Coach Bariski, along with Coach Rizzo and Coach Nohe, are on the rostrum, along with senior captains Keeno Holmes and Casey Oliver, with the remainder of the team in the front.

The resolve these young athletes displayed on and off the court has made their families and their school proud, and it is a privilege to host them today at the Capitol. I offer them best wishes for success in all future endeavors and ask you to please join me in congratulating the Lincoln Park Leopards on being 2018-2019 State champs.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Marshall, thank you so much. Team, just stay down front. Your coaches and captains will be down with you in just a moment for a group photo.

While we are getting the group photo, the Southern Columbia Football Team, if you could come up first, and then we will do the Southern Columbia Wrestling Team.

SOUTHERN COLUMBIA AREA HIGH SCHOOL FOOTBALL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. At this time I am going to turn it over to Representative David Millard, chair of the Tourism Committee, followed by Representative Kurt Masser, the majority caucus administrator.

Representative Millard, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. MILLARD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, today we welcome to the State Capitol the championship Southern Columbia Football Team. Representative Masser will give you all the statistics about all of the wins that this team has had. It is not their first time here. They seem to have a stellar program with their coaches and keep coming back to the Capitol, and we are just delighted to receive them every year.

Representative Masser.

Mr. MASSER. This is one of those parades that comes by my house that I said about the last time, and this is the dynasty that we have here at Southern Columbia. There is not a small school in the State that can compare to Southern Columbia's resume. Coach Jim Roth is one of three coaches in Pennsylvania with over 300 wins; 31 seasons, I think, with 10 or more wins. Is that right?

Out of 31 PIAA finals that have been held, the Tigers have played in 17 of them. They have won nine State championships. It does not hurt when you get a young fellow named Julian Fleming, who is two-time AA Player of the Year in Pennsylvania; this year also named the "2018 Gatorade Pennsylvania Player of the Year." And did I mention to you, Julian, that I want you to go to Penn State? But that is a whole other story. Of course, making Julian look good is a kid who is heading to Alabama to play next year. When you have a quarterback that is headed to Alabama in Stone Hollenbach, he can even make Julian Fleming look good, so, Julian, you have to thank Stone for that.

And if Fleming was not the two-time AA Player of the Year, we would probably have "Thunder" Gaige Garcia probably might be the two-time AA Player of the Year. We have "Thunder" and "Lightning" at Southern Columbia. It is two brothers. Gaige Garcia is "Thunder," 2042 yards and 38 touchdowns on the season. This year his younger brother came up to be "Lightning" to "Thunder," and "Lightning," the freshman, ran for 1179 yards and 23 touchdowns. He led Southern Columbia with 11.7 yards per carry. Those two brothers also combined to catch 19 passes, 10 of them for touchdowns. Of course, we have a great wide receiver in Julian. Preston Zachman might have been the second best wide receiver in the conference. Making them all look good are our offensive/defensive linemen like Donlan, Stabinski, Quinton, Kerstetter, Schankweiler, and Six, just to name a few. Then you have backers like Haladay and Tillet and Nate Crowl; DBs (defensive backs) like Miller and Jake Davis. They all form what comes out to be Southern Columbia and Southern Columbia Football.

Of course, we have had a longtime presence of stability of assistant coaches who are with us also today. Alex Carawan, one of them who has done a great job on the Southern sidelines for a number of years. They do not just rebuild, they reload. Two days after the State championship game, the weight room is packed. That is what makes Southern Columbia Football.

Congratulations, Tigers, on another great season, and we will see you back here next year.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Masser.

At this time, team, just stay down there. We are going to take one quick photo here and then Representative Masser, and Representative Millard will be down with you and your fellow teammates.

And the wrestling team, if you will come down, right over here on the side of the wall. I think some of these football players are wrestlers too.

The other coaches or administrators, if you want to come up, please feel free. We are going to bring the rest of the team down here, but if the coaches and administrators want to come up, just come on up. So some of these young men were on two championship teams. That is amazing; outstanding.

Representative Millard, are you going to kick us off? Everybody, if we could have your full attention. These gentlemen have traveled far to be with us.

SOUTHERN COLUMBIA AREA HIGH SCHOOL WRESTLING TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Millard, Chairman Millard, please proceed.

Mr. MILLARD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, Representative Masser and I would like to welcome to the State Capitol the Southern Columbia Wrestling Team and their coaches – a championship team, a lot of great individual efforts. And Representative Masser will again give you all of the statistics concerning this team.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Representative Masser.

The SPEAKER. Representative, you may proceed.

Mr. MASSER. Another parade by my house – they are in a lot of parades – this one by the Southern Columbia Wrestling Team. Southern Columbia is being honored by capturing first place in the team rankings during the 2018-2019 PIAA Class AA Individual Wrestling Championships. They amassed 121 points and they placed second in the PIAA AA Dual Championships. Under their head coach, Jerry Marks, this team has provided so much excitement, again with the Garcia brothers, Ian Yoder, and I can go on and on. Brandon Gedman, Patrick Edmondson, Lear Quinton, Preston Zachman, Dorkoski – all of these guys up here have just brought so much joy to the region watching you guys. I know watching that Muncy match was a fantastic experience – that gym was packed – and then watching you down at duals. This year coming up we are going to take on Reynolds and we are going to beat Reynolds in the duals.

But congratulations to the Southern Columbia Class AA Team Champions, the Southern Columbia Tigers. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Chairman Masser, or Caucus Administrator Masser, and Chairman Millard. And we are going to do a photo here and then the rest of the wrestling team will be down with you and the Representatives.

Thank you, gentlemen.

At this time I would like to bring up a State champion wrestler, Mr. Garcia, and then also we have with us Robert Sacavage, a former judge and a wrestling champ himself. And Representative Kurt Masser is going to do a presentation for an individual State champ and for a former State champ.

GAIGE GARCIA PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Kurt Masser is recognized. This young man is a State champion this year, and we would like your attention.

Mr. MASSER. It is my honor today to stand to recognize Gaige Garcia. He captured a State title by defeating a wrestler from St. Joe's Catholic Academy by a score of 5 to 2. A three-time sectional district and regional champion, he amassed an undefeated season record of 47 wins, and a career record of 114 wins and 6 losses. He comes from a family of wrestlers. As I said, he was the "Thunder" in "Thunder and Lightning," and comes from a good Mount Carmel – the neighboring school district – bloodline. His father was a three-time State champ from Mount Carmel.

So congratulations to Gaige Garcia on capturing the 2018-19 State championship.

GUEST INTRODUCED

Mr. MASSER. And it is also my honor today, talking about the Mount Carmel roots from his family, it is also my honor to present or to honor Judge Robert Sacavage's 50th anniversary of his State championship win at Mount Carmel.

Judge Sacavage was a district attorney and then president judge for Northumberland County, and he is a friend, and I am honored to recognize him on the 50th anniversary of his State championship. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. We have two members with guests on the resolutions, Representative Jozwiak and Representative O'Neal. So we are going to begin with Representative Jozwiak, and it is a memorial resolution. This is a memorial resolution, so we need to have everybody in their seats and we need to close the doors of the House. After that we have two unanimous consent introductions of guests, Representative Sheryl Delozier and Representative Marcia Hahn. So we are going to begin with Representative Jozwiak, followed by Representative O'Neal, followed by Representative Delozier, followed by Representative Hahn.

Please close the doors of the House. All members, please take your seats. This is a memorial resolution with respect to the F.O.P., the Fraternal Order of Police, so I am going to ask everybody to please take their seats.

STATEMENT BY MR. JOZWIAK

The SPEAKER. Representative Jozwiak, sir, you may proceed.

Mr. JOZWIAK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to ask my colleagues to support an important resolution concerning law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty. Before I do that, I first would like to recognize some members of the Pennsylvania State Troopers Association and the Pennsylvania State Lodge Fraternal Order of Police who are here with us today. From the State Troopers Association is president, David Kennedy, to the left over here; and with him is legislative liaison officer, Harry Dannehower, who is a retired State Trooper. From the Pennsylvania State Lodge Fraternal Order of Police are secretary, Mr. Joseph Regan; and trustee, Mr. Vince DiCenzo. Thanks for being with us today.

In the United States last year, 144 law enforcement officers were killed in the line of duty; unfortunately, 4 were from Pennsylvania. This resolution honors three police officers and one deputy United States marshal who served in Pennsylvania and lost their lives in the line of duty. The four men I would like to recognize are the following.

Philadelphia Police Officer Raymond Diaz, Jr., who served in the 24th District, was a 20-year veteran. While responding to a burglary, Officer Diaz's vehicle was struck by another vehicle, resulting in numerous injuries from the accident. While recovering, Officer Diaz fell, requiring additional surgeries and prescription medications. Officer Diaz died as a result of an accidental overdose. He is survived by his wife of 20 years, Meagan; daughters, Marissa and Alexandria; and son, Raymond. He was 47 years old.

Deputy U.S. Marshal Christopher David Hill served in Pennsylvania in the Middle District. He was a veteran of the United States Army for 3 years as a Ranger, and a deputy U.S. marshal for 11 years. While attempting to serve an arrest warrant with a United States Marshal task force on a woman who was making terroristic threats, a man from inside the home opened fire on the task force; upon officers returning fire, one of the rounds pierced the wall and struck Deputy Marshal Hill. Deputy Hill was taken to the hospital, where he succumbed to his wounds. He was 46 years old. He is survived by his wife of 16 years, Sylvia; his son, Travis; and his daughter, Ashlynn.

Det. Sgt. Brian Scott Cuscino was a member of the New Castle Police Department for 16 years. He was a detective, a firearms instructor, a SERT (Special Emergency Response Team) team member, a sniper team leader, a cell phone forensics analyst, and a homicide investigator. While participating in a required physical training exercise for the special response team, Officer Cuscino suffered a heart attack and died. He was 44 years old. He is survived by his wife of 23 years, Heather, and his sons, Brandon and Dustin.

Police Officer Alex Sable was a member of the York City Police Department for 4 years. Officer Sable graduated from the York Technology Institute with a degree in computer systems. He was a veteran of the United States Marines, serving for 7 years. While participating in a SWAT (special weapons and tactics) training exercise for water rescue, Officer Sable suffered a cardiac arrest and passed away. He was 38 years old. He is survived by his wife of 12 years, Rebecca; his son, Ethan; and his daughters, Annabel and Eliana.

Colleagues, I encourage you to read the resolution to learn how these men lived and how they lost their lives. As a former law enforcement officer, I would like all of us to remember these men, not because of how they died, but because of how they lived. They served their communities. They protected their communities. They sacrificed for the people in their communities.

Mr. Speaker, I offer this resolution as a way for us, on behalf of each and every Pennsylvanian, to show gratitude for the sacrifice of these four law enforcement officers. I offer my heartfelt condolences to the families and loved ones of these four brave men. I ask my colleagues to support HR 217.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. O'NEAL

The SPEAKER. We are going to now proceed with Representative Tim O'Neal, on HR 218.

Mr. O'NEAL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to thank my colleagues for the unanimous vote designating the month of April as "Donate Life Month" in Pennsylvania. With me here today to witness the vote are Michael Kenney – please stand – legal counsel for the Center for Organ Recovery and Education; Dwendy Johnson, community relations supervisor for the Gift of Life Donor Program and State team leader for Donate Life Pennsylvania; Samantha Garvey, an intern in Miss Johnson's office; Katelynn Metz, communications and marketing coordinator for CORE; and Aubrey Meller and her mom, Robin, from Canonsburg, in my legislative district. Aubrey is a liver and small bowel recipient.

This issue is deeply personal for me as well, as my grandmother received a kidney donation in 2010. She has done well in the years since, and I am happy to report that she is living today without the difficulties of kidney failure. In fact, every 10 minutes a person is added to the national transplant waiting list. Currently more than 110,000 people are awaiting organ donations. Despite more than 130 million people registered as organ, eye, and tissue donors, the need for organs outweighs the supply. Tragically, on average, 22 people die each day waiting for a transplant. My grandmother was one of the lucky ones. I urge you to join me in designating yourself as an organ donor on your driver's license and letting your loved ones know of your wishes.

In conclusion, thank you for supporting organ donation, and I urge you to do all you can to bring awareness to this important issue.

But I take this moment to share with you the issue that we have. Bert was somebody that came into work every day listening to Ann – Ann is on our Appropriations staff. She is all-knowing about our budget process over there. And he would come into work every single day happy to be at work, and those of us that know how our State employees work so hard for our Commonwealth, Bert was that example. And Bert was such an example; his saying was that he was not only a beloved husband and father, but a dedicated worker, and he was known to say that Mondays were the best day of the week because you had a whole week of challenge and opportunity ahead of you. We need more employees like that for our Commonwealth and those that are working for them.

His 39 years here were after he served in the Army in the Korean War, and he was a member of the VFW Post 6771, as well as American Legion Post 26. He was a veteran, he was a father, he was a friend, and a husband. He is somebody that is a testament to all of our State employees, and the people recognized his role, as they named a building after Mr. Bertolino

many years ago. Those of you that might date yourself as long as I have with the State might remember the Bertolino Building.

But the ability for us to tout our State employees, Bert is a fantastic example of that. I am very proud to have his family here today, to be able to give Bert that last saying of "Thank you, friend, and farewell."

But he served our Commonwealth well, and thank you, Mr. Speaker, for giving me the opportunity to include his family and say thank you for his service and to give our condolences for their loss, because we truly lost a good one when Bert passed.

The 2019 Law Enforcement Torch Run transported the Flame of Hope along its entire 10-day journey from Athens, Greece, to Abu Dhabi, United Arab Emirates. Demonstrating outstanding loyalty to the noble goals and principles of the Special Olympics, Chief Mettin has generously contributed to the welfare of the organization and its members. Please join me in welcoming Chief Mettin.

STATEMENT BY MR. ZIMMERMAN

The SPEAKER. Representative Dave Zimmerman is recognized to speak on HR 252.

Mr. ZIMMERMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to ask support for my HR 252, recognizing April 27 as "World Veterinary Day," and this year's theme recognizes animal vaccinations. Many people think of veterinarians as the doctors we go to for the care of our beloved pets, and in that role, we are greatly indebted to them, as many pets are our best friends. Veterinarians are also key to our nation's food supply and the economic health of our family farmers. Veterinarians also fulfill many other functions, such as regulatory medicine, public health, and military service. To prevent the introduction of foreign diseases in the United States, veterinarians are employed by State and Federal regulatory agencies to quarantine and inspect animals brought into the country. They supervise international and interstate shipments of animals and they test for diseases that can threaten animal health and human health or our food supply.

Veterinarians serve as epidemiologists in city, county, State, and Federal agencies, investigating animal and human disease outbreaks such as food-borne illnesses, influenza, rabies, etc. They help ensure the safety of food processing plants, restaurants, and water supplies. The U.S. Army Veterinary Corps helps protect the United States against bioterrorism and is responsible for care of government-owned animals and biomedical research and development.

Veterinarians are doctors who fulfill many necessary roles in modern society, and we owe them a debt of gratitude for all they do.

STATEMENT BY MS. BOBACK

The SPEAKER. Representative Karen Boback is recognized to speak on HR 267. She is chair of the Children and Youth Committee.

Ms. BOBACK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HR 267 designates April as "Autism Acceptance Month" in Pennsylvania. Autism spectrum disorder, which is ASD, is a

developmental disability resulting in varying levels of impairment of an individual's ability to learn, develop healthy interactive behaviors, and understand verbal, nonverbal, and reciprocal communication. According to estimates from CDC's (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) Autism and Developmental Disabilities Monitoring Network, about 1 in 59 children – that is 1 in 59 children – have been identified with ASD. ASD is reported to occur in all racial, ethnic, and socioeconomic groups, but it is about four times more common among boys than girls. Currently, there is no cure for this disorder.

It is my pleasure to offer this companion resolution with my former House colleague, now Senator, John Sabatina. We hope our resolutions will raise awareness and acceptance for those families affected by this condition. I thank my House colleagues for their support of HR 267, and I thank you, Mr. Speaker.
