The Upper Perk Indians won the first Small School State Championship after defeating Fairview High School 8-4 at Muhlenberg High School. Their season culminated in 13 wins and 9 losses.

Please join me in recognizing the physical fitness and undeniable skill of these championship winners. Congratulations, ladies.

Mr. MACKENZIE. Well, thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would also like to extend my congratulations to the Upper Perkiomen High School Girls Water Polo Team on winning the State championship. It is an incredible accomplishment that you should all be very proud of, and in addition to congratulating you, I would also like to extend my congratulations to the coaches, support staff, parents, and families of the outstanding players for helping them bring out the best in their playing abilities as they went through the season and winning a championship. We know that while these are individual and team accomplishments that they are being recognized for, they had a lot of support and help along the way.

So congratulations to everybody else, and again, bringing home a State championship is an incredible accomplishment that you are going to remember for the rest of your lives. So please remember it, enjoy it, celebrate today, and onto another season next year, another successful season. Congratulations to the seniors who are graduating, and best wishes for all their future successes and accomplishments in life as well.

Ladies, if you will come on up here – there are not that many – and the coaches. And if you will just come to this lower row, we will be able to get the entire team.

The Sergeants at Arms will open the doors of the House.

Members, I heard, just in some discussion, somebody talk about oh, you know, I do not want to be on the floor when we are having presentations. And it is interesting to me; it is not like we are pushing midnight on voting. The idea is that this is the people's chamber, and 203 members represent every corner of this State – a very vast and diverse State on so many fronts. And these young people who are champions, we have this tradition that if they want to come to meet the members of the House and be honored that they have that opportunity. I personally, as Speaker, see this as quite an honor for us, too, to have the opportunity to meet and to showcase to citizens all across the State champions from the schools throughout our Commonwealth.

**STATEMENT BY MS. SHUSTERMAN**

The SPEAKER. Representative Shusterman is first because she has guests on a resolution, HR 106. And, Representative Shusterman, please feel free to introduce the guests as well.

Ms. SHUSTERMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am pleased to rise today during Women's History Month to talk about HR 106, which designates March 21, 2019, as "Rosie the Riveter Day" in Pennsylvania. During World War II, as millions of men answered their country's call to serve, millions of women stepped up, too, to fill jobs right here at home.

Rosie the Riveter began as a campaign to recruit women to work in the defense industries. These women helped build the equipment American soldiers needed for war. Here in Pennsylvania, women built ships at the Philadelphia Naval Shipyard, worked the steel mills at Mon Valley, assembled anti-aircraft guns in York, built Mack Trucks in Allentown, and repaired airplanes in Middletown.

Today I am honored to have two Rosies joining us on the House floor. They are to my left, right over in the corner. I am pleased to introduce Ruth Wilson from Philadelphia, who trained and worked as a sheet metalist at the Philadelphia Navy Yard, helping to build the USS *Valley Forge* aircraft carrier. She was 1 of 600,000 African-American Rosies.

Oh, you might want to get up again. And Mae Krier of Levittown is with us today. When the war started, Mae moved to Seattle to work for Boeing, building B-17s and B-29s. In recent years she has been instrumental in pushing for Rosie the Riveter Day to be recognized at the national level.

Thank you to them and thank you to my colleagues for your support of the resolution. Thank you very much.

The SPEAKER. Representative Shusterman, are there guests in the back as well? They are here. Okay. We will bring them up. You want to get a photo with everybody? Yeah. Staff, can you assist our two guests, if they could come to the well of the House to get a photo with Representative Shusterman. And any other guests in the back on Rosie the Riveter Day? Oh, okay.

She is definitely a legend in our community and somebody worth honoring. So thank you, Representative Shusterman, for taking the time. And thank you so much to Miss Ruth for being here. I love you, Miss Ruth.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

### STATEMENT BY MR. WHEATLEY

The SPEAKER. We have another significant group of guests. This is not on a resolution, but Representative Jake Wheatley has with us today some outstanding guests from all across the Commonwealth and he is recognized on unanimous consent to introduce them.

Mr. WHEATLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Wheatley.

Mr. WHEATLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As some of you may know, today is Minority, Women, and Disadvantaged Business Enterprise lobby day. That is a day where we have asked our entrepreneurs from all across the Commonwealth to come here and put faces to the letters that we always hear and some of us, I think, take for granted. But far too often these are our entrepreneurs, men and women, who have done all that we have requested them to do and the only thing that they want is a fair opportunity to compete with any other business enterprise.

And so today I wanted to recognize some of our upstanding business owners from Pittsburgh, from Harrisburg or central PA, as well as from Philly. And as I call your name, if you would stand in the back; I think they are all on the floor: Clinetta Jackson, David Williams, Frederick Douglas, Sontaya Perry, Terri Shields, Dimitra Diggs, Angelo Perryman, Garry Johnson, Marc Coleman, Melinda Emerson, Richard Cottom, Tara Aldrich, and Tomika McFadden. I want to congratulate you for all the work that— Oh, and Melonease Shaw. I am sorry. Melonease Shaw. How can I forget Melonease? I am going to be in trouble, Mr. Speaker. But I wanted to congratulate all of you for the work, your energy, and for your contribution to our society, and I want to thank you for being here today. I want to recognize you for your outstanding work.

And I want to just make this one little caveat because I still have a couple of minutes, a minute left, and that is, 40 years ago, one of our former colleagues, Representative Gordon Linton, started a process asking the question, what are we doing to support entrepreneurs like the ones in the back? And it came back from his select committee work that we were doing very little to really open up and be fair with contractors like those in the back. Twenty-one years later, we had Auditor General Casey and LeAnna Washington, who was then the chairwoman of the PLBC (Pennsylvania Legislative Black Caucus) who asked the question, what are we doing to support women-owned firms, minority-owned firms, disadvantaged businesses? And we found out we were doing very little. Ten short years ago, 2009, we did another select committee, a bipartisan select committee, to ask the question not only what are we doing, but what can we do better? How can we make policy that really supports fairness in our contracting practices? We produced recommendations, and from 2009, select committee, we still have not moved to open up the opportunities of fairness for entrepreneurs.

So I am going to just encourage you all to spend some time with these entrepreneurs. Get to learn what they do and how they do it and what they see that are barriers for doing business with this State. And I will tell you that if we really believe in the economy of free enterprises and the free marketplace, then we want to make sure there is no unfairness in our process that makes it easier for some companies to do business while other ones are at a disadvantage. And I would think after 40 years of looking at this question, we certainly know that for women, disadvantaged businesses, and minority businesses, there is something in our system that is definitely placing them at a disadvantage.

So thank you today, Mr. Speaker. Congratulations for these entrepreneurs. I look forward to spending some time with you today.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Wheatley. We are very appreciative.

And to all the guests, thank you so much for spending time with us on the House floor.

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 441, PN 427**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of June 30, 1981 (P.L.128, No.43), known as the Agricultural Area Security Law, further providing for definitions and for purchase of agricultural conservation easements.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Representative Greg Vitali is recognized on the bill, sir.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to, for the information of the members, let them know that the Pennsylvania Farmland Preservation Association does oppose this bill. Although their opposition was verbal this year, in a letter of 2015, they indicated their opposition was that they "...believes that the use of preserved farmland for commercial energy development is not consistent with the intent and purpose of preserving farmland, as described in the...legislative findings..." And although it is true that the current law allows other forms of energy development on this preserved farmland, they oppose that too.

I am actually of two minds of this bill because I support wind turbines, but am a little bit uncomfortable with this legislation. So I have gone back and forth over the years on this bill. But I just wanted to let the members know that it is not without some opposition.

The SPEAKER. Does anybody else wish to speak on the bill?

Representative Curt Sonney, on the bill.

Mr. SONNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to remind the members that this is a very contained bill. It is very specific on the amount of land that can be used. And to remind the members that preserved farmland, you know, has nothing to do with farming. There is nowhere does it say that once this land is preserved, it must be farmed; it simply cannot be broken up.

And not allowing for wind generation I believe was just a misstep when the legislation was first drafted. You can mine on this land. You can drill gas wells on this land. But you cannot put a windmill.

And this came to heart in my district several years ago where there was a proposed development just along a ridgeline and the farmer came to me whose land was preserved and said that, you know, why is he cut out from a possible income source on his own land? And so it made sense to me to try and work through this problem, and working with the Department of Agriculture, we came up with this bill that limits it very much so on the amount of land that can be used. So in other words, a wind farm, as you would normally think of it, could never be put on preserved farmland. You can only take 2 acres out of the first 100 and only 2 acres after that out of every additional 50. And so it limits it very, very much.

So I would just encourage a positive vote on this bill.

### REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mrs. EVANS submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Kick Butts Day is March 20, 2019, and is expected to feature more than 1,000 events in schools and communities across the nation and even the world. It is organized by the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids. The first Kick Butts Day was held in 1996.

Every day more than 3,000 kids under age 18 try smoking for the first time, and 700 kids become daily smokers. Tobacco use remains the leading cause of preventable death in the U.S., killing more than 480,000 people every year. Kick Butts Day raises awareness about tobacco problems and encourages peers to become tobacco-free and supporting solutions to reduce tobacco use. Quitting smoking can add years to your life, as smokers who quit before age 40 reduce their chance of dying early from smoking-related diseases by about 90 percent. Quitting smoking also greatly protects your loved ones from dangerous secondhand smoke and sets an example for family and friends to show that life without cigarettes is possible.

While our nation has made great strides in combatting tobacco use, there are roughly 15.5 percent of Americans who still smoke. Moreover, tobacco use continues to be the leading cause of preventable death, killing over 480,000 people annually – more than alcohol, vehicle accidents, drug use, murder, and suicide combined. The continued prevalence is why I am introducing a resolution recognizing March 20, 2019, as "Kick Butts Day" in Pennsylvania. It is vital that we continue to highlight the deleterious effect smoking has on individuals and on

society as a whole. Our nation spends over \$170 billion in health-care expenses related to tobacco use, and according to estimates by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), smoking results in \$156 billion in lost productivity each year. And every single day about 2,000 minors will try smoking for the first time.

Within 20 minutes of quitting smoking, your heart rate and blood pressure begin to drop. Within 12 hours, carbon monoxide levels in your bloodstream return to normal. Within weeks or months, your circulation and lung function improve, and risk of heart attack begins to drop. You breathe easier, coughing less often. Within 2 to 5 years, your risk of mouth, throat, esophagus, and bladder cancers are cut in half, and your stroke risk matches that of other nonsmokers. And even more long-term benefits, outlined by [smokefree.gov](http://smokefree.gov), continue in the time after you quit smoking. That is why I support recognizing March 20, 2019, as "Kick Butts Day" in Pennsylvania. We want a healthier, happier society, and this is one major way we can achieve that goal.

Our country has made tremendous strides in the battle against tobacco use, but we can always do better. Whatever methods you choose – whether it is with the help of gum or a patch, or perhaps with prescribed medical assistance, or even if you decide to go cold turkey – there is never a better time than right now to kick those butts to the curb. Do it for your friends. Do it for your family. Most importantly, do it for yourself.

Many times we have the opportunity to visit our school systems, particularly when we talk about Pennsylvania history. And every time I go I ask, "Who was the first woman to ever

govern a State?" I never get the correct answer. For those of you who do not know, I am going to tell you right now.

William Penn, founder of the Province of Pennsylvania, married Hannah Callowhill Penn in 1696. When William Penn became incapacitated by a stroke in 1712, Hannah Callowhill Penn governed the Province of Pennsylvania in his name and handled all of the financial and legal affairs for the next 6 years until his death in 1718.

Following Penn's death, Hannah continued to govern Pennsylvania from England for another 8 years. At the time of his death, the colony was in financial debt, but Hannah Callowhill Penn, through her strong leadership and fiscal management, was successful in restoring financial stability to the colony before her death in 1726.

As we honor March as Women's History Month, I hope you will join me in celebrating Hannah Callowhill Penn as the first woman to govern a State.

To introduce written remarks regarding HB 324.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Remarks from Chairman Gillespie on HB 324 have been accepted into the record.

Mr. GILLESPIE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

My bill is designed to reduce unemployment and the welfare rolls, encourage job creation and growth, assist start-up entrepreneurs with job training, and lend a hand in revitalizing downtowns. The bill creates the microenterprise assistance program, which may be run by existing municipal entities capable of supporting small business creation, job training, and blight remediation using the program.

Microenterprises are small businesses operating with a limited amount of capital. They have between one and five employees, and on average, create jobs not only for the owner, but for an additional one to two employees.

Utilizing similar language to the landmark land bank legislation, the entities who may operate this program are able to acquire land through the same existing methods prescribed under law. This includes donation from tax claim bureaus and municipalities, or purchase at auction. They may then lease this land to low-income individuals to start a microenterprise.

The lessee must undergo training on running a business. The loan offered by the authority ranges between five to ten thousand dollars in start-up capital. The local taxing authority may place a 5-year property tax abatement on the real property if used to develop a microenterprise or remediate blight.

The program would be financed by the municipal entity starting the program with private donations and investments, and through applying for existing grants from State, local, and Federal sources.

My bill creates an innovative and unique way to encourage low-income entrepreneurs. With the training, business loan, and property that they may receive from this program, we are equipping them to succeed.

This bill passed the House last session, and I ask for your support again. Thank you.
