Grant us a common faith that man shall know bread and peace; that he shall know justice and righteousness, freedom and security, an equal opportunity, and an equal chance to do his best, not only in our own lands, but throughout the world. And in that faith, let us march, march toward the clean world, our hands can make. Amen."

STATEMENT BY MR. MERSKI

The SPEAKER. Representative Merski, the floor is yours.
Mr. MERSKI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, colleagues, I want to thank you for your unanimous vote on HR 353, commemorating 100 years of diplomatic relations between Poland and the United States.

As the Speaker mentioned, we are extremely honored to have some very special guests here today. First, I would like to introduce Kamil Henne, Deputy Consul General of the Republic of Poland in New York. Consul Henne serves as deputy chief of mission at the consulate general, and it is an honor to have him here today.

We are also very honored to have with us Deborah Majka, honorary consul of southeastern Pennsylvania; Peter Obst, representative of the Poles in America Foundation; Sylwia Czajkowska, secretary of the Kosciuszko Foundation, Philadelphia chapter; Hanna Wewiora, treasurer of the Kosciuszko Foundation, Philadelphia chapter; and Michael Wewiora, member of the Kosciuszko Foundation, Philadelphia chapter. To our guests, I would like to say "witamy," which means "welcome" in Polish. While the word is generally used to mean "welcome to my home," today it also means "welcome to our House."

We are so proud to have you with us today as we recognize not just the strong bond between our nations, but also the rich Polish-American heritage shared by so many Pennsylvanians, like myself, and the contributions that Polish-Americans have made. From the very founding of our country, Poland has been our staunch supporter and proud ally in the fight for freedom and democracy – with Gen. Casimir Pulaski and Col. Tadeusz Kosciuszko, who fought on the side of the American colonists against the British in the Revolutionary War.

Poland regained its independence and sent its first ambassador to the United States in 1920, strengthening the ties between our countries. Most recently, Poland joined NATO (North Atlantic Treaty Organization), helping support U.S. counterterrorism efforts by sending large troop deployments to Iraq and Afghanistan.

Equally strong are the cultural ties shared by more than 10 million Polish-Americans, including more than 800,000 Poles and Americans of Polish ancestry who call Pennsylvania home. According to the 2000 United States census, Pennsylvania ranks fourth – just behind New York, Illinois, and Michigan – as the State with the largest number of Poles and Americans of Polish ancestry. In fact, at least four Pennsylvania cities, including my hometown of Erie, Philadelphia, Allentown, and Hazleton, have sister cities in Poland. As Polish-Americans, we are deeply proud of the customs and traditions we share. Those traditions are alive and well in Pennsylvania, where residents everywhere enjoy our pierogis and kielbasa, our festivals, and our music.

We are also deeply proud of the many ways Polish-Americans have made their mark here in Pennsylvania, from the immigrants working in the coal and steel industries who provided key support to leadership in our unions, to Pennsylvanians who made key contributions to science, the arts, and industry – individuals like Col. Francis Gabreski, the Oil City native who was the leading American air ace in the European Theater in World War II, shooting down 31 enemy planes; scientist Hilary Koprowski, a leader in microbiological research at the University of Pennsylvania; aeronautical engineer Frank Piasecki, who played a key role in the development of the helicopter; and mathematics professor Leopold Boeck, who founded the first polytechnical institute in the United States. And of course, for the past 60 years Poland and the U.S. have shared a vibrant educational partnership, as our citizens have welcomed thousands of exchange students.

As we commemorate 100 years of diplomatic relations between Poland and the United States, we look forward to the next 100 years with optimism, knowing that the rich bond we share will endure for decades to come. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Merski, and to our guests. As soon as we have a break, we would love to get a photo with you and the Representative.

I speak on behalf of myself, not on behalf of any of the other members of this chamber, but I know myself, as I follow information in the media, I can tell you that I, personally, would strongly support having an American military base in the country of Poland. I think you have been amazing allies to the United States, and Polish-Americans are wonderful people. Thank you so much.

Representative Bradford.
Members, Representative Bradford has the floor on HB 923.
Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to HB 923. In fact, I was in opposition to all of the budget reform packages, as they were called, that have just passed through the House. But in the interest of efficiency, I only speak on this bill, because I think the problem in each of them is the same and I think it is worth noting for the record.

These bills are the legislature, obviously, telling the executive how to run their shop a little more efficiently, and while none of us is perfect and there is always room for improvement, I think sometimes the House needs to reflect a little bit on its own record in regards to fiscal stewardship of the Commonwealth.

I went back to look at an article I remember very fondly, from October 18, 2017, and at that time you may remember this body had passed a general appropriations bill, a general appropriations bill about \$2 million more in spending than what this body saw fit to ever appropriate in terms of revenue. Now, one can argue about the politics of it, but I think the numbers are what they are. I want to quote from a Katie Meyer article, and I think it was in WITF, and it quotes the then House majority leader, Dave Reed. He said, "...the legislature is presenting a better option – even if it is no one's preference. 'Look, in an ideal world, you do a little less borrowing, you do a little more in recurring revenue,' Reed said. 'There weren't enough votes on both sides of the aisle to do that, so you've got to go to the next plan.' " It goes on to say, "The GOP-authored plan would fill \$1.5 billion...of a \$2.2 billion budget gap by borrowing against the commonwealth's Tobacco Settlement Fund."

Now, look, the reality is, we could do a lot better, borrowing and not doing enough in appropriating so that supplementals become necessary in subsequent budgets. Unfortunately, it has become common in this body. There is nothing particularly conservative about it and there is nothing in particular that is good budgeting. But I think that these proposals, these reforms fall short of the mark because they only talk about what this body,

with its imperfect record, would impose on the executive. I think if we are being honest with the people of Pennsylvania, a body that has passed general appropriations bills billions of dollars in excess of what it has raised in revenue should probably begin by looking in the mirror and not passing faux reforms for political points.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Rosemary Brown.

Mrs. BROWN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And since this is specifically on HB 923, the previous speaker really did not speak too much exactly on this bill, but I will tell you that this is really the need to show transparency to the taxpayers. It is to show the need of why we are asking for additional supplementals and how we possibly can get ahead of it in the future and make stronger and better decisions for the budget process.

So in regards to all the past bills that were recently voted on, I think as legislators these bills do nothing but the best for our taxpayers, as far as ensuring that we are being as transparent, as careful, and really looking at how we are spending money and if we are making the right decisions.

So I would ask for an affirmative vote on this last bill as well.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Brown.

The majority Appropriations chair, Representative Stan Saylor.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This is a government reform bill. As Representative Brown talked about, this bill simply has more transparency in it. This year we have an \$813 million surplus right now, but we have \$748 million in supplementals. So everybody out there believes we have \$813 million to spend, when we really do not because we have \$748 million in supplementals.

Now, I think we need to make sure that the public understands transparency in government. This bill simply is a good-government bill that makes sure that we, as well as the public, understand why the supplementals are necessary, how can we go forward and make sure that we solve these problems, that we do not need to do supplementals. It is simply asking the agencies to make recommendations to this General Assembly on how to improve the process.

This is simply a good-government bill that should have been passed a long time ago, so I ask for a positive vote on this. I do not know how you oppose good government and more transparency in government on a bill like this.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Matt Bradford, the minority Appropriations chair, for the second time.

Mr. BRADFORD. I would just remind the good chairman that if we want to avoid supplementals, maybe we should begin by adequately funding budget line items when we know that they are going to be far in excess of what is budgeted each year. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Cris Dush.

Please wait. Members, members, please suspend. Representative Dush is entitled to be heard.

Representative Dush.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would just like to respond to the last speaker. We have the authorization, we have the constitutional responsibility to set those limits. It is when the Governor makes a unilateral decision to go beyond those and spend, as the majority chairman of the

Appropriations stated, \$748 million over and above what the legislature gave him the authority to do, that is what we need to put a stop to, because constitutionally, he has been given the authority to spend a certain amount of money and he has spent over that, and quite honestly, my folks back home that are disabled service providers and that sort of thing, they are wondering where that money went. It certainly is not getting out to the people who are taking care of people at the working ends of things. It is getting eaten up by the bureaucracy down here, and this is the type of thing, the transparency, that needs to be brought forward, and I would urge members to vote for this bill. Thank you.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. HOHENSTEIN submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

I am concerned that HB 1170 may backfire and hurt workers more than help them. The requirement to use the Federal E-Verify employment system in the construction industry is intended to address the issue of misclassification of workers. I fully support real misclassification legislation – and I will absolutely vote for such legislation when it comes to the floor.

HB 1170 is not a misclassification bill. My concerns are focused on the efficiency and reliability of the program, the use of it as a weapon in labor disputes to harm union organizing efforts, and the lack of individual worker protection. I also believe that the bill does nothing to punish the worst actors: employers who exploit both authorized and unauthorized workers.

While I appreciate and respect the motivations for this bill – to protect U.S. authorized workers and to prevent the practices of misclassification, wage theft, and tax fraud – I believe the use of E-Verify would actually force more industry underground and not significantly protect U.S. workers. In fact, it would be harmful to small businesses and result in both authorized and unauthorized workers having their rights further curtailed, with some even subject to deportation.

E-Verify systems are known to have error rates between 10 and 15 percent. U.S. citizens and authorized workers will be trapped by those errors and lose their jobs through no fault of their own. The lawful workers trapped in the E-Verify system are most likely going to be women, whose names often change with marriage, and Latinx workers with hyphenated or dual family names. Again, we are talking about U.S. citizens, lawful permanent residents, and other authorized workers – not merely unauthorized workers. The E-Verify system is inefficient, and does not come as advertised. It is more trouble than it is worth.

Another problem with HB 1170 is its mandate for small businesses – even if a business has only one employee. This would be an undue regulatory burden for these small businesses. The benefit from use of the E-Verify system is questionable at best. In fact, when Arizona implemented a similar system, it found an increase of unscrupulous employers misclassifying workers – stealing wages and taxes, and not protecting them with UC (unemployment compensation) or WC (workers' compensation). Mandating this system onto all employers will only drive more employers, and the workers they exploit, underground.

One of the hidden dangers in this legislation is its complaint-based enforcement system. This system would be a perfect weapon to attack a viable, lawful contractor's operation or a union organizing effort. A job could be shut down because a subcontractor files a complaint against another subcontractor that outbids them on a job. A nonunion shop could file a claim against a union shop. The opportunities for abuse abound. Even investigations into legitimate complaints could be extremely confusing, with the delays alone costing days or weeks on a job site. The bill contains no way to control the extra costs of time lost on jobs due to investigating legitimate and illegitimate complaints, and no mechanism to protect law-abiding employers and lawful union organizing from retaliation.

Last week the House rejected attempts to improve this bill to get it closer to ensuring that the appropriate employers are targeted—those that are large-scale violators of wage and hour, unemployment, and workers' compensation laws—and that workers are truly protected from the nefarious practices that the bill seeks to stop. The bill does not contain any worker protection measures. I proposed an amendment that would have provided exploited unauthorized workers access to legal T and U visas when they cooperate with investigations against lawbreaking employers, but that amendment was found "out of order" and never made it to the floor for a vote. Similar proposals by my fellow Democratic Representatives were also rejected. The end result is a system in which a worker whose wages are stolen and who is subjected to unsafe working conditions will not be protected by our government. The most likely result will actually be deportation, with the employers and their brokers free to continue their lawbreaking and exploitation. As I said before, I believe that those exploited workers would be happy to stand shoulder to shoulder with their organized union card-carrying brothers and sisters. Federal law provides for their protection, and if we are importing Federal law, we should have also imported the legal protections provided by U and T visas.

As a final slap in the face to the hardworking authorized workers HB 1170 purports to protect, the bill is completely toothless against the nefarious employers, labor brokers, and contractors exploiting the cheap labor of unauthorized workers. The only potential penalty is loss of a contracting license or permit. The problem is that the Pennsylvania Department of Labor and Industry has no jurisdiction to enforce those licenses or permits. This renders the bill powerless against the very entities it is supposedly designed to control.

The only losers are the workers of Pennsylvania. Those workers, whether they carry a union card, a green card, or they have nothing to prove who they are, will be left out in the cold—pitted against each other while the real villains go free.
