This bill reasonably adds the new drug, Suboxone, which is being used to treat opiate and heroin addiction, and I think this is especially needed, Mr. Speaker, because of an FDA (Food and Drug Administration) report that since the inception of Suboxone, that there have been over 20,000 deaths across the country where Suboxone has been the primary or secondary cause of death. So I think this is needed legislation and would ask the members for an affirmative vote. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. SAMUELSON

The SPEAKER. Representative Steve Samuelson will be speaking on a resolution, and the Chair calls upon Representative Samuelson at this time.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank the House for its approval of HR 456, which I have introduced with Representative Frank Farry of Bucks County. Falls Prevention Awareness Day is an opportunity for everyone, young and old, to learn how to prevent fall-related injuries that affect older adults.

Every year a quarter of Pennsylvania's senior citizens fall. Some of these falls are serious enough to lead to emergency room visits, hospitalization, loss of independence, and in some cases, death. Falls are a major cause of hip fractures and are responsible for more than half of fatal head injuries.

In 2017 the costs for fall-related hospitalizations in Pennsylvania among those 65 and older totaled more than \$3 billion. Falls impact seniors, their families, and their loved ones. If a senior loses their independence due to a fall, families may need to provide more at-home care or be faced with having to put their parent or grandparent in a long-term-care facility. Even falls without an injury can take a toll on a senior's quality of life. Older adults who are afraid of falling may limit their activities and social engagements. This can lead to physical decline, social isolation, or depression.

The good news is that many accidents can be prevented, and that is what Falls Prevention Awareness Day is all about. This year's theme, "Take a Stand to Prevent Falls," calls on seniors, caregivers, family members, and professionals to play a part in raising awareness and preventing falls in our older population. While the focus is on seniors, people of any age can find themselves suffering from a balance disorder caused by health conditions or medication that puts them at risk for falling. We can all do some simple things to reduce the risk of falling such as having your eyes checked and having your prescription drugs reviewed regularly; eliminating fall hazards from the home by removing throw rugs, installing handrails along stairs, staircases, and in bathrooms; and also improving lighting in the home; engaging in exercise that can improve balance and that can help everyone reduce the risk of falling.

Since 2005 the Department of Aging's Healthy Steps program has been helping Pennsylvanians age 50 and older reduce their fall risk through education and exercise classes that improve health, strength, and balance. The department's Healthy Steps in Motion program has reduced fall incidents by approximately 28 percent. Falls do not have to be part of aging. Simple steps can help our seniors and help them keep standing.
