This is the first time the competition will be held in York, Pennsylvania. As you know, the winner of this competition will go on to represent Pennsylvania in the Miss America competition.

We would like to give a special welcome, if she will raise her hand, to Miss Pennsylvania 2018. Please raise your hand, please step up a little forward. Thank you so much. Kayla Repasky is from Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, and has served the State so well, really well.

Miss Pennsylvania's Outstanding Teen is also with us, if she will step up, please, and wave her hand. That is Cecilia Petrush from Delmont, PA, which is Westmoreland County – Gettysburg, obviously, is in Adams County – so, Cecilia, thank you so much for being with us today. I know you have to be over to meet with the Governor at 1:30, but we are so honored that you are here. Please stay on the floor until you have to be escorted to the Governor's Office.

We wish each and every one of you the very best. You are all winners by being part of that outstanding competition. Thank you. And you may stay seated there if you would like.

Representative Fritz, please come to the rostrum, sir, for the purpose of presenting a citation to one of our State champions. We are going to close the doors of the House. After Representative Fritz, Representative Dawkins, you will be next, sir, so you may want to come down to the front just to be ready. So we will have Representative Fritz followed by Representative Dawkins.

Members, please take your seats. This good man has traveled some distance to be with us today with his dad, and then I am going to have a championship team come up here as well, and they have traveled a long distance. So if everybody could please take their seats.

DAVID MARTIN III PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Fritz, you may proceed. Mr. FRITZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am honored to stand before this House in order to recognize an exceptional athlete. David Martin III, also known as Duke the Dozer, is a national champion wrestler in the 134-pound weight class. Young Duke and his family hail from Honesdale, Pennsylvania, in Wayne County.

I am going to take a moment to recognize family in attendance. We have his father, David, Jr.; mother, Lisa, over here in the well; sister, Ruby; and grandmother, Janet Martin. We are so pleased you could be with us. And in the back, also in attendance, we have Duke's uncle – and I might add as a side note, a best bud and the best man in my wedding; best best man speech ever – uncle, Greg Martin; his lovely bride, Colleen; and Duke's first cousins, Levi and Blake. So happy, so pleased you could be with us today.

Colleagues, Duke Martin is a most fitting example of the focus, will, determination, tenacity, and fierceness that is necessary to achieve greatness on the wrestling mat. His work ethic and dedication I am sure will continue to carry him to new heights. Scholastically, Duke is finishing his fourth grade year at Lakeside School in Wayne Highlands School District, and sport-wise, Duke the Dozer is a 5-year member of the Honesdale Elementary wrestling program; as well, he is a member of the Maple City Madmen Club, and additionally is a member of the West Scranton Junior Wrestling Club. Duke, you are a busy young man and we are super proud of you and your success.

Now, colleagues, for those of you that have never been to a wrestling match, at the end of the contest, the two wrestlers return to the center of the mat in order to shake hands; following that handshake, the referee raises the hand of the victor.

So, colleagues, I am going to step back from this podium in order to raise Duke's hand to signify his victorious achievement, and upon doing so, I kindly ask all of you to join me, join me in giving him an applause and cheer that a national wrestling champ deserves.

Thank you so much, colleagues, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Jason Dawkins. Representative Dawkins, if you could, we are going to bring the whole team down to the well, and actually, they probably could all come on to the rostrum. If the whole team could come down, please, to the front. Just bring them down – the whole team and coaches – everybody just come on up to the rostrum. Thank you.

SANKOFA FREEDOM ACADEMY CHARTER SCHOOL BOYS BASKETBALL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Dawkins, please introduce this championship team for us. I do need everybody to take their seats.

Mr. DAWKINS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Good morning, members. I am here joined with our Sankofa PIAA Class A Champions. I know it looks like I am little shorter; they are standing on some type of ledge. I am not really this short.

On Thursday, March 21, 2019, at the Giant Center in Hershey, Pennsylvania, the Sankofa Freedom Academy defeated the Vincentian Academy 83-61 in the PIAA Class A Boys Basketball Championship.

Sankofa Academy went six for nine from the three-point range in the first half, and shot 64 percent from the field overall to build a 21-point lead at halftime. Adding 15 steals and 5 blocked shots, the Warriors had size, forced 16 turnovers, shared the basketball with 21 assists, and played above the rim with 6 dunks.

Senior forward Scott Spann led all scorers with 26 points. He also added eight rebounds and four steals. Dynamic junior wing Derrius Ward added 20 points, nine assists, and six steals. Versatile senior Khalil Turner supplied 12 points, four assists, three blocked shots, and three steals. Kobe Devine added 12 points, on four of six, shooting from behind the three-point line. The Warriors led 21-10 after the first quarter, 45-24 at the intermission, and 63-36 heading into the final frame. The Warriors' average margin of victory in the four-game stretch during the Class A was 36 points.

Led by one of my good friends and one of my schoolmates from high school, coach Isaiah Thomas, who could not be with us today – Isaiah just recently won the Democratic nominee for city council back in the city of Philadelphia for the at-large candidates – but seated with us behind me is the entire team that led in the championship, and I have with us the assistant director – or the athletic director, I should say, Mr. Charles McLaughlin. Also I have with us Marteik, who is one of the coaches here. We have the team captain, Kobe Devine; the leading scorer, Scott Spann; the Class A Player of the Year, Derrius Ward; and also, the junior standout, Canaan Boswell. They are all behind me right now at the podium.

So if I could have all of my colleagues join me in congratulating the Sankofa Freedom Academy on a PIAA Class A State Boys Championship for 2019. Please rise and give them a round of applause. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Congratulations, and we are so appreciative that you could be here today. We are going to get a photo right here, so if you could just stay standing. And then Representative Dawkins, if one of the young men with you could hold the citation open for the photo, that would be great. Thank you.

Representative Tina Davis and Representative Galloway, if you could please come to the rostrum, and we have some winners from the Neil Armstrong Middle School. If they could come up to the podium with the good Representatives. And you can open the doors of the House and just let the team members off the floor.

Members, please take your seats. Guests, please take your seats. If there are any conversations, if you could, please take them off the House floor.

NEIL A. ARMSTRONG MIDDLE SCHOOL PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. And please, Representative Tina Davis, introduce us to these champions.

Mrs. DAVIS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Before we start, I want to give a round of applause to all of the parents and grandparents up in the gallery who came with the Neil Armstrong Team.

So Mr. Joseph Marlow, our schoolteacher for Neil Armstrong Middle School, Bristol Township, is the teacher that won the "What's So Cool about Manufacturing?" video contest. The goal of the competition is to make manufacturing—

The SPEAKER. Members, please let us have your attention. These young folks traveled quite some distance from Bucks County to be here – a good, close to a 2-hour drive, if not for sure a 2-hour drive one way. Let us give them our attention.

Mrs. DAVIS. And they broke down, but we made it.

So it is called the "What's So Cool about Manufacturing?" video contest. It is a statewide contest, and the goal is to make manufacturing cool and seductive to young kids. We are very proud of their accomplishment. Under Mr. Marlow's guidance, Mayah Alford, Thomas Brennan, Jayleen Chaves, Pyper Goldey, Layla Matthias, and Giovanni Nigro's team placed first out of 32 teams competing at the State level.

They started their competition, actually, in New York City, in Times Square, featuring the largest and biggest worldwide billboard in Times Square with Macron Company. Their video will make STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) education, technical training, and the ultimate goal of a career in manufacturing, attractive to hundreds of middle schoolers.

There is a seed we want to plant in our young people, and these brilliant young students have helped to do that with their video. Throughout the project, these students learned how manufacturing has been revolutionized by technology in the past few decades. In addition to learning about possible future careers in manufacturing, the students sharpened their video production and video storytelling skills by cutting down hours of footage into 2 minute and 30 second video products.

The Armstrong team had already been developing their video storytelling and editing skills by being part of a larger group that produces a daily video of current happenings at the school that is broadcast on televisions in every classroom called the Armstrong News Network.

These students clearly have a bright future, and please stand and give them a great, warm welcome.

We have a citation for your team. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Galloway, do you wish to say anything? Thank you, sir. Thanks for being up here too.

We will be voting on the uncontested House resolutions later today. The Sergeants at Arms can open the doors of the House.

The SPEAKER. We are pleased to welcome right now Jackson Miller from Easton, Pennsylvania. Jackson, please raise your hand there. We are so honored to have you here. He is with his mom and dad, Dave and Rachel Miller, and nurse, Tami Dakin.

Folks, Jackson is 10 years old and he has been diagnosed with MECP2 duplication syndrome, and they are here for the passage of HR 367, sponsored by Joe Emrick, I believe; right, Representative Emrick? He is right there.

We are going to be voting that later today, but as you know, Jackson is with us and we are just so honored that he is here. That resolution will designate July as "MECP2 Duplication Syndrome Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.

Please give Jackson and his family and nurse and Representative Emrick a big round of applause for being here today.

We are asking Representative Mark Keller to please come to the rostrum. Members, please take your seats. We are going to close the doors briefly here. This is our last champion for today, but this in an exciting champion. Listen to the accomplishment of this young lady – really outstanding.

MALLORY KAUFFMAN PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Mark Keller. Please, sir, proceed.

Mr. KELLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am pleased to be joined at the rostrum with this young lady from the 86th District in Perry County, who has demonstrated her athletic excellence on the State level. Mallory Kauffman, a recent graduate of Greenwood High School, took home not one, but two gold medals at last month's PIAA Track and Field Championships in Shippensburg.

Mallory won the AA discus and shot put competition, and she did so by a wide margin. In the discus, her winning throw went 151 feet, 7 inches – 15 feet farther than the second-place winner. Then the shot put, her throw of 48 feet, 3 inches was about 6 feet farther than the number two position. Her track and field golds were the first for Greenwood in 25 years. She also set a school and county record with her winning throws in the shot put.

It is not easy being a student athlete and having to balance all of the activities between school and homework and practice, but Mallory was able to do all that and excel to the highest level in her sport, and that is what makes her achievement so very special.

Mallory is headed to Penn State University and is excited about the possibilities ahead of her as she trains to compete in the Big 10. We know you will do well, Mallory.

On behalf of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, I extend a heartfelt congratulations to you, Mallory, for your stellar season and two PIAA titles. We are proud of you and know you will continue to do the best. Thank you.

To win the discus and the shot put, and in the manner that you did, how far you exceeded the next person behind you, that is just amazing. No wonder Penn State wants you, and what a wonderful scholarship too. For you to be competing at the Big 10 level, that is amazing. Thank you.

MOTION TO SUSPEND RULES

The SPEAKER. Representative Burns is recognized for the purpose of that motion.

Mr. BURNS. I rise to make a motion on amendment 01653.

I do not speak on the House floor very often, and I certainly never have asked to suspend the rules, but I am doing so today because I believe it is that important. It is that important for the mom-and-pop businesses throughout Pennsylvania, and I am going to explain why. Act 39—

The SPEAKER. Sir, and this is no disrespect at all, but remember, you are on the motion to—

Mr. BURNS. Okay.

The SPEAKER. —suspend, so you want to have your amendment considered, 01653, and that is going to require a two-thirds vote.

Mr. BURNS. I would like to explain why we should be suspending the rules.

We should be suspending the rules because of Act 39. Act 39 has put bar owners at a disadvantage in Pennsylvania. If you own a liquor license in Pennsylvania, you are at a disadvantage because that law allowed you to compete against Walmart, Sheetz, Giant Eagle, Wegman's – corporate giants. We have pit mom-and-pop businesses against corporate giants. And the answer was, these corporate giants were going to be able to purchase the licenses from the mom-and-pop businesses in Pennsylvania. However, that did not happen, because the law also allowed the LCB (Liquor Control Board), the Pennsylvania Liquor—

The SPEAKER. Sir, I apologize. If the motion to suspend passes, you will be able to go into detail.

Mr. BURNS. I would like to explain why we should be voting it.

The SPEAKER. On a motion to suspend, it is really just cause and effect.

Mr. BURNS. I do not think the summaries that we have in front of us do justice to what is happening here.

So if I may continue. The LCB is undercutting private mom-and-pop businesses—

The SPEAKER. No; no. Sir, you are going to have to suspend, and I apologize.

On a motion to suspend, all you are saying is, look, this is late. I wish it were on time. The underlying amendment does this. You can say what the amendment does and I would like everybody to have an opportunity to vote on it and it requires a two-thirds vote and I would ask you to suspend it. Then if it passes, you are going to be able to go at length with respect to your amendment.

Mr. BURNS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We need to suspend the rules to help mom-and-pop businesses survive, because in depressed areas in Pennsylvania, they are struggling. They are struggling to stay in business.

The SPEAKER. Sir, please suspend, just for a second.

Representative Burns, can you just see the Parliamentarian and myself for just a moment, please. Leaders can come up too.

Just come on up to this side of the rostrum. Just come right in front and then come over to the side.

(Conference held at Speaker's podium.)

The SPEAKER. Representative Burns, on the motion to suspend.

Mr. BURNS. After consultation with the Speaker, this motion is necessary to allow mom-and-pop businesses to sell their licenses in the Poconos region in Monroe County. There is a developer who is building a tourist area—

The SPEAKER. Sir, sir, please. Just state the amendment. What is the amendment and say why it is good to pass.

Mr. BURNS. The amendment would allow struggling mom-and-pop businesses in Pennsylvania – these are the small businesses in your communities – they would be allowed to sell their license and get out of business and save them from bankruptcy. So if you support small business and mom-and-pop businesses in Pennsylvania, you will vote to suspend the rules.

Mr. RADER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

A few years later, June was recognized nationally as "Dairy Month," as a way to celebrate the contributions of the dairy industry.

Here in Pennsylvania, dairy is the economic driver for one of the Commonwealth's top industries: agriculture. Pennsylvania has more than 6,500 dairy farms, which is the most in any State except Wisconsin. We are ranked sixth in total milk production nationally, and our 525,000 dairy cows produce more than 10.8 billion pounds of milk annually. The average herd size is about 80 cows. Ninety-nine percent of all dairy farms in Pennsylvania are family owned.

All of us are familiar with the current struggles many Pennsylvania dairy farmers are experiencing. This is due to the downward trend in fluid milk consumption, yet they are still producing more milk than ever. The dairy industry pumps nearly \$15 billion a year into the State's economy and supports more than 52,000 jobs.

Dairy Month offers us an opportunity to recognize Pennsylvania's hardworking dairy farm families and the food processors who provide consumers with a wide variety of fresh and wholesome dairy products. These products are loaded with essential vitamins and nutrients. Milk is still the official beverage of the Commonwealth and was designated so in 1982. We are proud of the dairy industry and we are thankful for the contributions it makes to the State's economy and to our daily lives.

So thanks again for your support of HR 375, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.
