PRAYER

May we continue to learn from our own setbacks and defeats, seeking wisdom and courage to allow them to be learning opportunities and moments of growth.

And third, for them to win required the dedication, sacrifices, and talents of many team members, coaches, and support staff, family members and fans. May we recall and acknowledge with gratitude all those who work directly with us, who counsel and support us, and especially those who do the day-to-day ordinary tasks, often behind the scenes, who allow the team to win.

And finally, we remember all those members of our families, any friends who are sick and suffering, may they have wise and compassionate caregivers, and may our deceased loved ones rest in peace. Amen.

An Act amending the act of June 3, 1937 (P.L.1333, No.320), known as the Pennsylvania Election Code, in preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions; in the Secretary of the Commonwealth, providing for requirements for disapproval or decertification of voting apparatuses and for census outreach; in district election officers, further providing for compensation of district election officers; in election districts and polling places, further providing for restrictions on alteration; in nomination of candidates, further providing for petition may consist of several sheets and affidavit of circulator, for manner of signing nomination petitions and time of circulating and for nominations by political bodies; in ballots, further providing for form of official primary ballot, for form of official election ballot, for number of ballots to be printed and specimen ballots and for forms of ballots on file and open to public inspection and ballots and diagrams to be furnished to candidates and parties; in voting machines, further providing for requirements of voting machines and for form of ballot labels on voting machines; in electronic voting systems, further providing for requirements of electronic voting systems, for forms, for election day procedures and the process of voting and for post election procedures; providing for voting apparatus bonds; in preparation for and conduct of primaries and elections, further providing for manner of applying to vote and persons entitled to vote and voter's certificates and entries to be made in district register and numbered lists of voters and challenges, for method of marking ballots and depositing same in districts in which ballots are used, for instructions of voters and manner of voting in districts in which voting machines are used, for count and return of votes in districts in which ballots are used, for what ballots shall be counted, manner of counting and defective ballots and for canvass and return of votes in districts in which voting machines are used and providing for deadline for receipt of valid voter registration application, for appeals and for appeals to court of common pleas; in voting by qualified absentee electors, further providing for applications for official absentee ballots, for date of application for absentee ballot, for approval of application for absentee ballot, for absentee electors files and lists, for official absentee voters ballots, for delivering or mailing ballots, for voting by absentee electors, for canvassing of official absentee ballots and for public records; providing for voting by qualified mail-in electors; in returns of primaries and elections, further providing for manner of computing irregular ballots; providing for dissemination of information and for jurisdiction; removing references to the Traffic Court of Philadelphia; and making related repeals.

SB 694, PN 1284

Amending the act of July 20, 1979 (P.L.183, No.60), known as the Oil and Gas Lease Act, providing for cross unit drilling for unconventional wells.

CABRINI UNIVERSITY MEN'S LACROSSE TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative O'Mara is welcome to speak. Ms. O'MARA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And thank you for the opportunity to recognize this extraordinary group of college athletes. It is with great honor that I welcome Cabrini University's Men's Lacrosse Team to the House chamber today in recognition of their winning the Division III National Championship.

The Cabrini University Cavaliers beat the Amherst College Mammoths 16 to 12, earning them their first NCAA Championship. Not only is this victory an impressive milestone for the men's lacrosse team, but this was the first-ever national title earned by any varsity athletic team at Cabrini University. It is also the first lacrosse team of any school in Pennsylvania to win a national title.

The team is led by head coach Steve Colfer, accompanied by associate head coach Ron Garling and assistant coaches Kevin Camp, Stephen Hill, Shawn Kaplan, Lucas Spence, and faculty mentor, Dr. Jennifer Bulcock.

During the title-winning game, goalie Riley White had 11 saves and 9 different Cavaliers scored goals. One player among them was Timmy Brooks, who returned to the field for the first time since recovering from his early season injury and scored the game-winning goal.

I applaud the men's lacrosse team and their coaches for making history at Cabrini University, and for their unwavering dedication on and off the field, which undoubtedly led them here today.

As an indication for the stellar teamwork and extreme effort put forth by the Cabrini University Men's Lacrosse Team, I would now like to present them with this citation congratulating them on this triumph. And selected by Cabrini University to accept the citation on behalf of the team behind me are President Donald Taylor; Brad Koch, director of athletics; Catherine Corcoran, associate athletic director; Stephen Colfer, head coach; and Ron Garling, assistant head coach.

Thank you all for joining us today. Thank you to all of the players. I know for some of you this was your first trip out to the Capitol. I hope you enjoy this momentous occasion.

Colleagues, please join me on congratulating Cabrini University Men's Lacrosse on their first NCAA title.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative O'Mara, and congratulations to the Cabrini University Men's Lacrosse Team. That must have been quite a win that went over Amherst, really outstanding. We hope to see you back again next year to those that are returning.

VAUX BIG PICTURE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS INTRODUCED

The SPEAKER. Representative McClinton or Bullock, please proceed.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We are so excited. Right now in the main rotunda these youth who are sponsored by #CLOSEthecreek are having a rally on criminal justice reform, and they are coming to uplift their voices on different injustices they see in this world that they are fighting to change. But the school is not in the 191st District, so I will call up the gentlelady from the 195th, my colleague, my sister Rep, Representative Donna Bullock.

It is an honor for me to welcome the students from Big Picture Vaux High School, located at 24th and Master, right in the heart of the 195th District. It is truly an honor to see these lovely students and have them engaged in this process here at the Capitol, making their voice heard about an issue that is important to them around criminal justice reform.

The SPEAKER. While they are taking a photo, Ethan Shaffer, in the rear of the House. Where is Ethan? Ethan is back there. He is a legislative assistant to Representative Comitta in her district office. Thanks for being with us, Ethan.

Is Professor John Kennedy here? Professor, please stand. And he has with him students from West Chester University. They are taking a Pennsylvania government and politics class, and they are guests of Representative Carolyn Comitta. Please stand, all of you. Thanks so much for being with us. Thank you.

Anna Duncan. Where is Anna? Anna is shadowing Representative Lewis for the day, and she is a senior at Lower Dauphin High School. Great to have you, Anna. Thank you so much.

Representative McCarter, if you will please come up to the rostrum. We are going to be having him introduce some high school champions that have traveled a good distance to be with us today. We will bring the entire team down to the well of the House. Oh, we have some of the captains and coaches and administrators right here. When you are introduced, gentlemen, please raise your hand.

The entire team should come down to the front. Members, please take your seats. These young men have traveled at least – I would think about 2 hours, right? – about 2 hours to get here to the Capitol.

Members, please give your attention to this championship team. We are so honored to have them with us today.

LA SALLE COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL BOYS LACROSSE TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative, please proceed, sir.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

I rise with immense pleasure to once again honor La Salle College High School's State Championship Team.

In May we celebrated the Explorers State Championship Hockey Team on the floor of the House, and today we are recognizing the La Salle College High School 2019 Class AAA Pennsylvania Lacrosse Champions and their coach, Bill Leahy. This Explorers team did not glide through their season untouched. They lost three of their first four games, enduring a bruising 21-10 early season loss that could have signaled the beginning of a truly terrible season. But it did not because the Explorers never gave up, not once through the whole season, nor in any individual game. They focused relentlessly on improving, even when they won. Immediately after winning the Philadelphia Catholic League title, I believe for the 23d time, en route to winning the State title the team did not whoop it up. They did not embrace or raise the championship plaque. The Explorers huddled up on the sideline and talked about what they could improve upon moving forward. This is a long tradition, instituted and nurtured by Coach Leahy. It is part of the culture of the team.

Coach Leahy teaches players how to be the best players, the best teammates, and the best men they can be. The Explorers here on the dais and on the House floor prove it. The Explorers won their State championship semifinal game 11 to 10 in double overtime, after trailing by six goals going into the fourth quarter, but they dug deep and found a way to win.

La Salle faced Conestoga – a team that had beaten them in a regular season matchup – but in the championship game, they beat the Pioneers 7 to 5 to claim the State title for the fifth time. They just kept digging and improving.

It was the theme of the year and a hallmark for the La Salle program built by Coach Leahy, who retired this year after reaching 512 coaching victories, all of them at La Salle. There are approximately 5500 high school boys and girls lacrosse programs in the country. Coach Leahy is only the 19th coach in the nation and the very first coach in Pennsylvania to achieve 500 wins. I am told that La Salle lacrosse is not about Bill Leahy though; it is about the players. But that lack of ego and purity of focus is Bill Leahy, who coached his boys to be the best players, best teammates, and most importantly, the best people they could be. It shows.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to recognize this incredible young team from my district and separately in a second citation their coach, Bill Leahy, the winningest lacrosse coach in Pennsylvania history.

Representing the team to the left of the Speaker today are retired head coach Bill Leahy; president of La Salle College High School, Brother James Butler; and three senior players – Danny Mallee, Kyle Cullen, and Ryan Meagher.

On the House floor, we have athletic director Joe Parisi; current head coach Rob Forster; associate coach Tony Resch; assistant coach Michael Sabatino; and also joining us in the back are Bill Leahy's parents, who made the journey up from Maryland to also be with us today. Please give them a round of applause.

I would also like to introduce the other players in the well here.

The SPEAKER. Hey, please raise your hand when your name is called.

Mr. McCARTER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Michael Dougherty, Mason Lasasz, Will Vandegrift, Griffin Zobel, Dillon Mollick, Mark Huntley, Luke Hreshko, Jack Pilling, Charlie Huntley, Tim Mehlman, Franky Fix, Kevin Kwok, Vince Morsa, Anthony Rossi, and James Guerin.

Again, I would like to also recognize the other members of the team who either graduated and could not be with us today, many seniors who have moved on to college, and again, I want to make sure that we will include their names on the official record, along with assistant coaches Kevin Dougherty and Brian Harrington, who were not able to be with us today, and neither is assistant coach Andy Hayes, who also was on last year's team.

Mr. Speaker, again, I would ask the members to one more time join me in honoring these exemplary young high school athletes and their coaches for their stellar performances on the grass. They are tremendous ambassadors for Springfield Township in particular, but also for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania as a whole. I am honored to host them on the floor today.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment also adjusts who would be covered by the program to match best practice. The amendment changes the age range to match best practice, including recommended screening for mammograms from 40 to 64 and recommended screening for cervical cancer starting at age 21 through age 64.

The name of the act has changed to match the appropriate program name, and more expansive language is used to cover all people who might be faced with these cancers.

Approximately 30 percent of CTE (career and technical education) students earn at least one certification. A CTE student will spend 3 to 4 years studying and taking multiple tests, such as NOCTI (National Occupational Competency Testing Institute) or NIMS (National Institute for Metalworking Skills), to earn a certification, and this success should be acknowledged.

As a legislative body, we should recognize that these skills are equally as valuable to our State as an IB (International Baccalaureate) or AP (Advanced Placement) successful score, and in fact, a CTE certification is a criteria on the Future Ready PA Index under "Rigorous Courses of Study."

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1459, PN 2816**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 35 (Health and Safety) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for emergency responder mental wellness and stress management; establishing the Statewide Critical Incident Stress Management Program; providing for duties of the Secretary of Health and the Department of Health; and, in emergency medical services system, further providing for support of emergency medical services.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

Representative Schlossberg, do you want to speak on your bill?

Okay. Representative Dan Miller.

Mr. D. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, of course I rise in support of HB 1459, but I did want to take a moment to talk about why I think this bill is so important and why obviously some of it will relate as well to the good Chairman Barrar's 432, which talks about similar issues as this bill. And I just want to share a story really quickly, not because the story that I have is any different than any other firefighter, but I wanted to illustrate the problem that this bill is getting to. Several years ago— Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Yes, Representative, what is up?

Mr. D. MILLER. Can I just have a little quiet, please.

The SPEAKER. Representative Miller, people are listening. Come on; please proceed.

Mr. D. MILLER. All right. You know what, I would appreciate it, Mr. Speaker. There are not too many times I ask for a moment, but—

So on Mother's Day I had a fire, and at that fire a 3-year-old was trapped inside the building. The mother was in the middle of a roadway trying to flag down any help that she could, and like any firefighter would do, I grabbed what I could and I went into that building.

There was no — it was just me in there and thankfully the good training of my department, but it was a big fire, and at that moment my wife happened to be there outside because we were traveling to get to her house for Mother's Day, and she watched as that building collapsed with me in it — at least partially collapsed with me in it —and I struggled to try and find that baby.

Thankfully not too long after that, other departments came to the scene and we had help, and with the good crew of everybody, we tried our best to get that baby on Mother's Day. We were not successful. By the time we got to the child, the child had since passed and the fire had gotten to her, but we wanted to get that baby because it was Mother's Day. So I was able to help kind of package the child up and get her out of there, and obviously that mom had a horrible day. My wife, who was at the scene, saw a lot and we did the best we could.

I ended up going home after that fire and had a tough time with aspects of it in relation to sleeping and then trying to wash what I felt was the feeling of that burned child, to wash it off my hands, and I could not get it off. So my department reached out — it is a good department — they reached out, and I kind of, at first kind of dismissed it a bit with it and I did not think much about it. By that point, I had been to my share of incidents and had been a firefighter for a bit of time and I did not think much about it. And like most people who are firefighters would tell you, you remember certain calls and this I considered to be just one of mine. But as the nights went through, I did not realize that I was yelling, and the dream that I kept having back in there was the 3-year-old was my son and I could not get him out.

My wife was aware of the problems of that, and thankfully, again, I had a good department. And like Representative Schlossberg's bill and more importantly, just as importantly, good Chairman Barrar's HB 432, it seeks to address those moments. A lot of departments have great resources, career unions who fight for good programs to be in place, a lot of good volunteers who make efforts to help when you try to get that off your hands, but that is not everybody.

So HB 1459 is extremely important, and HB 432 just as important for another day, and I wanted to share the story with it because I know you all support firefighters and emergency responders. There is not somebody in here who does not do that. And again, my story is no different than any other firefighter's story. We all have them. Many in this room have more stories than me. But if somebody did not come and give me the help and extend that, I was having problems with that, so that is what is so important about it, and then we sit up here with it and we go, like, this is a great bill and I know you are all going to vote for it. I am sure you will, and I know everybody looks to support the emergency responders, but we just cannot be in the situation where we rely so much on so few to go and do things and then expect that that job does not sometimes carry a cost that, especially in the old days, they might not talk about. They might be unwilling to say that that bothered them.

I know I was unwilling to talk about it because it bothered me, but I had a good department and a great chief and a good assistant chief who care and prioritize these types of things. But we are losing firefighters, we are losing emergency responders, and suicide is a problem. It is a massive problem. So these types of things here we have to be for. They should not be separated from issues of trauma. They should not be separated from issues of trauma.

We have to provide these types of supports. We have to recognize that what we ask these men and women to do carries a cost that often goes beyond the couple months that it really bothered me and sometimes leads to too much where that person ends up making a decision and there is no day tomorrow for that.

So I just wanted to say with it, for all our emergency responders and I know the time is late, but we have to do this bill and we have to do 432, and we have to be able to tell our responders that it is okay to seek help and it is okay to speak up, and not only do we want our departments to have these options, we want to be sure that they are creating a culture where it is accepted to take advantage of those options, and if in the baddest times that trauma becomes too much and you scrub as hard as you can to get that feeling off your hands with it, that it is okay, and it is okay to get some help and to get the coverage you need to be sure that, at least in the workers' comp issues, like the good chairman's bill, that we are going to create a system that is going to care for you.

Thank you for the extra time, Mr. Speaker.

On the question recurring,

Shall the bill pass finally?

BILL ON SECOND CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to second consideration of **HB 1890, PN 2623**, entitled:

An Act providing for the final disposition of fetal remains; and imposing penalties.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on second consideration?

The SPEAKER. There are a number of amendments. Amendments 3537, 3548, 3549, and 3550 have been ruled out of order.

Does anybody wish to object to the order of the Chair with respect to that, or does anybody wish to withdraw? And then I will be calling Representative DeLissio's.

Does anybody wish to speak on those amendments at this time?

Representative DeLissio, I will do your amendment last.

Oh, Representative Cephas' is withdrawn. That is amendment 3537.

Representative Frankel, I will start with you, then Representative Daley, then Representative Fiedler.

Oh, I am sorry. Representative Frankel's is withdrawn. My apologies. So that is amendment 3549 is withdrawn.

Representative Fiedler's is withdrawn. Amendment 3548 is withdrawn.

Representative Daley. Yes, please. Amendment 3550, 03550, the Speaker has ruled it out of order, but the good lady may speak, and if you wish to appeal, let us know.

Ms. DALEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I offer amendment A03550, which would ensure that discrimination related to pregnancy can be addressed. Pennsylvania women need reasonable accommodations relating to pregnancy, childbirth, and related medical conditions. Pregnancy discrimination is widespread throughout the country. And although we usually view it from the lens of pay inequality or job loss, in physically demanding jobs the stakes are much higher. Strenuous work conditions can cause a pregnant woman to suffer pregnancy-related medical problems. A recent study of thousands of pages of court and other public records found physically demanding workload caused women to suffer miscarriages, premature births, or stillbirths. Warehouses, hospitals, grocery stores, prisons, restaurants, and hotels are just some of the job sectors where this occurs.

The only protection for pregnant workers is an inadequate 40-year-old, four-paragraph Federal law, which only allows accommodations if all the employees receive the same accommodations. Without updating Pennsylvania's law to provide reasonable accommodations to pregnant women, pregnant employees are prone to this physical and emotional distress. This amendment would require employers to provide reasonable accommodations to pregnant employees, while also prohibiting pregnancy discrimination and change of terms in their employment.

Stand-alone bills have been introduced in this House since 2013 and perhaps even before that. We say we want to help women and families, and this amendment, A03550, would do just that. HB 1890 involves the outcome of miscarriage; my amendment helps to prevent it.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am withdrawing it.

The SPEAKER. It is withdrawn. Thank you.

On the question recurring,

Will the House agree to the bill on second consideration?

Ms. DeLISSIO offered the following amendment
No. A03595:

Amend Bill, page 1, line 14, by inserting after "conception"
after 24 weeks gestation

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. Representative DeLissio, on the amendment, please.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, currently in law we use 16 weeks as the measure for which remains need to be disposed of in a prescribed manner. The CDC (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention) actually says on average most States use 20 weeks. My amendment is proposing that we use— The current law, the bill in chief here is saying that we should take it down to zero weeks, meaning at conception. So any time after conception a prescribed method of disposing of the remains would have to be followed. My amendment uses 24 weeks, and I chose 24 weeks for the following reason: 24 weeks is what is not only acknowledged as viability medically, but it is also in sync with the definition of a "stillbirth," and a stillbirth would line up very nicely with what is being proposed here for a ritual disposal of medical tissue.

So with that information, I ask for the consideration of my colleagues for 24 weeks.

The SPEAKER. Representative Frankel, on this amendment, right? And I will call on you if you want to speak on the other two, but do you want to speak on this amendment right now? On this one?

Yes; please, go right ahead.

Mr. FRANKEL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of the DeLissio amendment for the following reasons: Pennsylvania law provides for the ritual disposition of fetal remains at 16 weeks now, which is when fetal death is defined in current law. As a reminder, most other States set fetal death at 20 weeks.

In speaking to providers who work with women during this difficult time, it became clear that for many this conversation about burying fetal tissue is an unwelcome one. Women deal with the loss of pregnancy in different ways, particularly early on. We know that 20 percent of pregnancies are lost, most of them prior to 12 weeks of gestation. Countless more fertilized eggs never implant, and we have no idea of knowing how many. Per this State law, all of those would be considered fetal deaths. All of those could have a ritual burial. All of those burials would require contracts with funeral directors.

Pennsylvania requires death certificates and burial for fetuses now. The most appropriate time to set that is 24 weeks, and with that, Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of the DeLissio amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative, do you wish to speak on this amendment?

Yes; you may proceed.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of this amendment. This bill imposes mandates and religious rituals on any person who has an abortion, miscarriage, or miscarriage earlier in pregnancy. Current law requires this at 16 weeks. This bill expands that requirement

dramatically. The bill is a dangerous step to restricting abortion by increasing the cost of a procedure, adding funeral costs, and to shame individuals who have not had full and what are—

Mr. CUTLER. Point of order, Mr. Speaker?

Ms. FIEDLER. —considered healthy pregnancies. This backdoor approach—

The SPEAKER. Yes.

Ms. FIEDLER. —to limit access to abortion—

The SPEAKER. Representative.

Ms. FIEDLER. —by defining—

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. CUTLER. Point of order, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Just suspend for— The leader is entitled to raise a point of order.

Sir, you may proceed.

Mr. CUTLER. Mr. Speaker, I believe it is consistent with our rules not to question the intent or the purpose of an underlying amendment. And while the gentelady may have feelings about this particular issue, I believe she is far afield of the underlying bill as well as the amendment by linking it to abortion. It is a discussion of fetal remains, one of which we already address in law, and I believe the gentelady is out of order.

The SPEAKER. Representative, the issue of the bill, the crux of the bill is what is done with the fetal remains. That is what is in front of us. If you could speak on that essence of the bill.

And I also will call you if you wish to speak on the amendment that you withdrew. I understand there was some agreement between the leaders with respect to that or at least staff members. So I will call on you for that separately.

But please speak on the bill in front of us.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you, Leader.

I would respectfully say that I do not believe that I am speaking about the intent; I am speaking about the impact that will be had on women and their families across the State of Pennsylvania—

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. CUTLER. Point of order, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Sir, you may proceed.

Mr. CUTLER. I believe the gentelady specifically said the intent of the bill and then proceeded to give her opinion of it, which would in fact go to intent. I believe the plain reading of the rule would apply to that.

Additionally, Mr. Speaker, I believe the construct of the debate should be restrained to the 24-week component because that is all the amendment deals with. A debate during final passage of the bill would expand to the scope of the bill. But she is currently off the subject matter of the amendment.

The SPEAKER. Representative, I do understand that in talking about the amendment, its relationship to what the underlying bill is is always going to be a part of discussing the amendment, but the issue of the bill and the amendment is fetal remains, and Representative DeLissio's amendment speaks to what the timetable is with respect to the handling of fetal remains, for the lack of a better phrase. If you could limit it to the amendment and to its relationship to the underlying bill, that would be appropriate, and you may proceed.

And I would just say this, the issue speaks for itself and nobody else has spoken in opposition to this amendment at this time and there may be so nobody has opened a door to a broader issue at all, and that is why we really need you to speak to the amendment and to its relationship to the underlying bill.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of this amendment. I think it is clear the impact that this amendment could have on the lives of women across the State of Pennsylvania and their families.

And I just want to point out as related to this amendment, which is very related to the amendment, since 2011 politicians have quietly passed 394 new abortion restrictions in 32 States across the country—

The SPEAKER. Representative—

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. CUTLER. Point of order, Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER. Representative, with all due respect, the leader's point is well made. Listen, you can issue a press release to that effect. You can have a press event in the rotunda to talk about other legislation that has been passed throughout the country in various State legislative bodies or discuss judicial opinions with respect to the same, but that is not what is in front of us now. Nobody would prevent you from putting that perspective into the public domain through press or outside, having a conference in the Capitol, but that is not what our rules state here in terms of discussing the legislation in front of us. That is where we are.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I look forward to supporting this amendment and standing with every woman today and her family. And thank you for the opportunity to speak about the impact this will have on Pennsylvania women and their families. I appreciate it.

The SPEAKER. Does anybody else wish to speak on the amendment itself?

Representative Frank Ryan. Again, on the amendment and its relationship to the underlying bill, please.

Mr. RYAN. Mr. Speaker, this is not an agreed-to amendment and I would ask for a "no" vote, please.

The SPEAKER. Does anybody else wish to speak?

BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **SB 147, PN 1329**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 34 (Game) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in Pennsylvania Game Commission, further providing for accountability; and, in hunting and furtaking, further providing for hunting on Sunday prohibited and for trespass on private property while hunting and providing for hunting on Sunday without written permission.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?

The SPEAKER. Now, this is a little bit different. This bill is on third consideration.

Representative Kortz, the Parliamentarian has intimated to me that because it is a technicality, that on third we may be able to argue that you do not need a motion to suspend for the amendment. But I am going to ask out of an abundance of caution that you make a motion to suspend. It is a technical issue. It is just a reference to a provision— Please wait. I am just—

Okay. We are not going to need a motion to suspend, according to the Parliamentarian.

Here is what the amendment reads – you can pull it up. Amendment 3567. It should be on your screen. The reference to this section is missing and it is inserting it. It should be "...under section 2303 (b.1) (4) (relating to hunting on Sunday prohibited)."

We are going to permit this vote without a motion to suspend because it is technical in nature and the rules allow that. It should be an exception, not the rule.

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

The SPEAKER. Representative Neilson, do you have a point of order?

Mr. NEILSON. A parliamentary inquiry, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. You may proceed.

Mr. NEILSON. So are we now going to create a new precedent that if it is just technical—

The SPEAKER. No, it has been done before. This is not a new precedent.

Mr. NEILSON. I just want to make certain that this is not a new rule because—

The SPEAKER. No, it is not new. It has been done before. We have rarely done it in my tenure as Speaker. I know there have been— I think as Speaker I have done it before. I know it has been done before. Yes; in fact, the Parliamentarian to the chamber has indicated that it has been done on numerous occasions and it is in the rules.

Mr. NEILSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. But I myself as Speaker have not done it much, if at all. I cannot recall.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of SB 147, and I want to thank my good friend and colleague, the majority chairman of the Game and Fisheries Committee, for his hard work on this measure. I thank the chairman for holding the hearing and moving the process forward.

I also want to thank the members of the committee for their due diligence, their passion and determination to make this a better bill, and it was made much better with the amendments added yesterday. I want to thank the majority leader and the Speaker for bringing this up for a vote today. I also thank the House staff on both sides for their hard work on this bill. It is greatly appreciated. And also a big thank you to the good Senators from Erie and McKeesport who championed this measure.

Mr. Speaker, we are about to make a historic vote today. SB 147 will end a practice that has been around for 337 years. The ban on Sunday hunting for deer in this Commonwealth has been around since the British were here. This bill is long overdue, and it has been negotiated with all the major stakeholders. This bill basically allows Sunday hunting for 3 days only. It makes trespassing a primary offense, and it requires written permission for those three Sundays.

Mr. Speaker, I am honored and humbled to stand before this august body today to ask for your positive consideration of this measure. As I stated earlier, this is a historic vote, and I am respectfully requesting your affirmative vote for this bill.
