HERSHEY HIGH SCHOOL FIELD HOCKEY TEAM PRESENTED

With an undefeated season record of 23 wins, these tremendous young ladies also won the PIAA District VI title. Under the expert guidance of head coach Lawrence Campbell and assistant coaches Randy Holsopple and Karen Donmoyer, the Lady Eagles were able to find the proper balance of talent, instinct, and heart to turn their championship dreams into a reality. GUEST INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. Members, I do not know if many of you have had the opportunity to be at the Senator John Heinz History Center in the city of Pittsburgh. It is truly one of the gems in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. We have been blessed amongst other exhibits that have been held there: the lunar landing, one on George Washington, one on the French and Indian War. Oh my goodness, there have been so many amazing exhibits that have been held at the History Center. And in addition to the History Center being such an asset to the Commonwealth and to the southwest region, another gem of an asset for Pennsylvania is Dr. Andy Masich. Andy, please stand. He is the guest today of Representative Jason Ortity and the Allegheny County House delegation, Republican and Democrat. We have invited Miss Pennsylvania USA, Kailyn Marie Perez, to say a few words. I would ask everybody to take their seats before we have her speak. She is just going to speak for a few moments, but I would like her to just say a few words of welcome, and if everybody could please take their seats.

Miss PEREZ. Thank you, Representatives, for having me here today. It is truly an honor and privilege to be here with you all. Representative Rothman did a pretty good job of covering who I am and what I am doing with my year as Miss Pennsylvania USA. STATEMENT BY MS. McCLINTON

The SPEAKER. Representative Joanna McClinton, the Democratic caucus chair, will speak first on HR 138. I do need all the members to be seated. We can open the doors of the House, but I need all the members to be seated. She is going to be calling on some of the members to stand at the end of her remarks. So I am asking all members to please be seated. And it is a fitting follow-up to Miss Pennsylvania USA's remarks. Please take your seats, all members.

You may proceed.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

March is the month where we take the time to look back and honor the many achievements of women throughout history and the vast strides made by women today. It is the time when we celebrate the significant contributions women of all races, ethnicities, and backgrounds have made to the world. It is also the perfect time to specifically celebrate the accomplishments of selfless service of elected women who serve in public office. With that in mind, I would like to officially join the National

Foundation for Women Legislators to designate March 19, 2019, today, as "Celebrating Women in Public Office Day" right here in Pennsylvania.

One of the most significant accomplishments women have made historically has been in the political arena. The 20th century has been a pivotal time of growth for women, from getting the right to vote to actually running for elected office. In 2018 women have smashed records filing for office and many of them, of course, winning office. Since 1971, the number of women serving as legislators has more than quintupled. This is something to be celebrated, yet there is still much more work to be done.

Right here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, although we comprise 51 percent of the population, we are still only occupying 25 percent of elected office right here in the General Assembly. These numbers are consistent nationally, and for us to have an effective democracy, we need representation of all citizens, including our diverse population of women. That is why it is important that we encourage, recognize, and support the inclusiveness of women in office.

I implore you to encourage women and young girls in your lives and in your communities to explore public service opportunities. But in the meantime, I am thrilled to acknowledge and celebrate all of our colleagues here. We have gone from 50 to just in a few weeks we will be at 52 women in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. So I ask all the women, stand in your seats, wave to your neighbors back home, all the women, the women. Everybody is standing up.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, ladies.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative McClinton.

STATEMENT BY MR. KINSEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Steve Kinsey has a number of guests. Can we bring Representative Kinsey's guests down to the front here, just come right down the side to the well of the House. Representative Kinsey, you will be right at the rostrum here in front. But if we could just bring his guests down front, and it is on HR 158, HR 158. And if we can, if we could just briefly close the doors of the House. Thank you very much. Representative Kinsey, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. KINSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I stand along with Representative Summer Lee and Representative Dan Williams, members of the Divine Nine. And, Mr. Speaker, we are thankful to this august body for their support of HR 158, which recognizes March 19, 2019, as "Alpha Kappa Alpha Day" here at the Capitol.

Mr. Speaker, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc., the oldest Greek-letter organization established by nine African-American, college-educated women, was founded January 15, 1908, at Howard University in Washington, DC. The AKAs, as they are affectionately called, have flourished into a globally impactful organization of nearly 300,000 college-trained members, bound by the bonds of sisterhood and empowered by a commitment to servant leadership that is both domestic and international in its scope.

Over the past 111 years, Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority has maintained its focus in two key arenas: the lifelong personal and professional development of each of its members, and galvanizing its membership into an organization of respected power and influence. The AKAs are consistently at the forefront of effective advocacy and social change that results in equality

and equity for all citizens of the world. Under the leadership of their international president, Dr. Glenda Glover, the AKAs continue to prosper.

I just want to thank my colleagues for the unanimous support of HB 265, and I would like to submit my remarks for the record.

The SPEAKER. Yes. Thank you very much, Representative Staats.

Mr. STAATS submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

I am sure many of you have heard from constituents about instances when they spend a lot of time and tuition on college courses and course materials only to find out that the course credits do not transfer to another college or university that they planned to attend. Currently the PA Department of Education operates an interactive database that allows students and prospective students to view where courses transfer among Pennsylvania's community colleges; universities in the PA State System of Higher Education, PASSHE; and independent colleges and universities that have chosen to participate.

HB 265 expands this database to include articulation agreements entered into by Pennsylvania's State-related universities, as well as the rural regional college, Thaddeus Stevens College of Technology, and public schools. By expanding this database, students can make better, more informed decisions about their future postsecondary career. This bill was voted unanimously from the House Education Committee.

I ask for an affirmative vote on HB 265. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. RYAN

The SPEAKER. Representative Frank Ryan, you are recognized.

Mr. RYAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Ladies and gentlemen, members, Mr. Speaker, I truly appreciate the opportunity and I want to thank Representative Readshaw for the opportunity to talk and mention Military Opportunities Day. For many of us who have served in the military, the military gave us a chance for an education. It gave us a chance for a trade. It gave us an opportunity that we might not otherwise have had. People who have come from an inner city, such as I did, were able to go into the Marine Corps – in my case – and provide an opportunity for my family that it might not normally have had.

The military provides an opportunity in so many different ways for training in the trades, going to college, the GI bill, and those recruiters that also serve our military, we call them in the Marine Corps "the pointy end of the spear" in the sense that they were going out and talking to young people.

We have a problem today where less than 35 percent of the younger people actually qualify for military service. So by having a military opportunity service day in a school and making sure that our children become exposed to this wonderful career opportunity gives us an opportunity and a chance to allow those youngsters to do things that they would not have ordinarily have done.

I hope that we will continue to recognize the great Americans who have gone before us and recognize that only by a strong military can we continue to defend the great freedoms that we have in this nation.

And I want to thank again Representative Readshaw and the Speaker for allowing us to discuss this today.

STATEMENT BY MR. READSHAW

The SPEAKER. Representative Harry Readshaw.

Mr. READSHAW. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would just like to read a couple paragraphs from the resolution which depict the subject of the resolution:

"RESOLVED, That the educational communities of this Commonwealth consider offering a 'Military Opportunities Day' presentation sometime in April during each school year; and be it further

"RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives encourage the residents and educational communities of this Commonwealth to recognize the United States military for its significant impact on and contributions to the educational system and its students as well as to career planning throughout this nation and this Commonwealth."

And a personal note, Mr. Speaker. I would certainly encourage all school districts throughout the Commonwealth to welcome the military in on their career days to make their facilities and their testimony available to all the students.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Tom Murt is recognized on HR 150.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I will be brief.

Mr. Speaker, the American Red Cross was originally founded in 1881 by Clara Barton—

The SPEAKER. Representative Murt. Representative Murt, please suspend. Come down to the front, if you do not mind.

Members, if you could please take your seats. The good gentleman is entitled to be heard.

I am sorry. I know you just had that – but I apologize. More folks will hear you. Thank you.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, we recognize the month of March as "American Red Cross Month" here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. In 1881 Clara Barton founded the American Association of the Red Cross, but in the year 1900, our Congress granted the American Red Cross a charter, making the volunteer organization responsible for providing services to members of the Armed Forces of the United States and relief to disaster victims domestically and abroad.

Mr. Speaker, today's Red Cross is a humanitarian organization led by volunteers that provides relief to victims of disasters and helps and supports people to prevent, prepare for, and respond to emergencies. For more than a century, the American Red Cross has been at the forefront of helping Americans prepare, prevent, and respond to large and small disasters.

Just as families and communities depend on the American Red Cross in times of need, the American Red Cross depends on the support of the American people to sustain the foundation and their mission. And I am proud, Mr. Speaker, that the residents of this Commonwealth have donated hundreds of thousands of units of blood to help save the lives of their neighbors and provide for their needs. The American Red Cross strives to prevent and alleviate human suffering wherever it may be found, protect life and health and ensure respect for each human being.

The American Red Cross has trained more than a quarter million people in many different programs across this Commonwealth. That is over a quarter million people in Pennsylvania alone, and approximately 186,000 individuals are trained in first aid, the proper way to perform CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation), or the use of an automatic external defibrillator. Our American Red Cross has also collected

nearly 250,000 blood donations to meet the needs of individuals such as accident victims, cancer patients, surgical candidates, and children with blood disorders.

Finally, Mr. Speaker, I want to say that, as a combat veteran of the war in Iraq, one of the greatest missions of the American Red Cross is the great things they do for our men and women in uniform. In the combat zone, there is no more powerful entity than the Red Cross to get a young soldier or marine or sailor or airman or coastguardsman out of the combat zone and back home with their family, to a wife who is having an at-risk labor and delivery and so forth. I had seen this happen when I was serving in Iraq and I had seen soldiers ordered out of Iraq on a 24-hour notice because the American Red Cross intervened on behalf of that family.

So today we recognize the American Red Cross and we recognize the month of March for the great work they do in Pennsylvania and around the world and throughout our great nation.
