STATEMENT BY MS. DONATUCCI

The SPEAKER. Representative Donatucci, please proceed.
Ms. DONATUCCI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you for allowing me to speak on this issue. It is not easy talking about terminal illnesses like cancer, but it is important that we do to make sure that the public is educated and healthy. I am here to talk about colorectal or colon cancer, as it is the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths in the United States, and has accounted for over 50,000 deaths in 2018 alone. Routine screenings and checkups for adults of the appropriate age could prevent up to 60 percent of colon cancer deaths. Sadly, many Americans are unaware of the steps that they can take to prevent this disease and do not undergo the simple test every year.

My dad died 20 years ago from colon cancer. That was before insurance paid for preventive screenings. So it is so important for you to go out and get tested.

I am introducing a resolution to recognize March 2019 as "National Colorectal Cancer Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. In relation to this resolution, the Blue Lights Campaign is an initiative created by Dr. Marianne Ritchie, who is my guest here today – and you can stand here in your blue. I did not put on my blue. She is a gastroenterologist and associate professor at Thomas Jefferson University, and she helps to generate awareness of colon cancer throughout Philadelphia and the rest of the State. Dr. Marianne Ritchie has for the last 5 years led the Blue Lights Campaign during March, shining blue on landmark

buildings for colon cancer awareness in Philadelphia and across Pennsylvania, including our State Capitol. In 2017 she was recognized with a national award for her Blue Lights Campaign and hopes to make this a national campaign.

And let me tell you something: she is amazing, because she does this single-handedly, and then after she gets everything lit up, she goes in these really crazy locations and takes pictures of it all. So when you see her post these pictures on any kind of social media, she is taking them.

So to honor her and her mission, I am introducing a second resolution to recognize Dr. Ritchie's Blue Lights Campaign.

As stewards of public health for our constituents, it is imperative that we bring attention to this deadly disease and the efforts that are being made to educate everyone on simple strategies that can help us prevent more cases of colon cancer, and ultimately death. I mean, this is so important. My life has been touched by this twice in my family, so this is just so important. It is so easy to eradicate. It all starts from a little polyp in your colon. If you get tested, they can find it.

So the Colorectal Cancer Alliance campaign for this year is "Don't Assume." Do not assume you are too young, that you cannot beat it, or that you are alone. If you are having symptoms, reach out, talk to your doctor and get screened.

Please join me in supporting these initiatives and working towards a healthier Pennsylvania for all of us. Working together, we can end colon cancer within our lifetime. Thank you for your consideration, and go get screened. It is so important. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Sergeants at Arms will open the doors of the House.

To Dr. Marianne Ritchie, the clinical associate professor at Jefferson, thank you so much for being with us today.

Representative Eric Nelson, if you will come to the rostrum, please. Representative Nelson has brought a championship team from some distance, about a 3-hour drive, maybe just short of that. We are so honored to have them here. Thanks, gentlemen.

All members, if you could please come onto the House floor at this time and take your seats.

GREENSBURG SALEM HIGH SCHOOL BOYS CROSS COUNTRY TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Nelson, the floor is yours, sir.
Mr. NELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just have to say, it is a great day to be a Golden Lion. Today I am joined at the rostrum by members of the Greensburg Salem High School Boys Cross Country Team, and to me, a benefit of living in a small community is that some of the gentlemen that I grew up around with, or the older guys that were the original championship coaches that coached me as a child, their sons are young men that stand before you today. It gives me great pride to remember coaches like Mr. Snider, who taught me and is a coach who is with us today, head coach Nathan Snider of the Greensburg Cross Country Team.

The boys behind me, the seniors, I am proud to introduce: Cameron Binda, Mark Brown, Mason Jobe, Dylan Binda, and of course their coach, Nathan Snider.

The SPEAKER. Representative Nelson, are those other members of the team back there?

Mr. NELSON. Indeed, they are, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Please come on up front into the well of the House; just come right down the side.

Mr. NELSON. So as these gentlemen are coming down, they are Noah Calisti, Quintin Gatons, Ethan Kelley, Dominic Zucco, and their assistant coach, Jeremy Lenzi. We also have the athletic director, Mike Burrell, and the assistant principal, Dr. Joe Maluchnik. All came from Greensburg Salem District to celebrate the very first cross-country championship that Greensburg Salem School District had in their history.

The Lions demonstrated character and grit through harsh conditions to come in 2d, 5th, 8th, 20th, 28th, and 54th, to bring 63 total points and a State championship to Greensburg.

So, Mr. Speaker, and my colleagues in the House, please recognize these young athletes with a round of applause.

If you will, since there are only a few of you, if you will come up to the rostrum with us, and I believe the athletic director and principal are here. If you would come on up for some photos, we would certainly appreciate it.

You are from the Brownsville area. Great. It is so good of you to be here today. Thanks for traveling all that distance. Great.

Angel Flores, where is Angel Flores? Please stand, Angel. Am I saying it correctly? You are a senior at New Oxford High School – a junior. You are a junior at New Oxford High School. He is shadowing Representative Torren Ecker for the day. Thanks for being with us today, Angel.

We have a very special guest here. Will Kate Bradford please stand, and Alex Loughran. Kate is the daughter of the Democratic Appropriations chair, Representative Matt Bradford. Great to have you here, Kate, and your school colleague, Alex Loughran. They attend Arcola Intermediate School. Thanks so much for being with us today.

I invite now Representative Patty Kim to the rostrum. Representative Kim, if you will just bring the guests right down into the well of the House. We are honored to have you here today.

STATEMENT BY MS. KIM

The SPEAKER. At this time I am going to ask for everybody's undivided attention. It is really quite an honor to have these young ladies here today with Representative Kim, and I am going to turn it over to Representative Kim. I do need everybody to please take their seats and show their respect to these guests.

Ms. KIM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Joining us in the House chamber today are about 30 young women and their teachers who will one day help revolutionize the way we live. These brilliant students from Harrisburg, Steelton-Highspire, Cumberland Valley, and Mechanicsburg School Districts are here to learn and talk to us about the key role State government can play in promoting and supporting girls and women in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics). That is why I appreciate Harrisburg University of Science and Technology in Harrisburg: including Dr. Bili Mattes, Ben Allatt, Dr. Beverly Magda, and Rebecca Lowe of HU; the STEM-UP Network, including Rubina Azizdin; and Million Women Mentors – PA for cohosting today's events, along with other programs that address this disparity. These efforts help encourage and support young women and girls to discover and pursue STEM careers throughout the Commonwealth.

As you know, Pennsylvania has some of the brightest and best students in our nation, but they need us to make a commitment to them. In our words and in public policy, we all must encourage and empower girls to pursue STEM fields. Truly, women and girls in STEM are important to the success of our Commonwealth and our nation.

Amend Bill, page 1, line 5, by inserting after "penalties" , for blocking of caller identification and other telemarketing screening products or services prohibited

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 9 through 11, by striking out all of said lines and inserting

Section 1. The definitions of "do-not-call list," "established business relationship" and "telephone solicitation call" in section 2 of the act of December 4, 1996 (P.L.911, No.147), known as the Telemarketer Registration Act, are amended and the section is amended by adding definitions to read:

Amend Bill, page 1, by inserting between lines 15 and 16 "Business telephone subscriber." Any natural person or entity subscribing to telephone service at a business location within this Commonwealth where the service provider classifies the line as a business line. The term does not include a subscriber that engages in telemarketing, makes telephone solicitation calls or is a telemarketing business.

* * *

"Do-not-call list." A list of residential, business or wireless telephone subscribers who have notified the list administrator of their desire not to receive telephone solicitation calls.

"Established business relationship." A prior or existing relationship formed by a voluntary two-way communication between a person or entity and a residential, business or wireless telephone subscriber, with or without an exchange of consideration, on the basis of an inquiry, application, purchase or transaction by the residential, business or wireless telephone subscriber regarding products or services offered by such persons or entity. In regard to an inquiry, the

person or entity shall obtain the consent of a residential, business or wireless telephone subscriber to continue the business relationship beyond the initial inquiry.

Amend Bill, page 2, by inserting between lines 1 and 2 "Telephone solicitation call." A call made to a residential, business or wireless telephone subscriber for the purpose of soliciting the sale of any consumer goods or services or for the purpose of obtaining information that will or may be used for the direct solicitation of a sale of consumer goods or services or an extension of credit for that purpose. The term does not include a call made to a residential, business or wireless telephone consumer:

(1) In response to an express request of the residential, business or wireless telephone consumer.

(2) In reference to an existing debt, contract, payment or performance.

(3) With whom the telemarketer has an established business relationship within the past 12 months preceding the call.

(4) On behalf of an organization granted tax-exempt status under section 501(c)(3), (5) or (8) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986 (Public Law 99-514, 26 U.S.C. § 1 et seq.) or a veterans organization chartered by the Congress of the United States and or its duly appointed foundation.

(5) On behalf of a political candidate or a political party.

Section 3. Section 5.1 of the act is amended to read:

Section 5.1. Blocking of caller identification and other telemarketing screening products or services prohibited.

No telemarketer shall take any action with the primary intent:

(1) to prevent the transmission of a telemarketer's name or telephone number to any recipient of a telephone solicitation call when the equipment or service used by the telemarketer is capable of creating and transmitting the telemarketer's name or telephone number; or

(2) to circumvent, bypass or disable any product or service used by the residential or business telephone subscriber to screen telephone calls.

Section 4. Section 5.2(a), (b), (c), (e), (g), (h) and (j) of the act are amended and the section is amended by adding a subsection to read:

Section 5.2. Unwanted telephone solicitation calls prohibited.

(a) General rule.—No telemarketer shall initiate or cause to be initiated a telephone solicitation call to a [residential] telephone number of a residential or business telephone subscriber who does not wish to receive telephone solicitation calls and has caused his name, address and telephone number to be enrolled on a do-not-call list maintained by the list administrator. This prohibition shall be effective 30 days after a quarterly do-not-call list is issued by the list administrator which first contains a residential or business telephone subscriber's name, address and residential telephone number. In the event that the Federal Trade Commission and/or the Federal Communications Commission establish a national No Call Registry, the Director of the Bureau of Consumer Protection in the Office of Attorney General is authorized to release to the list administrator of such national No Call Registry sufficient data to include all those residential and business telephone subscribers currently enrolled on the do-not-call list and any residential or business telephone subscribers who subsequently enroll with the Bureau of Consumer Protection in the Office of Attorney General. Prior to releasing any such data to a national No Call Registry, the Bureau of Consumer Protection in the Office of Attorney General shall provide those residential and

business telephone subscribers currently enrolled with the opportunity to remove their information from the do-not-call list.

(b) Listings.—Telemarketers making telephone solicitation calls shall quarterly obtain listings of residential [or], business and wireless telephone subscribers in this Commonwealth who have arranged to have their names, addresses and telephone numbers enrolled on the list administrator's do-not-call list or shall utilize a service provider who has quarterly obtained and will use such listings.

(e) Affirmative defense.—A telemarketer is not in violation of this section if all of the following are satisfied:

(1) He has established and implemented written procedures to comply with this section.

(3) The telemarketer acting on behalf of the seller has maintained and recorded lists of residential, business or wireless telephone subscribers who may not be contacted.

(4) Any subsequent call is the result of error.

(g) Restrictions on use of do-not-call list.—No telemarketer shall use a list administrator's do-not-call list for any purpose other than to remove residential, business or wireless telephone subscribers from telephone sales call lists.

(h) Disclosure to residential, business or wireless telephone subscribers.—Each local exchange telephone company, competitive local exchange telephone company, long-distance interexchange carrier company, Internet service provider that provides telephone service and affiliated companies providing telecommunications billing service shall clearly notify its residential, business or wireless telephone subscribers in this Commonwealth of their ability to contact the list administrator which accepts individual names, addresses and telephone numbers of persons who do not wish to receive telephone solicitation calls. The method of notification shall include, but not be limited to, placing the notice in billing statements mailed to residential, business and wireless subscribers and publication of notice in the consumer information pages of a local telephone directory of general circulation. The notification shall specify the methods by which residential, business and wireless subscribers may place their names on the do-not-call list and how often renewal is necessary.
