The girls piled up victory after victory this season. They played a 12-game regular season against local teams and went undefeated. They advanced to postseason play and met Chester Valley in sectionals where Levittown United won both games by double digits to claim the Section 8 Championship. They went to the State tournament where the ladies defeated Caln Little League, Towanda Little League, and the Keystone Little League to win their second State championship in as many years.

After this distinct honor, Levittown progressed to the Eastern Regional Tournament to compete with teams from New Jersey, New York, Maryland, Delaware, Connecticut, Rhode Island, and

STATEMENT BY MR. WILLIAMS

The SPEAKER. Representative Williams, the floor is yours, sir.

Mr. WILLIAMS. Mr. Speaker, thank you so much.

It is true that no action, no words will ever fully heal our country's wounds from the devastating terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001. On that day nearly 3,000 people from 93 nations died. In the aftermath, we as a collective cried, we felt unsafe, we felt unsure, and we mourned the losses of so many loved ones. But in addition to that, we prayed.

We also witnessed something grow out of the ruins in New York City, as well as Washington, DC, and the Shanksville area here in Pennsylvania. We were blessed with countless heroes, women and men who sacrificed and risked everything to save others. That list of heroes includes approximately 414 first responders and emergency workers who paid the ultimate price, losing their lives on that day.

In the 18 years since 9/11, we have continued to mourn. Every one of us has his or her own way of reconciling the events on that day. Pastorally, I have discovered strength in prayer, as I have prayed with families who have lost loved ones on September 11th and continue to pray in regards to those who died since that day from illness and complications associated with the devastation of that morning. I have also prayed for our country's continued resolve, that we remain steadfastly committed to joining together across religious as well as culture lines, to see the beauty in one another instead of focusing on our differences. And I pray for the first responders and their families, especially

those emergency workers who took their final breaths on that day.

And so it is with that in mind that I drafted HR 471, which allows all of us in Pennsylvania to formally express our gratitude to the fallen and exemplify our unity with the rest of the country. It would officially recognize the National Days of Prayer and Remembrance in Pennsylvania. Each year the National Days of Prayer and Remembrance fall on the last Friday, Saturday, and Sunday before September 11th. They commemorate a time of reflection, a time to honor those who lost their lives in service to this country as well as its citizens.

Thank you, colleagues, for your support of HR 471, and again, Mr. Speaker, thank you.

STATEMENT BY MS. RAPP

Now, I have never been one to ever follow football in any way, shape, or form. However, members of this House, I am greatly honored to rise and ask and thank you for your support of HR 478, which recognizes the tremendous life and achievements of one of Crawford County's most notable residents on the 150th anniversary of his birth.

Born on October 23, 1869, John William Heisman was raised near Titusville, played football near his father's local oil cooperative, and graduated from Titusville High School in 1887.

The founder of the American Football Coaches Association, just some of his legendary innovations include legalizing the forward pass, the center snap, the scoreboard, and the creation of game quarters. John Heisman also became a champion for increasing player safety by advocating for gear improvements and rule revisions.

The Heisman Trophy, which is named in his memory and has become college football's highest amateur honor, has been won by many gridiron greats, including Penn State's John Cappelletti and the University of Pittsburgh's Tony Dorsett.

In recognition of this extraordinary college football pioneer, I thank my fellow members for unanimous passage of HR 478, recognizing the great John Heisman.
