All members and guests, please take your seats. These champions have traveled some distance. We are so honored to have them with us. So at this time I am going to ask the Sergeants at Arms to close the doors of the House. If there is a need for a

caucus, please take it off the House floor; you certainly may. You certainly may take it off the House floor. And we do want to move to reorganization of committees but we do have some folks that have traveled some distance, so we need everybody to please take their seats.

WEST YORK HIGH SCHOOL GIRLS VOLLEYBALL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Carol Hill-Evans, if you could start us off. Thank you so much.

Mrs. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

So on Saturday, November 17, 2018, the West York Bulldogs defeated Warren High School 3 to 0 to win the PIAA Class AAA Girls Volleyball Championship at Cumberland Valley High School. The game scores were 25 to 22, 25 to 15, and 25 to 20. This was the West York program's first ever, first ever State title. The Bulldogs finished the season with a 28-and-1 record. The clinching kill was delivered by outside hitter Julia Rill off a set from setter Taylor Morley after a pass from libero Kambrie Hepler. West York head coach is Joe Ramp. Warren had been undefeated entering the State title match and then they met the Bulldogs. Julia Rill led the championship match with 12 kills. Tesia Thomas had 11 kills. Taylor Morley had 30 assists. Senior Kiersten Bowser came up with a big kill to finish the first game and a big block to help close out the second game.

After winning the program's State title and receiving their gold medals, Tesia Thomas told reporters that this was such a wonderful accomplishment because her teammates were like family. Her head coach, Joe Ramp, repeatedly talked about the balanced efforts of the entire roster. Opponents could never focus on trying to stop just one girl because every girl in a West York uniform contributed to this historic State championship. What this team accomplished in the fall will be remembered in West York for a very long time. The coaching staff, players, and entire school exemplified the best qualities in teamwork, in family, in establishing goals, and striving for greatness. Though Joe told reporters they never set a specific goal of winning a State title, the Bulldogs proved even gold medal dreams can come true when talent, desire – and most importantly, having fun – are part of the equation.

FARRELL HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. At this time Representative Longietti is invited to proceed presenting a citation to the Farrell Area High School Football Team. This team has traveled 4 1/2 hours. They are on the Ohio border and we are so honored they would make the trip to see us today.

You may proceed, Representative.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am pleased to present the 2018 Class A State champion Farrell Steelers Football Team from Farrell, Pennsylvania. Under the direction of the Pennsylvania Writers Class A "Coach of the Year," Jarrett Samuels, the Farrell Steelers defeated Lackawanna Trail High School by a score of 55 to 20 at Hersheypark Stadium on December 5 to capture the crown. The Farrell Steelers program celebrated its 100th season by becoming the first Mercer County football team to go undefeated and win a State championship by recording a perfect 15-and-0 season.

Led by senior quarterback/linebacker and Pennsylvania Writers Class A "Player of the Year," Kyi Wright, Farrell outscored its opponents by 779 to 117 and outgained them by 6500 yards to 2,438 yards. The Steelers were also led by running back Christian Lewis, who established school single season and career rushing yard records, and wide receiver Jourdan Townsend, who established a school receiving yards record, both named to the Class A all-State squad. They joined offensive lineman Kobe Hilton and Gary Satterwhite III, as well as linebacker Tymir Green, who were also named to the Class A All-State squad.

Along the way, Farrell defeated Reynolds by a score of 62 to 6 to earn the District 10 championship. They followed that with a victory over District 5 champion Shade by a score of 56 to 8; a 48-to-6 win over District 9 champion Coudersport; and a 41-to-10 victory over WPIAL champion Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, all leading to their State championship win over Lackawanna Trail.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to introduce the team members at the rostrum. They are head coach Jarrett Samuels, quarterback/linebacker Kyi Wright, offensive lineman Kobe Hilton, wide receiver Jourdan Townsend, running back Christian Lewis; also, the other seniors at the rostrum are Cameron Zimmerman, Elijah Harper, Dashon Sims, E.J. Rawlins, and

Vincent Purdie. Joining them are the remaining members of the team, in the well of the House, along with the superintendent, the Reverend Dr. Lora Adams-King, high school principal Matthew Fowler, and retired legendary head coach Lou Falconi.

Mr. Speaker, thank you for this opportunity to present and honor the 2018 Class A football State champions, the Farrell Steelers, from the city of champions, Farrell, Pennsylvania.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Longietti, thanks so much for bringing this championship team to the hall of the House of Representatives. We are so honored.

Everybody, stay there. We are going to take a few photos here.

Hey, everybody, I guess we already did the group photo already, so we are going to have all the team, if you could, just go right up the left. And you are going over to the Senate. We are way more exciting. Thanks for being with us. They did not get that.

Representative Mike Tobash, please come up to the rostrum. We are going to begin. The next individual that we are going to be honoring, this is really quite an outstanding award, so once the Farrell Football Team is off the floor, I am going to ask everybody to take their seats. This good gentleman has traveled some distance to be with us.

T. SGT. MARK ANTHONY XAVIER DURICK PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Mike Tobash.

Mr. TOBASH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you. I rise to introduce T. Sgt. Mark Anthony Xavier Durick. He is being honored upon his selection as the 2018 Airmen of the Year Junior Non-Commissioned Officer for the State of Pennsylvania Air National Guard. Mark.

The SPEAKER. Everybody, please let us give this young man a big round of applause.

Mr. TOBASH. Thank you, everyone.

Thank you, Sergeant.

Each year the Air National Guard seeks to recognize those airmen who best embody the United States Air Force core values of integrity, service, and excellence. A graduate of Schuylkill Haven Area High School, where he was promoted to second lieutenant with the Civil Air Patrol, Technical Sergeant Durick earned degrees from Kutztown University and the Community College of the Air Force.

The son of Mark and Myong Durick, who are joining us to the left of the rostrum – Mr. Speaker, do you mind if I ask Sergeant Durick's parents to stand?

The SPEAKER. Oh, no. We would be honored. Please stand. Thank you so much.

Mr. TOBASH. Thank you.

Sergeant Durick also has a sister, Christina. She is a linguist with the Army National Guard, and his father, Mark, also served in the Army as well.

He serves Pennsylvania's Air National Guard as a member of the 271st Combat Communications Squadron, the 193d Special Operations Wing. During a deployment to the Middle East, Technical Sergeant Durick served as a communication section chief and was instrumental in the accomplishment of daily critical and classified communications missions.

He currently is serving classified communications missions on a sabbatical as a satellite communications engineer in support of the United States Antarctic Program at the Amundsen-Scott South Pole Station. And I say he is currently serving; actually, he just got back from Antarctica in November. I had an opportunity to talk to him a little bit about his service in Antarctica. It was a 1-year program. And they are predicting cold weather in Pennsylvania, let me tell you about summer in Antarctica. It sometimes reaches 0 degrees Fahrenheit. And in the winter, colleagues, in Antarctica, it can be 100 degrees minus Fahrenheit as the ambient temperature; 100 degrees minus Fahrenheit, and this young gentleman was there for a year. I can tell you this, that he told me that the sun sets in March and it comes back up in October and you have got 6 months or more of winter, sometimes reaching minus 100 degrees.

Having served with distinction throughout his military career, Technical Sergeant Durick wore his uniform proudly. He brought proficiency and expertise to his challenging assignments, and his conduct, performance, and devotion to duty reflected his allegiance to the highest standards of the military.

He is from Schuylkill County, he is Pennsylvania's top junior airman, he is stationed at Fort Indiantown Gap, and he is a tremendous asset to the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Once again, we are humbled and we want to recognize the great service of Sergeant Durick.

The SPEAKER. Representative Jim Marshall, if you could make your way to the rostrum as well. And if everybody could please take their seats. If anybody needs to get on or off the House floor, please do so at this time before we proceed to honor somebody who has dedicated 36 years of service to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives – 36 years. Will Paula Schadel please join us up here on the rostrum. If anybody needs to get on or off, please do so at this time. We are honoring somebody who has been with us for 36 years and we are so honored for her service.

PAULA SCHADEL PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Marshall, will you please proceed.

Mr. MARSHALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to offer my heartfelt and best wishes to a staff member of the Republican Caucus who is retiring after 36 years of dedicated service to the Commonwealth. Paula has held several positions during her career here, but I have been fortunate enough to have worked with her since I was first elected in 2006. She was extremely helpful in assisting me to get my bearings around, and especially in the first few weeks and then the ensuing first session. I do not think I could have done it without her. Paula's energy, her lively personality, and thoroughness in her work were just a few things that made her such a joy to work with. I am eternally grateful for her professionalism to me and helping me to get to where I am and the work that she has done for our constituents and for this Commonwealth.

The SPEAKER. Representative Mike Tobash.

Mr. TOBASH. Thank you. I appreciate that, Representative Marshall.

I have the honor of sharing this recognition because Paula and I actually went to kindergarten together at Trinity Lutheran Church in Valley View. A couple years ago – Mr. Speaker, I was not going to mention 36 years, but since you let the cat out of the bag, I guess we are okay – we also graduated high school together, Tri-Valley High School.

If it is all right, I would like to introduce Paula's family, because family values are extremely important to her. And we are really honored to be joined by her mother, Annette; her stepfather, Tom Radel; as well as her sisters, Debbie, Roxanne, and Cheryl, who works here in the House; and her niece, Brooke, is also joining us as well.
