**MANHEIM TOWNSHIP HIGH SCHOOL
BOYS LACROSSE TEAM PRESENTED**

The SPEAKER. Representative Mentzer, you may proceed, sir.

Mr. MENTZER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is the honor of myself and Chairman Sturla, and privilege, to introduce to this chamber the Manheim Township Boys Lacrosse Team. They are the 2018 PIAA State Champions in the Class AAA for boys lacrosse in Pennsylvania. These young men – and standing behind me are the team captains, Zach Diamond, Caton Johnson, and Dan Klotz, and their coach, Dan Lyons – deserve our recognition today. As they enjoy this honor, there are others also bathing in their success: Coach Lyons and the players who have graduated from this team have also worked very hard to develop this program at Manheim Township High School and are also enjoying this win.

Mr. Speaker, this sport is, in relative terms, newly recognized by the PIAA in Pennsylvania. Since lacrosse was recognized in 2009, the championships in this sport have gone to high schools in the southeast part of Pennsylvania. Having this win in central Pennsylvania is a great achievement for these young men – and their State Representative. You see, I played sports at Manheim Township High School in 1974. Mr. Speaker, that is 44 years ago.

The SPEAKER. No way.

Mr. MENTZER. And, Mr. Speaker, I can only hope that these young men have a better chance at keeping their hair than I did.

But when I was in high school, the new sport was soccer, and it was in its early stages of development at Manheim Township High School. But our soccer team was unable to wrestle the State championship from the jaws of that Philadelphia region, so now we have done it, and our community is very proud.

So, Mr. Speaker, let us recognize this winning lacrosse team with a hearty round of applause, and then comments from Chairman Sturla.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, Representative Mentzer, for inviting me to be up here.

I have half of a precinct of Manheim Township in my district, so it is unlikely that I would be up here except for the fact that one of the players, Jeffrey Sturla, happens to be my nephew, and so I wanted to be here, in particular, just for him, to recognize him. So thank you.

The SPEAKER. My understanding is that the gentlemen we have here right now – first of all, Dan Lyons is the coach. Dan, will you raise your hand. Thank you so much. Then I believe these are the three captains, Representatives Mentzer and Sturla: Zach Diamond, Caton Johnson, and Dan Klotz. Please raise your hands, the three captains here. Thanks so much, guys. Great. We are so honored to have this State championship team from Manheim Township High School.

The Sergeants at Arms will open the doors of the House.

Gentlemen, if you could just go out your left, up to the rear. Thank you so much.

Members, come onto the House floor, but we are going to close the doors of the House because we have another important introduction.

If these folks could come down to the front right now. If the Sergeants at Arms can bring down the folks from Wexford Elementary School in the Pine-Richland School District, and those folks from the Mt. Lebanon School District, if they could come up here to the rostrum with us; if we could bring them down to the rostrum. It is going to be a little tight, but I think we have room for everybody.

**GREEN RIBBON AWARD WINNERS
WEXFORD ELEMENTARY SCHOOL AND
MT. LEBANON HIGH SCHOOL
PRESENTED**

The SPEAKER. The United States Department of Education has, really, a prestigious award that they give out called the Green Ribbon Award to school buildings and the great work that is going on within those buildings, and there are only 46 schools, 6 districts, and 6 postsecondary institutions across the country that have been given this award, and it is really for innovative efforts in education. Out of all the school districts – 500 – and

school buildings, and the work going on inside of those buildings – we know how much great work is being done – but only two in Pennsylvania were honored with this Green Ribbon Award.

We have leaders from those two schools here with us today. The first one is from Wexford Elementary School in the Pine-Richland School District, which myself and Representative Hal English represent. Wexford Elementary demonstrated progress toward goals in reducing environmental impact and creating energy efficiency; having a positive effect on the health and performance of students and staff; and worked diligently to exhibit effective environmental and sustainability education. From the Pine-Richland School District, Wexford Elementary, we have the principal, Dr. Rick Walsh – please raise your hand – Joanna Firmin, Wexford Elementary School teacher; Becky Miller, Wexford Elementary School teacher; Kristi Wees, Wexford Elementary School parent; and Jerry Glevicky, who is the Wexford Elementary School custodian. Each and every one of them was part of the projects, the innovative projects that got them – really, the team – and the school the designation as one of the Green Ribbon School awardees.

Please let us give them a round of applause. We are so honored that you would take the time to travel the nearly 4 hours to be with us today. As you know, this body continues to invest in public education, and we thank you for your heroic efforts. Thank you.

Now, our second school – and Representative Dan Miller, if you could come up to the rostrum. Representative Miller, because he will be talking to you about these good folks. But the second Green Ribbon School is Mt. Lebanon High School. I was just at Mt. Lebanon High School for a swim meet this past weekend. It was my kid. Representative Miller, do you want me to do the introductions, sir? Okay. That would be great. Thank you, sir.

Mt. Lebanon High School, as you know, is in the South Hills of Allegheny County. I was just talking to the team here. First of all, Dr. Timothy Steinhauer is superintendent of schools for Mt. Lebanon. Please raise your hand. Outstanding school district. Dr. Ronald P. Davis, assistant superintendent for secondary education; the high school principal, Brian McFeeley; and the high school unit principal, Carlene McGinty. And we also have executive director for Women for a Healthy Environment, Michelle Naccarati-Chapkis; and we have the educational program specialist/healthy schools coordinator for Women for a Healthy Environment, Michele Buford. Oh, she came up for both. Okay, which is great.

Amongst other things, Mt. Lebanon just did a complete renovation of its school building and made sure that it was LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certified. You have a recycling and composting project that you do with the students and community, an environmental education program in the school district – and, Principal, I am missing one other important point – and you have an energy-savings program, as well, that you do with the teachers, students, and community.

Boy, thank you so much. What an honor: one of 46 schools in the United States of America to receive the Green Ribbon Award. Please give them a round of applause.

We also have with us Madison Jones, who is going to be a junior at Mt. Lebanon High School. She just finished her sophomore year. Congratulations. Thank you. And, Representative Miller, thank you, sir.

STATEMENT BY MS. OBERLANDER

The SPEAKER. Representative Oberlander, the floor is yours. Ms. OBERLANDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I know that we have not voted on this resolution yet, but I do fully anticipate that it will be supported unanimously. It is HR 978, and it designates June 22 as "Lineworker Appreciation Day" in Pennsylvania. And this is a resolution that I sponsor each year in memory of a lineworker from the 63d District that lost his life while working to restore the power in our area. And I know that we have members in this House whose spouses, brothers, and sisters are also lineworkers.

Last year, in the work that was being done to restore power after the hurricane in Florida, I had a lineworker who was electrocuted. He has, praise the Lord, survived. He has had a very long comeback, but he is alive. And so this resolution is to draw attention to the important, dangerous work that our lineworkers do. There are approximately 114,000 of them, and any time that you have a storm or a power outage – I know coming across Interstate 80, I see many of their trucks as they travel to and from to help bring back that essential utility.

So today I honor their work, and I appreciate your support of the hard work that they do.

STATEMENT BY MR. WENTLING

The SPEAKER. Representative Parke Wentling, on HR 990. Mr. WENTLING. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Pennsylvania boasts more than 1500 lakes, ponds, and reservoirs, making it a treasure trove of recreation, scenic beauty, and habitat for wildlife.

With that in mind, I ask for your positive vote to declare July 2018 as "Lake Appreciation Month" in Pennsylvania. Lakes are a valuable economic resource for the Commonwealth's businesses, tourism industry, and municipal governments. Lakes also keep us safe through their use as flood control, for agricultural purposes, and as drinking water supplies for our homes.

Maintaining healthy lakes, ponds, and reservoirs is a responsibility that falls on all Pennsylvania citizens. When we have the opportunity later today, please join me in voting in support of this House resolution. I had a number of members here that cosponsored the resolution, and I offered to mention the lakes that they wanted me to mention that are in their legislative district. We had Lake Erie with Representatives Bizzarro and Sonney, Edinboro Lake with Representative Bizzarro, and Lake Redman by Representative Saylor.

DR. BRENDA ALLEN PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. We have a very special guest, and we are going to actually see if she would like to say a few words to the members. If we could just clear the rostrum. A brief hello; we would love it. Dr. Brenda Allen is the president of Lincoln University, and she is the guest today of Representative John Lawrence. Representative Lawrence, if you could come up. Please, let us give her a warm welcome, Dr. Brenda Allen.

Dr. Allen, we are so honored to have you here. If you would like to say a few words about the school and your tenure there and introduce yourself to the members. We are honored to have you here.

Dr. ALLEN. Well, thank you; that is such an honor. Thank you for welcoming me today. Thank you for the work that you do. Thank you for the support of Lincoln University. As many of you may or may not know, Lincoln University is the oldest historically Black college in the nation. Pennsylvania has the distinct honor of being the home of two historically Black institutions, both established as the rest of the country had African-American people in bondage.

Over the course of the last 164 years, Lincoln University has continued to transform the lives of many people from many racial backgrounds. We are among the top five historically Black colleges that educate individuals who come from the lower economic strata who end up in the top-five levels of the socioeconomic strata. We have a history of producing a lot of firsts. As many of you may know, distinguished poet Langston Hughes was a Lincoln University graduate; Thurgood Marshall,

who argued that strong Supreme Court case for *Brown v. Board of Education*, was a Lincoln University alumnus; and me, the 14th president, also a proud alumnus of Lincoln University, class of 1991.

So I am glad to be back in Pennsylvania. I am so honored to be running a school that has done so much to transform my life, and all I want to do is to make sure that we provide that for other individuals in the coming generations. And so to be here today is an honor, and again I just want to thank the State of Pennsylvania for the support that you have for the university, and all of your continued support is very much appreciated. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you very much, Dr. Allen.

Dr. Allen, 2200 students at Lincoln University? And, Doctor, 1854 Lincoln University was founded? 1854. Thank you very much.

The Sergeants at Arms will open the doors of the House.

Members, we are going to stay in recess. We are waiting for both the Appropriations Committee and the Consumer Affairs Committee, but we are going to go at ease. We are going to go at ease at this time.

I just want to thank all the members, and then particularly the members of the Judiciary Committee, Chairman Marsico, and Chairman Petrarca. The bill that we just passed and sent to the Senate will go a long way at stopping a terrible epidemic of squatting that is going to spread throughout the Commonwealth if we do not pass this legislation and get it signed into law. BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 2121, PN 3747**, entitled:

An Act to provide from the General Fund for the expenses of the Executive and Judicial Departments, the State Government Support Agencies and the General Assembly of the Commonwealth, the public debt and the public schools for the fiscal year July 1, 2018, to June 30, 2019, for certain institutions and organizations and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018; to provide appropriations from the State Lottery Fund, the Tobacco Settlement Fund, the Aviation Restricted Account, the Hazardous Material Response Fund, The State Stores Fund, the Milk Marketing Fund, the Home Investment Trust Fund, the Emergency Medical Services Operating Fund, the Tuition Account Guaranteed Savings Program Fund, the Banking Fund, the Firearm Records Check Fund, the Ben Franklin Technology Development Authority Fund, the Oil and Gas Lease Fund, the Home Improvement Account, the Cigarette Fire Safety and Firefighter Protection Act Enforcement Fund, the Insurance Regulation and Oversight Fund, the Pennsylvania Racehorse Development Restricted Receipt Account, the Justice Reinvestment Fund, the Multimodal Transportation Fund, the State Racing Fund and the ABLE Savings Program Fund to the Executive Department; to provide appropriations from the Judicial Computer System Augmentation Account to the Judicial Department for the fiscal year July 1, 2018, to June 30, 2019; to provide appropriations from the Motor License Fund for the fiscal year July 1, 2018, to June 30, 2019, for the proper operation of several departments of the Commonwealth and the Pennsylvania State Police authorized to spend Motor License Fund money; to provide for the appropriation of Federal funds to the Executive and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth and for the payment of bills remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2018; to provide for the additional appropriation of Federal and State funds from the General Fund, the State Lottery Fund and the Tobacco Settlement Fund for the Executive and Judicial Departments of the Commonwealth for the fiscal year July 1, 2017, to June 30, 2018, and for the payment of bills incurred and remaining unpaid at the close of the fiscal year ending June 30, 2017; and providing for augmentation from additional funding source.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Members, I am going to ask everybody to come onto the floor. This is the general appropriations bill. I know there are other ancillary bills as well, but members should come to the floor at this time. Representative Saylor will be speaking, Chairman Saylor of the Appropriations Committee I believe will lead off, and then Chairman Markosek will follow. So I am asking all members to please come to the floor. This is the general appropriations bill. We will hold it open for a couple more minutes, but all members should come to the floor. It is the general appropriations bill. I know there is going to be some discussion on the bill. The leaders, I am sure, will speak as well. All members, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats. This is HB 2121, PN 3747, and it is on page 12 of today's House calendar.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Chairman Stan Saylor, the Appropriations chair, the majority Appropriations chair, will speak first. Members, please take your seats.

Members, as you know, there is no time limit for the Appropriations chairs or the leaders. There are 5-minute limitations for all other members who wish to speak.

Chairman Saylor, you may proceed, sir.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to ask for support for HB 2121. HB 2121, of course, is our 2018-19 General Fund budget. I want to highlight just a couple aspects of our budget that we are about to, hopefully, pass.

The total spend number in HB 2121 is \$32.7 billion. That is an increase of \$560 million, or a 1.7-percent increase over last year's budget. The budget is below the rate of inflation. The rate of inflation is 2.13 percent. There are no new taxes, no fee increases to be utilized in paying for this budget. We are also putting money into the Rainy Day Fund. This is the first time we have done this since the Great Recession occurred. And the great note that I make to the members of this House is, in the past, the way the Rainy Day Fund was managed was that we would put 25 percent of the surplus in the Rainy Day Fund. This new budget allocates that 50 percent of any surplus must go into the Rainy Day Fund, so it is an improvement in what we are doing there as well.

The budget also includes money for education. Specifically, it includes \$100 million more for basic education, \$20 million more for Pre-K, \$5 million more for Head Start, \$15 million more for special education, and \$25 million more for our educational improvement tax credit. For school safety, which has national attention and is a major issue for all of us in our districts in trying to protect our students, we are committing \$60 million this year. We are using some of the funds that were made available as a result of the Corbett veto in the '14-'15 budget that was reversed by the courts. So the House is committed, both the Democrats and Republicans, to \$15 million towards that \$60 million, the Senate is committing \$15 million, and the administration as well is committing \$15 million, and we are using \$15 million from the Judiciary to create a restricted account for school safety.

Building onto many pieces of legislation that this General Assembly passed for career and technical education, our legislative package that passed here back in April, we are also committing an additional \$30 million for career and technical education. We realized the important role that these schools play in training our future workforce. This is an investment in growing Pennsylvania's economy.

PASSHE (Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education) will get an additional \$15 million, which is a 3.3-percent increase, which are our 14 State-owned universities; Penn State, Temple, Lincoln, our community colleges, and Thaddeus Stevens school will get a 3-percent increase in this budget.

We also realize the importance of our number one industry in Pennsylvania: agriculture. We have increased \$3 million to the line item for the spotted lanternfly, which is a major issue for Pennsylvania, a species that I believe comes from China. We are also committed in this budget to Penn State's Agricultural Research and Extension office, as well the University of Pennsylvania Veterinary School, with a 3-percent increase.

There is money in this budget to provide services to an additional 965 individuals that have intellectual disabilities and currently are on our waiting list. There is money in this budget to provide home- and community-based services to an additional 5230 seniors and those with physical disabilities. There is funding in this budget to provide child-care services to an additional 1600 children, further reducing the waiting list.

The budget includes funds to provide evidence-based home visiting services to 800 families affected by our opioid crisis and epidemic. We have appropriated funds in this budget for a rate increase to our EMS (emergency medical services) agencies, as well, and the critical services they provide to each of our communities. There is a \$5.5 million increase for nursing home rate increases.

Today this is a fiscally responsible budget that provides for the needs of the citizens of this Commonwealth without increasing taxes. I ask the members of this General Assembly to please vote "yes" on what is very responsible and meets the needs of our citizens.

I also want to thank Chairman Markosek, my cohort on the Democratic side, for working so closely this year to try and get a bipartisan budget that Democrats, Republicans, and the Governor could come together on. So Chairman Markosek, this is his last budget, and I am pleased to say that we have a budget that I believe we can all agree is a good budget for the citizens of Pennsylvania.

So, Mr. Speaker, I thank you, and again I ask for a "yes" vote on 2121.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Chairman Saylor.

Chairman Saylor, I know this is the general appropriations bill, but there is no tax bill because there are no tax increases. Is that correct?

Mr. SAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, there are no tax increases and no fee increases in this budget.

The SPEAKER. Representative Markosek. Chairman Markosek.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I would like to first of all thank Chairman Saylor for his kind words. It has been great working with him, great working with Chairman Adolph before that, and all of the members and staff of the Appropriations Committee in the last number of years that I have been fortunate to be the chairman.

When the Democratic Caucus elevated me to the job to become the chairman, the Democratic chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, it was certainly a great honor. But I was also stepping in at the time, back in 2011, into a position, like many of you did then, to provide fiscal direction for a State racked by this country's worst recession. In 2011-2012 our General Fund budget was \$27.3 billion. Today we are looking at

\$32.7, as mentioned. When I was a freshman, way back when, our budget was \$7 1/2 billion, and people still complained about spending too much.

We all can find things that do not sit well with us or do not sit well with our constituents in HB 2121. But I do not rise to speak to you today about any negatives. There are good elements in this budget: hundreds of millions of more dollars for education, both basic education and higher education; a deeper commitment to fixing our roads and bridges, something we all agree to and something important to me as the former chairman of the Transportation Committee; a balanced Lottery Fund, so that all of our constituents who use those programs will feel confident that they will continue.

We are stepping up with this budget to do more for our relatives, neighbors, and friends with intellectual disabilities. The money in this budget will help us reduce the waiting list in Pennsylvania, that has grown far beyond what I have personally thought it should be. We are not shying away from the fight to stop heroin and opioid abuse and addiction. And we are continuing to pay the pension bills that the legislature, years ago, wrongly sidestepped in the past.

Overall, we have not overspent during my time as Democratic chairman. Provided you can lead us – provided you can lead us, because I am not going to be here – but provided you can lead us successfully into the 2019-2020 budget, I believe we can do more to help our citizenry and move Pennsylvania up the economic ladder – and still not overspend.

While the amount of our General Fund budgets have slightly increased during my time as chairman, our political discourse has sometimes headed in the opposite direction. We cannot afford to do that. The budget process needs proposals, counterproposals, listening, consideration, and firm commitment to get it done. This works if you are in the majority and it works in you are in the minority. This institution is designed for compromise. When we do not compromise, it does not work.

Pennsylvania's schoolchildren need more support – better leadership and inspirational examples of what it takes to learn and grow as human beings and as a community. If they do not see and feel what it is like to be valued, they will grow up hurt, and probably vindictive or selfish, and we will tumble further as a Commonwealth. This is not what William Penn envisioned when he founded the Province of Pennsylvania many years ago. It is not what our veterans fought for in either of the World Wars, Afghanistan, or the Gulf.

Our worst enemy can be ourselves when it comes to evil and wrongdoing, and it has been ourselves throughout the United States. We can be a positive example – fiscally, inspirationally, rationally, and intellectually. I hope you will be that and more, because the talk about what the 2019-2020 budget should be or must be will begin almost as soon as the 2018-19 budget becomes law.

So let us stay focused on why we are here – we are almost at the deadline – and let us keep those good vibes going that are so prevalent this year. You will need them moving forward without me.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker; thank you, Chairman Saylor; and thank you, colleagues and friends. Now, let us go get this budget done. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Cris Dush. Representative Dush, you may begin. A 5-minute clock, please. You may begin, sir.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Compared to 4 years ago, we have come a very, very long way from the day when the Governor's budget went down zero to 193 with no support on either side of the House, to today where we now have a budget that we do not have additional taxes, the Trump tax cuts have actually spurred the economy, and we are looking at – thank you – we are looking at having something of a surplus.

With that being said, I do have some concerns, specifically with page 388 of the bill: "EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED BY LAW, IF AN ADDITIONAL FUNDING SOURCE AFTER THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS SECTION BECOMES AVAILABLE, THE SECRETARY OF THE BUDGET MAY, UPON EXPRESS WRITTEN APPROVAL OF THE CHAIRPERSON AND MINORITY CHAIRPERSON OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE OF THE SENATE AND THE CHAIRPERSON AND MINORITY CHAIRPERSON OF THE APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, DIRECT THAT FUNDING SOURCE TO AUGMENT A LINE ITEM APPROPRIATION IN THIS ACT...."

Now, we have seen the propensity for the Governor and the Secretary of the Budget, as well as DGS (Department of General Services), to create things like what was supposed to have been a lease-leaseback and then create a special fund and a new funding source. While I understand the original language that the Governor wanted in here gave much more latitude to the Secretary of the Budget, this does at least rein it in and hold it to where each of the chairpersons in all four caucuses have the ability to put a stop to it.

That being said, a supplemental appropriations bill should be coming back to the House for consideration. I will take the chairman's word that the caucus will be notified upon receipt of that request, but I would still think that any supplemental appropriation should be done by the General Assembly.

Further, page 381, "GENERAL RULE.—ANY FEDERAL MONEY..." – and if the chairman would be willing for an interrogation on this, I just want to— I am not saying it is— I just want to clarify, a point of clarification.

The SPEAKER. Chairman Saylor says he will stand.

Mr. DUSH. Just a quick question as regards to— I will read the language; I think you got it. As "GENERAL RULE.—ANY FEDERAL MONEY WHICH HAS BEEN PREVIOUSLY APPROPRIATED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY AND AUTHORIZED OR ALLOCATED BY THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT BUT REMAINS UNSPENT FROM PRIOR FISCAL YEARS AND WILL NOT BE RENEWED FOR FISCAL YEAR 2018-2019 IS HEREBY APPROPRIATED." That is on page 381. Does that mean that the money is going back to the Federal government, or is that going to be allocated to something specifically to that fiscal year?

Mr. SAYLOR. Mr. Speaker, the money that is allocated by the Federal government for that agency is allocated for a specific use. It can be carried over, but it cannot, the use of that money cannot be used for anything else. Just because you did not use it this year, you cannot move it to another category and use it for something else. Federal government rules would say it has to be spent, whatever they themselves, as the Federal government, have allocated it for.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you. And that money, after a 2-year period, has to go back to the Federal government. Is that not correct?

Mr. SAYLOR. Yeah. If we do not reappropriate it after 2 years, you are correct, it would have to go back to the Federal government.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

Because of the lack of time, I will withhold my judgment on the bill until I have heard some more questions answered by other members. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Longietti.

Please begin the timer.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support HB 2121, the general appropriations bill for the 2018-19 budget. There are a lot of good features in this bill and we have heard some of those, whether it is the money for early childhood education, which is critically important, or for our school districts, for higher ed, for career and technical ed. There are a lot of good reasons to support this bill.

But I do want to put it on the record a concern. And I serve as the Democratic chair of the Tourism and Recreational Development Committee, and one of the line items in the budget is "Marketing to Attract Tourists." And just to give historical reference, you know, it was not that long ago that we spent about \$30 million to attract tourists to Pennsylvania, and now as far as that line item goes – at least the money that actually goes to attract tourists – we are down to about \$4 million. It is hard to compete with neighboring States. New York is spending about \$70 million; Michigan, I think, is in the \$40 million range; and there are others that spend significantly more than Pennsylvania, and that translates into lost market share. We have been losing market share as a result of that.

A recent study that was done showed that for every dollar we put into marketing the State, that is about \$3.43 in sales tax revenue in the same budget year. In the same budget year, we get about a \$3 1/2 return on every dollar we put into marketing the State.

Now, when you look at that line item, it looks like it is getting a bump, which would be a good thing, right? Unfortunately, my understanding is that that money is not going to be allocated for actually marketing the State for tourism purposes, and instead is going to end up getting allocated to projects or events in certain areas of the State, which I am sure we could all argue that there is something in our area that could use some help, but we really need to put that money into marketing the State and attracting tourism so that we do not continue to lose market share.

And so my concern is that we are going to look at that line item and say, "Wow, it's getting a bump," and then next year is going to come and we are going to say, "We don't need to do anything there," when in reality, we are not putting that money into marketing the State. And I think we are making a mistake, because tourists, potential tourists watch television commercials. They get other ways that we can reach them and we are not reaching them and our surrounding States are reaching them and we are losing market share, which means that we cannot grow our economy in Pennsylvania. And each of us – it does not matter where our district is – each and every one of us, tourism is a significant part of our local economy, and so we ought to be investing in that. We ought to be marketing the State, and I hope when we look at a budget next year, we would keep that in mind.

So thank you, Mr. Speaker. I will be voting for the bill, but I wanted to put that on the record. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Greg Vitali. And please start the clock. Representative Vitali, that was not— I am saying it for—

Mr. VITALI. I am not going to personalize that.
Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. —every member; every member, sir, not just you.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. I just want to make a couple of points, my concerns with this budget. The first is, it assumes about \$83,000 in revenue from the Oil and Gas Lease Fund, and it in fact takes the Oil and Gas Lease Fund practically down to zero. I believe that the \$35,000 going to the General Fund from the Oil and Gas Lease Fund is clearly unconstitutional based on the *Environmental Defense Foundation* case decided last June. So that is clearly, clearly unconstitutional. I think the other \$83,000 to DCNR (Department of Conservation and Natural Resources) is also unconstitutional. So I think that is one clear problem with this.

I think another problem is that it continues the chronic underfunding of the Department of Environmental Protection. Ten years ago, that agency had about 3,070 employees. Now, over time, by cut after cut, it is barely over 2500, about 2540 employees. So there has been a 500-person cut in Environmental Protection, and that has resulted in the underenforcement of our environmental laws throughout the Commonwealth.

Third, I think the Delaware River Basin Commission funding, it was over \$900,000 under Governor Corbett, and it is \$217,000 now. That agency performs a very worthwhile function in regulating water withdrawals from the Delaware River, which an enormous amount of Pennsylvania's population benefits from. I think, I believe this is flat-out retaliation against that commission for doing their job with regard to protecting the drinking water and avoiding unnecessary gas drilling in that region.

Mr. Speaker, I understand this is a difficult – I am not even going to say it is a difficult budget time, because we are at full employment. We are at full employment. We are about 3.8-percent employment. Times never should be better. If there are revenue shortfalls, it is because we have chosen to have revenue shortfalls. We are at a great time in our economy with the employment levels being what they are. We are choosing to chronically underfund a very important agency. We are choosing not to enact constitutional revenue measures. We are continuing to flaunt the PA Supreme Court's authority, as far as us being trustees of the public trust, as far as the oil and gas fund.

So I just wanted to raise those concerns for the record, and thank you for your indulgence.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.
Representative Sturla. Waives off.

I ask my colleagues to support this amendment. It is technical in nature. In this advisory board, the language just states "A building owner or manager," and I would like to amend the bill to say that "An owner or manager of a commercial building with an elevator" to ensure that this is a building owner or manager with an elevator, given that we are talking about elevators as the advisory board.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
The SPEAKER. Thank you.
Representative Mullery, on the amendment, sir.
Mr. MULLERY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I think it is very important to understand the Senator's impetus behind this bill. Back on July 18, 2016, Kristopher Moules, a corrections officer from Luzerne County, was killed in the line of duty when, in a struggle with an inmate, they bumped up against an elevator door. It was caused to swing out, and both fell 59 feet and 1 inch to their deaths. Senator Baker, who has worked tirelessly with the Department of Labor and Industry and with the elevator industry to craft a bill that has been agreed upon by essentially all parties, worked over the course of

the last 2 years to get this bill into print, and I know her desire is to have this bill to the Governor's desk in advance of the July 18, 2018, anniversary of this tragic death.

These amendments – this one included – are not agreed to by the maker, they are not agreed to by the department, and they are not agreed to by the elevator industry. We have a very strong bill, a bill that is very well crafted and ready for passage by the Governor.

For those reasons I would strongly urge a "no" vote on amendment 7756.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Aaron Kaufer, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. KAUFER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I must also rise and ask for a "no" vote in regard to this amendment. This has been a work of a couple of years in getting to this point, and I want to ask my colleagues to oppose this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Galloway, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. GALLOWAY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I, too, rise to oppose this amendment. This bill that has been negotiated between the House and the Senate, Senator Baker's bill, has been a long time coming. It is a good bill. It is agreed upon.

We have serious concerns over all these amendments that have been filed, and I ask my colleagues for a negative vote on this amendment. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. Representative Evankovich, on the amendment.

Mr. EVANKOVICH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I really respect the nature by which my colleagues just stood in opposing this amendment. I just want to remind the membership that we use words like "agreed upon" and we use words like "shareholder meetings," but did any of them come and talk to you? Every member that introduces a bill must face the test of the 252 other members of the 2 elected chambers and a Governor, and to simply say that something is agreed upon or not agreed upon in a matter of very heavy substance is understandable.

This amendment, under the bill's language – the bill is drafted and has an advisory board, and as a member of that nine-member advisory board is a building owner or manager. I think most of us in here probably own a building. Does that make us an expert on elevators? This is about elevator safety. This is about ensuring that what happened to the young man, the young corrections officer, does not happen to anyone. And just nominating an individual that happens to own a building – it could be a building that is underground – does not make them a suitable expert and a right to have a seat on this type of an advisory board.

This is a technical amendment. This is technical in nature. It adds the word "elevator" to the owner or manager. I strongly ask for members' support so that we can ensure that this tragedy does not occur in our Commonwealth again. Thank you.

If I could have the attention of the members for just a couple of minutes, with an issue which I consider critically important to our constituents across the State of Pennsylvania when it comes to drug and alcohol treatment. The Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs has proposed to change the criteria on which they evaluate people going into treatment for level of care. A criteria has been in place and used in Pennsylvania for 28 years, and it is my belief and the belief of a lot of people who assess people for drug and alcohol treatment that it works very, very well. The department has proposed to changing to this criteria – look at this book – the ASAM (American Society of Addiction Medicine) criteria, which is a national standard. This book is 450 pages. Eight thousand people in the State that do this assessment are going to have to be retrained in this ASAM.

Mr. Speaker, although the amendment today is out of order and I have to withdraw it, I want to assure the members that we are going to continue to fight to overturn what DDAP and the administration are trying to do. These are our Medicaid patients; these are our poor, deteriorated people, and we are going take away the options that they have to get into treatment. This is going to hurt people. This is going to endanger the treatment system that we have across the State of Pennsylvania. And I need to go no further than look at North Carolina, who has recently changed over to this ASAM criteria, and I understand on conversations with the people from North Carolina that the treatment system, the residential rehab system is shutting down.

So let us not take options away from people. I am going to continue to fight this. I expect to hold public hearings over the summer and into the fall. I have circulated a cosponsorship memo. I would ask all the members to take a look at it and join me in cosponsoring this to stop DDAP from changing over into this misguided criteria, which is going to push people into outpatient and MATs (medication-assisted treatments) and not allow them the option to get into residential rehab.

Mr. Speaker, this program helps children throughout our Commonwealth who are most at risk of dropping out of school. And this program, as I mentioned, has been a great success. And the National Guard, prior to embracing this program, once ran a very, very successful GED (general equivalency diploma) completion program at Fort Indiantown Gap, and this program was primarily for young men and young women who wanted to enlist in the National Guard that did not have high school diplomas. And the program was so successful that many National Guards from other States would actually send their pre-recruits to Fort Indiantown Gap to get the GED training that they needed to pass that test and to enlist in our military.

So this is a great program, and I commend my colleague and my friend, Representative Stan Saylor, for bringing this forward.
