### 75TH ANNIVERSARY OF D-DAY COMMEMORATION

The SPEAKER. Tomorrow, June 6, 2019, marks the 75th anniversary of D-Day. The Battle of Normandy began on June 6, 1944. Some 156,000 American, British, and Canadian forces amongst other nations, but certainly the American, British, and Canadian were the large bulk of those individuals on five beaches along the 50-mile stretch of the heavily fortified coast of France's Normandy region. Code-named "Operation Overlord," under President Franklin Roosevelt, Prime Minister Winston Churchill, and the Commander, the Supreme Commander Dwight Eisenhower, the invasion was one of the largest amphibious military assaults in human history. So many of those valiant young men lost their lives, taking on the atrocities head-on with respect to Nazi Germany.

Today we are blessed to have the opportunity to remember this historic event. At the suggestion of the Parliamentarian, Clancy Myer, and in conjunction with Kelly Fedeli of our office, you are about to see a video. This video takes us back to this chamber, 2001, shortly after the book "Band of Brothers," written by the famous historian Stephen Ambrose, was published. It went on, of course, to become a well-known HBO series, and at the time the House of Representatives had the honor of hosting several members of Easy Company, which was portrayed in the series and talked about in the book, and Easy Company was the 101st Airborne from Pennsylvania. The most significant character, Dick Winters, lived not far from the Capitol, in Hershey. He could not attend in 2001, but we later recognized him on the House floor in 2003.

Once we watch the video, I am then going to be calling upon our good friend and colleague, Representative Mark Gillen, who has assembled for us – and we are so thankful for his work – 10 World War II veterans who are seated in the well of the House, and hold your applause because we are going to be giving them a huge round of applause when Representative Gillen introduces them.

But at this time we are going to take a moment to watch this short video in honor of those fallen at D-Day, the 75th anniversary of which will be tomorrow. Thank you.

(Commemorative D-Day video was presented.)

The SPEAKER. As someone who is the son of a man that served in World War II, my father was a chief petty officer for the United States Navy, served on the destroyer, the USS *David W. Taylor*, and he has been gone since 2002, so we are so honored to have with us today some of those who are still here – God bless – that served our country in World War II.

### REMARKS BY MR. GILLEN

The SPEAKER. The Chair now turns it over to our good friend and colleague, Representative Mark Gillen.

Mr. GILLEN. Dwight David Eisenhower said that the eyes of the world are upon you at the cusp of the D-Day invasion.

The Speaker correctly noted that a lot of the heavy lifting was done by the United States, Great Britain, as well as the Canadians. But we were not alone. Freedom-loving people from Belgium, Denmark, Norway, the Netherlands, Greece, Poland, Czechoslovakia, New Zealand, and Australia also were in the vanguard that stormed the beaches, that were in the air, and the French, and the French Resistance, certainly on the continent itself.

In a few moments I am going to introduce our distinguished guests this morning. I want to acknowledge a birthday that is coming up, first, lest I forget it. I just read about it in the newspaper yesterday. At this end we have a 91-year-old youngster, Luigi Cinifici. And you are saying, well, let me do the math here; how did you get into World War II? You are 91 years old. Lou, we are not going to give away your secret, but I think your signature looks a lot like your parent's signature, if I am not mistaken. There is a strong possibility there. And Dr. Cedric Jimerson has been a friend for many years, I will say more about him, but I just want us to acknowledge him on his upcoming 100th birthday. Dr. Jimerson.

"The hope and prayers of liberty-loving people everywhere march with you," Dwight David Eisenhower said. Five thousand ships; 11,000 aircraft; some 160,000 men; 50 miles of coastline; and 54-degree water, which became very critical in the lives of some that were coming ashore – they gave their lives that freedom might live. Much has been said about the age of these veterans and the World War II generation passing from the scene – and thank you for the very touching remarks from the Speaker relative to his own dad's service – but this day is sanctified by blood. It has been made sacred by the love for freedom that these men and ladies had, and that love exceeded the bounds of life itself. We can muse on the lives that were lost, but these were lives that were properly given to their country because of that love for freedom.

And seated off to the left of the rostrum, I just wanted to introduce – in fact, we will have just a pair of introductions before I introduce our guests in the front. Evelyn Mosser is a longtime friend, and we live right on the banks of the Mohnton Navy Yard with her World War II husband. Evelyn's cousin, Everett Keffer, who was married to Irene, who is seated right there, was at Normandy. He has passed away. He was introduced on the floor of the House of Representatives, some of you may recall. He was in *PC-1261* that day, and I believe he embodied the sacrifice of that generation. As I spoke with Everett one day over there outside of Governor Mifflin High School at a festival, he told me a bit of a story that was so compelling that I felt it was important for Herb, Mark, and the team to record that, and they did just that. He was blown out of *PC-1261*, a patrol craft, by a German shell, and for the next 2 years Everett was hospitalized in England and in the United States. And yes, indeed, we lost hundreds of thousands of men and women during World War II, but there were hundreds of thousands that were injured, that were permanently disabled for the rest of their lives, and it took ladies like these and friends and family members like these to care for them for the rest of their lives.

And seated directly next to them is Dorothy Trate. She is a Rosie the Riveter. Look at that muscle there. She has got a good bicep muscle still.

And as you can well imagine, to bring a group like this here today requires all hands on board, and in the back of the auditorium, I would like the group to stand if they would not mind standing just for a moment. These are friends, these are family members, these are drivers; some of my staff is back there as well. And Cheryl Anderson from The Heritage of Green Hills in our district, actually right across from the district office, did an outstanding job bringing this group here today. Thank you very much.

And now to the introductions. I briefly mentioned Lou Cinifici, Luigi Cinifici. It was enough for Lou's family to send him out and away from home to serve, but during the same period of time that Lou was serving, five of his brothers, I said five of his brothers, were serving during World War II. His family was not immediately aware that he had enlisted but figured it out somewhere down the line as he departed. Lou thought that this was a good situation because he was going to be in a tug in the New York Harbor, as I recall, Lou, and suddenly the tugboat got orders and was headed to the Panama Canal. And instead of a tugboat during World War II in New York Harbor, Lou was hauling around munitions in the South Pacific. So we are certainly delighted that he could join us here today. And he began that adventure and that journey as a 16-year-old, a 16-year-old teenager during World War II.

Walter Davis – and we will just move right down the line here – not only was a pilot in World War II, an aviator, but he trained pilots. And so I would like you to just bookmark as we go down here if you can recall and take advantage of the opportunity just for a few minutes afterwards to visit with some of these heroes before they move on to the reception.

Charles Eberwein. Charles, they call him Big Charles at The Heritage of Green Hills. Charles was in the Coast Guard. And as I recall discussions with you, your parents really did not want you to join because you already had two siblings that were in the service. And lest you move past the Coast Guard during the Second World War in terms of their engagement, there were 2,000 members of the Coast Guard that were killed during World War II in engagements principally in the Atlantic against German submarines.

I always refer to Bill Gordon as the person that saved my life. Bill was on the carrier USS *Hancock* with my own dad, and my dad was in the slow, lumbering *Grumman Avengers*, torpedo planes that slowly moved at the Japanese fleet. And Bill was part of the air group that flew protective cover with the fighter aircraft that he was on, and without those aircraft, we certainly would have lost a large number of the *Grumman Avenger* torpedo planes. Interestingly enough, Bill's wife, Dee, was a pilot domestically, because there was a dearth of pilots and she flew herself during the Second World War, though she was flying in the United States. My dad has been gone since 1982, so Bill was my adopted dad.

We have already introduced briefly Dr. Cedric Jimerson. And if you think we are kind of in rarefied air here with what you are hearing, you are going to go a long distance around this country and spend a lot of time trying to identify World War II surgeons, men that were not joining when they were 16, 17, and 18 years

old. I am going to give away the big secret – I think it was out already – you were born in 1919, if I am not mistaken, Dr. Jimerson – okay? – coming up on that 100th birthday. So thank you for your service. Thanks for making the extra special effort to be with us today.

And if not for people like Bernadine Smith with the Army Nursing Corps. All right. I noticed Dr. Jimerson had his arm around you earlier. Okay? Renewing a relationship there perhaps. So they served alongside the doctors and they mended many of those people and brought them back to health, like Everett Keffer.

Moving down the line here, Ethan Smith was in the air over Nazi and Italian occupied Italy; *P-51 Mustang*, as I recall, if I am not mistaken. So each one of these individuals not only put the uniform on, but they were willing to risk their life for their country.

My longtime neighbor, Kenny Mosser, right there at the Mohnton Navy Yard, and we had the Wyomissing Creek separating our two properties, and he has been a regular visitor to veterans events, a great friend of the Berks Military History Museum. And we are certainly delighted that you and Evie were able to join us today.

A couple of months ago John Fleming came walking in my direction with his date – by the way, you all still are dating – Dorothy and you are a date. Okay? And so we will have the discussion about dating in our midnineties – but John came walking up and he is a veteran of the Battle of the Bulge, and both he and Dorothy had their canes and he had a box, and inside that box was a 25-foot German banner that he had pulled down after the Battle of the Bulge when the United States troops were meeting Russian troops at the close or the cessation of conflict, at least the European conflict of the Second World War. And so, John, thank you for your distinguished service not only in Europe but for many years with the Battle of the Bulge Survivors Association in Berks County.

Joe Zebertavage, now he likes to just be called Zeb because it is a whole lot easier. Zeb was on a 40 millimeter, if I am not mistaken, and he was on the USS *O'Brien*. And so if you want to engage somebody who had a bird's-eye view of what was happening in D-Day and the carnage, and he identified a ship near his that was headed down, he is the gentleman that you want to talk to. I was assured that he was in such good health that he would not need a ride here, that he was probably going to jog from Berks County to the Capitol today. But like many of these who began their service in World War II, he really never stopped serving, but after D-Day, Zeb, you were on the USS *Conway*, and if I am not mistaken, you were involved in the invasion of the Philippines.

So we are delighted that each of you could be here today, and I would encourage everyone today to focus not on the fact that 97 percent of this generation are gone but rather thank those who have served and also recognize there is a focus with those that are still living. We need to support our current veterans community. And yes, we mourn the loss of the World War II generation, but more importantly, we need to thank God that they lived.

I would simply like to submit my remarks for today in honor of the 75th anniversary of D-Day and extend my eternal gratitude for those that served. As we all know, freedom is not free. God bless everyone.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Readshaw.

Mr. READSHAW submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

On June 6, 1944, 160,000 Allied troops landed along a 50-mile stretch of heavily fortified French coastline to fight Nazi Germany on the beaches of Normandy, France, in an operation that Allied Commander Dwight D. Eisenhower called a crusade in which, "We will accept nothing less than full Victory!"

This Pennsylvania House of Representatives had six past members who served at D-Day: Wayne Balthaser (D-Berks, 1959-1960), William Bolton (R-Montgomery, 1951-1954), Joseph Manmiller (R-Dauphin/Lebanon, 105th Legislative District, 1975-1988), Harry Ridinger (R-Adams, 1963-1964), Victor Yarnell (D-Berks, 1963-1964) who served with the British Army, and Raymond Book (R-Allegheny, 30th Legislative District, 1983-1988), who just died on May 6, 2018, and would answer any questions about D-Day.

Pennsylvania became the true arsenal of democracy as Gov. Edward Martin stated nothing else but victory mattered.

The success of D-Day was due in no small part to the strength and resolve of the rank-and-file soldiers. As has been noted in several speeches over the years, the vision and foresight of President Franklin D. Roosevelt and Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower whose achievements were rooted in their core beliefs, high standards, and abilities were able to garner strong performances from those serving under them.

The Allied forces' assault on continental Europe was the largest amphibious offensive in history, with two significant variables beyond the control of Allied forces: the weather and the strength of the German forces. Even then, more than 5,000 ships and 13,000 aircraft supported the 82d and 101st Airborne Divisions, the British 6th Airborne Division, and the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion along with other attached Allied units taking part in the assault behind German lines for the D-Day invasion, and by day's end on June 6, 1944, the Allies had taken a foothold in Normandy.

The D-Day cost was high, with more than 9,000 Allied soldiers killed or wounded, but more than 100,000 soldiers began the march across Europe to defeat Hitler. Despite the casualties and injuries to Allied forces during the attack, the assault on D-Day was accomplished and broke the resolve of the German Army.

Did I get everybody? Representative Ciresi, I see. Is he here? Is he back? Just give me a second. Any member of the House of Representatives who is a veteran, are you in the photo? Okay? Is everybody here? Thank you so much.

At this time we are going to have our World War II veterans, they are going to have to leave the floor here, and we are very, very appreciative of having these amazing guests with us today.

The SPEAKER, Representative Malagari, Representative Hanbidge, and Representative Stephens are here for the purpose of presenting citations to these championship teams.

Representative Malagari, will you be starting us off? Thank you, sir.

Representative Malagari.

Mr. MALAGARI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am proud to have the chance today to honor not one, not two, but three championship teams from North Penn High School, located in Lansdale, Pennsylvania, each of which knows its way around a swimming pool.

We were talking earlier just on the rostrum that Representative Hanbidge and myself are swimmers, the Speaker is as well. I actually swam at North Penn for a little bit of my career but not much, and I have a very personal connection to coach Jason Grubb, coach Brian Faikish, and coach Jeff Faikish, who are here in the well of the House. They were all my coaches; some of them I swam with when I was an 8-and-under at Lansdale Swim Team. Imagine that.

Today we have here with us the girls swimming and diving team, the girls water polo team, and the boys water polo team, all proudly representing the North Penn Knights.

The girls swimming and diving team won its second consecutive PIAA Class AAA State Championship in March. The tally that weekend included North Penn divers Paige Burrell, Meghan Wenzel, Kianna Yancey, and Madalyn Freece taking the top four places in the 1-meter dive finals. That is diving board dominance. Additionally, the swim team racked up two individual and three relay second-place finishes as the Knights compiled a team total of 243 points, 77 points higher than their closest competition.

The girls water polo team won its fifth consecutive State championship in October, edging Wilson High School 5-4 in the title game. Claudia Thamm, who would later help the Knights' swimming team to its gold medal, scored both the tying and winning goals in the final 2 minutes of action in the water in the water polo State championship. Jane Montague scored 2 other goals, and another top swimmer, Caroline Dunigan, who is not here with us today, made 10 saves in net for the Knights.

It was double the water polo fun when the boys team won its second straight State championship in November, also powering past Wilson High School – there is a trend here – by a score of 14 to 9. Sean Faikish and A.J. Patterson each scored five goals for the Knights.

And how about some love for head coach Jason Grubb, down in the well of the House – please raise your hand – who directed both the girls and boys teams to their State titles.

It takes incredible skill and dedication, not to mention countless hours of practice and participation and preparation, to complete and to compete at this level. It also takes the guidance of great coaches and the support of families every step of the way. Winning not just one but multiple State championships is an extraordinary accomplishment.

These student athletes bring a great deal of pride to our community and I am happy to be able to recognize their achievements here at the Capitol. Congratulations to the teams, and I would not be surprised to see you here again next year.

The success of both the girls and the boys teams speaks not only to the strength and endurance of these young men and women but to the incredible coaching staff dedicated to their growth as athletes, and more importantly, as people.

Congratulations to all three teams on their victories this year. You have made our district proud, and I cannot wait to cheer on your continued success. Thank you.

Mrs. KULIK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The year is 2019 and we live during a time when technological advancements in the medical field are allowing physicians to identify, diagnose, and treat diseases faster and more efficiently than ever before. We live in a time where we know for a fact that certain things like smoking, drinking, or a poor diet are harmful to our bodies and likely will be the root cause of poor health in the future.

We have all this knowledge and information at our disposal, but we still overlook basic yet serious health hazards on a daily basis, like overexposure to ultraviolet radiation. Overexposure to UV radiation, as many know, is one of the main reasons skin cancer now is the most commonly diagnosed cancers in the U.S. Sunlight, for example, is the main form of UV radiation, but it also can be emitted by man-made items like tanning beds.

Despite the readily available information regarding the risk of overexposure to UV radiation, many people do not take the necessary steps to protect their skin from the silent killer. It is because of this that I am grateful for the passage of HR 282,

which designates July 2019 as "Ultraviolet Safety Month" in Pennsylvania. It is my hope that by doing so we will be able to promote education and awareness about the dangers of UV radiation and the small steps every Pennsylvanian can take to reduce their risk of developing skin cancer.

"Drug-related overdose death." An incident where an over-the-counter drug, prescription or controlled substance or illegal substance is the primary or secondary cause of death of an individual or may have been a contributing factor to the death of an individual.

Section 7.1. Requirements for first responder agencies and hospital emergency departments.

(a) Submission.—A first responder agency or hospital emergency department shall, in the format determined by the department, electronically submit drug-related overdose event information to the department.

(b) Data elements.—All of the following information shall be

provided by a first responder agency or hospital emergency department:

- (1) The full name, date of birth, gender and address of an individual who experienced a drug-related overdose event.
- (2) The date and time of the drug-related overdose event.
- (3) The address where the individual was picked up or where the drug-related overdose event took place.
- (4) Whether an emergency opioid antagonist was administered to the individual.
- (5) The location where the emergency opioid antagonist was administered, if available.
- (6) The amount of emergency opioid antagonist administered, if available.
- (7) Whether the drug-related overdose event resulted in death.
- (8) The suspected or confirmed drug involved in the drug-related overdose event.

(c) Frequency.—A first responder agency or hospital emergency department shall submit all information required under subsection (b) to the program no later than 72 hours after a drug-related overdose event was reported.

(d) Definition.—As used in this section, the term "emergency opioid antagonist" means a medication approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration to reverse the effects of an opioid drug. Section 7.2. Requirements for coroners and medical examiners.

(a) Submission.—A county coroner or medical examiner in this Commonwealth shall electronically submit data, in the format published under subsection (c), on a drug-related overdose death to the department within five business days of finalizing the cause and manner of the drug-related overdose death.

(b) Contents of data.—In complying with subsection (a), a county coroner or medical examiner shall provide all of the following information to the department:

- (1) Demographic information of the decedent, including but not limited to, the full name, address and date of birth of the decedent.
- (2) The toxicology report.
- (3) The autopsy report.
- (4) The circumstances of the drug-related overdose death.

(c) Publication.—The department shall transmit a notice of the format for data submission under subsection (a) to the Legislative Reference Bureau for publication in the Pennsylvania Bulletin within 30 days of the effective date of this subsection.

(d) Public reports.—The department shall use the data submitted under subsection (a) to compile publicly available reports containing statistics and patterns relating to drug-related overdose deaths on a quarterly basis to help identify threats to public health and safety.

(e) Liability.—Any individual who, in good faith, provides data to the department under this section shall not be subject to any civil or criminal liability as a result of providing the data.

The SPEAKER. We return now to HB 1005, PN 1341. This is brought up by Representative Jim Cox. Please again read a summary of the bill.

The amendment was offered by Representative Heffley.

Representative Heffley, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. HEFFLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment, amendment A01645, was a product of discussions with both the Department of Health and the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program. This amends the bill to collect information with respect to naloxone usage when there is a drug-related overdose, whether or not the overdose is fatal. This information would direct the PDMP to prepare a form for first responder agencies to complete in connection with emergency departments when naloxone is used. It also acknowledges that some of the information is not readily available to first responders, so it provides protections for those first responders who collect the data. By adding this language, Pennsylvania would be following six other States that collect information on naloxone use.

This amendment is agreed to by the prime sponsor of the bill, and I would appreciate your support.

The SPEAKER. Representative Jim Cox, the prime sponsor, on the amendment.

Mr. COX. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is an agreed-to amendment, and so I would ask for an affirmative vote from all of the members. Thank you.

While I support this amendment because it does get us closer to, I think, what the prime sponsor and many of us want to do, is to get those people who have suffered from an overdose closer to the help that they really need, I have really significant concerns about the underlying legislation and this amendment does not fix all those issues. So when we talk about this on third consideration, I think we are going to have to take in some input from some of the key stakeholders who have really significant concerns, and while this amendment does address some of those issues, it does not address all of them. And when we talk to our first responders, emergency room physicians, they still have very serious concerns with respect to the underlying legislation.

That being said, I support this amendment. Thank you.

**STATEMENT BY MR. POLINCHOCK**

The SPEAKER. Representative Todd Polinchock is recognized on unanimous consent, and please take your time, sir. Mr. POLINCHOCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As a new freshman, this is my first House resolution, so it has not passed, the magnitude to me, of how important this is to be part of Pennsylvania history. So I want to thank my colleagues for passing HR 216. By doing this, you recognize the vast scope of the problem. Across the country 100 people die each day from an opioid overdose, 100 people a day, and that number could reach as much as 250 if we let potent synthetic opioids like fentanyl continue seeping into our illegal drug markets.

Like many of you, I, too, have heard from EMS (emergency medical services) personnel who have Narcan to revive the same people over and over. Think about that. They are using Narcan on the same people over and over. So this repetition is a sign that we have to find a better strategy to get those addicted onto the path of recovery. And that is what this task force will do. We will form a group of experts from hospitals to EMS companies to law enforcement and drug treatment facilities. They will be tasked with finding effective methods for collecting data, identifying funding sources, and most importantly, finding ways to stabilize those addicted and get them into treatment. The task force will then report back to the Joint State Government Commission, which will issue a report on the findings and make recommendations to this whole House no later than 18 months after adoption.

As I see it, we have no other option. Narcan can only do so much. We must find an effective way to get those with addictions long-term treatment and to break the cycle of opioid abuse.

Thank you so much again, and I appreciate all the help on getting this passed. Thank you, everybody.
