HR 247 is a resolution memorializing Congress to facilitate and ensure implementation of the VA Maintaining Internal Systems and Strengthening Integrated Outside Networks Act of 2018. The VA MISSION Act is designed to overhaul and reform the Veterans Choice Program, along with other facets of the Veterans Health Administration, and strengthen its ability to deliver health care by consolidating VA community care programs into a single program that is much easier to navigate, expanding eligibility for Program of Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers, strengthening the VA's ability to recruit and retain the best medical providers, and strengthening the VA's infrastructure.

The MISSION Act will strengthen the VA's nationwide VA Health-Care System by empowering veterans with more health-care options. Through the MISSION Act, veterans will have more choices than ever in getting timely, quality health care. More importantly, veterans will be able to decide what is important and best for them.

The Commonwealth is home to nearly 1 million men and women who have served. As one of those veterans, I believe this is a much-needed reform. Veterans need this reform to ensure they receive the quality and timely care they were promised when they put on the uniform.

Thank you to my colleagues for recognizing the important function of the MISSION Act and for adopting this resolution today.

The SPEAKER. Representative Frank Farry is going to be recognized on unanimous consent, and I am going to ask everybody to please take their seats. I know it is a busy day here with a number of the code bills in front of us, so please, members, if you could take your seats.

STATEMENT BY MR. FARRY

The SPEAKER. Representative Farry, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. FARRY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank the members for their unanimous support on HR 343 yesterday. We specifically chose the Resolution No. 343 because that is the number of FDNY firefighters that were killed in the line of duty on September 11.

What this resolution does is it asks Congress to fund the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund. If you did not see the Jon Stewart video when he testified before Congress a few weeks ago, it is worth the 10 minutes of your time to see that testimony. Right now that fund is underfunded and the payments that the victims from the 9/11 Fund will be receiving will be greatly reduced. This is probably one of most egregious things that I have seen the Federal government do.

There are over 90,000 victims that have been impacted because of the health effects of what happened on September 11, including 1500 Pennsylvanians. My great colleague here from Montgomery County spoke eloquently yesterday about the loss of his brother because of the health effects on 9/11. I do not think we can be any more compelling than that.

There are a few Congressmembers in Pennsylvania who have not signed on to the bill, and we do not know if it has full support of both of our Senators. So I just ask my colleagues – obviously, the resolution is going to be transmitted to their offices – but if you have any contact with your Congressman or Congresswoman or any of the two U.S. Senators, please encourage them to support and fully fund the 9/11 Victim Compensation Fund. Thank you.

As one of the members of the PlanCon Commission who spent 2 years visiting public schools across this Commonwealth, I am glad that this bill is finally coming up for a vote today. However, for the benefit of my colleagues, I feel the need to draw attention to an amendment that was put in in the Appropriations Committee last night after 8 p.m. In this amendment, in lines 14 to 15 of the bill, it struck out the language defining an "Emergency" as one that would put "the health, safety, or welfare of students at risk."

The PlanCon Commission heard testimony from districts across this Commonwealth – urban and rural, suburban districts – that told stories of schools where water was impacted by lead, where asbestos on the third floor of the building was preventing the districts from using those spaces, where temperatures that were too hot or too cold were preventing students from coming to school in the summer or in the winter periods.

Mr. Speaker, I will be voting "yes" on this bill today, but I hope as we continue to work on PlanCon and finally, finally remove the moratorium with funding, hopefully in next year's budget, that we will consider instances that put the health, safety, or welfare of students at risk as true emergencies and make sure that we are moving funding to those projects that solve those problems.

The SPEAKER. Representative Stan Saylor, on SB 700, sir.
Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The reason for the amendment on SB 700 was because it had the wrong wording of the commission's report. My good colleague from Delaware County knows that the report did not say the things that were in that legislation. We simply struck out that language because that was not in the report. And I am sure we would not want to change and misrepresent a report that she and I both voted on. This simply puts into law those things that the commission – which was made up of administrators from across this State, school directors, and superintendents, along with legislators, other independent groups – it simply makes sure that the report is accurate in this piece of legislation.

Mr. FRANKEL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I want to thank my colleagues for considering this amendment.

Simply put, it is not appropriate for a State advisory council to create clinical practice guidelines. Illinois passed a bill with strikingly similar language to create a strikingly similar advisory council, also charged with creating clinical practice guidelines. The treatment of children with rare neurological illnesses is not a geographic matter; it is a scientific and it is a medical one. Why are the States of Illinois and Pennsylvania deciding how children with a complex, rare disease should be treated, especially one where the medical community is still in vigorous debate about how prevalent that disease is and what the treatment looks like?

After all, these diseases are poorly understood and research has produced contradictory results with competing claims and evidence about what children with these symptoms need. That matters, especially when we are talking about advising potentially extreme treatments like antibiotic therapies and plasmapheresis – replacing children's plasma in order to clean their blood.

We searched for other cases of advisory councils in Pennsylvania creating these guidelines, and we have done it, but only in the case of opioid prescribing guidelines to manage a public health crisis, the crisis of addiction and death, not to tell doctors how to treat kids. The Institute of Medicine created standards for creating clinical guidelines that clinicians will use and we can all trust, issues like conflict of interest, description of benefits and harms of each suggested protocol, summary of all the available evidence, and an explanation of the part played by values, opinion, theory, and clinical experience in driving the recommendation.

The goal is to take politics out of the process of determining clinical guidelines, which is why I believe we should take the clinical guidelines out of this task force. The medical community seems to be working toward a consensus on how best to treat these children, and we should not do an end run around scientists and doctors to direct children's care.

So, Mr. Speaker, I would ask my colleagues to support this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Representative Barry Jozwiak, the prime sponsor, on the amendment.

Mr. JOZWIAK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand in opposition to this amendment. I have spoken a number of times on the reason I am the prime sponsor of this bill. I have a constituent in my district who has a child that struggled with PANDAS (Pediatric Autoimmune Neuropsychiatric Disorders Associated with Streptococcal Infections) for many years now, and some of our colleagues have people, constituents that their children have the same problem. A main reason for the struggle is because the disease is commonly misdiagnosed and not treated appropriately. The main and fundamental issue of this bill is that the advisory council meet to establish diagnostic protocols and treatment models to prevent the struggle from happening with other children and families. Without this council giving advice, we will continue to have children struggle with these conditions.

We frequently use advisory councils such as this as a way to bring experts together to establish guidelines around the disease. This will not put into statute those diagnostic protocols or treatment methods, but it will give the professional organizations a starting point with this multidisciplinary approach.

I request a "no" vote on this amendment.

I rise today in support of the parking-protected bike lanes and pedestrian plazas so that Pennsylvania can benefit from this proven lifesaving design, and to thank my colleague from Berks County for his bill.

This bill is very important to Pittsburgh because there are several parked car protected projects that have been put on hold due to the outdated requirements of our Vehicle Code. One such project is located on Forbes Avenue in Oakland, which is a broad, four-lane State road through some of our densest medical and education facilities in Pittsburgh. It connects thousands of residents via car, bus, and bikeways to their jobs, their classes, and to the care of their doctors.

In October of 2015, Susan Hicks was riding home from work when she was killed by a driver on Forbes Avenue. She was a scholar – passionate and brilliant. She loved Shakespeare, Russian films, and riding her bike. I did not know Susan, but I know her friends who loved her. She was a resident of my district and her loss is still felt today in our community.

We need safer streets and this is one tool we can use to create them. Protected bike lanes make our streets safer for everyone, whether you are using an assisted mobility device or walking your children to school, catching the bus to a class for the day or driving your car to work – all without the loss of parking to our business corridors and our residential neighborhoods.

When our streets are safer for cyclists, everyone wins. Thank you so much for your support.
