Ms. KLUNK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank my colleagues for your unanimous support of HR 357, designating June as "Alzheimer's and Brain Awareness Month" here in Pennsylvania. The number of those affected by Alzheimer's disease or other related brain disorders is staggering and increasing with each day; 5.8 million people are currently living with Alzheimer's here in the United States, and 280,000 of those, and probably even more who are undiagnosed, are living right here in Pennsylvania.

Having a loved one with any type of dementia is simply devastating, and I can certainly speak from experience with my own grandmother. They deteriorate and sometimes they just do not know you, but it is the memories that you have of them that keep you going when their memory is slowly fading away. Caring for a person with Alzheimer's or any other related brain disorder can be exhausting. There are long, grueling days trying your patience. Those days are filled with heartache, but yet filled with love; filled with bright moments, and yet dark moments. And that is why the Alzheimer's Association commemorates the longest

day of the year, June 21, to remind all of us how much work, worry, care, and love goes into caring with those who are affected by Alzheimer's disease and related brain disorders, because caring for someone with dementia simply feels like the longest day every day. It is an emotional roller coaster for the individual living with the disease and for the loved one watching their journey.

Informal and family caregivers like me and my family save taxpayers billions of dollars in uncompensated care, yet we need to do more to support these families who are maintaining such a delicate balance. I would like to take a moment today to thank each and every family caregiver across the State of Pennsylvania. Many of you work full-time jobs, sometimes missing work to care for your family member or even your neighbor. It is stressful and it is exhausting, but you do it for one reason: because of love. So today we thank those caregivers for the dedication and devotion and sacrifices that they make each and every day.

Today we are joined in the gallery and here on the House floor with advocates and caregivers, and many of you, I am sure, have had a chance to meet them here this morning. I would like to introduce Jennifer Holcomb down here with us. Jennifer is the director of memory support at Cross Keys Village in New Oxford. John Rudy serves as the chairman of the board of the Alzheimer's Association Greater Pennsylvania chapter; Michelle Rudy, who is an advocate; Bob Marino, who serves as a board member and advocacy chair of the Delaware Valley chapter of the Alzheimer's Association; and the many advocates who we have up in the gallery with us today.

Here in Pennsylvania, the Alzheimer's Association has two wonderful chapters with wonderful resources to assist those living with Alzheimer's and those who are helping to take care of them. There is help and there is support, and these people are here to offer it.

I want to thank each and every one of you for your support today for this resolution and to the many caregivers and advocates who are out there making sure that there is hope.

During his 40-year career, Jayson has shared his unique perspective on America's pastime with his readers. Well known for writing about baseball's oddities and obscurities, Jayson is also an expert in the more modern aspects of the game, including player personnel, game strategy, and statistical analysis. His weekly trivia questions are "can't miss" reading for any fan. Jayson has won an Emmy Award, twice been named Pennsylvania Sportswriter of the Year, and is a member of the Philadelphia Jewish Sports Hall of Fame. Along with his daily coverage and columns, Jayson has authored three books on baseball: "Wild Pitches: Rumbblings, Grumbblings, and Reflections on the Game I love"; "Worth the Wait: Tales of the 2008 Phillies"; and "The Stark Truth: The Most Overrated and Underrated Players in Baseball History."

- (2) occupies any place for the purpose of receiving, recording or registering bets or wagers, or of selling pools;
- (3) receives, records, registers, forwards, or purports or pretends to forward, to another, any bet or wager upon the result of any political nomination, appointment or election, or upon any contest of any nature;
- (4) becomes the custodian or depository, for gain or ward, of any property staked, wagered or pledged, or to be staked, wagered, or pledged upon any such result; or
- (5) being the owner, lessee, or occupant of any premises, knowingly permits or suffers the same, to be used or occupied for any of such purposes.

(b) Authorized pools.—A person who conducts or participates in a pool shall not be subject to prosecution under subsection (a) if all of the following apply:

- (1) The total amount wagered in the pool between all participants does not exceed \$1,000.
- (2) Each participant in the pool has an equal chance of winning, each wager accepted for entry in the pool is the same dollar amount and no participant places more than one wager in a pool.
- (3) Other than the wager, no other money or thing of value is paid or given for participation in the pool.
- (4) All wagers collected for entry into the pool are paid as prizes to one or more participants in the pool.
- (5) No wagers or portions of wagers are retained by the person operating the pool and collecting wagers for participation, except that a person operating a pool may be entitled to win a prize as a participant in the pool.
- (6) The transaction of entering and operating the pool is incidental to a bona fide social, professional or familial relationship.
- (7) The pool is not based on the outcome or performance of elementary school, middle school or high school athletic events or players.

(c) Construction.—Nothing in subsection (b) shall be construed to:

- (1) Relieve an eligible organization of the requirement to obtain a license under section 307 of the act of December 19, 1988 (P.L.1262, No.156), known as the Local Option Small Games of Chance Act, in order to operate a pool or have a pool operated on its premises.
- (2) Make lawful any activity prohibited under the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), known as the Liquor Code.

(d) Definitions.—As used in this section, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"Eligible organization." As defined in section 103 of the Local Option Small Games of Chance Act.

STATEMENT BY MR. STRUZZI

The SPEAKER. The Chair calls upon Representative Struzzi on HR 268. It will be on unanimous consent.

Mr. STRUZZI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Colleagues, I stand before you today to say thank you for this affirmative vote on HR 268, a resolution directing the Joint State Government Commission to study the behavioral health treatment system in Pennsylvania. Through the work of advocates, the stigma surrounding behavioral health is slowly starting to dissolve and health-care providers are embracing the importance of the linkage between behavioral health and physical health. However, we still do not have a firm grasp on the actual needs and ability to meet those needs of individuals seeking treatment. The true systematic barriers to timely placement and access to appropriate behavioral health services are not fully understood. We know that a shortage in mental health professionals and a lack of access to timely treatment services positions emergency departments as de facto safety nets for psychiatric treatment. We also know that in these situations, patients suffer, which has an impact on both patients and delivery system outcomes.

In order to determine the appropriate policy, we must understand the whole landscape. That is why HR 268 is so important. Friends, we cannot get to the destination unless we know how to get there. We must put an end to the issues that face our treatment communities. I want to see people get through

treatment, get back to an effective quality of life, and contribute to society. We need to make these linkages between mental health, physical health, and drug addiction, and figure out what we need to get people back into society.

So thank you again for your support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1001, PN 1126**, entitled:

An Act regulating milk banks that provide donor human milk in this Commonwealth.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The Chair is going to call upon Representative Donna Oberlander to speak on the bill. And I am going to ask all members to please take their seats. We can open the doors of the House, but I do need to have members seated. We have guests here with respect to this bill. Members, if you could please take your seats. Any conversations can just step off the back of the floor. Members, please take your seats.

Representative Oberlander, you may proceed.

Ms. OBERLANDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am proud to stand before you today as a sponsor of this legislation that will help support our families and strengthen our communities. HB 1001 seeks to ensure that medically fragile newborns receive the best quality human milk so that they can not only survive, but thrive. According to the March of Dimes, breast milk has demonstrated health benefits for preterm and low-birthweight babies, those weighing about 3 pounds. Nearly 14,000 babies are born preterm in Pennsylvania each year; in fact, our State spent more than a billion dollars on medical costs related to prematurity this last year alone.

Banked donor milk is evolving in Pennsylvania and nearly 95 percent of level 3 and level 4 NICUs, that is the neonatal intensive care units, are using it for their at-risk infants. This is up from less than 37 percent in 2015. HB 1001 provides necessary oversight of a growing and evolving industry that serves the most fragile residents of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. And let me emphasize that this legislation only seeks to regulate the entities processing and distributing the milk, not the many mothers who choose to donate.

Due to the explosion of demand for donor milk both by hospitals and the public, many companies are entering into the market, and for these reasons it is important that Pennsylvania does its job in regulating this. Let me explain how the regulatory structure would work. All milk banks that collect or distribute milk in Pennsylvania must apply to the Department of Health for a license. They would be required to medically screen their

donors; to contact the health-care provider to verify the donor baby is getting adequate growth. The milk must be processed to inactive pathogens, meaning pasteurized; and postprocessing bacterial cultures must be performed. The Department of Health would have the option of allowing accreditation from a recognized professional organization to fulfill the requirements for licensure, and the Department of Health must inspect the facilities of the milk bank.

I do want to address the topic of remuneration because there has been some confusing information being distributed on this. And I want make it perfectly clear that mothers can still be financially compensated by a for-profit company but that it is not a mandate, and that the bill requires that the companies that compensate donors apply for an exemption from the Department of Health. They would be required to disclose their donor practices. This is a process identical to the one in New York where several companies that pay donors have licenses.

The legislation enjoys the support of many organizations and individuals. And let me close by sharing with you a few words from our donating mothers who signed a petition to support HB 1001. "Milk donation was a rewarding experience, one that I hope other mothers can have. By supporting this bill, I hope that milk bank regulations will offer safe, consistent support for mothers, babies, and families throughout the Commonwealth."

And "I have donated approximately 40 gallons of dairy-free breast milk since his birth. The milk bank has precautions in place to ensure that my baby gets all the milk he needs before I donate to other babies."

I ask for, respectfully ask for your affirmative vote on this very important bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Bill Kortz.

Mr. KORTZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, HB 1001 is a well-intentioned bill, and conceptually, I favor it. However, there have been some safety concerns that have been raised, and one of the concerns is the test for opiates. And I am getting confusing signals whether there is going to be a test or there is not going to be a test. And sadly to say, in today's society, we have a crisis, if you will. We have an epidemic of opioids. They are everywhere. It does not matter what age, men or women, it does not matter; it is happening across the broad spectrum of society. Because of that safety concern and whether the test is being done to the strict standards or not, Mr. Speaker, I have to err on the side of caution on this, and I am going to urge a negative vote.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Donna Bullock.

Mrs. BULLOCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand in support of this bill but I do not do it without careful consideration. The mere mentioning of breast milk or breastfeeding in this chamber often gets a reaction from my colleagues that it is uncomfortable for them. But as we talk about a growing industry that can help many of our families here in Pennsylvania, I caution that we are careful to make sure we are considering all of the issues and factors that are before us.

The focus on breast milk in past has focused on things like health risks and such but has not looked at exploitation or the economic inequities that are involved. Policy has often neglected to recognize the true economic value of a woman's work. Lactating is not an easy job. It takes a lot of time, skill, and

energy, and often we do not put a dollar or a value on the work of women. This is just one more area in which we fail to value women's work.

I hope that this bill and the regulations included in it will encourage more conversations on this issue, that we provide regulations for a growing market and we provide protections for vulnerable families, and at the same time, we put a value on the work of women all across Pennsylvania. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. Representative Oberlander, first, on unanimous consent.

Ms. OBERLANDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to let you know that I would like to submit the balance of my comments on HB 1001 and would seek your permission, please.

The SPEAKER. Oh, yes, please. Thank you very much, Representative Oberlander. Thank you.

Ms. OBERLANDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Ms. OBERLANDER submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Mr. Speaker, I am very proud to sponsor legislation that will help support our families and strengthen our communities. HB 1001 seeks to ensure that medically fragile newborns receive the best quality human milk so that they can not only survive, but thrive.

UPMC's Department of Pediatrics told us that as seen in the blood banking industry years ago, some policies, such as donor remuneration without critical transparency and oversight, can introduce significant

risks for both donors and recipients. The review of procedures by the Department of Health helps to ensure that all milk banks that operate in Pennsylvania are using evidence-based practices and that donor milk remains available to those infants with critical needs.

The Food and Drug Administration classifies donor milk banking as food processing, which provides excellent guidelines regarding storage, processing, and spoilage, but does not address the screening of donors or the protection of the donors and their babies.

The Pennsylvania chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics has told us that there is little data currently available about the act of milk donation itself and newer practices such as donor remuneration being used by some companies. It is important for the Department of Health to be able to review the practices of each organization collecting or distributing human milk in Pennsylvania.

The Mid-Atlantic Mothers' Milk Bank, our own nonprofit milk bank here in Pennsylvania, is accredited by the Human Milk Banking Association of North America, which provides inspection and detailed guidelines for all aspects of milk banking. The HMBANA guidelines, which were developed in conjunction with the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), have an exceptional 30-plus year safety record, but accreditation is voluntary and unavailable to for-profit companies.

Due to the explosion of demand for donor milk, both by hospitals and the public, many companies are entering the market. Some of these entities, such as the providers of human milk fortifiers, are evidence-based companies that provide helpful services. Others have non-evidence-based processes or exploitative practices such as pressuring donors, imposing arduous contracts, or targeting specific populations. Entrepreneurs without any experience in pediatrics, nutrition, tissue banking, or even health care are beginning to enter the market as well. In the past 4 years, there have been several well-publicized incidents, such as one company targeting lower income communities in Detroit (Medolac) and another sourcing milk from Cambodia (Ambrosia), prompting that country to ban the exportation of breast milk. Licensure will have a positive impact on insurance coverage for donor milk as well.

I do want to address the topic of remuneration. There has been some confusing misinformation regarding payment of mothers for their milk. Mothers can still be financially compensated by a for-profit company, but that is not a mandate. The bill requires companies that compensate donors to apply for an exemption from the Department of Health. They will be required to disclose their donor practices. This process is identical to the one in New York, where several companies that pay donors have licenses. The remuneration of donors is a relatively new practice, and little data is available about the risks involved for donors, donors' babies, and recipients. Simply requiring specific procedures for remunerating companies to follow is inadequate. For example, it is impossible for a health-care provider to verify that a donor baby is receiving all of the mother's own milk that s/he needs. Growth is the only data that is available, and both health-care providers and milk banks rely on self-reporting from the mother to determine what the baby is eating. Exploitative practices that pressure mothers could affect self-reporting.

It is also impossible to predict the donor practices of companies that will enter the industry in the future. The exemption process provided in the bill allows the Department of Health to evaluate each organization's donor practices to see if they are reasonable.

This bill does not impede business, but instead recognizes and elevates milk banking as a lifesaving and critical medical service. The provisions of the bill lay the groundwork for safe and ethical practices and will enable the Department of Health's oversight of a rapidly evolving industry that impacts young families. Due to safety and ethical concerns, HMBANA prohibits affiliated milk banks, such as Mid-Atlantic Mothers' Milk Bank, from compensating donors. We are very aware of the unintended consequences that could result if remuneration would be required under this legislation. It would be among my worst fears if a mother – who may be desperate for financial compensation – would choose to donate the milk intended for her baby and that baby would suffer. The regulations proposed in my legislation would help ensure that only excess milk from the mother may be donated and that her child would meet nutritional benchmarks. We cannot allow

the targeting of low-income women by paying for donor milk and pressuring mothers to donate excessive amounts. HB 1001 protects the milk donor and her baby as well as donor milk recipient babies, while ensuring a safe and stable supply of donor milk to address our most critical needs.

This legislation enjoys the support of fellow milk banks and many medical professionals – key organizations and physicians who understand the importance of donated mothers' milk, including:

The Executive Director of the Mid-Atlantic Mothers' Milk Bank.

The Medical Director of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) at UPMC Magee-Women's Hospital.

The Medical Director of Postpartum and Lactation for Temple University Hospital.

The Director of Neonatology for St. Luke's University Health Network.

The President of the PA Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

The Regional Director of Advocacy and Government Affairs for the March of Dimes.

The PA Affiliate of the American College of Nurse-Midwives.

The Chief Executive Officer of the Children's Home in Pittsburgh, a pediatric specialty hospital.

Let me close by sharing with you a few words from our donating mothers who signed a petition in support of HB 1001:

"Milk donation was a rewarding experience, one that I hope other mothers can have. By supporting this bill, I hope that milk bank regulations will offer safe, consistent support for mothers, babies, and families throughout the Commonwealth."

"It is sad that anyone would attempt to profit off the babies and their families that need donor milk to thrive. Having safety standards in place to ensure the safety of these babies should be paramount."

"I have donated approximately 40 gallons of dairy-free breast milk since his birth. The milk bank has precautions in place to ensure that my baby gets all the milk he needs before I donate to other babies. For-profit companies incentivize milk donation by paying donor mothers, who then may take milk away from their own babies and sell it."

On questions of drug testing, currently there is only one device – the Miris Human Milk Analyzer – approved by the FDA to measure the macronutrient content of human milk for clinical use. There is a lack of options for drug testing human milk in the U.S. In most areas of the country, there are no labs that will perform drug tests for milk banks, or if they do, it is cost-prohibitive and they cannot handle the volume required by a milk bank. ELISA kits from Neogen are the only reliable way for milk banks to test milk for drugs. These kits were developed by Prolacta and Neogen, and now Neogen owns the tests and sells them. Neogen is the only company to offer these tests at this time.

That does not mean that such testing is not important. The Mid-Atlantic Mothers' Milk Bank is one of only three milk banks in the country to drug test milk – North Texas and Denver are the others – and is one of only a small handful of milk banks to own a Miris. Drug testing and nutrient analysis are not required by HMBANA at this time. Including this testing right now could negatively impact other nonprofit milk banks, as this bill could be a model for other States.

STATEMENT BY MR. SONNEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Curt Sonney is recognized to speak on HR 234.

Mr. SONNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As a member of the Great Lakes Legislative Caucus, I introduced HR 234, declaring September 7, 2019, as "Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Appreciation Day" in Pennsylvania in order to shine a spotlight on the importance that the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River have on the economy and the environment.

The Great Lakes system, which includes all five lakes and the St. Lawrence River, are globally significant, holding 21 percent of the world's surface freshwater. The system provides drinking water to more than 48 million Americans and Canadians, and supplies 56 billion gallons of water per day for municipal, agricultural, and industrial use.

Here in Pennsylvania, Lake Erie is among our most valuable natural resources and adds extraordinary economic value to the State. The State's Lake Erie coastal region is home to an estimated 250,000 Pennsylvania residents and provides more than 3,000 jobs. The well-known Presque Isle State Park attracts 4 million visitors, who spend an estimated \$76.9 million annually. The tourism and recreation industry in the area contributes more than \$65 million to the State's economy, with harbors and marinas that support a \$71 million annual recreational boating industry, and a growing steelhead fishery that generates nearly \$10 million in expenditures and \$6 million in value-added activity in Erie County.

We must all actively work together to protect and enhance the Great Lakes system and the many benefits it brings to the Commonwealth. That is why I am honored to have authored HR 234, designating September 7, 2019, as "Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Appreciation Day" in Pennsylvania.

STATEMENT BY MRS. KULIK

The SPEAKER. Representative Anita Kulik is recognized to speak on HR 283.

Mrs. KULIK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I would like to talk about a little-known, yet severely chronic, autoimmune disease known as myasthenia gravis. This disease, which is estimated to affect 20 out of every 100,000 people in the U.S., is an autoimmune disease where the nervous system attacks nerve cell receptors, thus causing the skeletal muscles to contract.

Individuals living with myasthenia gravis live with chronic muscle weakness, with roughly 15 to 20 percent of individuals needing to use a ventilator to assist them in breathing at some point in their life. Despite the chronic muscle weakness, MG is extremely hard to diagnose because, as we know, muscle weakness is a common symptom of many disorders, which means MG is often overlooked and the patient continues to suffer.

It is because of this that I drafted HR 282, which would designate June 2019 as "Myasthenia Gravis Awareness Month" in the Commonwealth. It is my hope that by calling attention to this disease, we can honor those who suffer from it, acknowledge the health-care practitioners who care for these individuals, champion the researchers who continue to work diligently to improve the lives of sufferers, and thank the countless advocates committed to finding a cure.

Lastly, I would like to thank everyone here in the House chamber for unanimously adopting this resolution, dedicating June 2019 as "Myasthenia Gravis Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. By doing so, we are giving a voice to those who suffer in silence, but also hope to finding a cure for a disease that has affected far too many people for too long. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. GILLESPIE

The SPEAKER. Representative Keith Gillespie is recognized to speak on HR 281.

Mr. GILLESPIE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is the fourth annual Chesapeake Bay Awareness Week. My colleagues on the Chesapeake Bay Commission from all three States – Maryland, Virginia, and Pennsylvania – conceived the idea of Bay Awareness Week in our realization that very few of us, even those in Maryland and Virginia, understand the way that water is connected to our daily life and is influenced by our individual actions.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. GILLESPIE. Mr. Speaker, I would like to submit the rest of my remarks for the record.

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir. Thank you so much, Mr. Chair.

Mr. GILLESPIE. Thank you.

Mr. GILLESPIE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Pennsylvania has more than 85,000 miles of rivers and streams – one of the highest densities of stream miles of any State in the nation. Unfortunately, almost one-quarter of those waters are impaired, meaning they are not safe for drinking, recreation, or aquatic life. This is a burden

to our local communities, and also impacts downstream neighbors. In particular, half of our Commonwealth – all or parts of 43 counties – drains to the Chesapeake Bay, the nation's largest estuary. The Susquehanna River provides 50 percent of the freshwater that flows into the Chesapeake Bay. Like many of our own waters, the bay is listed as "impaired" under the Federal Clean Water Act.

The Commonwealth has just released its draft phase 3 Chesapeake Bay plan, a roadmap to have all necessary water quality practices in place by the year 2025. This plan describes the significant work that remains to be done, but it also highlights the value of work that has already been done by our local governments, farmers, and many other dedicated Pennsylvanians. These efforts are working. Bay health has improved and is showing signs of resiliency, even in the face of 2018's record rainfall.

But more work remains. The good news is that investments in soil health, forested stream buffers, and nutrient management will directly benefit our own local waters while also improving the bay. Indeed, we are likely to never save the bay if our focus is only to remain downstream on the bay itself. Instead, we will succeed when we focus on the quality of our own local streams that provide our drinking water and recreational opportunities. It is a win-win.

While we take action today to specifically raise awareness of the Chesapeake Bay, let us use this as an opportunity to raise awareness of the waters all across our Commonwealth and celebrate the potential of clean water to improve our economy, health, and quality of life.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

The SPEAKER. Representative Tom Murt is recognized to speak on HR 356.

Mr. MURT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to thank my colleagues for an affirmative vote on HR 931, otherwise known as Older Pennsylvanians Month. Mr. Speaker, as the chair of the House Aging and Older Adult Services Committee, along with my colleague, Chairman Steve Samuelson, I want to take this time to acknowledge our older adults here in the Commonwealth.

As many of us are aware, Pennsylvania has the sixth highest population of seniors in the nation. In 2011 the first baby boomers began turning 65 – Mr. Speaker, that is 10,000 people every day in the United States – and by 2020 the senior population is estimated to be 25 percent in Pennsylvania. As these baby boomers age, we realize that we must not only have adequate services and supports available to them, but we also recognize the services, expertise, and knowledge they bring to our local communities.

Mr. Speaker, this year's national theme is "Engage at Every Age." We want to acknowledge that more and more older Pennsylvanians and adults are participating in activities that promote mental and physical wellness, offering their wisdom and experience to the next generation and seeking to mentor others with their life experiences.

The baby boomer generation, Mr. Speaker, is a much different senior population than the previous generation, and indeed, different than any other senior population. The "Engage at Every Age" emphasizes that you are never too old to take part in activities that can enrich your physical, mental, and emotional well-being.

And as the baby boomer generation enters the senior citizen age group, they are doing it with energy – taking charge, advocating for themselves and for others, and striving to live a more independent and healthy lifestyle.

Today we recognize our older Pennsylvanians as they engage at every age here in our Commonwealth, and we thank them for continuing to share their talents, their skills, and their stories with us every day.

STATEMENT BY MR. DAY

The SPEAKER. On HB 630, sponsored by Representative Gary Day, the Chair calls upon the prime sponsor on the passage of that particular legislation.

Representative Gary Day.

Mr. DAY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, quite some time ago our Veterans Affairs and Emergency Preparedness Committee heard testimony from the United States Department of Military Affairs, and oftentimes they give us information about where there are certain gaps in protections for our military service men and women that work in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Therefore, I introduced a bill, which was adopted today, HB 630, and it extends current employment protections for residents who are employed in Pennsylvania but are members of a National Guard or a Reserve unit in another State. In that case, the Governor from that other State could call them to action, and when they do, we want to make sure that their jobs are protected here in Pennsylvania.

So with that, I introduced HB 630, and we as a group here today passed that legislation, which I am extremely proud and honored and thankful to all the members of the House of Representatives, and I hope that the Senate takes this bill up quickly to close that gap in protections for our military service men and women.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Ms. WHITE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

When emergency medical care is needed, time is a critical factor between life and death. Over the years, we have taught civilians how to rescue a choking victim with the Heimlich maneuver, and to restore heart and lung function with cardiopulmonary resuscitation. Yet many people do not understand how to prevent someone from dying during a hemorrhage.

By passing HR 352, we are adding our voices to the national campaign to educate the public about uncontrolled bleeding.

Approximately 40 percent of trauma-related deaths worldwide are due to bleeding or its consequences, establishing hemorrhage as the most common cause of preventable death in trauma. It only takes as little as 2 minutes for a person to bleed out, when the average time for a first responder to arrive is 7 to 10 minutes. Organizations across the country are offering classes to teach individuals how to be an "immediate responder" when someone near you experiences a traumatic bleed. The American Red Cross and the Federal Emergency Management Agency have online courses to teach people how to stem a bleed. The American College of Surgeons offers free in-person classes.

Through proper training and awareness, anyone can be ready to help someone in an emergency bleeding situation. I urge all Pennsylvanians to receive the proper training and become an immediate responder to save someone experiencing traumatic bleeding.
