(I) the motion pertains to a person who is the subject of an active criminal investigation with a reasonable likelihood of securing an arrest or prosecution in the foreseeable future; and

(II) there is reasonable suspicion that a criminal act has occurred.

(ii) Data obtained by a law enforcement agency under this paragraph shall only be used to establish probable cause to obtain a search warrant or arrest

warrant.

(iii) Requests made to the Office of Attorney General to query the system under this paragraph shall be made in a form or manner prescribed by the Office of Attorney General and shall include the court order, when applicable. Each individual designee of the Office of Attorney General shall have a unique identifier when accessing the system.

(iv) The Office of Attorney General shall not query the system for information regarding a drug-related overdose event.

(12) An authorized employee of a county or municipal health department may query the system if the employee has a unique identifier when accessing the system and the employee accesses the system for any of the following purposes:

(i) Developing educational programs relating to prescribing practices and controlled substance abuse.

(ii) Identifying at-risk individuals for the purpose of connecting them with addiction treatment professionals and programs, including single county authorities.

(iii) Compiling epidemiological data to ensure the security of the system when an authorized employee of a county or municipal health department accesses the system.

(c) Consolidated standards permit.—A person conducting remediation activities under this act may obtain a consolidated standards permit. The following shall apply:

(1) A person who is issued a consolidated standards permit in connection with the remediation activities under this act is not required to obtain a permit, license, plan approval or other approval in connection with the activity under the act of June 22, 1937 (P.L.1987, No.394), known as The Clean Streams Law, the act of January 8, 1960 (1959 P.L.2119, No.787), known as the Air Pollution Control Act, the act of July 7, 1980 (P.L.380, No.97), known as the Solid Waste Management Act, the act of July 13, 1988 (P.L.525, No.93), referred to as the Infectious and Chemotherapeutic Waste Law, the act of July 6, 1989 (P.L.169, No.32), known as the Storage Tank and Spill Prevention Act or other Federal statutes relating to environmental protection or the protection of public health. A person who obtains a consolidated standards permit under this subsection is deemed to be in compliance with the requirement to obtain a permit, license, plan approval or other approval in connection with the activity under the applicable provisions of those acts and regulations.

(2) The department shall grant or deny a consolidated standards permit within 120 calendar days from its receipt of an application. The department may extend the review under this paragraph to comply with required Federal notice requirements.

(3) No later than January 1 of each year, the department shall submit a report to the Environmental Resources and Energy Committee of the Senate and the Environmental Resources and Energy Committee of the House of Representatives on the utilization of the consolidated standards permit.

First, I want to just express my gratitude to my colleague from Centre County for offering this bill, working with interest groups to do his best effort to get this passed, and I do understand that this is anticipated to be one step on a road that is not complete so that we can offer the citizens in the Commonwealth the best opportunity for care.

This bill has to do with stage IV metastatic cancer, pretty serious event. I am going to be a "no" vote today and I am going to be a "no" vote for the express reason to remind this chamber and hopefully the Senate as well that we have a way yet to go. This bill, as I understand it, prohibits the use of off-label medication for the treatment of stage IV metastatic cancer. And if you have gotten that diagnosis, it is a very serious event. And

if your health-care provider thinks that he or she has enough information that they are willing to prescribe something because they have done maybe some personal research into it, that should not be prohibited by an insurer under any circumstance.

So for those reasons today – again I want to thank my colleague from Centre County – my "no" vote is a reminder that we are not done working on this topic yet.

The SPEAKER. Representative Benninghoff, on the bill.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I respect the gentlelady's comments and she has always been very gracious to discuss this issue, which I know is both professionally and personally very important to her.

I want to compliment Chairman DeLuca last week for helping us get the amendment done.

Very simply for me, Mr. Speaker, this is about patient care. This is about us as a chamber bipartisanly saying that patients ought to be able to have access to medications that may not necessarily be part of a regimented protocol but a physician feels are appropriate, they are USFDA (United States Food and Drug Administration) approved, and if the physician believes that pill number four is better for you than trying to fail first at number one, two, and three, we think stage IV metastatic cancer ought to have that opportunity.

I would ask the members for their support. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And I appreciate the chamber's support. Thank you.
