An Act amending the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), known as the Liquor Code, in licenses and regulations for liquor, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages, further providing for sale of malt or brewed beverages by liquor licensees.

On the question,

Mr. **BURNS** offered the following amendment No. **A01546**:

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 1 through 19, by striking out all of said lines and inserting

Amending the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), entitled "An act relating to alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages; amending, revising, consolidating and changing the laws relating thereto; regulating and restricting the manufacture, purchase, sale, possession, consumption, importation, transportation, furnishing, holding in bond, holding in storage, traffic in and use of alcoholic liquors, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages and the persons engaged or employed therein; defining the powers and duties of the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board; providing for the establishment and operation of State liquor stores, for the payment of certain license fees to the respective municipalities and townships, for the abatement of certain nuisances and, in certain cases, for search and seizure without warrant; prescribing penalties and forfeitures; providing for local option, and repealing existing laws," in licenses and regulations for liquor, alcohol and malt and brewed beverages, further providing for renewal of licenses.

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 22 through 25; page 2, lines 1 through 7; by striking out all of said lines on said pages and inserting

Section 1. Section 470(a) of the act of April 12, 1951 (P.L.90, No.21), known as the Liquor Code, is amended to read:

Section 470. Renewal of Licenses; Temporary Provisions for Licensees in Armed Service.—(a) All applications for validation or renewal of licenses under the provisions of this article shall be filed with tax clearance from the Department of Revenue and the Department of Labor and Industry and requisite license and filing fees[, and shall include an application surcharge of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00),] at least sixty days before the expiration date of same: Provided, however, That the board, in its discretion, may accept nunc pro tunc a renewal application filed less than sixty days before the expiration date of the license with the required fees, upon reasonable cause shown and the payment of an additional filing fee of one hundred dollars (\$100.00) for

late filing: And provided further, That except where the failure to file a renewal application on or before the expiration date has created a license quota vacancy after said expiration date which has been filled by the issuance of a new license, after such expiration date, but before the board has received a renewal application nunc pro tunc within the time prescribed herein the board, in its discretion, may, after hearing, accept a renewal application filed within two years after the expiration date of the license with the required fees upon the payment of an additional filing fee of two hundred fifty dollars (\$250.00) for late filing. Where any such renewal application is filed less than sixty days before the expiration date, or subsequent to the expiration date, no license shall issue upon the filing of the renewal application until the matter is finally determined by the board and if an appeal is taken from the board's action the courts shall not order the issuance of the renewal license until final determination of the matter by the courts. The board may enter into an agreement with the applicant concerning additional restrictions on the license in question. If the board and the applicant enter into such an agreement, such agreement shall be binding on the applicant. Failure by the applicant to adhere to the agreement will be sufficient cause to form the basis for a citation under section 471 and for the nonrenewal of the license under this section. A renewal application will not be considered filed unless accompanied by the requisite filing and license fees and any additional filing fee required by this section. Unless the board shall have given ten days' previous notice to the applicant of objections to the renewal of his license, based upon violation by the licensee or his servants, agents or employes of any of the laws of the Commonwealth or regulations of the board relating to the manufacture, transportation, use, storage, importation, possession or sale of liquors, alcohol or malt or brewed beverages, or the conduct of a licensed establishment, or unless the applicant has by his own act become a person of ill repute, or unless the premises do not meet the requirements of this act or the regulations of the board, the license of a licensee shall be renewed. Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, a noise violation shall not be the sole basis for objection by the board to the renewal of a license unless the licensee has received six prior adjudicated noise citations within a twenty-four-month period.

* * *

Section 2. This act shall take effect in 60 days.

The **SPEAKER**. The Chair calls upon Representative Burns, on the amendment.

Mr. **BURNS**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Basically, this amendment just removes it not just for the clubs, but also for the small business owners in our communities, because in good times, we have to give people a break; in bad times, we sit here and ask them to pay more. The LCB (Liquor Control Board) has record profits and record sales. So it is time to give the people that support the LCB a break and let us remove the surcharge, and this is a vote for small business owners in our communities. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**. Representative Jerry Knowles, the prime sponsor, on the amendment.

Mr. **KNOWLES**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would ask for a "no" vote on the amendment. I think it is interesting to note that the gentleman from Cambria County wanted to put this amendment on the bill in committee and he received no second on the motion. No one seconded his motion to include all of the bars. I think we need to remember that this is specifically for our veterans organizations, as well as our volunteer fire companies who are in need of help. Seven hundred dollars to the organizations that we are talking about, it is very important.

So having said that, I would ask for a "no" vote on the amendment.

The SPEAKER. Chairman Jeff Pyle, on the amendment, sir.

Mr. PYLE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Regrettably, I have to also ask the members to vote against this. As the gentleman, Mr. Knowles, pointed out, this bill died for a lack of second in committee. Now, if you are unfamiliar with committee structure, it is 15 majority, 10 minority. No one seconded it. It is probably because the amendment would carry with it a \$12 million price tag to our LCB, and that is not money we are willing to give up. Please vote "no" to the amendment.

The SPEAKER. Representative Tobash is on the House floor.

We are going to go at ease.

The House will come to order.

BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1410, PN 2161**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of December 8, 2004 (P.L.1801, No.238), known as the Transit Revitalization Investment District Act, in general provisions, further providing for declaration of policy and for definitions; providing for military installation remediation; and establishing the Military Installation Remediation Fund.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

MOTION TO POSTPONE

The SPEAKER. Representative McCarter, on the bill.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Is a motion in order, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Just everybody is coming back into their seats. You have order.

Mr. McCARTER. Mr. Speaker, I move to postpone consideration of HB 1410 to a time following the release of the Department of Environmental Protection's preliminary report on water testing for PFAS (perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances) and PFOA (perfluorooctanoic acid) sites identified to be near sites of potential contamination.

The SPEAKER. Okay.

On the question,

Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. On the motion, the majority leader.

Mr. CUTLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the prime sponsor has been working on this bill over the summer. I do not believe that we should delay the discussion of clean water. I would urge opposition of the motion and immediate consideration of the bill. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the motion, Representative Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I remember a former member in defining another problem said the attitude of running the bill goes something like this: Something must be done, this is something, therefore this must be done. And my sense is that is what we are dealing with with the Stephens bill right now. You know, I read this thing at least three or four times and I still cannot figure it out. I made an effort to reach out to the prime sponsor this summer to talk, and that was unsuccessful.

I am just very uncomfortable with this bill in its present form. I do concede—

The SPEAKER. Sir, please, please suspend. If you want to speak out against the bill once we have the vote in front of us, that is fine. But what we have in front of us right now is just a motion.

Mr. VITALI. Right. And in support of why it should be postponed, I am saying it is not ready for prime time and here is why.

The SPEAKER. Okay. It seemed to me that you were arguing against the bill. If you want to talk briefly on the motion— An argument on a motion is very concise and short.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. I think I made my point. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative McCarter, for the second time.

Mr. McCARTER. Mr. Speaker, I never had a chance to speak the first time. You went to someone else before I— The microphone was turned off. All I did was make the motion—

The SPEAKER. Sir, you made a motion.

Mr. McCARTER. —but normally you get a chance to speak to your motion.

The SPEAKER. It seemed to me that you were done.

Mr. McCARTER. Is that correct?

The SPEAKER. You may speak. Go right ahead.

Mr. McCARTER. But it is still on the first time, Mr. Speaker, correct?

The SPEAKER. Sir, speak.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, I make this motion for referral because, as I have carefully watched the evolution of this bill, it has become clear—

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. CUTLER. Point of order, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir.

Mr. CUTLER. I believe the good gentleman made a motion to postpone, and he just referenced a motion to referral. I was curious which one he might be undertaking?

The SPEAKER. He has a motion to postpone.

Mr. McCARTER. It is a motion to postpone. I apologize.

As I have watched this bill come before us, it continues to change and expand as the issue does of PFAS and PFOA. What started out as an issue for the residents in a portion of one member's district has now expanded far beyond that and very well may be statewide. And while the communities of Horsham, Warrington, Warminster, and Warwick Township, contiguous locales to the former Willow Grove Air Naval Station, have surely suffered grievous harm, it is also apparent that the contamination has spread in various degrees to other locations in Bucks and Montgomery Counties as well from this site.

But in fact, 17 other sites outside of southeastern Pennsylvania across the State have already been identified as areas of contamination. This has been acknowledged by the fact that the Governor initiated a PFAS Action Team earlier this year to study the issue and directed the DEP to begin testing the water in more than 350 water suppliers potentially impacted across the State. Mr. Speaker, that testing is now ongoing and a preliminary report is expected later this fall.

I think we are all eager to know the true scope of the problem so that we can address it in a unified and systematic way without having to craft legislation for each separate impacted community. The results of this testing will surely be impactful on how we address the contamination across the State, whether in Erie, Allegheny County, Lancaster County, or Montgomery County. But without knowing the full scope of this problem, the narrow nature of control over the distribution of funding and the decisionmaking process currently contained in this measure raise potential conflicts and many other issues of interest that may tie the hands of other communities trying to seek relief from this contamination problem.

The SPEAKER. Sir, this is a motion to postpone. If your motion succeeds—

Mr. McCARTER. I am speaking—

The SPEAKER. —people— No, no, no. You are on the bill. You are on the bill.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. DERMODY. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Leader, your point of order.

Mr. DERMODY. I believe the gentleman is debating—

The SPEAKER. Do you have a point of order?

Mr. DERMODY. —and giving the reasons why we should postpone the bill, and I think it is right on point to the motion to postpone. He should be allowed to speak.

The SPEAKER. The Parliamentarian suggested that this was far afield from a motion to postpone and I agree.

Mr. CUTLER. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir.

Mr. CUTLER. Consistent with that, I believe the rule is very clear, the only items to be discussed under the rule is the reason to postpone. If we want to get to the underlying merits of the bill, that will happen on the underlying debate of the bill, and I certainly would support defeat of this motion again so that we can get to the underlying bill.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The majority leader is correct.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. DERMODY. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Yes; point of order, sir.

Mr. DERMODY. The gentleman is discussing or debating why it is important that we should postpone the bill and not kill the bill so we can help other sites or at least get information back on what is happening across the Commonwealth with this problem. So that is why he should be allowed to argue why we should postpone this so we can help all Pennsylvanians that will be affected with this problem.

The SPEAKER. What we have heard so far certainly encompasses a motion to postpone and much more.

Do you have a lot more to offer?

Mr. McCARTER. Just a few more sentences, Mr. Speaker, in trying to outline why it is necessary to postpone this.

The SPEAKER. Okay. We will hear them out, and then if I have to interrupt, I will interrupt.

Mr. McCARTER. I have no doubt.

No doubt the additional time will make us all better prepared to make a more thoughtful and meaningful decision on how to craft the best possible response to this serious problem.

Mr. Speaker, the Governor's recent action to provide another \$3.8 million beyond the millions that have already been put forth in support of the residents of the contiguous area around the air naval station provides the resources necessary to help these individuals during the period of time until we get this report to see the scope of the problem in a much better vein.

So I would ask and again for all of us to make sure that we do not create something here with additional information we might be better off in remediating in the future. I ask for your support in postponing consideration until the preliminary report is made public. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. On the bill, Representative Kenyatta.
Mr. KENYATTA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to this bill. I know that— If anybody has their computer screens up, they can see that I was the first cosponsor on this bill because the issue of PFAS in Pennsylvania is an important one and I applauded the maker of this bill for bringing it up. But as I just mentioned, the issues of PFAS are important for all of Pennsylvania and not just for Horsham

Township. Every single resident of Pennsylvania deserves clean water, and the idea that we are going to pass a bill that has operational costs that are to be determined, a bill that is going to allow a shadowy authority to dictate how millions of dollars are going to be spent without any real understanding from this body of where that money is going to go, that is a problem.

Over the summer the Governor, as was said by a colleague, dedicated \$3.8 million toward this contamination, and we need to do more. But as we have had this debate, there were concerns on both sides of the aisle about how this was being done and about what was in this bill. Those concerns still stand. We should have reconsidered, but since that failed, we have to vote against this bill. If we care about clean water, we have to care about clean water across the Commonwealth and not cherry-pick where we want to do it so there can be increased development, and ultimately that is what this is about – increased development.

We have debated in this chamber about clean air, clean water, and it seems like so often those concerns fall on deaf ears. But when it is time to figure out how to build condos, then we want to clean up that location. But when we are talking about mothers and families that just want clean water for their kids, we do not seem to have the money or time.

There are folks whom I know on both sides of the aisle have concerns about this legislation, and you ought to vote with that in mind. Vote "no" on this bill, and let us get real about clean water in Pennsylvania.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Anybody else on the bill?

So we have the Democratic Appropriations chair and the majority leader on the bill.

The Democratic Appropriations chair, Matt Bradford.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I likewise rise in opposition to HB 1410. I would like to quote real quickly an e-mail that we received some months ago from a gentleman named Leo Knepper. Leo stated in a very succinct e-mail on behalf of his group, the Citizens Alliance of Pennsylvania, "The funding" from 1410 "can be used for funding transportation infrastructure, economic development costs, payment of debt service for construction, infrastructure, site preparation, etc. In other words, it can become a slush fund for pet projects. Raising additional concerns is the provision that allows the State Representative and Senator in that municipality, or an adjacent one, to serve as a board member of the established authority."

We can argue about the appropriate way to deal with this issue. I believe Representative McCarter rightly outlined this is an issue that is far greater than one municipality in the county in which I reside. It is frankly wrong to drive funds just to certain chosen cherry-picked municipalities based on the representation of one Senator or one Representative or any political party. I believe we can do far better. I believe there is an opportunity that we missed that Representative McCarter offered us. Until such time, I think we would be wise to follow the admonition of Mr. Knepper and look for ways to create ways to protect our environment, not create slush funds for chosen Representatives and Senators for projects that have nothing to do with the environment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the bill, the majority leader.

Mr. CUTLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, only in Harrisburg can we come and hear people argue against clean water. It really is amazing to me. When you look at the bill, I think it is important to recognize the coalition that has been built around it. And to some of the prior speakers, do I believe that the bill is perfect? No. But quite frankly, none of the bills that we pass are absolutely perfect. We have to operate with what we have when we have it and the information that we have. Delaying consideration of the bill so that we can get a preliminary report, a preliminary report on an issue that first surfaced in 2014, I think it is time that we vote for clean water.

Mr. Speaker, the Governor himself has recognized this issue. Some of our colleagues here in this chamber stood at press events with him as they discussed the distribution of supplies in this area and recognized the importance of it. The good gentleman from Lebanon County rightfully identified the Federal government in our own caucus discussions as the rightful payer. He will work on a piece of legislation, a trailer piece, that will ensure if any funds come in, that we are appropriately made whole.

But let us get to the local level. Who supports it? Well, there are a host of environmental groups – Clean Water Action, PennEnvironment, and PennFuture; so do some of the coal companies – PA Anthracite Council and Calgon Carbon; a variety of building trades. Mr. Speaker, why is that? Because this, as indicated by the prime sponsor, could potentially create over a billion dollars in construction activity on an otherwise useless brownfield; an otherwise useless brownfield very similar to many of the other sites that we have here in the Commonwealth that we just voted to inventory on the good lady's bill, because we recognize that in order to return them to taxpaying parcels, there is some remediation that needs to be done. That passed unanimously. I certainly hope clean water does.

Mr. Speaker, when you look at the jobs that could be created locally, I hope that we all recognize the potential impact of billions of dollars in the local economy. But most importantly, if none of that stirs your concern for this issue in that area, I would simply point you to the millions of dollars the local residents have already incurred.

I had a similar issue in the 100th District, the one that I am privileged to represent. It was a TCE (Trichloroethylene) plume, slightly different but was identified as an environmental problem. DEP appropriately took action. This one is complicated by the fact that it is a Federal actor, one that we should work on.

Mr. Speaker, as for me, I am for clean water today. I am not in favor of delaying that vote. I believe the residents of this area as well as every other area because there are a host of other issues that we need to work at, but we need to start somewhere. The place is now. Here before us we have the opportunity to show that we support clean water, and I would urge all the members of the chamber to do so.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Democratic Appropriations chair, Matt Bradford, for the second time.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you. I rise in favor of good government, and I am glad that the good leader is in favor of clean water, not just today but every day, because some of the votes that we see in this body belie that statement, but I am not going to impugn his integrity or his character like he may of mine. But I am going to say this: We should all be for clean water and we should all be for good government. The simple reality, there is a right way to remediate, and we all know that that does not involve setting up a special

environmental fund for one affected municipality run by their own elected House and Senate member. It is that simple. There is a right and a wrong way to do things, and we all know in our heart of hearts what this turns into – a special fund that is far afield from its original purpose. If we get back to talking about remediation, there is a path forward for this bill, but in its current form, that path has been extinguished in a blaze of insider trading and I do not think any of us are comfortable with that.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative McCarter wishes to speak on the bill.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

It was not my intention to speak again. However, again hearing the majority leader talk about two different things, and that is one of the major problems— Two different things, one of which is clean water. I do not think there is a person in this chamber that does not believe in clean water, and that characterization is absolutely absurd. The second part, though, that the majority leader spoke about was the issue in a sense of redevelopment because this bill tries to do two things at the same time. It is a clean water bill, but it is a redevelopment bill. And that is one of the major problems with this bill. It is not single subject to begin with. It is actually two subjects. And that is a major concern that should be to each and every one of us.

If you want a redevelopment bill, do a redevelopment bill, but then you have to look at that particular project and what is contained there. When I walked the site of that particular naval base recently, what did I see? Tons of excavated soil, contaminated soil sitting on a runway with a tarp over it because nobody will take that soil. Who is going to want to live on that property, buy a house, put a tomato garden in or let your kids roll in the soil?

Let us not kid ourselves. If we are going to talk about a real development project, do that, but if you are going to talk about clean water, let us do that for all the people of Pennsylvania. That is the problem we are facing here. We have a problem with this bill that needs to be addressed, and hopefully we will at some point in the future be able to do that for all communities across Pennsylvania. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The majority Appropriations chair, Stan Saylor, on the bill.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

You know, I find it interesting that this House, the Senate, and Governors in the past have approved brownfield bills – that is redevelopment and that is cleanup. I do not know how you can play politics with the lives of other individuals by sitting down and being hypocritical about what this bill does and what this House has done in the past. I do not know anybody who has criticized brownfields, which are an investment in redevelopment and jobs in Pennsylvania and it cleans up our water as well. So to sit here today and make accusations that this bill is out of line with anything this General Assembly has ever done is absolutely absurd, and I think it is time to understand and put politics aside and understand that this is a community and there are people in this community who are hurting. And if we do not want to fix it, shame on us, but at some point in time we need to address this issue.

So I think it is time to pass HB 1410 and clean this mess up. Maybe we should not be the ones cleaning it up, but we need to stand up and do the right thing today and not continue to put this off onto the citizens of Montgomery and Bucks Counties.

Mr. Speaker, I ask for a positive vote on HB 1410. Thank you.

CONSIDERATION OF HB 1102 CONTINUED

AMENDMENT RULED OUT OF ORDER

The SPEAKER. Representative Josh Kail calls up HB 1102, PN 1595, page 2 of today's House calendar.

Representative Bradford has an amendment, 02895. In consultation with the Parliamentarian, it has been ruled out of order.

HB 1102 creates a freestanding act establishing the Keystone Energy Authority for businesses that use natural gas and its byproducts for family-sustaining jobs, including skilled trades. The Bradford amendment not only expands the bill to add alternative energy sources as part of the qualifications but also adds prevailing wage requirements that are already in place with respect to construction of these facilities and which is not the subject of this particular bill. In fact, prevailing wage is being utilized on construction at the present time. This is not a bill that deals— This is actually very pro-prevailing wage as a project, but in terms of the legislation, it does not need to address that.

This amendment violates Article III, section 3, of the Constitution and House rule 20, which provides that no bill shall be passed containing more than one subject. The Pennsylvania Supreme Court held, in *Commonwealth v. Neiman*, that the subject matter of proposed amendments must relate to the same subject as that contained in the underlying bill.

At this time it is ruled out of order.

And there are no other amendments that are offered.

RULING OF CHAIR APPEALED

The SPEAKER. And, Representative Matt Bradford, the Democratic Appropriations Committee chair.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to appeal the ruling of the Chair.

The SPEAKER. You may, and any argument on this will be beginning with the leaders after you make your appeal. And then I will call on the leaders with respect to arguing on the appeal.

And here is what we have in front of us: Shall the decision of the Chair stand as the judgment of the House? Those in favor of sustaining the Chair's decision will be voting "aye"; those opposed will be voting "nay."

On the question,

Shall the decision of the Chair stand as the judgment of the House?

The SPEAKER. The Democratic Appropriations chair will go first, and then the leaders may speak if they wish to.

You may proceed, Representative Bradford, the Democratic Appropriations chair.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I ask that we appeal the ruling of the Chair. The Keystone Energy Authority creates a new authority to designate 20 zones in which petrochemical natural gas and other downstream

businesses will be eligible for tax exemptions and credits for 10 years. Its estimated cost is \$444 million.

I heard the gentleman moments ago say this is about clean water. Okay? Well, I would argue that this amendment that has been ruled out of order is about—

The SPEAKER. Stop the discussion.

The appeal is on single subject, and you may confine your remarks to the single subject.

Mr. BRADFORD. I am not exactly sure what we are striking, Mr. Speaker, but I will proceed.

Okay. So the single subject, as I understand it, is incentivizing energy here in Pennsylvania. The gentleman in his proposal proposes to incentivize carbon-producing forms of energy, and they, obviously, are one source, but there are many sources. And many times we heard from many different outlets in Pennsylvania that we are in favor of all of the above – all of the great sources of energy that are abundant here in Pennsylvania. Some of those sources happen to be carbon-free sources of energy.

For those of us who believe that climate change is real and believe that there is a need to go down the path of a cleaner, greener economy, we would argue that rather than incentivizing exclusively, not saying that there should not be some incentives, but if we are going to incentivize largely multinational, multibillion-dollar petrochemical companies, maybe, maybe there should be a seat at the table for some portion of that incentive to go for solar; maybe, maybe something crazy we could do, hydrothermal; maybe we could do batteries; maybe Pennsylvania could also be on the forefront of a green energy boom as well.

I do not think one has to come at the expense of the other, but I believe that the ruling of the Chair makes it such that we have to choose such winners and losers. If one believes climate change is real and believes that we have a need to address that, then we must overrule the ruling of the Chair, because, frankly, we are able to incentivize multinational, multibillion-dollar petrochemical companies—

The SPEAKER. Sir, you are far afield. This is a single-subject discussion. If you want to discuss the bill on "yes" or "no," you can make those arguments when the bill runs on third consideration. This is second consideration.

In addition, your discussion seems to impute some discussion about the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standard, which is already in existence and incents alternative forms of energy. If you want to amend that, that is a bill that you can draft and file to expand those incentives.

Mr. BRADFORD. Mr. Speaker – and please, I appreciate the admonition, and please understand, I am trying to stay strictly on what is in front of us – what I am saying is, the subject is incentivizing energy in Pennsylvania; I am saying one side wants to exclusively incentivize carbon-producing energies and I am saying that this body, by appealing the ruling of the Chair, can say that we can talk about incentivizing all forms of energy, that there is a single subject here – that subject is incentivizing energy – and that if we are going to have a diverse portfolio of energy, not the AEPS, Mr. Speaker – I do not know where that exactly comes from – but if we are going to talk about using all of the strength of Pennsylvania's economy and being ready for the future, that we should incentivize all forms of energy, and that single subject is clearly within the topic.

So thank you, Mr. Speaker, again for that admonition. I just want to say, I think we need to, again, appeal the ruling of the Chair; talk about this amendment, which would allow us to have

a discussion about the single subject of what forms of energy we should incentivize here in Pennsylvania.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

The majority leader, on the appeal of the ruling of the Chair.

Mr. CUTLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, when you have an amendment that is far afield of the underlying bill, you get a debate that is subsequently that as well. It is very simple: This is a freestanding act. So is the AEPS, the Alternative Energy Portfolio Standard, that the good gentleman referenced. They each need to be individually dealt with in their own freestanding acts. Therefore, the amendment is out of order and the ruling of the Chair should be sustained. I urge support of that.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. So the question in front of us is, shall the decision of the Chair stand as the— Do you wish to speak, Representative Samuelson?

Mr. SAMUELSON. Yes. Are we allowed to speak on the appeal?

The SPEAKER. Yeah, you may. You may.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the motion to appeal the ruling of the Chair. I took some time to look at the actual amendment that was ruled out of order. I encourage you to do the same. It is the Bradford amendment 2895. So what was ruled out of order – let me read – "solar electric energy." So if you agree that that discussion is out of order, vote to sustain the ruling of the Chair. "Solar thermal energy." If you agree that that discussion is out of order, vote to sustain the ruling of the Chair.

The SPEAKER. Please suspend.

Mr. SAMUELSON. I am reading from—

The SPEAKER. Please suspend. It is not a discussion on those particular topics. Those bills can be introduced separately. It is whether or not it is contained within the four corners of the bill that is here. It is the ruling, and I read it in detail, and it was based on two particular provisions. We read it in detail with the Parliamentarian, and the Parliamentarian raised the issue with me as Speaker. You are far afield, and you are not speaking precisely with respect to the ruling of the Chair.

Mr. DERMODY. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. You may proceed, Representative Samuelson.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you—

Mr. DERMODY. Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. You may proceed with the admonition given by the Chair. You may proceed, Representative Samuelson.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. DERMODY. Mr. Speaker? I am not going to—

The SPEAKER. Sir, just if you have a point of order, say point of order.

Mr. DERMODY. I have a point of order, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. There are rules and you can—

Mr. DERMODY. Well, I have a point of order, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Yes. What is your point of order?

Mr. DERMODY. The point of order is, the gentleman is discussing the subject of the bill, and because we disagree with your ruling, he is suggesting why we disagree with your ruling because the amendment is relevant—

The SPEAKER. Let me be particular—

Mr. DERMODY. —and is a single subject. Now, he needs to be allowed to make his argument because we disagree with what your ruling was. He is allowed to state the reasons why we disagree and how this does not violate the single-subject rule. As a matter of fact, it enhances it.

The SPEAKER. Correct, but it was not on the topic at hand. And the ruling will stand, and you may proceed, and you have been given an admonition.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. CUTLER. Point of order, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Yes, majority leader.

Mr. CUTLER. Mr. Speaker, if I may offer some clarification. I do agree that the good gentleman should be able to make the argument regarding whether or not the ruling is in order. However, the ruling was that it violates the single-subject rule, and while the good gentleman's debate has been strictly centered around whether or not you support certain kinds of energy or not, I believe that that is far afield and that your ruling is correct. So we need to talk about the single subject.

And again, I would simply point the members back to the fact that they are both independent, freestanding acts. Basic statutory construction says that is how they are drafted and that is how they need to be amended. This is out of order because it does not do that. It is not speaking to the support of any individual area of energy production or another. The process by which the act that the gentleman is citing and the amendment references is independent and can be independently offered as a bill and moved forward accordingly through the regular committee process just as this bill was. It is simply stated in the rules.

The good gentleman has ruled from the Chair that the amendment is out of order. That is the correct ruling by a clear reading of our rules and the application of the case law that was cited by the Chair. And I would urge the members to confine their debates to that area.

The SPEAKER. Representative Samuelson, the majority leader is correct.

Mr. SAMUELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I will try to be concise in my conclusion. My understanding is the bill in chief is financial incentives for energy production. Representative Bradford had an amendment that was ruled out of order. Reading from the first few lines of this amendment, the topics in this amendment that are ruled out of order include "solar," "wind power," and "hydropower." I disagree. I think we should be allowed to talk about that. And I think the amendment should be in order. So I urge a vote to not sustain the ruling of the Chair. Let us have this discussion on alternative energy sources, including "solar," "wind power," "hydropower" – I am reading from the text of amendment 2895.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And you know, I reluctantly get up and I just think you are just wrong in this particular ruling. You know, this bill is part of the Energize PA package, and wind and—

The SPEAKER. Sir, please, please suspend. You would be far afield even if you were talking on the bill itself, but we are on a ruling with respect to a violation of the single subject.

Mr. VITALI. Got it.

The SPEAKER. You are far afield.

Mr. VITALI. Well, I will disagree with you on that point because the subject—

The SPEAKER. But I get to make the rulings as Speaker, and you are far afield. And you are an exceptionally smart legislator. You are far afield on that.

Now, if you want to—

Mr. VITALI. You are making me blush.

The SPEAKER. —discuss energy policy, the rotunda is available and you can have a press event at any time you want, but we are on the ruling of the Chair. That is it.

Mr. VITALI. Got it. Okay. So it is single subject, and I would argue that the subject is energy, and I would argue the subject is energy because this bill is part of the Energize PA package and this bill creates an energy authority and this bill creates an energy enhancement zone.

So I would argue that the subject of this bill is energy, and I would also argue that wind and solar and geothermal are energy. So I think in this particular case when the Speaker rules that that is a different subject, I think he is dead wrong. We are talking about energy. The Bradford amendment clearly is introducing a vital other type of energy. It is the same subject. And I do think that we should overrule the ruling of the Chair.

The SPEAKER. All those in – let me be precise about this and I apologize – those in favor of sustaining the Chair's decision will vote "aye"; those opposed will be voting "nay."

On the question recurring,

Shall the decision of the Chair stand as the judgment of the House?

I have some comments I would like to submit for the record on HR 467. Thank you very much.

Ms. DELOZIER submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I want to thank my fellow members for recognizing October as "Domestic Violence Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania with HR 467.

More than 10 million people are abused each year in the United States. In Pennsylvania, 122 people died from domestic violence incidents in 2018. The deaths last year occurred in 36 counties in Pennsylvania, including one death in Cumberland County, which I represent. It weighs heavily on my heart. Domestic violence is a scourge in every segment of society. The victims are all ages, races, income levels, and education levels. Some of those killed last year were young children, whose potential in life will now never be known.

With this resolution, I hope we can further raise public awareness about domestic violence. As part of Domestic Violence Awareness Month, a red silhouette will stand in the Capitol Rotunda to highlight the devastation brought about by domestic violence. The red silhouette is part of the Silent Witness Initiative. I urge you to find time to visit this tribute and consider what you can do to prevent domestic violence.

We need those who are experiencing domestic violence to know they are not alone. There is help available. I encourage victims to reach out and learn from others who have left their own abusers.

Pennsylvanians can come together and say we will not tolerate this behavior. This resolution sends a strong message from those of us in State office.

It is important that we help these victims come forward and raise the public consciousness. October is an opportunity for us to publicly pronounce that we will fight for victims, we will be a voice for the voiceless, and we will educate those around us.

Mrs. TOEPEL submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The "Someone You Know" event was created to raise awareness of the growing opioid crisis, remove the stigma attached to drug addiction, share experiences, and urge people to seek treatment. Since my career in public office began, I have been a firm supporter of those who struggle with physical and mental health issues. Opioid addiction is no different. I proudly support efforts to curb the prescription of narcotics and bolster treatment options for individuals who have become addicted.

I commend Independence Blue Cross Foundation on its campaign to remove the stigma of opioid addiction and help people find the help they need to recover and heal. I was happy to author HR 494, along with my colleague, Rep. Dawkins, to designate September 25, 2019, as "Someone You Know Day" in Pennsylvania. It is my hope that by designating this special day, we can focus more attention on this important public health crisis.

Unfortunately, what began as a short-term treatment for those with medical ailments has often turned into a long-term addiction that is tearing apart families and destroying lives. This crisis did not happen overnight, and it will take continued outreach and action on all of our parts to get this epidemic under control and make sure everyone has access to treatment. I truly believe that through positive reassurance and support, we can encourage individuals and their families to seek the help they need to lead long, fulfilling lives.
