STATEMENT BY MR. MARSHALL

The SPEAKER. Representative Jim Marshall, on HR 121.

Mr. MARSHALL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank my colleagues today for supporting HR 121, designating March 21 as "World Down Syndrome Day" in Pennsylvania. I would also like to thank, welcome, and recognize the advocates and families here today with us and ask Representative Mihalek to introduce her guests.

Ms. MIHALEK. Thank you, Representative Marshall.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today we are joined by Chloe Kondrich of Upper St. Clair, who was the driving force behind Chloe's Law, which was signed into law in 2014, requiring health-care practitioners to educate pregnant women who receive a prenatal diagnosis for Down syndrome on the positive outcomes of giving birth to a child with Down syndrome. Chloe, along with her father, Kurt Kondrich, have passionately led an effort to educate families about Down syndrome. They have spoken to the United Nations, and have even published a book, all promoting the message of "Embrace Don't Erase."

Thank you to the Kondrich family for being here and for their efforts to educate us all.

We are also joined by the lovely Mikayla Holmgren, who has traveled all the way here from Minnesota. She is a student at Bethel University in Minnesota. Mikayla was the first woman with Down syndrome to compete in the Miss USA Pageant, in 2017. She won the Spirit Award, in addition to the Director's Award, during the competition. We thank you, Mikayla, for leading by example and being such an inspiration to us all.

I would also like to welcome Marisa Niwa, who is joined by her parents, Nancy and Joe. Nancy serves as the president of Achieva, an organization whose mission it is to ensure that all children have the same opportunities, and they were part of a nationwide movement to integrate citizens with disabilities into communities rather than to isolate and segregate them. It is because of organizations like Achieva that Marisa is part of our community. She lives and works in the community, just as the rest of us do, and I often run into her at my local Giant Eagle, while she is busy at work and I am grocery shopping. Thank you to the Murray family for joining us today.

Thank you all for being here today and for all of the advocates in the room that are educating us and inspiring us all on Down syndrome. We expect more great things from you in the future. And thank you to my colleagues for recognizing March 21 as "World Down Syndrome Day."

The SPEAKER. We also have with us Jessica Capitani and Caden, and Tamara Singleton and Devin. Thank you so much for being with us today, and thank you, Representative Marshall and Representative Mihalek.

STATEMENT BY MS. DELOZIER

The SPEAKER. Representative Delozier, you may proceed.

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to thank my colleagues for their unanimous vote designating March 25, 2019, as "Greek Independence Day" here in Pennsylvania. I also would like to thank the members of the Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Cathedral in Wormleysburg, who are here today to witness this vote. The cathedral, which is located in my legislative district, is an important part of our community. It holds an annual festival each spring that draws thousands. There is mouthwatering homemade Greek cuisine, Greek arts and crafts, and Greek dancing and tours of the ornate cathedral. I encourage everyone to attend this year's event, which will be scheduled May 17 through 19. We always talk about the Farm Show milkshakes; well, you need to come to the Greek Festival for all the Greek food, because it will be well worth it.

March 25 is a significant day in Greek history. It is the day the nation celebrates the start of the War of Greek Independence in 1821. Nine years later, in 1829, with the Treaty of Edirne signed, an independent Greece was established. March 25 also is the day the Greek Orthodox Church celebrates the Annunciation by the Archangel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary, as it is exactly 9 months before Christmas.

Greeks have played an important role in Pennsylvania and United States history. About 3 million Greek-Americans have kept traditions from the motherland alive here and have made significant contributions to many of the businesses and industries. Greece also is a birthplace of democracy, which is how we now govern today. Without its influence, who knows what our country would like look now. In addition, the Greeks played a key role in modern western philosophy through Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle. Another issue that we have and you may not realize is that one-third of the English vocabulary is Greek. With all of the impacts Greeks have had on our everyday lives, it is only appropriate that we pause for a few moments to pay tribute to that history.

In conclusion, we thank the Greeks for their contributions and recognize their independence day. You have had such a positive influence on the United States and we are so proud to have you as part of our communities all across Pennsylvania. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. MACKENZIE

In fact, throughout the 20th century, Greece was one of only three nations to ally with the United States in every major international conflict, and to this day, the Greek nation remains a reliable strategic partner and steadfast ally of the United States.

The contributions of Greek-Americans are innumerable. In order to commemorate the important role that Greek-Americans continue to play in our economic and cultural development as a Commonwealth, again I do want to thank you for everybody's vote on recognizing March as "Greek-American Heritage Month" here in Pennsylvania.

Representative McCarter, on the amendment.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to introduce amendment A00294. And I want to commend the maker of this bill for addressing the need to protect our minors from lifelong damaging impact of nicotine addiction, for what many experts are calling the perfect addiction machine. This amendment is put forward not to harm this bill but to enhance it.

Mr. Speaker, as we are all very much aware, e-cigarettes and vaping pens have exploded in popularity, particularly among our young people drawn by the novelty flavorings and new technology. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has found that roughly 21 percent of our high school students, and even some middle school students, are now using e-cigarettes.

Excuse me one second.

The SPEAKER. Members, if you could, please take your seats. Members, please take your seats. Representative McCarter has the floor on his amendment.

Mr. McCARTER. These are obviously alarming numbers and I simply think that the General Assembly should go further. That is why I am proposing that we amend HB 97 to prohibit the sale of nicotine delivery devices to anyone under the age of 21, but on not only that, but all nicotine products, including traditional tobacco products as well.

Mr. Speaker, research clearly indicates that the majority of tobacco and nicotine addiction begins before the age of 21, and it is now abundantly clear that the impacts of both tobacco and nicotine addiction are intertwined. We all hear that the purpose of vaping products is to reduce addiction to cigarettes, but statistics clearly show the vaping use by minors has grown exponentially and has helped to reinvigorate tobacco use among youngsters in our middle schools and high schools not only in Pennsylvania, but throughout the nation.

Mr. Speaker, to counteract this, legislators in several States have introduced legislation to raise the age to purchase tobacco products to 21. As of March 1, 2019, seven States – New Jersey, Virginia, Maine, California, Hawaii, Massachusetts, and Oregon – have raised their age of access to 21, and several more States are considering doing so as we speak here today. Four hundred and forty localities, including New York City, Chicago, San Antonio, Boston, Cleveland, Minneapolis, Kansas City, and Washington, DC, have also increased the age to purchase tobacco products and have seen positive impacts on their high school communities. According to the Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids, a leading advocacy agency fighting underage tobacco use, 8.1 percent of high school students, or 1.1 million minors, were active smokers in 2018 nationally, and the percentage is on the rise again. Additionally, 20 to 33 percent of high school students now vape regularly, according to recent surveys, and that percentage is also increasing. Is there anyone here that does not believe that tobacco and e-cigarette companies have targeted our youth?

Mr. Speaker, an increase in the minimum age of access will further restrict and reduce the likelihood that they become regular smokers as minors. The Campaign for Tobacco-Free Kids states that this age increase will help reduce deaths, disease, and health-care costs incurred by underage nicotine use. The organization further states that 95 percent of adult smokers start the habit before they are 21 years of age and that the time period between 18 and 21 is characterized as critical, when experimental smoking becomes regular. While less than half of adult smokers – 46 percent – become daily smokers before the age of 18, four out of five do so before the age of 21.

Mr. Speaker, raising the age of access to 21 will help counter the efforts of some tobacco companies to target young people at a critical time when many move from experimenting with tobacco to regular smoking. The Institute of Medicine of the National Academies, in a report entitled "Public Health Implications of Raising the Minimum Age of Legal Access to Tobacco Products," found that raising the minimum age to 21 will have a significant impact. The report asserted that, over time, if the age were set at 21, nationwide modeling indicated there would be approximately 223,000 fewer premature deaths, 50,000 fewer deaths by lung cancer, and 4.2 million years of lost life for those born between 2000 and 2019.

AMENDMENT WITHDRAWN

Mr. McCARTER. Mr. Speaker, we have an opportunity to change things and we must do this. I have been informed by some members of the lobbyists, who in fact are for the tobacco industry, that they are in support of raising the age to 21. Mr. Speaker, with that in mind, because that language is not completed yet for their addition into the legislation, I will be withdrawing this amendment at this time, but we will hope that we can take this up in the near future.

**STATEMENT BY
MS. BOBACK AND MRS. COMITTA**

The SPEAKER. And you may proceed, Representative Boback.

Ms. BOBACK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We would like to thank you for helping us designate March 27, 2019, as "Female Veterans Day" in Pennsylvania. Currently there are approximately 2 million female veterans in the United States, over 60,000 of whom reside right here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Mrs. COMITTA. Women have a long, courageous, and often underrecognized history of providing military service to our country. Traditionally, women in the military served as nurses, typists, and clerks. Prior to and during the Civil War, women who wanted to serve on the front lines disguised themselves as men in order to serve our country. It was not until the end of World War I that women were permitted to join the military, and even then it was only to serve during wartime. With the passage of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act in 1948, women were finally allowed to serve as permanent members of the military and earn full veterans' benefits.

Ms. BOBACK. The United States military continues to evolve in recognizing the value of women in the military. In the last two decades we have witnessed the first women to graduate from the Virginia Military Institute and the Citadel, the first women fighter pilots flying combat missions in Iraq, the first woman to command a Navy warship, the first African-American woman to be promoted to brigadier general, the first woman to be promoted to an Army four-star general, and the first woman to be awarded a Silver Star for combat action.

We thank you for your support of this very dynamic and important resolution honoring our female veterans.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. Representative Dan Frankel, on HR 139.

Mr. FRANKEL. Mr. Speaker, I will be submitting my remarks for the record.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir. And that is on Patient Safety Awareness Month.

Mr. FRANKEL. Yes.

The SPEAKER. HR 139. Thank you.

Mr. FRANKEL submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, patient safety is at the core of what every single person employed in health care does; doctors, nurses, and other health-care providers dedicate their lives to caring for patients. But providing care is not simple. Although hospitals, clinics, and doctors' offices take many steps to keep their patients safe, medical errors can happen. Often medical errors happen when there is a single misstep in a chain of activities. Medical errors are a serious public health problem and a leading cause of death in the United States. More than 250,000 people die each year from medical mistakes, according to a 2016 Johns Hopkins study. This makes medical errors the third leading cause of death, right before respiratory disease. According to the Pennsylvania Patient Safety Authority, in 2017, in Pennsylvania alone, health officials reported over 302,000 medical errors and hospital-acquired infections; of those cases, almost 300 were fatal.

Despite all the great progress made in our Commonwealth to address this issue, statistics show that the goal of patient safety is yet to be fully achieved. For this reason, Mr. Speaker, it is vital to devote this time to raise awareness about this important issue.

Patient Safety Awareness Month serves as a dedicated time and platform for growing awareness about patient safety and recognizing the work already being done. By recognizing that untoward events occur, learning from them, and working toward preventing them, patient safety can be improved. Part of the solution is to maintain a culture that works toward recognizing safety challenges and implementing viable solutions rather than harboring a culture of blame, shame, and punishment.

For this reason, Mr. Speaker, today I would like to recognize and reaffirm the Commonwealth's commitment to promoting patient safety through education programs, supporting research, and expanding access to safe medical treatment. Each of us will be patients at some point in our lives. By extension, all members of society have a stake in improving the safety of our health-care system.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Tom Murt, on HR 143.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, in October of 1955, the Pennsylvania General Assembly passed the Pennsylvania Human Relations Act, which prohibited discrimination in the areas of employment, housing, and public accommodations on the basis of race, color, familial status, religious creed, ancestry, handicap or disability, age, sex, and national origin. Mr. Speaker, in September of 1973, the Congress of the United States passed the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, which was the precursor to the passage of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, and prohibited the Federal

government and their status as an employer from discriminating against qualified individuals with disabilities. Mr. Speaker, I am proud to say that in 1990, George H.W. Bush signed into law the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990, ADA, which served as the world's first comprehensive civil rights law for individuals with disabilities.

Mr. Speaker, while I am standing up here, you have courageously, many times when we have had Pennsylvanians with disabilities in the Capitol and in our midst, you reminded us that none of us is perfect, that all Pennsylvanians suffer with some kind of disability or handicap and none of us is perfect. And I thank you for that, Mr. Speaker, for that wise observation.

Mr. Speaker, in this Commonwealth alone, approximately 14.2 percent, or an estimated 1.8 million residents, have a disability, and approximately 19.1 percent of working-class Americans with a disability are employed as compared to 65.9 percent of working-class nondisabled Americans. Although the act of fostering awareness about the issue of our Commonwealth's disabled population is important, the real objective lies in ensuring that Pennsylvanians with disabilities are provided the dignity, respect, and accommodations they deserve.

The purpose of this resolution, Mr. Speaker, is to recognize the prevalence of the systemic inequities that exist within our society pertaining to the treatment of our residents with disabilities, as well as acknowledge the many invaluable efforts that have been made throughout the history of our nation and Commonwealth to institute much-needed civil protections for all Americans.

This is why, Mr. Speaker, I thank my colleagues for designating the month of March "Disabilities Awareness Month." We encourage all Pennsylvanians to learn more about the many unique challenges confronting this Commonwealth's residents who are disabled, and assume the task of fostering a greater degree of awareness and education regarding this critically important subject.
