COMMUNICATION FROM GOVERNOR

VETO OF HOUSE BILL

The Speaker laid before the House a communication in writing from the office of His Excellency, the Governor of the Commonwealth, advising that the following House bill had been vetoed by the Governor:

HB 800, PN 1676.

Said bill having been returned with the following message:

TO THE HONORABLE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES
OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA:

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 800, Printer's Number 1676.

The General Assembly and I are working very hard to adequately fund public education in this Commonwealth. The goal is to have an accountable system in place, and it is my belief that our current system is not funded sufficiently.

This legislation prompts a serious question: why would the Commonwealth allow for the expansion of the Education Investment Tax Credit (EITC) that supports private institutions while our current public-school system remains underfunded? We have public schools that are structurally deteriorating, contaminated by lead, and staffed by teachers who are not appropriately paid and overstretched in their responsibilities. Tackling these challenges, and others, should be our collective priority.

The EITC lacks proper accountability and oversight, and little is known about the educational outcomes of students participating in the program due to a reporting loophole in the current law. Even less is known about the scholarship organizations that retain up to twenty percent of each dollar that is supposed to pass through them and are subsidized heavily by taxpayers. Additionally, House Bill 800 seeks to increase the maximum annual household income limit to \$95,000, further deserting the program's original core principle.

I am also deeply concerned by the drastic escalation of the cost of this tax credit program. Initially, the annual cost of the tax credit program will be enlarged by \$100 million. Clearly, this is a considerable amount of revenue. Then, there are the automatic increases to the total amount of the program. According to the Department of Revenue, the amount of General Fund revenue that will be lost over the next five years on account of this bill is over \$650 million. This is a staggering sum in a relatively short period of time without a single dedicated revenue source.

Simply stated, the EITC program envisioned by House Bill 800 strays from the original stated intent of the program – to lift people out of poverty – and fails to provide any additional accountability or oversight for the tax dollars being expended.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 800, Printer's Number 1676.

HEMPFIELD HIGH SCHOOL QUIZ BOWL TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Brett Miller, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. B. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, we often recognize individuals from this podium for their competitive athletic achievements, and while these athletic achievements are notable, there are others who achieve amazing exploits in other areas. Mr. Speaker, it is my privilege to

recognize a group of stellar academic students from Hempfield High School in the 41st District in Lancaster County who excelled in the area of academic achievement by winning the 2019 Pennsylvania State Academic Competition. These individuals competed for the State title against the best academic students from all across Pennsylvania, and their venue for the competition was the most beautiful of arenas, for they competed right here in the House chamber and also in the Senate chamber. It was right here in the Capitol where this group of students from Hempfield High School defeated the best of the best in quiz bowl competition to win the State title. I might add that I was privileged to be here that day to witness these students compete, and though I am biased in my view, they did an outstanding job and the results bear witness to this fact.

Mr. Speaker, this group of State champions had an outstanding year. They won the Lancaster-Lebanon League Championship, which qualified them to compete in the State tournament against other schools throughout the Commonwealth where each had won their own qualifying events to get here. And during the competition, facing the many difficult questions, the many required calculations, the pressures of time, and the need to quickly draw upon their collective knowledge and preparation, they showed that they were up to the challenge and they won. HARRISBURG UNIVERSITY OF SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY ESPORTS TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Patty Kim and Representative Stan Saylor, our majority Appropriations chair, are coming up to the rostrum. And I am going to bring the rest of the team to the well of the House. So the rest of the Esports Team, come on down to the well of the House.

Representative Patty Kim has with her our majority Appropriations chair, Stan Saylor, and the Harrisburg University Esports Team.

Representative Patty Kim, the floor is yours.

Ms. KIM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is my honor and privilege to welcome to the House floor the first-ever ESPN Collegiate Overwatch National Champions. The students you see here from Harrisburg University are pioneers in an emerging sport and an emerging industry. Last month the Harrisburg Storm—

Ms. KIM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

So last month the Harrisburg Storm dominated the inaugural ESPN Collegiate Esports Championship in the competitive online game Overwatch, a team-based, multiplayer video game where they work together to secure and defend control points on a map or escort a payload across the map in a limited amount of time. It is easy to underestimate the ability to compete in Overwatch, but it takes strategic thinking, split-second decisionmaking, dexterity, hand-to-eye coordination, and strong cognitive abilities to be good at this sport. And the team right here is the best in our nation.

After going 33 and 0 in the regular season, HU went on to defeat New Jersey Institute of Technology and Maryville University, before taking out the University of Utah in the championship match. HU's championship and their success in Esports is pointing a spotlight to our city, our State, and our region. Coupled with the efforts of nonprofits like Whitaker Center and the Pennsylvania Esports Coalition, professional franchises like the Philadelphia Fusion and Susquehanna Esports, and a growing list of high schools here in central PA, the Commonwealth is becoming a hub of Esports activity.

I want to acknowledge the leadership of Harrisburg University. We have Doug Firestone, to my far left; we have Brian Humphrey; we have the coach, Coach Gramano; and Chad Smeltz. They had the foresight to see the potential that

competitive video gaming could have on the growth of the university, and it has put the city of Harrisburg at the epicenter of the growing sport, Esports movement.

So once again, Mr. Speaker, I want to congratulate these student athletes at HU for their tremendous accomplishment going down in history as the first-ever Overwatch Collegiate National Champions. Please congratulate the team with me.

The SPEAKER. The majority Appropriations chair, Stan Saylor.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I, too, want to join with Representative Kim in thanking the university and its students for their great accomplishment. When you think about these are students who competed against every university in this country, some of our best and finest, and Harrisburg University is the national champion, what a great privilege to bring back to Pennsylvania. Thank you to all the participants in all you guys did and the coach for a great job.

I want to thank you for that. It shows that Harrisburg University is a first-class university and we have them right here in our capital city of Harrisburg.

Also, I want to make one more note that really does not go with this team but it goes for the university to show what a class act this university is. Last year they placed 100 percent of their graduates in jobs, 100 percent.

So again, congratulations to the students and the university for a great accomplishment to bring back home to Pennsylvania a national championship.

And with that I will turn it over to Representative Kim to talk about the students.

DAYTON PITZER PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Mike Reese, Representative Eric Nelson, please come up to the rostrum with Dayton and his family, and they are going to tell you why he is here.

Mr. Speaker, it is my honor to present to the chamber today an outstanding Mount Pleasant athlete, Dayton Pitzer. Dayton will be a sophomore this year at Mount Pleasant Area High School. Mr. Speaker, he did all of this while carrying a 3.9 GPA (grade point average), while serving as class president, along with raising animals for the 4-H program and volunteering at a local nursing home. Mr. Speaker, Dayton Pitzer is exactly the student athlete we want to promote in our Commonwealth. He is a role model for all of those athletes coming up behind him, and I am certainly honored that he hails from my hometown of Mount Pleasant.

Therefore, I ask my colleagues to join me in celebrating not just an outstanding athlete but an outstanding person in Dayton Pitzer.

So let us all give a big round of applause to these two young men and a fine example of western Pennsylvania athletics.

STATEMENT BY MR. PYLE

The SPEAKER. Representative Pyle.
Mr. PYLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I wish to thank the membership for their positive vote for HR 365 that creates a day to recognize a very rare disease encountered here in the Commonwealth, cystinuria. Cystinuria is an inherited condition characterized by the buildup of amino acids within the body, cystine, in the kidneys and the bladder. It is commonly found in foods such as eggs, meat, dairy products, and whole grains. A person with cystinuria has the inability to process the amino acid, causing it to be reabsorbed into the body and then deposited as crystallized stones in the kidney. It is estimated that 1 in every 10,000 Americans are at risk of cystinuria, and there are only 30 reported cases in the Commonwealth.

Today we have someone who knows about cystinuria on a firsthand basis. Sitting in the well right now is our friend, Kelly Waters. Kelly, could you please stand up and give a wave. Thank you. Kelly was diagnosed with cystinuria at the age of 13 after experiencing excruciating pain in her kidneys. That is something I know a little bit about. The first surgery she underwent was the hardest. The stone removed was almost as big as the kidney itself. As a result, she has had over 50 surgeries on her one remaining kidney – also something I know quite a bit about. She lives in constant pain and lives with the fear that her son, Aiden, who is also here today – Aiden, can you give me a wave; thank you – she lives with the fear that Aiden might someday have to deal with this. She has to take more time off than allowed due to doctor's appointments. To date, there is no effective treatment or medication for people with cystinuria, but with continued research successfully someday there might be.

I thank you for recognizing June 24, 2019, as "Cystinuria Awareness Day."

And, Mr. Speaker, may I introduce our guests?

The SPEAKER. Please, if you would, Representative Pyle. Thank you.

I submitted this amendment based on an experience I had when I was serving in local government. We had our own police force and they were participating in a task force that was being run by the Montgomery County District Attorney's Office. All of that worked out fine until we realized that – and the District Attorney's Office would reimburse the borough for the cost of payroll for the police for the time that they were working, but one of the effects that it had was that officers who were later in their tenure were working a lot of overtime and this was then factoring into their pensions, which was the sole responsibility of the borough. And so looking at that, we ended up withdrawing and withdrawing our police officers from the task force because it was really exploding the cost for some of our pensions.

And so my thought was that if there was a memorandum of understanding between the local municipality, which is actually the employer of those local police officers, with the AG's Office, that that would help local governments to avoid having this kind of a situation. I have had conversations with the AG's Office and they have said that it is a little bit more complicated than just this and they would be willing to have a conversation about working this into the ultimate bill.

Mr. D. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, there is a lot of good I find and I appreciate the gentleman's effort in relation to HB 1522 as a whole. I think that there are some very good recommendations that it is building off of and I appreciate that.

There are some things that my amendment is different, but I want to be clear that it does aspects of the same thing. First, it makes sure to remove a requirement in relation to DCNR (Department of Conservation and Natural Resources) training for every junior firefighter who is in an urban setting. So if your fire department is in a city, knowing that fighting a forest fire of any type or size is really not going to be a reality, both the bill and my amendment would remove that requirement.

The second thing I think they both kind of share in common with it is that it allows a junior firefighter in rural settings to do everything but forest fire operations, so all the supportive roles and other things that a junior firefighter may do in a rural setting. The difference that comes up with it is in relation to what a forest fire operation may look like in regards to a junior firefighter. And here is where I think that the DCNR training is something we should not let go of. So what my amendment does is it says that if you are going to deploy a junior firefighter in permissible forest fire operations, that junior firefighter should still have the DCNR training. So again, if you do not deploy the junior firefighter in a forest fire, it is irrelevant, but if you do deploy them, they should have the training.

Admittedly, there is a bit of a question here as to where we are trying to get at. I know that there are some good examples of places that could qualify for some type of operations, meaning that it would not take a lot of training for somebody to take a can and to deploy it on a small brush situation on the side of a road. My concern with the bill as written is that I do not see the top line of delineation so clearly when you remove the entirety of the DCNR training. And what I mean with that is that I am concerned that without my amendment you will find a junior firefighter who is deployed in situations that go too close to a supportive firefighter role in a forest fire operation. For example, I think that most people would agree that under no circumstances should a junior firefighter be deployed in digging trenches in a forest fire situation without training, without that DCNR training as well.

So my amendment makes sure that if you are going to deploy, under existing terminology that we have here, if you are going to deploy a junior firefighter, should it be done in a situation where there are supportive roles of a forest fire, they should continue to have the DCNR training.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Ecker, on the amendment, sir. Mr. ECKER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I appreciate the good gentleman's concern for our volunteer firefighters, especially our junior volunteer firefighters, but I think the key here that everyone needs to understand is that Federal regulations do not allow junior firefighters to fight forest fires or even offer any support services that deal with extinguishing forest fires. So there are very few things that junior firefighters can even do as it pertains to forest fires, that being clearing fire trails, the construction or maintenance of patrolling fire lines, piling burning slash; these are types of things that basically they can only do when there is not an active forest fire

present. If there is an active forest fire present, these junior firefighters are not even permitted to be in those areas under Federal regulations.

What this bill does is eliminates a barrier for our junior firefighters, to take a training requirement away from those folks that and those companies that do not encounter these types of fires with any kind of frequency. So this bill helps our volunteer fire companies. We know we have a problem in recruiting young folks into the fire service. We are trying to tear down those barriers. That is exactly what this bill does.

So in that regard I would ask that we vote "no" on this amendment. Thank you.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mr. RABB submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

My bill, HB 1519, would provide critical funding for specialty crops in Pennsylvania, with priority given to those crops not supported by the Federal program. These funds will help enhance the competitiveness of Pennsylvania specialty crops through increasing consumer awareness; improving distribution systems; developing good practices for small farmers, packers, and processors; investing in research; and improving pest and disease control while supporting sustainability. Crops that are important to Pennsylvania like hemp, hops, hardwoods, and honey will be able to apply for this funding.

Pennsylvania has expanded hemp production, which has shown us the need to study this crop so it can realize its full potential. We lead the nation in our craft beef industry but need to continue to invest in opportunities for PA farmers to better grow hops to meet the demand for local PA Preferred products. And Pennsylvania is an international leader of hardwoods and forest products, which my bill would also support as an eligible specialty crop.

I am especially proud that my bill will dedicate funding to the rural and urban municipalities that have suffered from multigenerational poverty. Sixty-two percent of the municipalities in PA are considered rural, and my bill would dedicate funds to those rural municipalities where at least 20 percent of the population remains below the Federal poverty line of the past 30 years. Similarly, 38 percent of PA municipalities are urban and a portion of funds will be dedicated to urban areas that have suffered from multigenerational poverty.

Agriculture is truly ZIP Code neutral, and my bill will ensure that funds are invested across the State, including in the areas most in need.
