome the group from West Chester University and the political science majors and certainly encourage them to take an interest, to continue an interest in all the good work that we do here in the Capitol.

Mr. DERMODY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, we are all for business. We are all for small businesses in the Commonwealth; however, it has been a while since this bill was on second consideration. I would like to remind the members that what this bill does is cost the Commonwealth millions of dollars. Now, that may be a good thing, but I think this bill should be done in a much broader conversation concerning our whole budget. We have budget season coming up. We are going to have to vote a budget in a month or so, and if we are going to cut millions of dollars out of the budget, we ought to see how we are going to replace it, how we are going to pay for it, and how we can make it work in a way that makes sense for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, for the businesses of Pennsylvania, and for our budget.

So while this may be a good idea in the general budget consideration, a stand-alone bill that takes millions of dollars out of the Treasury without a larger budget discussion is a mistake, and I urge a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. Representative Dunbar, on the bill.

Yeah, and then Representative Nelson will get a chance to go last.

Mr. DUNBAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to correct for the record, what we just heard. This bill does not cost the Commonwealth any money. It is revenue-neutral. It is solely just a timing issue on when you can take a depreciation deduction.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Does anybody else wish to be recognized before I call upon the prime sponsor of the bill, Representative Nelson? Does anybody else wish to be recognized?

Representative Nelson, for a second time, sir.

Mr. NELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the comments of my colleague, and again, not only is this a revenue-neutral bill, but the House's financial software does not allow for dynamic modeling.

This is a pro-growth bill, and when we talk about, even short-term, the reduction of funds, for year 1, it is approximately \$2 million; \$2 million to the State of Pennsylvania to allow small businesses, construction companies, farmers, the ABC (Associated Builders and Contractors) to compete on a more level playing field. Year 2 we are talking a total of \$18 million. It is not a revenue-driving issue.

It is time that our small businesses in Pennsylvania be given the same opportunities as our large businesses. Our greatest employers should be allowed to compete on an equal playing field, and this bill affords that opportunity, and I thank everyone for their unified support.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

### STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Murt, the floor is yours, on HR 713.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am grateful for this opportunity to make remarks about HR 713, which declares today and this month "Cushing's Syndrome Awareness Day." Mr. Speaker, today about 15 million people are suffering from the endocrine disorder known as Cushing's Syndrome, and complicating the problem, many suffer without knowing treatment is available and critical to preventing further complications.

Mr. Speaker, Cushing's Syndrome is an endocrine disorder that most commonly affects people between the ages of 20 and 50. It occurs when the body's tissues are exposed to excessive levels of cortisol for long periods of time. The symptoms of the illness arise when they take hormones to fight asthma, rheumatoid arthritis, lupus, and other inflammatory diseases. The most common signs and symptoms involve progressive obesity and skin changes. Mr. Speaker, those afflicted will notice weight gain and fatty tissue deposits, particularly around the midsection and upper back. Their face will grow thicker and they will notice purple stretch marks on the skin of the abdomen, thighs, and arms. They will be slow to heal from cuts and infection. Mr. Speaker, if those affected do not receive prompt treatment, they can experience bone loss and unusual fractures, high blood pressure, diabetes, frequent or unusual infections, and loss of muscle mass and strength.

Mr. Speaker, by declaring "Cushing's Syndrome Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania, we are drawing attention to those suffering in silence. They must know that treatment is available to reduce serious injury, and the best weapon against this illness is education. We must make the public aware of the disease and its symptoms to increase the chances of a successful treatment. I thank my colleagues for their support on this measure.

They will approve the minutes. They will take public comment, if there is any. They will pay the bills. They will debate a land development or a subdivision plan. They will discuss who should pay for the recreation programs this summer and how much. They might plan a festival or a parade or a day of some sort. Other than that one citizen who always comes to the meeting and sits in the back of the room, they are pretty much alone, and their efforts are pretty much unnoticed. Unless, of course, something goes wrong. When the streets are not plowed, when the kids have no place to play, when the jobs leave town, that is when people wake up and say, "Something must be done." But your local government folks are out there every night trying to get something done, and they are not often recognized for what they do and must do well to keep the peace, to make sure there are adequate emergency services, and to make their budgets balance every single year.

As chair of the House Local Government Committee, I tell them all the time: by the time the Federal government responds to your emergency, the levees are broken, the streets are flooded, and the people are drowned. In Pennsylvania, it is your job to make sure the emergency services are working, and here in Pennsylvania, we literally have thousands of local governments and thousands of local government people working hard every day and every night to make sure these things are handled for the community. It is government by your neighbors, for your neighbors, and of your neighbors.

I want to thank my colleagues for recognizing the hard work of Pennsylvania's local governments and proclaiming this Pennsylvania "Local Government Week" and Wednesday Pennsylvania "Local Government Day." Thank you all, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.
