### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

#### THE SPEAKER (MIKE TURZAI) PRESIDING

#### PRAYER

HON. JASON DAWKINS, member of the House of Representatives, offered the following prayer:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and good morning to my colleagues, my friends.

Today I bring the translation of yesterday's prayer that was offered for our newest colleague, but before I do that, I wanted to take a moment to reflect my experience when I first got to the House, and I have seen other colleagues take this same stance and provide the morning inspiration. And I have always been somewhat hesitant to do it myself because I never thought I can provide such a message that I think would have been as inspiring as some of the folks who have come before me. But I have been moved to take the chance and come up here and provide my experience in the House, and I remember members who are no longer here like Representative Tallman, whom I did not know much but I met when he first made the morning prayer, and it gave me a snapshot into his gentle soul and I was able to kind of build a relationship based on what I heard him say from this rostrum.

So I hope I am able to inspire folks today and I hope we are able to unify each other through our actions and our words, because I do believe words alone do not predict beliefs, I believe your actions are what predict beliefs, and as an American Muslim of this chamber, I have always carried myself as an example of what it looks like to be a Muslim and I wanted folks to see that from the actual actions of me and not the words that I say out of my mouth.

So I am going to give the Surah Al-Fatiha that we had yesterday and the breakdown of what it means. It is the opening, it is the first chapter of the Holy Koran, and it is seven verses of the prayer for God's guidance and it stresses the Lordship and mercy of God. This chapter is the essential role of the daily prayer, and it is being recited at least 17 times per day to start each unit of a rakat, which is a part of the prayer. So as we begin:

In the name of God, the Lord of mercy, the giver of mercy, praise belongs to God, God of all works. The world of mercy, the giver of mercy, master of the day of judgment, it is You we worship, it is You we ask for help. Guide us to the straight path – the path of those who You have blessed, those who incurred no anger and have not gone astray.

That is the translation to Al-Fatiha, and again, I hope we all have a great start of this session and God bless all of our members. Ameen.

**STATEMENT BY MS. RAPP**

The SPEAKER. Representative Kathy Rapp is welcomed to speak on HR 170.

I am going to ask all members to please take their seats. Staff members, please take your seats. There are seats in the back, and the Sergeants at Arms will close the doors of the House.

It is a solemn resolution, so I would ask everybody to please take their seats; staff members as well.

Representative Kathy Rapp is recognized to speak on HR 170, which is Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day. I would ask the Sergeants at Arms if you could just ask members to please take their seats.

Representative Rapp, you may proceed.

Ms. RAPP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am honored to stand here today to be the sponsor of this resolution. I had a constituent who contacted me last year, a Vietnam veteran, and asked me to sponsor this resolution, and I myself am honored to stand here and talk about this resolution and the Vietnam era as a former Air Force wife during the Vietnam war. This resolution recognizes March 30, 2019, as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day" in Pennsylvania.

The Vietnam Conflict was fought in Vietnam from 1961 to 1975, and it involved North Vietnam and the Viet Cong in a conflict with the United States and South Vietnam. The United States became involved in the Vietnam Conflict because policymakers in the United States believed that if South Vietnam fell to a Communist government, then Communism would spread throughout the rest of Southeast Asia.

Members of the United States Armed Forces began serving in an advisory role to South Vietnam in 1961. As a result of the Gulf of Tonkin incidents on August 2 and 4, 1964, the Congress of the United States overwhelmingly passed the Gulf of Tonkin Resolution, Public Law 88-408, on August 7, 1964, which effectively handed over warmaking powers to President Lyndon Johnson until such time as peace and security had returned to Vietnam.

In 1965 the United States Armed Forces ground combat units arrived in Vietnam. By the end of 1965, there were 80,000 United States troops in Vietnam, and by 1969 a peak of approximately 543,000 troops was reached.

On January 27, 1973, the Paris Peace Accords were signed, which required the release of all United States prisoners of war held in Vietnam and the withdrawal of all United States Armed Forces from South Vietnam. And on March 30, 1973, the United States Armed Forces completed the withdrawal of combat troops from Vietnam.

More than 58,000 members of the United States Armed Forces lost their lives in Vietnam, and more than 300,000 members were wounded. In 1982 the Vietnam Veterans Memorial was dedicated in the District of Columbia to commemorate those members of the United States Armed Forces who died or who were declared missing in action.

The Vietnam Conflict was an extremely divisive issue among the people of the United States, and members of the United States Armed Forces who served bravely and faithfully for the United States during the Vietnam Conflict were caught upon their return home in the crossfire of public debate about the involvement of the United States in Vietnam.

Mr. Speaker, this was a time when members of our military were drafted. It was not a volunteer Army. It was very difficult, because even if you were from a family who served on other soils – I myself and my family were serving in Germany – whether they were drafted or whether they were volunteer Army, everyone deserves to be respected for their bravery for serving our country. And I can attest personally that when we returned from Germany during Vietnam, it was very clear the divisiveness that we saw because of the Vietnam Conflict from friends, family, just the way we were treated for being part of the military during that era.

And a positive thing happened because of Vietnam and our Vietnam veterans and the way they were treated. They were determined that no other military group of soldiers would return home to this country without the honor that they deserved. Many of our military organizations filled with our Vietnam veterans have made a concerted effort to make sure that our active military

and our Vietnam veterans are treated with the respect that they deserve in serving our country.

Thank you for supporting this resolution and recognizing March 30, 2019, as "Welcome Home Vietnam Veterans Day."

### STATEMENT BY MS. FIEDLER

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And thank you to my colleagues for supporting HR 108, honoring the life and substantial accomplishments of Ms. Violet Oakley on the 100th anniversary of the Pennsylvania Senate murals.

Violet Oakley was born in New Jersey in 1874, where she lived until financial disaster pushed her family out of their home and into a Philadelphia boarding house. There she entered into the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts and studied art under the only female instructor at the academy.

After her education, Violet Oakley rose to prominence by designing the murals, mosaics, and stained glass at All Angels Church in New York City. This work eventually caught the attention of the architect who was working on the Pennsylvania State Capitol.

Ms. Oakley was originally commissioned for a single mural in the Governor's Reception Room, but when the chief muralist died in 1911, she was asked to complete the remaining murals for the Pennsylvania State Senate chamber and the Pennsylvania Supreme Court room. The series titled "The Creation and Preservation of the Union" earned her \$100,000. Today that would be about \$2.5 million.

At that time it was rare for women to have such an impact in art, which was dominated by men. She traveled to Switzerland, Italy, and around the world during her career and opened doors for many women to follow behind her. She was also active in the women's suffrage movement.

So thank you again, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to my colleagues for joining me in support of HR 108 and recognizing the incredible legacy of Ms. Violet Oakley. Thank you.
