The amendment recognizes that a hybrid vehicle, which uses some gasoline and is powered the rest of the way by electricity, has already paid some gas tax for the portion that is driven – the portion of the time that the car is actually driven by gasoline power. So they should not be charged the same amount as a fully electric vehicle, which does not pay any gasoline tax at all. This amendment recognizes the distinction and makes it fair, and I ask the members to support Mike Carroll's amendment. Thank you.

Mr. ROTHMAN. Yes, Mr. Speaker.

Electric vehicles use the same roads that our gas vehicles do, based on about 12,000 miles per year, the average Pennsylvanian drives and at about 25 miles per gallon efficiency and the 57 cents per gallon gas, it works out to about \$272. I believe that the electric vehicles should be on par with the gas vehicles and should pay the same amount, since they are using the same roads.

I would urge my colleagues to support this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you.

Representative Carroll, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. CARROLL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I find myself living in an alternative universe, a House Republican amendment to raise a fee higher than what the House Democrats are eager to see.

Mr. Speaker, the \$150 registration fee for electric vehicles is indexed, as are all the fees, as a result of Act 89, and so the \$150 fee will remain in force for 2 years and then it will be indexed with the cost-of-living increases that are reflected in our budget and in the economy. So the \$150 fee is not static. And secondly, Mr. Speaker, at \$250, as the gentleman proposes, we will have passenger vehicles pay the same fee as vehicles that require a class A or B license to operate, vehicles between 26,000 pounds and 80,000 pounds. Just on fairness, I do not know how we register passenger vehicles at the same fee that we require for vehicles that necessitate a class A or a class B license.

So, Mr. Speaker, the \$150 is an accommodation relative to the gentleman's math, which is correct with respect to the amount of dollars that are paid by an average user of an average vehicle with respect to number of miles driven. But, Mr. Speaker, it just seems to me that \$250 is probably too high. I will concede that the \$150 may be too low, but I do not know how on fairness we have passenger vehicles registered at the same fee that it takes to operate a vehicle that requires a class A or class B license.

So, Mr. Speaker, I would ask for a "no" vote on the amendment. My suspicion is that the Senate will have their say on this bill and that the fee discussion that is under way today will not be concluded today but, in fact, will continue as the bill moves through the process.

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1100, PN 1593**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of March 4, 1971 (P.L.6, No.2), known as the Tax Reform Code of 1971, providing for energy and fertilizer manufacturing tax credit.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Representative Aaron Kaufer, on the bill.

Mr. KAUFER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I stand here very excited to offer this bill on final passage here in front of the House. This bill has become known as the dry cracker bill. But let me tell you what is involved in this bill, because it mirrors our current tax language already that we have here in Pennsylvania, that we have in regard to wet natural gas. This mirrors it for dry natural gas.

Let me tell you a little bit about how it works. This tax credit, in order for it to come into effect, there needs to be \$1 billion spent here in our Commonwealth. There have to be 1,000 full-time jobs here in our Commonwealth in order to receive this tax credit, and none of it is front-loaded. You have to meet these conditions in order for something like this to come into place.

Now, the Department of Revenue put out some numbers that I thought were interesting, because at the end of the day this bill nets the Commonwealth – we receive an additional \$108 million with this bill. Now, they put something out there that this would cost the Commonwealth something like \$27 million, the Department of Revenue and the administration. But you know, I thought it was pretty interesting; they actually cited a Wikipedia page on determining their fiscal note. Now, I learned as a freshman in high school not to use Wikipedia as a credible source, but here we are, the highest levels of government, using it for their fiscal note.

Let us talk a little bit about pollution. From 2011 to 2017, methane emissions declined 24 percent while production grew at 1,000 percent for oil and gas.

Now, let me talk a little bit about our region here for second, because this is important. In the past month, a little over a month, actually, northeastern Pennsylvania is poised to lose 1,000 jobs from announcements by the Governor to close White Haven and our State Correctional Institution-Retreat. We need family-sustaining jobs more than ever, and we are in an international economy. We need to use our natural resource of affordable natural gas to compete with cheap labor overseas. This will literally build family-sustaining jobs. Now, do not take my word for it, but I have a letter here from the Pennsylvania State Building and Construction Trades Council of the AFL-CIO, and it says, "On behalf of our 95 Local Unions and 16 Regional Councils, which represent over 130 thousand construction workers and their families throughout the Commonwealth, the Pennsylvania State Building and Construction Trades Council respectfully requests that you SUPPORT House Bill 1100 which creates" – and now I am still quoting; I am quoting this – "which creates countless jobs in Northeastern PA. Thank you for your consideration on this important issue." Signed by Frank Sirianni and the Pennsylvania State Building Trades.

Now I ask you, Mr. Speaker, this is a generational opportunity, not only for northeastern Pennsylvania, but for all the Commonwealth. We need to take it.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Mary Jo Daley.

Ms. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

So here we are with another massive spending bill outside of the budget process to help big business pay less tax. If we want to make Pennsylvania more business-friendly for all businesses,

why do we not enact combined reporting and reduce the corporate net income tax rate? I have a bill that is supported by the Governor that would do just that, and not only would that go further to energize Pennsylvania for our small Pennsylvania-based businesses, it will also make our Commonwealth more attractive to out-of-State businesses and all industries – all industries.

One of the qualifiers to receive this energy and fertilizer manufacturing tax credit is that the company has created at least 1,000 full-time equivalent jobs during the construction phase. Why are we not saying permanent jobs? What does equivalent even mean? Does that mean they are out-of-State workers making a similar wage with no commitment to employ Pennsylvanians once it is built?

Further, the legislation provides for a 20-day application review period, which is both short and unrealistic. Such a limited review period demonstrates that this bill is not aimed at ensuring that only qualified plants who meet high job standards benefit, but rather to give away millions in tax credits to big business. How could the department verify investment and construction job requirements in the initial year of application, with a 20-day window to approve applications? Pennsylvanians need the department to do its due diligence in reviewing these applications to make sure these businesses are following through on their end, preventing potential fraud and protecting the Commonwealth's taxpayer dollars.

HB 1100 has a roughly estimated annual fiscal impact of \$26.5 million per plant. But the department has no way to accurately predict how many plants will exist to take advantage of the tax credit. We could suddenly be talking about \$265 million in one year, which might be good for those businesses, but that is not being responsible fiscal stewards to the people we actually represent.

The department also tells us they have serious concerns with the drafting of the bill that may allow methane purchased from non-Pennsylvania suppliers to generate the tax credits under this proposal. If the plants can obtain resources more cheaply from out-of-State gas producers, this proposal subsidizes those purchases.

Ultimately, we are rushing through a proposal that we have absolutely no idea what the real cost will be or even any guarantee that one of these plants will ever actually exist. The department is telling us that they cannot handle another program this size with these unrealistic timeframes, while we provide nothing to them as additional resources. This is just another giveaway to large out-of-State gas companies.

I will tell you, combined reporting would do more for all Pennsylvania businesses, so we already know there are better options. Please vote "no" on HB 1100.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Josh Kail.

Mr. KAIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of HB 1100, and I have a little bit different perspective than what was just stated. I know a lot of individuals will say that this is just a giveaway to big energy companies, but in my district, it means a little bit more, because in my district, Shell decided to build the petrochemical plant and right now there are 5,500 laborers, steamfitters, operating engineers, all kinds of different trade groups that really benefited from that tax break that Shell got. Additionally, there are going to be hundreds of full-time jobs, beyond the impact of just what is happening on-site. Beaver County went from having 4 hotels to 31 hotels.

Beaver County has seen development that it has not seen in years, in decades. We were decimated when the steel industry left, but now we are starting to see some rebirth. We are starting to see some rebirth because of the energy industry.

I would ask my colleagues to consider the blue-collar work that we can bring back to the State of Pennsylvania and support this bill, HB 1100.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Greg Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to bring to your attention the views of a couple other stakeholders.

Mr. Speaker, over 35 conservation, clean energy, environmental protection, public health, and faith organizations in Pennsylvania oppose this legislation. They call it a large giveaway to the fossil fuel industry. Among that group includes such groups as the Sierra Club, the League of Women Voters, the Chesapeake Bay Foundation, PennEnvironment, Clean Water Action, Clean Air Council. The Sierra Club specifically opposes it, saying, quote, "We oppose subsidies that will expand the use of natural gas and natural gas infrastructure.... Pennsylvania should be working to transition...from fossil fuels, not subsidizing their expansion."

Now, Mr. Speaker, I think this bill is a bad idea and I am going to be opposing it. I think the reality is, if you simply listen to sound science and what scientists tell us, which is the need to become carbon neutral by 2050, you are not going to do that by subsidizing and expanding natural gas and other fossil fuel infrastructure. Sure, we need tax credits; sure, we need to create jobs, but they do need to be jobs with regard to renewable energy, energy conservation, jobs which take us closer to carbon neutrality and not something that locks us into a fossil fuel economy for decades to come.

So I would urge a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. The last person I have is Representative Dunbar.

Mr. DUNBAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

When it comes to tax credits, especially within our caucus, I am kind of recognized as the guy that is always opposed to them. I am the guy that is always complaining about tax credits. But with every tax credit, with every bill, you have to look at it. Look at the pluses and minuses. Look at what all is involved in it.

I give credit to the maker of this bill. It is well designed. It is truly meant to be an economic development tool and not a corporate giveaway. It has performance standards. They have to spend \$1 billion. They have to create 1,000 jobs. They cannot use the tax credits; they can only use 20 percent of the tax credits. There are limits in it as well. If they do not perform, there are no tax credits.

The fiscal note for the House, the House fiscal note said that there would be no adverse impact for Pennsylvania in the next 2 years, but there also was a Department of Revenue fiscal note that said \$26 1/2 million would be the cost if we had one plant; \$26 1/2 million would be the credit. But in order to utilize the credit, they would have to have revenues. They would have to have revenues of \$132 1/2 million – taxes owed to the Commonwealth – in order to use that credit. So if they had credit – if they have taxes due of \$132 million and they are going to take a credit of \$26 million, we are still netting \$106 million. That is economic development. That is not a giveaway. I heard comments like massive spending and things like that. This generates revenues.

There was one other tax credit I voted for, that was several years back, the cracker plant tax credit. I voted for that for similar reasons. This bill is very similar to that.

And I wanted to share with you the Governor's comments, our Governor's comments, on June 7, 2016, at the opening of a cracker plant. This is our Governor, Governor Wolf: "My administration is committed to creating jobs in the energy industry through responsible, well-regulated extraction and long-term, creative industrial growth. We have worked to develop strategies for safe and responsible pipeline development that brings resources to markets and facilities and we have prioritized the Shell plant to show the world that Pennsylvania is a leader in energy manufacturing and downstream production.

"The success of this project is part of a much-needed, longer term plan to translate our abundant resources to make Pennsylvania a leader in downstream production." That was our Governor in June of 2016.

So now we are looking at HB 1100, a bill that is almost identical to that one. So with HB 1100 dollars, we will have potentially a billion-dollar investment; without it, we will have nothing. With HB 1100, we will have 1,000 jobs – good jobs, union jobs; without it, we will have nothing. With HB 1100, we have potentially \$100 million of additional revenues; without it, we will have nothing.

I agree with our Governor, and I think we should do exactly what it says and take our abundant resources to make Pennsylvania a leader in downstream production. So let us show the world that Pennsylvania is a leader in energy manufacturing by voting "yes" on HB 1100.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. We are back to – I forget what Representative Carroll referred to it as – but we are back to HB 1392, PN 2060.

Representative Rothman, I think, on the amendment. On the amendment? Okay.

CONSIDERATION OF AMENDMENT A02828 CONTINUED

The SPEAKER. What we have in front of us is 02828, and, Representative Hennessey, I think, you wanted to speak on it. I apologize, sir. Oh, and then Representative Rabb. So I will do Representative Hennessey, then Representative Rabb.

Go ahead, sir. You may proceed, Chairman Hennessey.

Mr. HENNESSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I ask the members to support the amendment before us. With the amendment the drivers of electric vehicles would be required to pay an amount roughly equivalent to what the rest of us who drive conventionally powered vehicles pay to maintain our roads and bridges in this Commonwealth. The amendment really seeks equivalency among the drivers. We all use our roads and bridges. We should all pay equally to keep them safe. Please vote in favor of this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Rabb.

Mr. RABB. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As an electric vehicle driver myself, I take issue with this amendment. I understand that it has been introduced in good faith, but the reality is, I do not have the same access to the roadways that everyone else has, because there is not the proper infrastructure to allow those of us who drive electric vehicles. There are tens of thousands of gas stations all across this Commonwealth. There is only one fast-charging station in the city of the first class that has 1.6 million people, one fast charger. I cannot go – drive from Philly to Pittsburgh in my electric vehicle unless I want to spend hours and hours and hours finding a charging station way off the turnpike, because there is not a single fast charger on the turnpike. So as much as I want to benefit from being a driver in the Commonwealth and visit all of my colleagues and counties hither and yon, I literally cannot do that. Hither and yon, just for the record, that is both hither and yon. But never yon and hither. I say that to say that the infrastructure does not exist for those of us who are electric vehicle drivers, and we should pay our fair share. We should pay our fair share, and this is not reflective of the reality of EV drivers.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Carroll, go ahead, sir.

Mr. CARROLL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, in the intervening time we had a chance to look at the registration fees for electric vehicles across the State – across the nation, I should say, and I am happy to report if the Rothman amendment is included in this bill, we will be number one. We will surpass Michigan with their \$235 fee and Georgia

at \$213. So the addition of the Rothman amendment to the EV bill will make us number one in terms of registration fees for electric vehicles. Mr. Speaker, I think that is the wrong position to be. I hear over and over folks decry being number one when it comes to fees and taxes. I think the smart play here is not to be number one. Let us be in the middle of the pack with respect to registration fees for electric vehicles. Let us reject the Rothman amendment, keep it at \$150, and continue the conversation.

The SPEAKER. Leader Cutler is going to be our last speaker on this.

Representative Rothman, do you want to speak again or am I going to the leader?

Okay. You waive off. Good.

Anybody else wish to speak before I call on the majority leader?

The majority leader, Bryan Cutler, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. CUTLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I believe that the prior individual left out one important issue, and that is that of tax parity. I believe the prime sponsor of the amendment has already argued that the average cost to a traditional car engine is \$272. The gentleman's underlying bill starts substantially lower than that. It is my understanding that there are currently 9,100 of these vehicles on the road and failure to make the fee consistent with what the vast majority of us already pay will continue to subsidize this business by nearly \$910,000 into the future. I believe that that is fundamentally unfair.

The gentleman also overlooked the issue that we have a transportation and infrastructure system here that is more costly to maintain than some other areas. So I think that we need to address it and we need to start by making it equal amongst all drivers, and while this does not quite get there, I believe it is better than the original bill as proposed.

I would urge a "yes" vote.

I would like to thank all of my colleagues today who cosponsored my resolution recognizing September 16 through September 22 as "Prescription Opioid/Heroin Epidemic Awareness Week" in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

Nearly every community in Pennsylvania has been traumatically affected by the opioid and heroin epidemic, both rural and urban, transforming neighborhoods, leaving children without parents, tearing families apart, and taking lives of young adults and loved ones. The current opioid epidemic is the deadliest drug crisis in American history. In fact, accidental drug overdoses are the leading cause of death for Americans under the age of 50. It kills about 115 Americans every single day.

And while young adults are literally dying in our streets, it remains easier today to get opioids than drugs that treat addiction to them. But it is not just our young people that are being affected. About half of opioid overdose deaths occur among men and women ages 25 to 44, and their children are often the hidden victims of our nation's opioid epidemic. Babies are being born with neonatal abstinence syndrome at increasing rates. In fact, every 25 minutes a baby is born suffering from opioid withdrawal. In 2016, 10,749 children were placed in foster care because of parental substance abuse disorder or an opioid/heroin overdose. Parental opioid and other substance abuse can have a devastating impact on children. The early trauma exposure makes children more likely to suffer later mental health disorders, including substance abuse and post-traumatic stress disorder, creating a vicious cycle for far too many families.

The Commonwealth has worked hard to find solutions to this epidemic, and due to our efforts, preliminary data shows a decline this year in the number of opioid/heroin-related deaths. But we must continue to work together to save lives, improve access to help, and reverse the negative effects opioids have on our communities and on our neighborhoods. We must continue to support and expand funding for the most effective prevention, treatment, and intervention services for individuals who continue to struggle with substance use disorder. We must extinguish the debilitating stigma that surrounds mental and behavioral health, including substance use disorders, which so often deter individuals from seeking treatment in the first place. And we must continue to raise awareness of the possible consequences of the misuse and abuse of opioids, other controlled substances, and prescription drugs, not just for this week that we have been formally recognizing, but until we all recover. Thank you.
