The clerk of the Senate, being introduced, returned **HB 26, PN 4146; HB 99, PN 4254; HB 149, PN 4251; HB 353, PN 3779; HB 1013, PN 4069; HB 1511, PN 4253; HB 1885, PN 4255; and HB 2075, PN 4249**, with information that the Senate has passed the same with amendment in which the concurrence of the House of Representatives is requested.

HOUSE BILLS
CONCURRED IN BY SENATE

The clerk of the Senate, being introduced, returned **HB 927, PN 1080; HB 1539, PN 3353; HB 2049, PN 3127; and HB 2453, PN 3590**, with information that the Senate has passed the same without amendment.

BILLS SIGNED BY SPEAKER

Bills numbered and entitled as follows having been prepared for presentation to the Governor, and the same being correct, the titles were publicly read as follows:

HB 927, PN 1080

An Act amending the act of July 28, 1988 (P.L.556, No.101), known as the Municipal Waste Planning, Recycling and Waste Reduction Act, in recycling and waste reduction, further providing for municipal implementation of recycling programs.

HB 1539, PN 3353

An Act amending Title 23 (Domestic Relations) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in standby guardianship, further providing for definitions and for scope and providing for temporary guardianship; in child protective services, further providing for release of information in confidential reports; and making editorial changes.

HB 2049, PN 3127

An Act providing for requirements for documentation of the need for an assistance animal or service animal in housing and for the offenses of misrepresentation of entitlement to assistance animal or service animal and misrepresentation of animal as assistance animal or service animal.

HB 2453, PN 3590

An Act amending the act of February 18, 1998 (P.L.146, No.22), known as the Check Casher Licensing Act, amending the title of the act; in general provisions, further providing for authority of the Department of Banking and Securities; in licensing provisions, further providing for license terms and fees; in enforcement, further providing for suspension and revocation of license and civil penalties, for change of status, for restrictions on business of licensee and for civil penalty; and, in miscellaneous provisions, further providing for applicability and repealing provisions relating to report to General Assembly.

SB 798, PN 1078

An Act amending Title 12 (Commerce and Trade) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in Pennsylvania Military Community Enhancement Commission, further providing for establishment and membership.

SB 1092, PN 1710

An Act amending Title 42 (Judiciary and Judicial Procedure) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in sentencing, providing for sentencing for offenses involving domestic violence in the presence of a minor.

SB 1127, PN 1827

An Act amending Titles 18 (Crimes and Offenses) and 62 (Procurement) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in wiretapping and electronic surveillance, further providing for order authorizing interception of wire, electronic or oral communications; in trade and commerce, further providing for buying or exchanging Federal food order coupons, stamps, authorization cards or access devices and for fraudulent traffic in food orders; and, in source selection and contract formation, further providing for debarment or suspension.

SB 1209, PN 1886

An Act amending the act of November 29, 2006 (P.L.1471, No.165), known as the Sexual Assault Testing and Evidence Collection Act, further providing for sexual assault evidence collection program; and requiring the Pennsylvania State Police to complete and submit a report.

Whereupon, the Speaker, in the presence of the House, signed the same.

**NEWTOWN AMERICAN LEGION POST
NO. 440 JUNIOR PREP BASEBALL TEAM
PRESENTED**

The SPEAKER. Representative Warren, you may proceed, sir.

Mr. WARREN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today along with Representative Tai to recognize the State Champion Newtown Post 440 American Legion Junior Prep Baseball Team. Earlier this year in Coopersburg, Newtown defeated Boyertown 10-0 to win its second straight State title. In fact, the 2017 championship team, including three of the players on this 2018 championship team, were here in the House just a year ago yesterday. That said, a repeat seemed unlikely early in the season as the team started out 0-3 and was held scoreless in

the first 19 innings of play and was at one point 2-5. Philadelphia Eagles, are you listening? The team then won 16 out of 17 games in June, and the team ERA (earned run average) dropped to 2.09 for the season. From there it was on to the Lower Bucks County League's Championship Tournament. Seeded fourth because of their early struggles, Newtown overcame an earlier loss to advance to the semifinals where pitcher Collin Williams no-hit Langhorne while striking out 17 in the 3-1 victory. In the championship game, Newtown overcame a seventh-inning two-run deficit to defeat Northampton for the State – the State came later – for the county title.

At the State tournament, Newtown went 4-0 with wins over Southern Lehigh, Boyertown, rival and neighbor Northampton again, and then the 10-0 championship victory and rematch against Boyertown. Newtown only committed 48 errors in 35 games and finished the season 26-9.

Members of the team are joining us today on the rostrum, and please raise your hand as I call your name: Ryan Burkett, who gave Newtown many great pitching performances throughout the season; shortstop Quinn Erlandsen, a key contributor in the field and at the plate; outfielder Jack Harar, a key cog in Newtown's defense; Alex Stempin, who delivered clutch hits in the league tournament; and State tournament MVP (most valuable player) Collin Williams, who was not only the ace of the staff, but also collected six RBIs (runs batted in) in the championship game.

Other team members joined us in the front of the hall: Shane Anhalt, Andrew Brown, Nick Focella, Tony Godonis, Ishaan Hardaway, Joe Hughes, Jagger Matera was not able to make it today, Lukas Mullen, and Nate Rambo. And back up here on the rostrum, we are also pleased to welcome manager Joe Anhalt and coaches Steve Brown, Dave Hughes, and Sean Mullen.

Many family members also made the trip halfway across the State today to be with us and they are in the balcony, and we would like to congratulate them as well, for their love and support helped the team through both the challenging times early in the season and then the great championship run.

It would have been easy to let up or turn on each other when things were not going well, but instead they came together to turn the tide and finish as champions. Their season will not only be remembered for their State championship, but also for the lifelong friendships made and lessons learned together that will serve them both on and off the field. Lessons like: Do not give up too easily; honor your commitment to your team and your goal; build each other up when things are tough; keep your eye on the long term, not just the short term. These are lessons that we can all learn from.

So thank you for representing Bucks County so well and for showing us what teamwork looks like in action. Congratulations again on this tremendous accomplishment.

They are carrying on a proud tradition – a tradition that helps feed and sustain us all.

Please join me in congratulating the West Greene FFA Club for its impressive achievement, and join me in thanking them for their interest in being future farmers.

WEST GREENE HIGH SCHOOL SOFTBALL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Pam Snyder, the floor is yours.

Mrs. SNYDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I just have to start out by saying one thing, "We're back!" One of the toughest things to do in all of scholastic sports is to be a repeat State champion. But that is exactly what the West Greene School District Girls Softball Team accomplished this spring. The Lady Pioneers again captured the PIAA State Class A Softball Championship. They defeated Williams Valley High School by the score of 11-7. In 2017 this marvelous group of athletes won the same title, prevailing over the same opponent by the score of 9-8.

So the Lady Pioneers are once again on the House floor to be recognized, this time for being repeat champions. They have now captured the first and second team sports titles in this school's history, and for that, they richly deserve this recognition.

But there is an important part of their success story that needs to be mentioned. It is a life lesson for us all. This is a team that prior to its two consecutive State championships actually lost in the title game 3 years ago. Such a defeat in a big game can be crushing. Then we are going to head into Representative Costa's, because Representative Costa has family here, we are going to go into his farewell remarks next.

STATEMENT BY MR. SAMUELSON

The SPEAKER. Representative Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am joined by Representatives Watson and Hennessey in thanking the House for your vote in favor of Resolution 1157, recognizing November 2018 as "National Alzheimer's Disease Awareness and Family Caregivers Month." We also want to thank our cosponsor, Representative Bill Kortz, who could not be here today but who has been a leader in the fight against Alzheimer's.

We have several guests who are on the front lines of our fight to end Alzheimer's and related disorders who are here today and are seated to the left of the Speaker, and I would like to introduce them. We have Aging Secretary Teresa Osborne. She is one of Pennsylvania's strongest voices for those who have been diagnosed and the caregivers who provide for them. Earlier this year Secretary Osborne announced the formation of the Alzheimer's State Plan Task Force. This year in Pennsylvania 30,000 people participated in 28 Walks to End Alzheimer's. Some of these volunteers are here today.

Becky Jacobs of Clarks Summit. For the last 10 years Becky has volunteered with the Walk to End Alzheimer's and also the Alzheimer's Impact Movement. As an Alzheimer's ambassador, Becky travels to Washington, DC, every year with close to 1,500 advocates.

We have Beth Walden of Mechanicsburg. In addition to participating in the Walk to End Alzheimer's, Beth is a school social worker who works with emotionally disturbed children and their families. At home, she cares for her mother, Kim, who lives with Alzheimer's.

Pennsylvania has more than 675,000 informal, unpaid caregivers who last year provided an estimated 769 million hours of care, which is valued at about \$9.7 billion. Nancy Becker of Hanover is one of those caregivers. She is here with her husband, Gene, who was diagnosed 3 years ago with Lewy Body-type dementia. Refusing to adopt a negative attitude, Nancy and Gene remain positive and have become outstanding advocates for the Alzheimer's Association and Dementia Friendly America. These two individuals just celebrated their 51st wedding anniversary this past Sunday, October 14.

We have Cindy Hartman of Harrisburg. She has a long history of serving as a caregiver, after losing three close relatives to dementia, including her mother, grandmother, and aunt. Cindy is fighting back at the disease by raising as much money and awareness as possible. She has participated in practically every educational opportunity the Alzheimer's Association has offered, and yes, she was advocating with me this morning for more funding.

To the rear of the House, we have others who are helping to support both individuals with Alzheimer's and their loved ones from the Alzheimer's Association of Central Pennsylvania. From the Alzheimer's Association Greater Pennsylvania chapter, we have Clay Jacobs, Joni Shenk, Jessica Hill, and Jeremy Bland, and we also have Chuck Quinnan from the Department of Aging.

An estimated 400,000 Pennsylvanians are suffering from Alzheimer's or a related disorder. It is in their honor that we adopt this resolution. Researchers are working to find a cure, but until they do, we need the best in care and caregiver support. We need to give our health-care providers, caregivers, and first responders the tools they need to properly recognize and help those with Alzheimer's or a related disorder; we need to raise awareness so that people recognize the warning signs and get into treatment early when they have their best shot at slowing the disease; we need to support the important work of researchers who are doing their best to diagnose and eventually cure Alzheimer's disease; and we need to support our informal, unpaid caregivers so they can continue caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's or a related disorder.

I would now like to introduce Representative Kathy Watson of Bucks County.

STATEMENT BY MRS. WATSON

The SPEAKER. Representative Watson.

Mrs. WATSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you, Representative Samuelson, Representative Hennessey, and my good friend, Representative Kortz, who could not be here. Representative Kortz and I chair the Alzheimer's Caucus, and indeed, that caucus started out with a few people a number of years ago and it certainly has grown, much like our awareness of Alzheimer's has grown and, in fact, those afflicted with Alzheimer's has grown. And I can run through – I have pages of statistics of what is going on and all of that, but I want to talk about hope. I think if you would give me your attention for just a minute, and certainly, for those who are sitting here in the Speaker's section, I think it is all about hope now.

The SPEAKER. Members, I know we have a lot on the agenda today. Just, if we could, please take our seats.

You may proceed.

Mrs. WATSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you, ladies and gentlemen, for the privilege of speaking to you. I am talking about hope and sometimes that word has not been used in the past in connection with Alzheimer's disease, but thanks to institutions like the University of Pennsylvania and several others across this country and some of the private pharmaceutical companies, there is hope and there are treatments that are improving the situation for those who are afflicted with this disease.

I think, though, the hope that we can provide, we as the General Assembly might provide, is simply hope for the caregivers, that we are very cognizant – perhaps friends of yours, perhaps members of your own family, who indeed are caregivers of those who are dealing with this disease. You will hear all the stats about how it is one of the 10 greatest diseases for those who are over a certain age and we do not have a cure for it yet. But I will tell you that a few years ago we did not have an awareness about it either. We do now. The walks that some of the folks have participated in or sponsored or organized have become bigger and bigger and more successful.

It is with us paying attention to the caregivers and those who are out there to raise the funding for research, the hope is there, ladies and gentlemen, and with that hope I believe that certainly,

in the next 25 years or whatever, we will defeat this disease. We will. We will find treatments that will work. But it is something that cannot go away; that all of you who will be returning, you need to keep it in the front of your mind and recognize those caregivers need more than hope. They need help. So I will leave you with that message and you provide them, certainly next session, with the help and with the hope.

Thank you very much for the privilege of your time.

STATEMENT BY MR. HENNESSEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Hennessey.

Mr. HENNESSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Secretary Osborne.

Thank you very much, members, for your vote on HR 1157. By your vote, we have created and designated November as Alzheimer's Disease Awareness Month here in our Keystone State. In our Commonwealth we are committed to helping caregivers and their loved ones who suffer from this dreaded condition.

I was honored to serve on the Alzheimer's Disease State Planning Committee several years ago. Working with many, many dedicated persons, we adopted a comprehensive plan of action, and as with any plan, we have made great progress but we still have a long way to go. But we continue to make progress.

I want to take this opportunity to thank all of our caregivers across our State, who devote so much time and effort to care for those who need their love and attention. Caregiving is an art. For some it comes easily, others struggle, but for everyone it is a sacrifice of time, of energy, of forgoing other opportunities or events. It is a sacrifice of oneself, and all experience the roller coaster ride of emotions when delivering this care. Caregivers really are today's Good Samaritans.

The Alzheimer's Association has two chapters which cover our Commonwealth and they conduct Walks to End Alzheimer's, as you have heard from Chairman Samuelson. They have these walks across the State. Watch television and you will see walks advertised, and I promise you, if you join in on a walk, you will be uplifted. You will feel a sense of self-satisfaction in trying to contribute to the end of this disease. The money that is raised goes to support our world-class medical centers here in our Commonwealth at both ends of the State.

I expect fully to be at the November 10 walk at Citizens Bank Park in Philadelphia. It is amazing. There probably will be about 15,000 people who will join in that march that day. It is, as I said, uplifting. Please join if you can. Just watch television, watch for the ads, and you will see them.

And I should also mention there is a hotline that is operated by the Alzheimer's Association. It is a wonderful resource for information for those living with and dealing with Alzheimer's disease and other related disorders. The 24-hour hotline is 1-800-272-3900; 272-3900. If you have questions, if you need help, please call or access them online at www.alz.org/pa. For caregivers and families, the message is that there is hope, there is help, and there is support. God bless the work you do.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. Representative Neilson.

Mr. NEILSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would just like to submit some comments for the record and thank the members for their unanimous passage of HR 1083, honoring Mr. Lenfest.

The SPEAKER. Thank you.

Mr. NEILSON submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand here today to speak on HR 1083, honoring a staunch supporter of the preservation of Philadelphia's cultural, educational, and media institutions. The name H.F. "Gerry" Lenfest may not ring a bell for many of you, but some of the places that benefited from his philanthropic endeavors will be familiar to you. Here are just a few: the Philadelphia Museum of Art, Barnes Foundation, Kimmel Center for the Performing Arts, Drexel University, Temple University, the School District of Philadelphia.

In 1964, after working for a New York law firm, Lenfest landed a gig with Triangle Publications, which owned TV Guide and Seventeen magazine, as well as several TV and radio stations and cable franchises. With the help of two investors, Lenfest purchased a cable system in nearby Lebanon County that eventually became Suburban Cable, the 11th largest cable company in the country. He sold the company to Comcast in 2000 for about \$1.2 billion. Lenfest would go to donate \$1.1 billion of that to countless institutions throughout Philadelphia, including the places I previously mentioned.

In 2014, at the age of 84, Lenfest became the sole owner of the Philadelphia Inquirer, Philadelphia Daily News, and philly.com after his business partner, Lewis Katz, died in a plane crash. Two years later Lenfest donated those news outlets to a nonprofit he created, the Institute for Journalism in New Media, which later became the Lenfest Institute of Journalism. Lenfest's actions played an integral part in saving the Philadelphia Inquirer and Philadelphia Daily News.

At the time of his gift, he said, "What would the city be without the Inquirer and Daily News? Of all the things I've done, this is the most important. Because of the journalism."

One of Lenfest's final endowments was \$50 million to champion the new Museum of the American Revolution, which opened in April 2017. He felt the museum provided the missing link to tie together the city's historic sites.

Lenfest passed away at the age of 88 on August 5, 2018, leaving behind his wife, children, grandchildren, and siblings. There is no doubt that Gerry Lenfest's legacy made a huge impact on so many lives and will continue to do so for the next decade through the Lenfest Foundation.

Thank you to my colleagues for honoring the life and legacy of Gerry Lenfest by supporting HR 1083. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. KELLER

The SPEAKER. Representative Mark Keller, on unanimous consent.

For what purpose do you rise, sir?

Mr. M. KELLER. To speak on Alzheimer's.

The SPEAKER. Yes, you may proceed.

Mr. M. KELLER. I just want to reiterate what the last few speakers have said about Alzheimer's. I had a personal experience and have personal experience. Both my parents are passed on as of now, but I saw firsthand my father, who was a caregiver of my

mother's Alzheimer's, actually end up in the hospital for 3 weeks because we, as his children, did not realize how much care he was giving. So I cannot stress enough to those who have family members that have Alzheimer's, watch after those caregivers. It is very, very important. And I am very thankful to see that we unanimously passed that Alzheimer's resolution. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

One of our members is retiring from Allegheny County and he has his family and guests here, and I would ask all the members to please come to the House floor at this time. Would the other guests, if they could, as soon as the photo is over, if they could leave the House floor, we would appreciate that, before we go into the farewell remarks.

The SPEAKER. Representative Paul Costa has been a member of this august body since 1998. Currently serving his 10th term in the House, he represents the 34th District of Allegheny County. He currently serves as the Democratic chair of the Liquor Control Committee. Prior to joining this body, he served on the Wilkins Township Board of Commissioners for 3 years, was the board president, worked for more than 20 years in the Allegheny County Prothonotary's Office, and was deputy in charge of the family division. A graduate of Taylor Allderdice High School, he received degrees from the Community College of Allegheny County and Point Park University. He also attended the Allegheny County Local Government Academy. He and his lovely wife, Kathleen, have three children: Michael, Maria, and Dante.

As many of you know, Representative Costa – it is interesting, I often hear about the fact that we need more collegiality, but from every speech I have heard, there is a good bit of collegiality and working across the aisle in this chamber. That may be different in Washington, but here in Harrisburg it seems to be quite different, because I can tell you this good gentleman, Representative Paul Costa, is friends with each and every person, as a member of the General Assembly, and is probably the shining example of making friends from all across the State, and I am so honored to bring him up here for his farewell remarks as a legislator.

Representative Paul Costa.

Mr. P. COSTA. Thank you all so very much.

If you just bear with me for one minute.

Sorry, I do not do that.

Thank you. Thank you so very much. It has truly been an honor and a privilege to serve in the House of Representatives, in this beautiful building and also this beautiful room. I often sat in the back gazing up at the sky. I have been actually looking at all the art. We are so blessed to work in this building.

But I have never taken for granted the trust and the responsibilities that were afforded to me by the people of the 34th Legislative District, and I would first like to thank them for giving me that opportunity.

Along the way, I became friends with some pretty cool people. One of them was former Representative Rich Grucela. Rich and I got elected at the same time, and we immediately became friends. But he had a poster in his office with a quote that said, "What did you do when you had the power?" I often thought about that quote, especially lately. So I thought, well, what did I do? I had fun. Do not get me wrong. I think we all accomplished a lot of things together and there are a lot of pieces of legislation I am very proud that I worked on, but I am not here to talk about that today. You can do that when you do my condolence resolution.

I have been fortunate to go deep a couple times into a longwall coal mine in Pam Snyder's district. I was fortunate enough to fly in a Black Hawk helicopter high over Fort Indiantown Gap when we were – Colonel Tigie took me on this trip – and we are flying over Fort Indiantown Gap and there were other airplanes and other helicopters flying around and all of a sudden these flares started to come flying at us. Well, we later found out that the pilot of the plane found out that we were in the helicopter and he wanted to scare us so he threw flares at us. It worked.

But I have been everywhere, as I said, from down below to up above and I have even been fortunate enough to be pushed around the base pass over at City Island by Tommy Sankey. Thank you, Tommy. I move pretty good for an old guy, huh?

But today I want to focus my remarks on the relationships of the people that helped mold me as a State Representative. The first person that I want to talk about is Col. Tom Tigie. Billy Keller and Mike Carroll and I were talking last night, there are not a whole lot of members left that actually served with Tom Tigie, so I brought his picture. This picture hung over my desk, as I always loved this picture, but this is Tom Tigie here. Tom was a longtime member of the legislature, and Tommy made me a better person and a better listener. If anyone knew Tom and you ever had an argument with him— Wait a second. If you knew Tom, you definitely had an argument with him. He loved to argue. But he had a saying, if you would repeat back to him what he said, his quick response was, "No, that is not what I said." Ironically, my friend, Marguerite Quinn, used that quote just a couple weeks ago when you were being interrogated on your PFA bill, which, by the way, congratulations on getting that signed into law. But Marguerite used that line, "No, that's not what I said." It immediately made me think of Tom and it brought a huge smile to my face. Colonel, I miss you so much. God bless you.

The next person I want to talk about is his partner in crime, Gaynor Cawley. The reason why I also like this picture, and I know it is hard for you to see, but if they zoom in, that is Gaynor in the middle. That is always him, a smile on his face, and these

two were inseparable. We were blessed enough to live with Gaynor, and anyone who lived in our house will tell you what a blessing that was. Gaynor showed me there is a way you can be – by the way, he is one of the funniest storytellers ever, if you ever met him – but Gaynor would tell us stories all the time and all we would do is laugh and we would laugh so hard that tears would run down our faces and our stomachs would hurt from bending over laughing.

But Gaynor showed me something else too that is very important. John Taylor, the other day in his farewell speech, talked about helping each other out. We had an issue several years ago, South Side Sports Complex, a big issue in Gaynor Cawley's district, and the leadership for the Democrats, Republicans in both the House and the Senate wanted this legislation to pass. Gaynor Cawley did not. So Gaynor went around to a lot of different members and was asking them to help him out, and I will never forget the debate – it was very close whether Gaynor was going to win the vote or not – but Chairman Bob Flick, a senior member on the Republican side, stood up and said, you know, "This is very important to Gaynor. If this was my district and I was explaining to you how important it was to me, I would vote for it. So I am voting with Gaynor," and I think that sent a clear message to some of us younger members that if a senior member can go against leadership, so can we, and we did and we won the vote. And Gaynor was so excited and we were celebrating that evening and Billy Keller brought us all back to reality when he told Gaynor, "You know tomorrow they're going to recommit this bill and you're going to lose," which he did.

Speaking of Billy Keller – Mookie – Billy Keller is one of the best Representatives that you will ever find out there. I will tell you how good he is: When I first became a legislator, I went to Billy and I felt like Andy Dufresne from the movie "Shawshank Redemption," when he went to Morgan Freeman's character "Red" and he said to him, "I understand you're a person that knows how to get things," and he does. So one day I went to Billy, I said, "Hey, I have this bill. Any chance you could help me get it moved?" Again, we were in the minority, which was pretty much all the time. So Billy got the Consumer Affairs Committee to hold a meeting for the sole purpose of moving my bill out of the committee. Unfortunately, we found out about 5 minutes before the meeting started that the bill was in another committee. Think about that. He got a committee to run a bill that was not even in their committee. Billy, like I said, I cannot think of a better Representative that is out there that gets stuff done and I am going to miss you, and you people in Philadelphia, you are going to miss him also.

So where am I here? Sorry.

So now I want to get to the thank-yous. Leader Reed, I want to thank you for your calm demeanor, attitude, on your presentation on what you did yesterday too. I also want to thank you for the people that worked for you: Marcia, thank you; Steve Miskin, whom I affectionately call the "Spin Doctor," thank you; and, Mr. Leader, I also want to thank you for continuing to call on me in the Rules Committee, even though I sat behind you and even though you also knew that after I asked my question, my follow-up question always seemed to make people laugh, not on purpose, but it did.

Big Worm, I mean Big Derm, thank you for allowing me and showing me the way. When I first got elected, they sat me next to Frank and he taught me a lot the first couple months – well, the first year, because I think after that, they moved you. But I learned a lot from you, Frank, and I want to thank you so much.

I also want to thank you for appointing me to be the Liquor chair. I do not feel like I asked for a lot from you, but I did hound you for that. When Dante Santoni announced he was not running, I was sitting next to him at a meeting, and he is elbowing me, he goes, "You need to go after that, you need to go after that," and 5 minutes after the meeting, I got on the phone with Derm and I never stopped calling him. So thank you for allowing me to do that.

But you gave me then the Liquor chair and you gave me the opportunity to work with some pretty cool people. I am very fortunate that I worked with my executive director, Lynn Benka-Davies, and then most recently, Brittney Rodas. You can wave. Stand up and wave. I could not have asked for better people to work with. As you know, our staff make us look good and whoever is going to be the next Liquor chair, you are in good hands, because those two ladies will absolutely take care of you and they get a lot of stuff done. And there are a lot of members out there that know that, at least from our side, when they call and ask to take care of issues in our district, Lynn and Brittney are all over it and they usually get positive results. So thank you, ladies, so much.

You also gave me the opportunity to work with great cochairs and their staffs. John Taylor, you were the first one that I was with and I followed you. We used to be in Urban Affairs together, and I was so fortunate when I did become the Liquor chair, I got to work with you. I have the utmost respect for you, and unfortunately, since you are going to work with the Commonwealth Foundation, I guess our friendship ends here.

Then there is my good friend, Adam Harris. Adam and I have been friends from almost day one when he came in the legislature, and he will tell you the story too. There were not a whole lot of people that were at his wedding when he and Jenise got married, but I was fortunate that he invited me and I showed up on top of this mountain. I have no idea where that was, but it was beautiful. But thank you for your friendship and I will never forget: best birthday ever. Adam knows and I think Brian Ellis knows what I am talking about.

Okay. To the members of the Allegheny County delegation: Thank you so much for electing me to be the delegation chair a few years back. That was truly an honor. But what was even better is you gave me the opportunity to meet and work with Jeannie Allegrini. Unfortunately, Jeannie could not be with us this morning, but I want to thank Jeannie for all that she did. She and I thought we made a pretty good team working for Allegheny County, and I am so proud of that. So thank you, guys and ladies.

I would also like to thank former chairs Ron Raymond and Bob Donatucci. They were both the Liquor chairs when I was on the committee for a long time, and both Ron and Bob kept me very close on issues and there were even a lot of times when Ron Raymond, the Republican chair, would work with Bob and come to me and say, "Can you please help us get some votes?" and I always felt honored to do that and sometimes I would produce and sometimes we did not. But the important thing was that they showed me how to work together, how to work across aisles with your partners, and I thought J.T. and Adam and I did that very well, and again, I want thank you guys so much for being great partners.

Another chairperson I would like to thank is Bob Godshall. When Bob was the chair of the Tourism Committee, we traveled the State and we had the opportunity to build relationships with members from across the aisle and across the Commonwealth. There is nothing like having breakfast, lunch, and dinner and

even a beer at night to get to know somebody and find out that these other Representatives are exactly like you are. They are trying to make their communities better, and I think that always gave us the ability to become friends. And some of those friends became very, very close friends, like Brian Ellis and Tommy Killion and Jeff Pyle – or I call him Jeffrey – Mark Mustio, and his predecessor, John Pippy, and way too many to mention.

One of the complaints that I have is that we do not do enough relationship building like we used to. Tim Hennessey used to have the St. Patrick's Day celebration, where it brought everybody together. Tony DeLuca, he would have the Budget Blast. A lot of those things we do not do anymore. And of course, the Karaoke Caucus, I was proud of working on that to bring people together. But recently we had a softball game where we all got together and we raised money for food banks and hunger. But the cool thing about that, there were a lot of members that previously before that game really did not get a chance to know each other and were cheering and laughing together and having a good time, similar to what we do at Karaoke Caucus. So speaking of that, Joanna McClinton, hopefully you will keep up that tradition. Please work with Brian. When we first started Karaoke Caucus, we would have members come in that did not know each other and then immediately became friends and helped each other out. So again, I think that is one of the things that is missing, is we do not have that camaraderie building that we used to.

So, Mr. Speaker, I want to thank you for all you do, especially when you had Krystjan Callahan working for you and now, most importantly, Karen Coates. Karen, you are amazing. I do not know a person who is a harder worker than you are in getting things done, and I cannot thank you enough for all the help that you have given me over the time, even though some of the bills that I was pushing were contrary to – but thank you so much for all your help.

Jimmy Fata. Jimmy, thank you for being a friend, and even though any time I tried to get his attention to speak, he was like "No, no, you can't speak, not today." You are no Freddie Lochetto, but you are pretty darn good, buddy.

To all the lobbyists out there that have helped me along the way and also became my friends: D.T., Matt, Jay, Wendy, Dodo, Joe, Gary, Tracy, Clint, and Kyle. Thank you all for all your support and all your help over the years, and as I said, you all became very good friends.

To all the staff that helped facilitate the operations of the House, those seen and not seen, and especially those who were always there when I called up. So T.J. and Ryan, thank you so much for the years of service when I would call you for help, which was often. Stacie Ritter. Stacie Ritter was assigned to our freshman class when I first got elected and 20 years later I am still calling her for help, and she has always been there for me. So, Stacie, thank you. Cindy Cashman is another one, a longtime PennDOT employee who now works in the Governor's Office. Any time I called her, even when she was at the beach, she returns my calls and gets stuff done for me. So thank you, ladies.

Speaking of staff, I cannot thank my staff in the district office enough. As you know, they all make us look good. Susie McCallister, she and I worked together for 40 years. Twenty years we worked together in the Allegheny County Prothonotary's Office and now she has been with me for a long time, and actually, we are still friends. Imagine that, 40 years of working together and we stayed friends. Former longtime staffers Janice McMahon and Judge Tom Caulfield; current staff members Michele Edinger and Bill Pfoff; thank you all so much,

again, for making me look good. And several members have said that, when people vote, they are voting for them, they are not voting for us.

I have always been blessed with good staff. When I started here, I was assigned Peggy Kieres. Peggy was the absolute best that was out there. So one day I come in the office and Peggy is training one of our new employees that just started working for our caucus, and that is how good an employee Peggy was, that when new people came in, she trained them. So the one morning when I come in, she is training a young lady in my office, who is now my L.A., Kira Zickler. But Kira is much, much more than my L.A. When Peggy talked about retiring, I went to Jen Mann, because Kira worked for Jen Mann, and asked her, "Would it be okay if I talked to Kira about coming to work for me?" because I knew how she was trained and I knew she would be good. And Jen was kind enough to say yes and I was blessed that Kira did say yes to come along too. So thank you. Please stand up, Kira. As I said, she made the transition so smooth. So thank you, Peggy, and thank you, Kira, for putting up with me.

To my family: unfortunately, my wife and daughter and one son could not make it today. They had to work. Kathy, Maria, and Dante could not make it here today, but my son, Michael, is here with us today. Michael, thank you. I want to thank them for the sacrifices that they all had to make. Most people outside the legislature do not realize the impact that it has on our families, and unfortunately, our families do not have the thick skin that we all need. So I want to thank them for putting up with some of the aggravation that we have to as legislators, that we let roll off our backs.

To my mom, who is actually here today. Hi, Mom. Wave. Thank you for that. That was very kind. My mom is one of the few people that constantly watches PCN (Pennsylvania Cable Network) and enough that – so she sees what is going on and she knows what is going on in the background, because I got yelled at several times for, what she said, "You shouldn't be chewing gum on TV," and I said, "It's not gum, it's Good and Plenty's." So be careful what you do out there because your moms are watching. But to my mom and dad, everything that I am is because of you guys – well, the good stuff. My dad told me a long time ago to treat people nice, they may be your boss one day. So I took that as, you know, treat people how you wanted to be treated, and I thought that I always did that while I was up here. So if I did not, I apologize, but I hope that I succeeded treating everybody as nicely as I possibly could.

To my brother, Jay: Thank you for all your guidance and your assistance. Everybody should have a brother that is a Senator. It actually works out pretty good. I told you I was blessed.

And finally, to all current and former residents of the hall of justice, especially Mookie, Gaynor, the Colonel, Mike Diven – you are my boy, Blue – Harry Readshaw, the epitome of class, but also thank you for being tenants' council president for so many years. And Sid, Sid Kavulich, thank you for providing movie nights. Unfortunately, in my notes I wrote, "Get well," but as we all know, Sid passed away yesterday. So rest in peace, Sid. God bless you.

Sorry.

Senator Yudichak is also with us today; one of the wittiest people that I have ever met. He and I seem to have the same sense of humor. He is just a lot quicker than I am. I am putting the idea in my head and he has already got it out. But we also share our love for Neil Young and, obviously, for laughter. Johnny, thank you for being a friend for so many years. We got elected together

and we immediately hit it off and 20 years later we still get along. So thank you.

And finally, to the person whom my family calls my Harrisburg husband, Senator John Sabatina. John and I became very good friends over the years. As you know, he started as a State Rep but over the years we have gotten even closer and closer. But one of the cool things about Johnny is one of the very first nights that we were out – it was Ray Bunt's retirement – John came as a special election. So he was a midterm. So we were going to Ray Bunt's retirement party and we were, you know, socializing, having a good time, and all of a sudden we hear somebody singing and it was Johnny. So we immediately figured, oh, he is one of us, he is a singer, he came in, and so we asked him if he would like to live with us, to move into the hall of justice. And without even seeing the place, he said, "Yeah." I said, "Well, don't you want to see the place?" He goes, "No, I like hanging out with you guys. You're pretty cool." So, Johnny, thank you for making that decision to move in with us and being a good friend.

So that is pretty much all I have to say. Again, I want to thank everybody so much. This has been the coolest job that anybody could have. It does, obviously, have its ups and downs, but I enjoyed all 20 years of it and I cannot thank enough the people of the 34th Legislative District for giving me that opportunity and to meet so many cool and great people and I consider all of you friends. And I want to thank you all so much. God bless you all, peace, and I am out of here.

The SPEAKER. The 34th Legislative District has been so ably served – as has all of Allegheny County, by the way – Representative Costa, because you are a person that has never forgotten the people back home during your entire 20 years of service here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's House of Representatives.

And also, your family is such a distinguished family, but the one thing I would have done, though, is I would have told Jay to get out of the way and make room for you over in that Senate. I am teasing on that front. Senator Costa, I am teasing there. I have been longtime friends with both Senator Costa and Representative Costa, and I wish you and your family nothing but the best. Thank you for all you have done to make relationships more positive here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. SCHLOSSBERG

The SPEAKER. Representative Schlossberg, please proceed. Mr. SCHLOSSBERG. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to thank the members of the House for their unanimous approval of HR 1147, designating November 2018 as "Adrenoleukodystrophy Awareness Month." I also want to make sure that I talk about a special young boy and his loving family. Adrenoleukodystrophy, also called ALD, is a deadly genetic condition that damages the membrane which insulates nerve cells in the human brain. This causes acids to build up in the brain, nervous system, and adrenal gland. This gradually ravages the brain, leads to blindness, deafness, seizures, loss of muscle control, progressive dementia, and results in death or permanent disability, usually within about 2 to 5 years of diagnosis. ALD is unknowingly carried by women and affects 1 in 18,000 people. It knows no racial, ethnic, or geographic boundaries. It severely affects boys and men, though females can display symptoms. The most devastating form appears in childhood between ages 4 and 10.

Is there hope for ALD? There is always hope, but the aggressiveness and seriousness of ALD requires early detection. Newborn screening and diagnosis does allow for treatment through bone marrow transplants, which are shown to be effective for early diagnosis.

Now, like many diseases, the words that I just used to describe this disease can seem sterile. It was for me until I met Janelle Livingston, the mother of Kaleb Holder. Janelle is here today, along with her husband, Jerel. They are in the back. Janelle and Jerel, if you could please stand so we can acknowledge you. Thank you.

In March of 2016, Kaleb Holder was named Deputy Sheriff for a Day in Lehigh County by our sheriff, Joe Hanna. At the time Kaleb took the oath of office, he was 8 years old and his mother, Janelle, stood by to watch. Two months prior, Kaleb was diagnosed with ALD. This followed a massive seizure that led to the testing and eventual diagnosis. Janelle woke up every morning not knowing what part of Kaleb would be gone. She knew his sight, hearing, motor, language, and respiratory skills would be compromised and that, eventually, Kaleb would be in a total vegetative state, a fear that has since tragically come to fruition.

Kaleb's story was covered by the Morning Call, and I recently had the chance to meet with and talk with Janelle. As devastating as this story is, Janelle is committed to raising awareness about ALD, the need for more testing, for early detection, and a plea for more bone marrow donors to give those who are diagnosed a fighting chance.

With the tears that accompany Kaleb's story is a story of hope for the future. While we know that the fight against ALD is tough, there are treatments. Survival is possible, life is possible, and in that there is hope. We owe a debt of gratitude to Kaleb and his family as they struggle. They clearly need to be in our prayers, as their need for comfort and peace is very real.

In such pain, I hope that there can be a story of hope for the future. In the House's adoption of this resolution, let the pain that his family faces every day be transcribed in the record, not in resignation, but in resolve. We, all of us, resolve to fight so families in the future do not have to experience the same pain that Kaleb's family feels. We also resolve to encourage individuals to register themselves for bone marrow donations, a critical step in order to ensure treatment. Finally, we resolve to save lives so that a little boy's dream of being sheriff is not just for one day, but for a full and valiant career.

Again, thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to the House for this unanimous resolution.

Jim, as you know, first ran – I think, Jim, 2008, right? And how old are you? Jim is 35 and he started in 2008. I would not say he is retiring. He has got a lot of great years in front of him. As you know, he ran for the United States Senate, was an outstanding candidate. I am sure we will be hearing more from him in the future.

Jim has been a member since 2009, serving his 5th term representing the 15th Legislative District of Beaver County. He is a member of the Appropriations Committee, Professional Licensure Committee, Commerce Committee, and State Government Committee.

As you know, Jim introduced, and we were proud to support, legislation that allowed tax credits at brownfield sites with respect to certain facilities. One entity, Shell, has so far taken advantage of that. His efforts led to Shell's decision to build the first petrochemical plant in the northeast of the whole United States in Beaver County. Over 6,000 construction jobs, including 800 ironworkers, right at the present time from western Pennsylvania; 800 ironworkers at the present time. There will be 600 permanent jobs and a \$6 billion investment. Other of those facilities can locate, as you know, as well in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania using those credits. Jim has also been a leader on school choice issues and on many other fronts and never afraid to take on a tough issue.

He serves as a member of the Penn State Beaver Advisory Board, Beaver County YMCA Board – he actually chaired their respective capital campaigns – cofounder and chair of the Big Brothers Big Sisters Ambassadors' Council.

A graduate of Beaver High School, Washington & Jefferson College graduate, and earned his law degree at Widener, and Jim and his wife, Jayann, reside in Beaver County with their young son, Nolan.

Now, Representative Mark Mustio, my neighbor – my district adjoins Mark's – and we have been great friends for quite some time, knew each other before getting into politics. He represents the 44th Legislative District in Allegheny County and was first elected in 2003. He has been an outstanding chairman of the House Professional Licensure Committee and a member of the Liquor Control Committee. One of the leading, really the leading lights, along with Representative Christiana, on moving Pennsylvania into the private sector with respect to the sale of wine and beer.

A 1975 graduate of Moon Area School District, graduate of Grove City College, and has also just been a great benefactor and supporter of Grove City College as well. A very successful businessperson. First became a casualty underwriter with Aetna back in late 1979. He is president of HHM Insurors, a partner in HHM Benefits; has been with that firm since 1981.

He received the Bob O'Conner Junior Achievement Leadership Award, recognizing his efforts to inspire young people to become involved in their communities. He was a supervisor in Moon Township. Also, I grew up there. Past chairman of the Pittsburgh Airport Area Chamber of Commerce, has served on the boards of the Western Area Y, Moon Area Excellence in Education, and the Airport Corridor Transportation Association. As you know, Mark has led on so many issues, most recently telemedicine and making sure that is availed by citizens throughout Pennsylvania.

He has a daughter, Laura; a son, Ryan, whom I have had the blessing of spending time with, just outstanding individuals.

And at this time I am going to call up – both of them just very pro-family-sustaining-job – Representative Jim Christiana and Representative Mark Mustio.

FAREWELL ADDRESS BY MR. MUSTIO

Mr. MUSTIO. All right. Let us let it rip.

I was not emotional until I started to walk up here and saw all of you and saw the handful of people that left that do not like me.

Now, this is going to be very serious; if you all know me, how serious this is going to be.

So first of all, this is about you and all that you have given to me in my 15 1/2 years here. It has just been an awesome experience. I have learned a lot. I had a sign in my office that said "I'm growing older but not up," and I think most of you probably will attest to that.

There is one person here that if you like me, you can say she takes credit for this, and there is the same person, if you do not like me, you can blame her. Most of you do not know that I was this close to being the shortest tenured member of the House. When I was elected in 2003, Governor Rendell had offered two budgets and the Republicans in the House and the Senate had the nerve to pass one of them and he vetoed part of his own budget, if you remember that. Well, I got elected in June, the 30th, or sworn in June 30 with Tom Killion, and so we were back and forth that entire summer and fall, and I think the last day of session was, what, December 21st or 22d – I am looking over at Joe because he never missed a day – and so I would go in on a Friday, there was a cover letter for an Eagle Scout Award and I read the boilerplate letter and it looked fine, and I told the gentleman staffer at the time to please print that on a letterhead and I will sign it. Well, it was taking forever to come out. So I said, "Look, I'll just come in on Saturday, the next day, and I will sign it." So I came in Saturday, it was on my desk, I signed it. Fortunately, Bonnie Stopperich is in my life. At the last sentence in that letter it was supposed to say, "Good luck in all future endeavors." Well, he manually typed it instead of printing the boilerplate, and instead of the "l," it was an "f." It was horrible. You can imagine the embarrassment that would have taken place. But, Bonnie, you have had my back every day and God bless you for making that astute find in that letter and reading and checking that young man's work. He, by the way, went on to work for a Congressman. So, Bonnie, if you could give everybody a wave, I would appreciate that.

Jim Scott, also in my district office, is the gentleman that does all those senior citizen-type applications and they love him. So, Jimmy, thanks for getting me all those senior votes over the years.

Many of you probably remember Joy McKee. She retired a couple of years ago. Joy, please stand up so they can recognize you again. She, when you get elected in a special, you do not know what is going on around here, and if you remember The Family Circus cartoon, she would always draw me maps like that and I said I have to go to a meeting in this building, so she would draw the dotted line and I would follow it to get there. But in addition to being an awesome Harrisburg secretary, she also milked cows before she came here and then on the weekends she would work at a farmer's market; later on she worked at a convenience store and then also a hotel. She is one of the hardest working people that I know. And thank you, Joy, so much.

Ty McCauslin, my communications specialist. Ty has an awesome set of ties. He roots for all the wrong sports teams. But he made sure that all my media was taken care of and cleaned up all those negative comments on my Facebook page. Thank you, Ty.

Kelly Roth, my administrative assistant. You know, I thought Joy was the best until I had the pleasure of working with Kelly. Fantastic. And if you and your family ever move to the Pittsburgh Airport area, we will hire you at my company. You are the best consummate professional. Thank you.

The Speaker mentioned telemedicine. I dragged Wayne Crawford all over the place for the last few months working on that issue. And I had a good time; I am not so sure that he did. But, Wayne, thank you so much. And he had veto power on the committee. He had the ability to keep me from hurting myself and some of the decisions that I wanted to make too aggressively early on. So, Wayne, thank you so much for your help and what you have done for every member of this caucus over the years. Thank you.

Mike Vereb was supposed to be here. I am not sure, I think we locked the doors to keep him out. So we will defer on him until later.

Cheryl Schriener, my cubby bear, also known as red spikes. She has her own cheering section up there. She taught me to wait before hitting send in my e-mails but also wait before hitting send in my mouth. Without her I would have been in a lot more trouble than I normally would be in. And God bless you. You are my heart outside of my body. And thank you. And I am not going to cry right now, but you are the best and I look forward to spending a lot of years traveling with you and doing a lot of fun things. Thank you, dear.

All right. Now, my goal is to mention every member on the Republican side of the aisle at some point, so we are going to read pretty fast here. And then my friends on the Democrat side. Because you know how you sit out there and you say, boy, is he going to mention me? Is he going to mention me? So Bruce and Susan and Dana, Garth, Amanda, Dave Donley, and Rob Gaertner, Ritchie LaFaver, Lisa Taglang, Josiah Shelly, Erin Raub, Karen Dalton, Tom Dymek, and all the Appropriations staff and the leadership staff. Karen Coates. I think Karen Coates may be the only, the only staff person on our side of the aisle that has her own cheer. Is that right, Pyle? "Karen Coates!" No, not one more time. We will save that.

How are you doing, stenographer?

All right. Steve Miskin. Tony Aliano. Chad Weaver, Mr. Sushi. Rod Corey, fellow Grove City grad. Jim Mann and Neal Leshner.

You know, when I took over HRCC (House Republican Campaign Committee) last session, we had some door-knocking machines and the new members were Aaron Bernstine; Bud Cook; Alex Charlton; Michael Corr – what is up? You know, he obviously did not like it here. Matt Dowling; Jonathan Fritz; Dawn Keefer; Zach Mako. Zach was knocking on doors and I get

these reports and I notice his doors were not moving, and so I called him on his cell phone and I said, "Zach, what's going on?" He says, "Well, I'm deployed in Europe for 2 weeks." I said, "Never mind. I'm sorry." But thank you for your service to our country, Zach.

Retired members: Billy Adolph. "Candyman" John Payne. I think 15 of these pounds are thanks to Hershey when I sat next to John. Don Walko and Dave Mayernik, former members that now live in my district. Doug Reichley. Tom and Dick Stevenson. Dick Stevenson, probably one of the nicest members to come out of here until I met Parke Wentling. I think he challenges him for being one of the nicest, nicest individuals.

Now the back row. John "Ferris Bueller" Maher, what can I say? It was Jimmy Marshall's and my responsibility to make sure, but, John, absolutely a joy to be next to you. You taught me so much, particularly about procedures and Mason's Manual and what we should be doing. I am going to miss that deep resonating voice and the debates, and hopefully you will still be in government somewhere down the road. John Taylor – Jim Marshall, we will talk about him a little later – John Taylor, J.T., chair of the Tuesday Caucus. Mike Peifer, for some reason he said I look like a muskrat. Yep, there it was. Kurt Masser, Doyle Heffley, Lynda Culver, Rosemary Brown, and Dave Millard for voting me. Just kidding. Speaker Turzai, from my hometown. Thank you for your support from the very first day of my campaign. In working closely with you and Leader Reed over the last 4 years, I have gotten to see a different side and a more personal side not only of each of you but also of a lot of our members. We all have personal issues that we have to deal with as well, in addition to doing this job. Speaker, how you physically are able to do what you do across the State and most recently the country while at the same time being there for your family is truly remarkable. I think we may have disagreed on approaches now and then, but at the end of the day you were always right, you are the Speaker.

Similar to others, I want to use this opportunity today simply to say thank you; to say thank you to some of my MVPs over the last 10 years, thank you to my secret superheroes who make this Capitol one of the most beautiful places to work in the country, say thank you to those who keep us safe and those who make it a little bit more manageable being 250 miles away from home: people like Lynn, Spizz; people like my friend, Dee. Dee, she works downstairs in the cafeteria, and she is my superhero because every day Dee shows up to work, she greets me and others with a smile on her face, she brightens my day no matter what personal struggles she is dealing with. No matter what challenges she is facing in her personal life, she always treats me like I am her son or her friend and gives me a genuine smile. People like that I will never forget, those people that touch your lives like Mark said in some ways that they will never know, but I hope people like Dee know I appreciate how she touches people's lives.

Additionally, I want to say thank you to the Capitol Police Department and the House Security Department. In this crazy world that we are living in, thank you for risking your lives to protect ours so that we can get home to our families safely. You truly are superheroes.

To the members, past and present, collectively over the last 10 years, I have thoroughly enjoyed working with each and every one of you. In particular, I want to say thank you to some of the members who have inspired me over the years: people like Jake Wheatley. You know, Jake, Jake has inspired me many times, but specifically on June 22 when Jake asked people to put down, to put down their labels and to love people. He had a cry for people outside this Capitol and inside this Capitol to value every life and to know that every life has dignity and people should cherish the lives that they have and to treat people with respect. People like Mark Rozzi. Mark, throughout your journey of fighting for victims of sexual violence, you have inspired me, but particularly on this past September 24 and 25 when his legislation was lifted out of this chamber. People like Garth Everett and Kerry Benninghoff. Watching those two men bravely talk about the medical challenges of their daughter and their grandson inspired me and many others. People like Pam DeLissio and Jeff Pyle. They came into this hall every day with a smile on their face and a passion to serve their constituents as they were battling cancer. You two inspired me and I know many others.

Those instances and many others that I have watched some of you have to struggle with have made me realize that people outside this Capitol, they are oftentimes ignorant to the fact that we are human beings and that we are dealing with personal struggles and challenges. And even sometimes when we are in the middle of a budget debate or we are debating highly emotional and sensitive issues, I think we sometimes forget that our colleagues may be, may be struggling with personal challenges. I may not be able to convince those outside this Capitol to treat us with respect and understand the challenges that people are going through, but I do ask all of you to stop and appreciate that the people that you are working alongside not only do they have professional things that they are working on and a

passion to serve their constituents, but they may also be dealing with personal challenges.

Next, I want to thank some members who were helpful in passing legislation that was important to me. I would like to recognize those who helped pass several school choice proposals that I had introduced: bills to create the OSTC (opportunity scholarship tax credit) program; to expand, streamline, and integrate the OSTC and the EITC (educational improvement tax credit) programs – former Representatives Mike Vereb, Mike Gerber, Tony Payton, and Sam Smith. Current Representatives Jamie Santora and Speaker Mike Turzai for all you have done on that important issue to me and many others. Those programs have saved hundreds of thousands of kids who were trapped in failing, oftentimes very violent schools and put them on a path to success.

Thank you to the members that helped pass the petrochemical tax credit bill – a bill that the CEO of Royal Dutch Shell credited as a necessary and impactful piece of legislation that led to their \$6 billion investment in Beaver County. Thank you. I know that we throw the word "billions" around all the time in this building, but that investment represents the largest private investment in Pennsylvania since World War II. There are 30 cranes operating in one site right now in Beaver County, and soon there will be 100 cranes building that plant. And it is 2 miles from Jayann's and my home. So thank you to Jim Marshall, Bill Kortz, Rob Matzie, and so many others that I would be remiss if I did not thank you for changing Beaver County.

I would also like to thank Mark Mustio for putting Nolan to sleep today so that I did not have to feel like my speech put him to sleep. I look over there, I thank you, Mark, for getting Nolan a nap.

I would also like to thank those who helped me pass some transparency measures, PennWATCH and SchoolWATCH. When it comes to solving our challenges in this building, whether they are budgetary problems, health-care challenges, or restoring the public's trust in government, transparency is the prescription for curing those problems because you cannot heal what you do not reveal. Leader Reed, Policy Chairman Benninghoff, Speaker Turzai, Seth Grove, and Stan Saylor, thank you for your help in getting those bills to this floor, and thank you, all members, for passing that legislation.

Thank you to Representative Dan Frankel. It was an honor to serve alongside you in our effort to temporarily end the UPMC (University of Pittsburgh Medical Center)-Highmark feud. I think it was also a model of what this place needs more of. Dan and I could have spent years on where we disagree on health-care policy, but from the very beginning we agreed to focus on where we agreed and we found a solution and we went all around Pittsburgh and anywhere that we would be invited to talk about the need for that UPMC-Highmark feud to end. I hope that in the next session you tackle that again as it continues to rear its ugly head not just in western Pennsylvania but in central Pennsylvania and even now in the southeast.

I would like to thank those individuals here in Harrisburg who taught me some important life lessons like the late Dan Clark, like Dave Thomas. You know, early in my second term, it was around June 30, it was our first budget in the majority. It was the budget where we were committed to getting a budget done on time and it was a little bit uncertain if we would make that timeline. And I remember Dave Thomas, who worked for Speaker Sam Smith at that time, he was sitting right up here where Mark is sitting and I had my new seat on the aisle and Dave

Thomas went like this to me to come up to the rostrum. And so I buttoned my jacket. I thought, man, the Speaker must need me to help finish this budget, and I walked up there proudly. And when I got up here, Dave just whispered in my ear, "Man, you're starting to get fat." That inspired me to lose 35 pounds. So thank you, Dave Thomas, for your leadership.

Thanks to some others in Harrisburg whom I have worked with over the years: Abbey Haslam. Abbey, you are one of the most talented people I have ever worked with. Tony, Karen; Sandi Pancoe and Paula, they were the only two secretaries I ever needed up here. Thank you for your help. And Danielle Guyer. You know, Danielle knew that there was something that was really important to me. McGuire Memorial School is a private school. They educate some of the most severely physically, mentally, and behaviorally challenged kids. And they were, they were losing students to approved private schools in Pittsburgh because the home district would save 50 percent on the tuition, so they were forced to send these kids on a bus for an hour because they could not afford to send them to McGuire. So Danielle was the person who is my superhero and the superhero of McGuire that made sure that over the next four budgets the Fiscal Code had language to fix that problem. They are so appreciative of Danielle's efforts and many people's efforts up here. Obviously, we know that legislators get far more credit than we deserve, but today I want to give credit where credit is due and thank Danielle.

I could not think what it would be like to give a farewell speech without mentioning the two young ladies in my office, Monica and Jen, who have been with me for a long time, and I do not know what else to say than thank you. Thank you for all you have done to serve the 15th District. Thank you for inspiring me to fight for the first maternity leave – excuse me – to fight for the first maternity leave policy for State employees. Thank you to Ally Fisher, Leader Dermody, Speaker Turzai, and Leader Reed for finally establishing the first maternity leave policy for State employees. Of all the people that work for the State employees of all the agencies, the Democratic and Republican leadership team in the House established the first maternity leave policy. And thank you, gentlemen, for your leadership; and, ladies, for fighting for a program that needs expanded. We have got a long way to go, but thank you to the leadership team for finally doing that.

I want to thank real quickly some people that have worked in my district office over the years: Karen, Josh, Roman, Alicia, and Julie for all you did for me and my family and the people of the 15th District.

To the people of the 15th District, thank you for this opportunity. The people of Beaver County, you know, I was a 25-year-old kid and, as the leader said yesterday, who was not prepared to be a legislator when I was elected. I am not a Harvard student, I just had the guts to do it, and they took a shot on me, and I am forever thankful for that opportunity. And to the people of Washington County who allowed me to finish what I started.

Finally, I want to thank my family, my parents, Jayann's parents. You know, recently Representative English, he mentioned the difficulty of being the Representative's kids, and I said I completely agree with his assessment, but I will also say that it is a challenge being the Representative's parents. You know, we are in this vile, toxic environment right now where everything is said about candidates, and some of us candidates

and elected officials, we expect it. And even though we voluntarily go into the arena, I do not think a parent is ever prepared to stomach those. I would like to thank my brother, my sisters, my brothers-in-law, sisters-in-law, for their love and support.

I would like to thank my loving wife, Jayann. And I know she has taught me that public speeches are not the best forum to truly express my abounding love and appreciation, but it is worth noting that over 10 years my staff has seen some changes; the car I pack up and drive to Harrisburg has seen changes; thanks to Dave Thomas, my weight has even changed; my hair color is starting to change. But Jayann's love and support has never changed.

And I was going to talk about Nolan but he is sleeping. But my man, Nolan, he has had to stomach and deal with a dad who leaves for Harrisburg, a yearlong grueling campaign, and things that his baby sister in January will not have to deal with. But he has changed my life and I just cannot thank him enough for being a really special, special boy.

So with that, I just want to say thank you again. I apologize to anyone I missed or did not name. I just did not want to do what Mark Mustio did and just read the roll.

So, Mr. Chairman.

Mr. MUSTIO. We have a little toast, and this is a toast that I did actually after I was first elected, and Mary Larcinese, who worked on my campaign and I spent 7 straight weeks with her, will probably remember this.

Mr. CHRISTIANA. Friends may come.

Mr. MUSTIO. Friends may go.

Mr. CHRISTIANA. Friends may peter out.

Mr. MUSTIO. You know.

Mr. CHRISTIANA. But we will be friends.

Mr. MUSTIO. Through thick or thin.

Mr. CHRISTIANA. Peter out.

Mr. MUSTIO. Peter in.

Mr. CHRISTIANA. God bless you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you very much, Representatives Mustio and Christiana.

We will be taking some photos and then we are going to take just a brief break before we go to Chairman Markosek, just briefly.

I was at Representative Jim Christiana's kickoff for his first race down in Monaca and spent a lot of time with him on a lot of issues for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and we are going to miss him. To you and Jayann and Nolan, nothing but the best. God bless.

To Mark Mustio, my neighbor and one of my closest friends here in Harrisburg, thank you for always being so passionate, diligent on so many issues, just on so many issues, and really getting me myself to see a broader array of relationships and understanding of issues, particularly when it came to jobs. You had a very broad vision about that, and what you have done in moving a jobs agenda for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and certainly for southwestern Pennsylvania has been nothing short of exemplary. And thank you for all you have done on the other side of the street too, but just thanks for your friendship. May God bless.

We are going to be just taking a very brief time for photos, and then I am going to have Chairman Markosek up to the rostrum.

FAREWELL ADDRESS BY MR. MARKOSEK

The SPEAKER. Representative Joe Markosek is serving his 18th term as the Representative for the 25th Legislative District of Allegheny County and never missed a vote. He is chairman of the House Appropriations Committee for the Democrats, and, Joe, you have been in that position, both in the majority and the minority for— Oh, just the minority for the last 8 years? For 8 years. Joe, you were a chairman for Transportation, right? And you were in the majority for Transportation. He was the majority Transportation chair and then was the Democrat minority chair of the House Appropriations Committee the last 8 years. Also, a member of the Policy and Rules Committees.

As you know, he was one of the leaders with respect to Act 44 of 2007, which increased transportation funding significantly. And before taking office in 1983, Chairman Markosek worked with Westinghouse Water Reactor Division as a buyer of nuclear components and in fact was sent to Three Mile Island as part of the repair/recovery team immediately following the accident in 1979. As many of you know, he is very active in his community out in Monroeville, although there are other communities as well that he represents: championing funding for libraries, youth facilities, local governments, EMS (emergency medical services) providers, transportation improvements, health-care

organizations, and local access for senior citizens and people with disabilities. He has been a member of the Monroeville Area and Plum Chambers of Commerce, as well as the Murrysville Library Foundation Board. He sits on the Pennsylvania School Employees' Retirement System Board and the Pittsburgh Supercomputing Center Advisory Committee.

This good man, hard worker, individual who has worked with people from both sides of the aisle, effective relations with the majority chairs, both – I think maybe all three, Mario Civera, Bill Adolph, and Stan Saylor, the majority Appropriations chairs. And for me, obviously amongst the other important points, a 1972 graduate of the University of Notre Dame, I am going to be missing my fellow graduate.

Joe Markosek is a class gentleman, and I am very honored to bring him up for his farewell remarks.

Mr. MARKOSEK. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

You know, I have been watching people give these farewell speeches for 36 years and I have taken a lot of notes over there and I always wondered, you know, when will the time come and I wonder how I will do. Well, here we are. And the one thing I decided to do was to go way back to my high school days, over 50 years ago, and I had a speech class in high school. I cannot recall very much about that speech class, but the one thing I did remember was the speech teacher says when you are preparing to give a speech or remarks, make an outline. So I put a short outline together for this speech.

First of all, the first part of the outline is an introduction and thank you to all the folks that I need to introduce here today and thank. The second part is what I have titled "Memories," and I will not go on and on and on, but I have been here a long time and I have a lot of memories, but I sort of, I think, have put it into a succinct kind of snapshot version of the last 36 years. And then finally, the third part of the outline is a summary where you kind of make your point, go over a couple of other things, and leave some thoughts for your audience. So here we go.

The first part is the introduction, and I would be remiss if I did not mention my longtime friend and former employee in my district office, who actually still is an employee in my district office, who passed away just this Friday night. So in a week where our chamber has seen some other sadness, I had also the additional sad time that I had to deal with, and we have all had to deal with, the loss of one of our colleagues, Kevin Keller. Kevin was just a wonderful, wonderful friend, a great worker. His son, Shaun, worked for me about 10 years ago. He left and got a job in Washington, DC, and his dad, Kevin, who was a postman for over 30 years, had retired and we had an opening, a part-time opening at the time, and he said, "Gee, I would like to do that." And we brought him on and he found a new career. Even though all those years with the post office, he loved working for the House of Representatives and for our district in our district office. So I thought it would be just very appropriate to mention Kevin here as I start my remarks.

But first of all, you know, the family should come first, right? I do not have a very large immediate family. I have an extended family. But my immediate family consists of: I have a sister who lives in Florida with her husband, Gary. They could not be here today. I have one child – my son, Brandon. He could not be here today as he is pursuing his own career. And I also have here today, though, my best friend, my partner for the last number of years, former Assistant Chief Clerk of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives for many years, Linda Lehman. I love you, sweetie.

You know, we have some district office folks that have driven up here from Pittsburgh this morning, from the Monroeville area. First of all, of course, is my chief of staff and many folks from Allegheny County know Kim Steele, and, Kim, you have been wonderful to me and you have helped me to be successful and I appreciate that. Carole DiBiase could not make it with us today. I know – I just got a text from her – she is watching on PCN. So, Carole, I wish you were here. Dave Palermo and Bill McClelland are two part-timers that we have. They are retired police officers from the great municipality off Monroeville and they are here today. Bill and Dave, give a wave. And we also have Sherry Herbst, who could not make it. She was ill today. Her husband, Jeff, who is our local magistrate back home, was also going to attend, but they could not make it.

I also want to introduce, and most of you know a lot of them, my staff here in Harrisburg, and of course my executive director, Miriam Fox, has just been wonderful and really knows her stuff as we all know and I learned a long time ago, you know, Miriam will put you on the right track and follow her lead when it comes to budgetary processes. Miriam, you have done a great job. Thank you very much.

The rest of my staff I want to at least mention: Jenn Belz, Lee Adkins, Tara Friel, Tara Trees, Beth Balaban, Paul Baldari, Eric Dice, Bernie Gallagher, Wendy Lewis, Chloe Bohm, Anne Baloga, Caleb Sisak, Patrick Shaughnessy, Gueorgui Tochev, David Geiger, Sean Brandon, and Mark Shade. Thank you all. That is the first part of the outline.

Now, the second part which I have entitled "Memories." March 28, 1979, the Speaker mentioned, that was the date of the accident at Three Mile Island. I had never been to the city of Harrisburg before. I had never seen the Capitol before. I was 29 years old, you can do the math, but I was 29 years old, and I was sent down here. And those of you who might have been around Harrisburg at the time remember that Governor Thornburgh was sending everybody out, but we were coming in because we had very important work to do. The entire nuclear industry at that time was called upon to come to Three Mile Island and help solve the leak problem and the radiation problems and the cleanup issues, and I was called as part of that, and I first saw Harrisburg. And that is not what drove me to the legislature. In fact, I was not even involved in politics then. But what happened was soon after that I got involved with some other Westinghouse employees that were involved with the local politics in Monroeville. They got me involved in that, and I ran for local council and lost. Probably the best thing that ever happened because they said, "You know, you were such a great candidate even though you lost. We need a candidate for legislator." So the following year, 1982, they recruited me and I ran for the legislature. In the spring of 1982 there were four of us running on the Democratic ticket, two on the Republican ticket. I won the Democratic primary by 122 votes and ended up on November 2, 1982, being elected to the House of Representatives for the first time. And it is interesting to note that our legislative body was founded in 1682. Exactly 300 years later I got elected. Now, if you figure it out, I have been here 36 years, so we are 336 years old. I have been here for about 10 percent of that entire history. So when you think about it in those terms, I think it makes it sound a little different.

Another date that was important was Tuesday, January 4, 1983, my first swearing-in, and when I stood back there and raised my hand on the Bible and took the oath of office, in that room with me at the time was Tom Caltagirone, Tony DeLuca,

Bob Freeman, and Bob Godshall. They were the only ones that are still here and Bob Godshall and I are moving on, but they were the only ones that were there the day I took the oath of office. But there are two other people I want to mention who were here that day: Leroy Irvis, Representative Leroy Irvis, was the Speaker; Matt Ryan was the minority leader; Jim Manderino was the majority leader at the time; and the Parliamentarian was a really young guy by the name of Clancy Myer, and I turn around and there he is. He is still here. Another gentleman who went on the State payroll the very same day that I went on the State payroll – you know, you get elected in November and you go on the payroll December 1 – was a young guy who did not know his way around, I am sure, at that time by the name of Dave Reddecliff, and he is now the Chief Clerk of the House. So we all have some history here.

Moving forward, fast-forward a little bit to Thursday, September 17, 1987, that day was the 200th anniversary of the Constitution of the United States. And you know, just to go over History 101 a little bit, you know, we fought the Revolution in 1776 through about 1781, I believe it was. The country was formed and we had what we called the Articles of Confederation, a form of government that did not work very well, and they said, "Look, we have got to redo this." And they did a Constitution, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison in particular, in Philadelphia at the same building where they signed the Declaration of Independence, Independence Hall. And in honor of the 200th anniversary of that, Speaker Irvis, Majority Leader Manderino and Minority Leader Matt Ryan took the entire House to have a session day on the lawn of Independence Hall on September 17, 1987, to recognize the 200th anniversary of our Constitution.

Moving forward to Wednesday, May 17, 1988, and even though we have had some sadness here, that I think was perhaps the most profoundly sad day that I ever spent as a legislator. And we did not have the iPhones and the social media like we have today, the texting. I can remember walking on the floor in the back there and we were called to order and the Speaker said that one of our members, Representative Bill Telek from Cambria County, was murdered and they found his body on the street in Harrisburg early that morning. Bill Telek was a friend. He was a Republican from Cambria County. Those of you who may remember Bill Telek, he always had a smile on his face, cigar-chomping type of guy. I think he had about seven children, and soon after his funeral, his wife was elected for several terms here to fill his seat.

December 25, Christmas Day 1992, birth of my son, Brandon. Obviously, a big day in my life, and I did not have to miss a session day. So that is part of the reason that the record still stands.

January 1, the year 2000, Y2K. I was not Appropriations chairman then, but I remember we had a line item in the budget for Y2K because we all had the fear that nothing was going to work when midnight of Y2K came around. It turned out that that was a fear, luckily, that was overblown. We did not have anywhere near the problem. But I think we kept that line item around for quite a while. Especially when somebody needed something, you know, you could always dip in there.

September 11, 2001, we all know what happened. I happened to be home visiting a women's shelter that morning. We were not in session that day. But the one thing, and the reason I bring that up, is because of the profound change, changes that occurred because of that here. You know, when I started here, people could

walk in and out of this Capitol Building, almost any room or office or whatever, unquestioned – any stranger, you know, tourists – and they would just walk around. There was almost no security. That— 9/11 changed everything, changed everything. We have a whole heck of a lot more security. And just driving in the other morning in the garage, we have a new security system there now that we have just installed. So that really changed a lot here in the General Assembly and the Capitol Building and I am sure everywhere else as well.

December 2006 I was appointed the majority chair of the Transportation Committee, and that was a dream come true. Believe it or not, you know, when I started in this job way back when and was in it for a little bit and you know how we all kind of get certain issues that we, you know, have a little more favoritism towards than others, become our favorite issues, if you will, Transportation was mine. You know, I had worked for the Pittsburgh and Lake Erie Railroad. I had been on the board of the Allegheny County Port Authority Transit System. I was on the Transportation Committee for about 15 years, and my dream was to someday be the chairman and I got to do that, and I was the majority chairman for 4 years, and it was until that time I always thought it was a dream come true, and later when I looked I still have the bias and when I say I think I have been the chairman of the two best committees in the House – obviously, Transportation, in my opinion, and Appropriations. So I have had a lot of dreams come true, but at that time that was one.

And about 6 months later, in July of 2007, my bill, HB 1590, became Act 44 that had passed. And for those of you who perhaps need reminded, Act 44 was the bill, it was a funding bill for transportation, but the funds were going to come from the monetization of the turnpike, which included the tolling of Interstate 80. Now, that is a controversial subject. It was then; I am sure it still would be now. And that did not occur, unfortunately, as time went on, and maybe some of you who live along that corridor think that is a good thing. But as far as transportation funding was concerned, that was something that really would have solved a lot of problems looking forward over time. But anyway, that was my bill and it is still in effect and it is still somewhat controversial and Act 89, the new transportation bill that we have now, includes Act 44 because the turnpike continues to give quite a bit of money to our mass transit systems and our road and bridge, PennDOT, road and bridge construction systems. And since we do not— Act 89 also calls for the sunset of Act 44 money in another few years. So those of you who will still be here in a couple of years, that issue is going to come back, because when that money goes away, you are going to have to find alternatives.

November 16, 2010, it was the election, my election as Democratic chair of the Appropriations Committee. I had thought I had lived my dream, but boy, I got another opportunity to have another dream, and I got to serve with just so many great people, not only people on the committee but both sides of the aisle. The two great chairmen, obviously, Bill Adolph and Stan Saylor, and I am really going to miss that, as well as of course the staff on both sides of the aisle.

Spring of 2018, I announced my retirement and I will not be a candidate for reelection. It was not a particularly easy decision. A lot of things made sense. But as I stand here in front of you right now, you know, I have mixed emotions, to be honest, and I guess that is normal.

But that brings us up to October 17, 2018. That is today when I get to deliver a farewell address. I am looking forward to November 13, which is our last scheduled session day, and God willing, I will make it and keep that record intact, 36 years, not too bad.

And then the last part of section two of my outline, January 1, 2019, swearing-in day. I am hoping to be here as a guest of one of the newly sworn legislators.

Okay. Finally, now this is the last part of where I summarize and just a few thoughts. You know, somebody asked me the other day, "What is the most profound change that I've seen in 36 years here?" I had to think about it a little bit, but not too long. You know, there is an old saying about never watch legislation or sausage being made. Well, with the advent of social media, the public, and all of us we see the sausage being made. So if I had to say what is the profound change, it would be social media, social media and technology in general. You know, when I started here, we had binders on the desks, not laptops, and today we have issues like telemedicine and distracted driving. You know, when I was a freshman, if you would have said we are going to ban distracted driving, that would have meant, okay, you cannot eat in the car or you cannot comb your hair. But we know with the advent of technology and it is something for us all to remember, we, here in the legislature, are a very deliberative body and sometimes that means we do not move very quickly. Technology moves far more quickly than we do, far more quickly, and we are struggling always to catch up. We are struggling always to catch up, and I do not know that that is going to change.

But my best advice, as I get ready to leave, is compromise, compromise, compromise. You know, this building, as beautiful as it is, and we have heard speakers get up here, and the artistic glory of this place, the majestic look of it is fantastic. And we can say the same about the Capitol in Washington, DC. But you know, the purpose for this building is not a museum. It is not a place to bring tourists to just walk around and enjoy the artwork. This was developed by our Founding Fathers to be a place of compromise. You know, they understood that if you do not want a monarchy and if you do not want a dictatorship, then you are going to have to have a republic, and that means bringing all kinds of diverse people and diverse ideas into one body where you can hash them out and debate them and come up with answers, and that does not always mean that you are going to get everything you want. You have to be able to give if you want to get. I think we have far too many people that come here and learn the getting part a lot quicker than they do the giving part. So any advice I would have for those of you who are going to continue here is this will not work unless we compromise. You hear all the time, you know, Washington will not work, Harrisburg will not work. They are right. If we do not compromise, it will not work.

So I would hope you would keep that in mind, and I will just leave one other analogy here, but – and my good friend, Harry Readshaw, brought it up the other night when we were having dinner where he says, "You know, it's best to play this game between the 40-yard lines," using a football analogy. You know, you have the very liberal, you have the very conservative, but let us play the game within the 40-yard lines where we get most of the people are and most of the ideas are and where you can get compromise worked out. You know, people on either end generally are going to have a much harder time getting together, but it is that main body within the 40-yard lines that I think you have your best chance of doing things and getting things done.

So in summary, you know, I was looking for, I do not know, a poem or the words from a song that would somehow encapsulate my career and with my remarks here today, and I think I found it, I think I found it. You might have to use your imagination a little bit and maybe take a little license, but it was a song written by John Lennon and Paul McCartney in 1965, and the name of the song was "In My Life." And it was also recorded by numerous other people besides the Beatles, including Bette Midler and Johnny Cash, and the song goes like this, and I am singing, not singing, but saying this to you, to each one of you as an individual:

There are places I'll remember
All my life, though some have changed
Some forever not for better
Some have gone and some remain

All these places have their moments
With lovers and friends
I still can recall
Some are dead and some are living
But in my life, I've loved them all

But of all these friends and lovers
There is no one who compares with you
And these memories lose their meaning
When I think of love as something new

Though I know I'll never lose affection
For people and things that went before
But in my life, in my life, I have loved you all more.

Farewell, everybody.

STATEMENT BY MR. JAMES

The SPEAKER. Representative James, you may start. We will go right here at the podium. Members, please give the speakers an opportunity to be heard. Representative James, you may begin.

Mr. JAMES. Okay. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I wanted to make a few comments on HB 1097, the CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) bill for students grades 9 through 12. CPR is a recognized and successful lifesaving procedure which 36 States have adopted in order to deal with this lifesaving training. It is a matter of local control for sure. There is some opposition to the bill, as I have noticed, primarily due to

the concept of invading school latitude for significant disruption to their academic program.

In regard to that academic programming, this bill does not require CPR training to be made a part of the entire school program but makes it an optional situation. All the school districts now have required every 3 years training, CPR training, for administration and teachers, and I am trying to open the door to the kids. Five hundred school districts are administered by men and women who hold master's degrees and Ph.D.s, arguably among the brightest in the Commonwealth, and I believe they are very capable of determining the proper budgeting, securing a location, scheduling, and providing notice to parents, along with complying with existing policy according to Red Cross.

I want to thank the members for their support today. It is important, I think, to not deny the young people, grades 9 through 12, the opportunity to get this training. And just for the record, CPR has actually been practiced since 1740, when the Paris Academy of Sciences recognized the efficacy of the lifesaving practice. Thank you all for your votes.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Mr. READSHAW. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, November 10 will be the 243 years of the Marine Corps birthday. And in keeping with longstanding tradition of previous legislators, Sam Hayes, Richard Chess, Ed Zemprelli, Paul McHale, Tom Tigue, Merle Phillips, Bill DeWeese, and myself, I have introduced this resolution to proclaim November 10, 2018, "Marine Corps Day" in Pennsylvania.

The United States Marine Corps have a long and proud history beginning with the resolution that founded the Continental Marines on November 10, 1775, going forward with men and women serving all over the world today.

Marines truly embody the motto of the Marine Corps, "Semper Fidelis," which translates from Latin as "always faithful" and signifies the defense of freedom and democracy worldwide.

I would just like to read the last stanza of the lyrics of the Marine Corps Hymn, Mr. Speaker, which reads:

Here's health to you and to our Corps
Which we are proud to serve;
In many a strife we've fought for life
And never lost our nerve.
If the Army and the Navy
Ever look on Heaven's scenes,
They will find the streets are guarded
By United States Marines.

Mr. Speaker, that is not to offend our brothers that served in other arms of the Armed Forces, but the fact of the matter is, they will find the streets guarded by United States Marines.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. RYAN

Mr. RYAN. Ladies and gentlemen, members, thank you very much.

I just wanted to take a second here, if I could, to announce that at 1600 hours today, Sgt. Maj. John Canley, United States Marine Corps retired, will be presented the Congressional Medal of Honor by the President of the United States at the White House. I was fortunate enough to receive an invitation, but it was from a Medal of Honor action, conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of his life above and beyond the call of duty for service in Vietnam, and with him will be my sergeant major, Sgt. Maj. Eddie Neas.

The backbone of the United States Marine Corps is our Noncommissioned Officer Corps, and I would ask you to celebrate the great heroism of so many men and women in the United States Marines. We recently celebrated the 100th anniversary of women Marines. But in just a very short period of time, Sergeant Major Canley will be the most recent recipient of the Medal of Honor.

As a former faculty member, it is an honor to be here today joined by my colleagues, Representative Brown and Representative Rader, in honoring East Stroudsburg University on its 125th anniversary.

Since its inception, ESU has come a long way in becoming the highly respected educational institution that it is today, offering an array of undergraduate and graduate degrees.

East Stroudsburg Normal School opened its doors on September 4, 1893. A faculty of 15 greeted a group of 320 students who had entered the 2-year program in elementary and science education. Although the Normal School was originally privately owned, ownership was transferred to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in 1920, and the name was changed to East Stroudsburg State Normal School.

In 1927 the right to confer the degrees of bachelor of science in education and bachelor of science in health education was granted, and the school's name then became the State Teachers College at East Stroudsburg.

In 1960 the college's name was changed to East Stroudsburg State College, reflecting the addition of liberal arts and science curricula. In November 1982 the State System of Higher Education was authorized by SB 506.

The college officially became East Stroudsburg University on July 1, 1983. Today ESU offers quality, affordable academic programs, a diverse and scholarly staff, and an intellectually challenging environment.

All throughout ESU's rich history, they have consistently adhered to the principles that make the college experience invaluable.

Once again, I am pleased to be joined by Representative Brown and Representative Rader in honoring all they have done for the Commonwealth. Thank you.

I thank you, Representative Farry, for being a cosponsor on my bill. I hope that it will be reintroduced in the spring, because as a mother and a grandmother, that is something that we cannot ignore. Children need our help.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 2638 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER. We return to HB 2638, PN 4248, page 3 of supplement D House calendar. Representative Rothman wanted to speak. Representative Rothman followed by Representative Stephens. Those are the only two members, I believe, that I need to call.

Mr. ROTHMAN. Mr. Speaker, this is pretty simple. They are taking the revenues, tax revenues that will come about by cleaning up a site that is polluting and there is not clean water, they are taking the revenues by developing it, sort of like a tax incremental financing, and using that to float bonds to clean it up. This is a basic, simple case, and I urge my colleagues to vote "yes."

The SPEAKER. Representative Stephens.

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

You know, Mr. Speaker, I think there is – I will keep it brief – but I think that there is a brief history that would maybe be helpful for some of the members here.

So this process concerning the Willow Grove Naval Air Station has been unfolding with the Federal government for many years, and unfortunately, they have saddled one of our communities with a blighted, undeveloped former military base, and unfortunately, the runoff from that base is going into several other communities. The contention that this bill only addresses one community is just flat-out wrong. This bill would address water contamination resulting from that military base, regardless of which community it is found in, and what is really important is, as I embarked upon this process, I worked with the administration. Since last spring, I worked with the administration. As a matter of fact, the language of the bill is largely the administration's language. This was the approach that the administration suggested, and so we, of course, made some tweaks and negotiated and worked through that, making sure that we had the Department of Revenue, making sure that we had the other entities involved comfortable with the language that you

see before you today. So this was a product of many, many months of conversations and discussions and negotiations.

And one of the things that was very important to the administration – and I agreed with it – was that we should develop a plan that could be replicated elsewhere, so that where there are other instances of contamination where the responsible party cannot be held accountable but the land remains economically viable, we could utilize this approach. And so the whole point of this is to say, "All right. Let's give this a shot and work on this site to try to make this productive." This is land in eastern Montgomery County that, but for the Federal contamination, would be producing jobs and tax revenue for this Commonwealth.

So we can do nothing. We can do nothing and we will sit with a blighted old runway and a blighted old taxiway and some blighted old hangars in the middle of what would otherwise be economically viable and desirable land. We can do nothing if we would like. Or we can try this approach where we say, "You know what? We're not going to actually draw down today's tax dollars. What we are going to do is we are going to say, 'Hey, if we clean this up, this might actually be worth something. If we clean this up, we can create jobs here in Pennsylvania. If we clean this up, we can put people back to work so that they are paying taxes to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and taking care of their families and saving for retirement and everything else like that.' "

So that is the choice that is before us. We can clean up the drinking water or we can leave folks with contaminated drinking water. We can clean up an old military base and get it repurposed so that it can be productive for the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania or we can do nothing. We can leave people in the lurch with contaminated drinking water with cancer-causing chemicals or we can go ahead and take action.

And, Mr. Speaker, one of the things that I know many of the members have asked me – I would be thrilled, absolutely thrilled to replicate this in other communities across the Commonwealth. I would be incredibly proud, frankly, to next session start work on other communities that are similarly situated, that have similar environmental challenges, that are otherwise economically viable and work to go ahead and make sure that we get those communities remediated, make sure we get those communities back on the tax rolls, make sure we get those communities producing jobs for the people who live in those communities. It is about repurposing those blighted communities from environmental contamination. That is what this bill does, and this bill can be a model for the rest of the Commonwealth.

But every journey starts with one step. So let us take that one step today and let us cast this "yes" vote so that we can begin repurposing, reducing the environmental pollution and contamination, and get the land at the Willow Grove Naval Air Station back to productive use for the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

An Act amending the act of February 2, 1966 (1965 P.L.1860, No.586), entitled "An act encouraging landowners to make land and water areas available to the public for recreational purposes by limiting liability in connection therewith, and repealing certain acts," further providing for liability for landowners to recreational users.

HB 645, PN 4278

An Act amending the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971, in realty transfer tax, further providing for excluded transactions; and, in neighborhood assistance tax credit, further providing for tax credit and for grant of tax credit and providing for reporting.

HB 1216, PN 3819

An Act amending Titles 18 (Crimes and Offenses) and 42 (Judiciary and Judicial Procedure) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in riot, disorderly conduct and related offenses, further providing for definitions, for the offense of neglect of animal and for the offense of attack of guide dog; in trade and commerce, further providing for the offense of discrimination on account of guide, signal or service dog or other aid animal; and, in particular rights and immunities, providing for rescue from motor vehicle.

HB 1233, PN 4252

An Act amending the act of July 9, 1976 (P.L.817, No.143), known as the Mental Health Procedures Act, in general provisions, further providing for scope of act, providing for definitions, further providing for treatment facilities and for individualized treatment plan and providing for assisted outpatient treatment implementation by counties and for assisted outpatient treatment implementation by department; in involuntary examination and treatment, further providing for persons subject, for involuntary emergency examination and treatment authorized by physician, for persons for whom application may be made, and for additional periods of court-ordered involuntary treatment; and adding provisions relating to assisted outpatient treatment.

HB 1511, PN 4253

An Act amending the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971, in hotel occupancy tax, further providing for definitions and for imposition of tax and establishing the Tourism Promotion Fund.

An Act providing for notification of patient test results to be sent directly to a patient or the patient's designee; and providing for duties of the Department of Health.

BILLS SIGNED BY SPEAKER

Bills numbered and entitled as follows having been prepared for presentation to the Governor, and the same being correct, the titles were publicly read as follows:

SB 6, PN 2105

An Act amending the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), known as the Human Services Code, in public assistance, further providing for definitions, for resources and for verification system, prohibiting eligibility for individuals convicted of drug distribution, prohibiting eligibility for violators of sexual offender registration, further providing for false statements, investigations and penalty and for prohibited use of public assistance funds, providing for lost access devices and further providing for violation and penalty.

SB 31, PN 12

An Act amending the act of June 26, 2001 (P.L.755, No.77), known as the Tobacco Settlement Act, in Commonwealth universal research enhancement, establishing the Spinal Cord Injury Research Program and Spinal Cord Research Advisory Committee, further providing for department responsibilities and for use of funds and providing for spinal cord injury research programs funding.

SB 403, PN 1228

An Act amending Title 53 (Municipalities Generally) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in employees, further providing for commission members.

SB 627, PN 700

An Act amending the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971, in corporate net income tax, further providing for definitions.

SB 676, PN 1289

An Act amending the act of June 2, 1915 (P.L.736, No.338), known as the Workers' Compensation Act, in liability and compensation, further providing for injuries outside this Commonwealth; in procedure, further providing for the Workmen's Compensation Administration Fund; and, in the Uninsured Employers Guaranty Fund, further providing for definitions, for fund, for claims, for claim petition, for department and for assessments and transfers and providing for uninsured employer obligations and for administrative penalties and stop-work orders.

SB 771, PN 969

An Act amending Titles 8 (Boroughs and Incorporated Towns) and 11 (Cities) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in powers and duties of elected officials, further providing for completion, filing and publication of auditor's report and financial statement; and, in accounts and finances, further providing for annual reports, publication, filing report with Department of Community and Economic Development and penalty.

SB 772, PN 970

An Act amending the act of June 24, 1931 (P.L.1206, No.331), known as The First Class Township Code, in auditors, further providing for surcharges, auditors' report and publication of financial statements.

SB 773, PN 971

An Act amending the act of April 18, 1929 (P.L.612, No.253), entitled "An act for the election of the mayor, members of town council, and auditors, in incorporated towns of the Commonwealth; regulating the manner of voting for such officers, and repealing inconsistent general, local and special laws," further providing for publication of audit report.

SB 796, PN 2106

An Act amending Title 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in general provisions, further providing for definitions; in fees, further providing for exemptions from other fees and providing for recreational trailers and recreational cargo trailers and for special procedures for trailer registration; and, in size, weight and load, further providing for restrictions on use of highways and bridges and for registered gross weight.

SB 801, PN 1012

An Act amending Titles 8 (Boroughs and Incorporated Towns) and 11 (Cities) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in contracts, further providing for regulation of contracts; and, in contracts, further providing for contracts or purchases not requiring advertising or bidding.

SB 802, PN 1013

An Act amending the act of June 24, 1931 (P.L.1206, No.331), known as The First Class Township Code, in contracts, further providing for general regulations concerning contracts.

SB 803, PN 1014

An Act amending the act of May 1, 1933 (P.L.103, No.69), known as The Second Class Township Code, in contracts, further providing for letting contracts.

SB 804, PN 1015

An Act amending the act of May 27, 1953 (P.L.244, No.34), entitled "An act relating to and regulating the contracts of incorporated towns and providing penalties," further providing for regulation of contracts.

SB 919, PN 1549

An Act amending the act of May 28, 1937 (P.L.955, No.265), referred to as the Housing Authorities Law, further providing for powers of an authority; and providing for relocation.

SB 947, PN 1330

An Act amending Titles 8 (Boroughs and Incorporated Towns) and 11 (Cities) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in corporate powers, further providing for personal property; and, in corporate powers, further providing for city property and affairs.

SB 948, PN 1331

An Act amending the act of June 24, 1931 (P.L.1206, No.331), known as The First Class Township Code, further providing for suits and property.

SB 949, PN 1332

An Act amending the act of May 27, 1953 (P.L.244, No.34), entitled "An act relating to and regulating the contracts of incorporated towns and providing penalties," further providing for power to convey.

SB 961, PN 2098

An Act amending Title 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in licensing of drivers, further providing for learner's permits and for driving while operating privilege is suspended or revoked; in miscellaneous provisions, further providing for the offenses of homicide by vehicle, aggravated assault by vehicle, homicide by vehicle while driving under influence, aggravated assault by vehicle while driving under the influence, for accidents involving death or personal injury while not properly licensed and for accidents involving certain vehicles; and, in driving after imbibing alcohol or utilizing drugs, further providing for grading and for penalties.

SB 1007, PN 1396

An Act amending Title 53 (Municipalities Generally) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in consolidated county assessment, further providing for definitions, for chief assessor, for notices, appeals and certification of values, for special provisions relating to countywide revisions of assessments, for board of assessment appeals and board of assessment revision, for regulations of board and for auxiliary appeal boards and alternates; and making editorial changes.

SB 1098, PN 2107

An Act amending Title 75 (Vehicles) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in rules of the road in general, further providing for meeting or overtaking school bus and providing for enforcement of failure to stop for school bus with flashing red lights.

SB 1156, PN 2108

An Act designating a bridge on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 100 over the Schuylkill River in Pottstown Borough, Montgomery County, as the Newstell Marable, Sr., Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on Stoughstown Road over Interstate 81 in Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3007-0020-0865) as the Private Raymond Lafayette Naugle Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge on Maple Avenue over the Yellow Breeches Creek in Walnut Bottom Township, Cumberland County (bridge number 21-3009-0012-0000), as the Sergeant Kenneth Lee "Buck" Devor Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of U.S. Route 219 South, over U.S. Route 22, also known as the Admiral Peary Highway, in Cambria Township, Cambria County, as the PFC Nick Kozorosky Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 286, known as Washington Street, over the Kiskiminetas River, between Saltsburg Borough, Indiana County, and Loyalhanna Township, Westmoreland County, as the First Sergeant Alexander Kelly Memorial Bridge; designating the bridge identified as Bridge Key 14196 located on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 39, also known as Linglestown Road, over U.S. Route 22 in the City of Harrisburg, Dauphin County, as the Specialist 4 Reuben Garnett, Jr., Memorial Bridge; designating a portion of Pennsylvania Route 54 in West Mahanoy Township, Schuylkill County, as the Francis V. Donald Whipple Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of Pennsylvania Route 36 over Three Springs Run, South Woodbury Township, Bedford County, as the Marine Lance Corporal Darrell Magruder Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on that portion of State Route 1001 over Imlertown Run, Bedford Township, Bedford County, as the First Lieutenant Eric Fisher Wood, Jr., Memorial Bridge; designating a bridge on U.S. Route 209 over the West Branch Schuylkill River in Pottsville, Schuylkill County, as the Captain David A.
