This team was made up of mainly underclassmen; however, the leadership of two key seniors, Aaron Nuble and Andrew Czachor. A special shout-out to Andrew. Andrew, can you put your hand up? Oh, Andrew is not here. Well, I am giving a shout-out to Andrew, who pitched 6 2/3 scoreless innings. After going down 2-0 early in the game, Andrew came into the game at a crucial time and he shut the opposing offense down. The Tide was able to mount a three-run comeback and held off their opponents to clinch their first State championship since 2014.

### STATEMENT BY MR. BERNSTINE

The SPEAKER. Representative Bernstine.

Mr. BERNSTINE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I have some very special guests with me here today. Today in the Judiciary Committee we had passed through HB 1855 in recognition of Markie Mason. Markie Mason was brutally murdered in western Pennsylvania by an individual who was recently released from prison.

It is something that hit our community harder than you could ever imagine, and this family has been through terrible tragedy. While this family has been through tragedy, they have also worked extremely hard with me on legislation in order to put something together that would help future children and future residents right here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. So I wanted to thank them for their support, thank them for their bravery, and thank them for their efforts to help Pennsylvanians.

We have Maram Saada—

The SPEAKER. Wait; please suspend.

Members, please take your seats. We are being introduced to some family members with respect to horrific victims of crime. Please take your seats.

Thank you for being with us today.

Mr. BERNSTINE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, we have Markie's mother, Maram Saada. If you could wave when I call your name. We have Maram's best friend, Laquisha Lyles. We have Mark Mason, Sr., Markie's father. We have Kayla Mason, Markie's stepmother. And while the rest of you are up there, I will tell you that I think my favorite one of the bunch is my man, Matthew Mason, a 7-year-old, who is about one of the most bravest 7-year-olds that I ever had the opportunity to be around.

So as we continue to work on HB 1855, I thank the folks behind me for having the bravery and the courage to put Pennsylvania residents first, and we will honor Markie in this House for years and years to come. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Bernstine. Thank you so much, family, for being with us today. God bless. God bless you.

This is on a resolution that we will be voting on later today. It is HR 566, Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month. But Representative Matzie and Representative Warren do have some guests that they will be introducing in their remarks. We will be voting on it later today, so they will be advocating for its passage.

### STATEMENT BY MR. MATZIE

The SPEAKER. Representative Matzie, you may proceed, sir.

Mr. MATZIE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I introduce this resolution designating the month of November as "Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month" to keep a deadly disease in the spotlight.

According to the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network, the disease is the third leading cause of cancer deaths in the United States, claiming more lives than breast cancer, and is projected to become the second leading cause in the near future, possibly as early as next year.

The statistics show that this year alone, more than 56,000 people in the United States will be diagnosed with this deadly disease and more than 45,000 people will die. That is a 2-percent increase over last year. It is hard to see the statistics going in the wrong direction, and it is especially painful to see those we know and love affected.

The disease hit close to home last year when we lost our dear colleague, Flo Fabrizio. Never one to back down from a challenge, Flo put up a great fight but ultimately lost that battle at age 73.

For me, the story hits even closer to home. My mother is a pancreatic cancer survivor. She was one of the lucky ones. The 5-year survival rate for pancreatic cancer is just 9 percent. Mom is at 5 1/2 years. She is a miracle.

Unfortunately, pancreatic cancer often spreads before it causes any symptoms, so by the time a patient sees the doctor, the tumor has already attacked nearby blood vessels or organs and surgery is no longer possible.

In these cases, which are sadly the majority of cases, the only remaining treatment options are chemotherapy and radiation. The news is not all bad. Doctors are learning more about whom the disease targets and how it can be detected. For example, they are discovering that patients who carry certain genetic mutations are more likely to develop pancreatic cancer, as are people who suddenly develop diabetes relatively late in life, like my mother. Knowing that certain individuals are at higher risk affords the possibility of early screening, and new screening tests are being developed as well.

Researchers are investigating using liquid biopsies, which can detect tumor cells in the blood, as well as blood tests that can detect pancreatic cancer based on protein patterns in the blood. Researchers are also developing new forms of imaging, imaging that can detect the disease at an earlier stage. We are also learning more about the disease. Just a few months ago, a researcher at the University of Virginia announced a new discovery regarding how the cancer fuels growth, and of course, there are clinical trials under way as I speak.

What can we do from our end? Well, we could speak out about the danger of ignoring symptoms and make sure Pennsylvanians understand that early detection can mean the difference between life and death. We can continue raising public awareness about pancreatic cancer and advocate for greater funding for research. Through medical research comes experimental drugs, clinical trials, and the first steps toward a cure.

You know, my mom was part of a clinical trial, and prior to her being diagnosed they had just approved the treatment that she underwent. Two forms of chemotherapy were applied to that tumor. It shrunk the tumor enough, it shrunk the tumor enough, and because of the location of that tumor, she was a candidate for surgery. She had the Whipple procedure, she had the tumor removed, and, as I said, is a miracle still with us.

And we can vow to keep pancreatic cancer in the public light until surviving the insidious killer is the rule, and not the exception. And we ask you all to continue to speak out about it. It is so important, and that is why I wear purple today as well,

that being the color for Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month. Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Day is this week. It will be Thursday.

So again, I thank you for your kind attention today. I ask for a vote when it comes to the floor later. Perry Warren, my good colleague, State Representative Warren, will have some comments as well. Thank you.

### STATEMENT BY MR. WARREN

The SPEAKER. Representative Warren.

Mr. WARREN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Representative Matzie.

I am pleased to introduce two special guests today for Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month. In the back of the chamber, Christine Edmonds from Newtown is the president of A Love for Life. Anne Marie Hughes from Newtown Square, in Representative O'Mara's district, is a board member of A Love for Life and a two-time pancreatic cancer survivor, celebrating 8 years this month.

Christine started A Love for Life in honor of her husband, Kevin Edmonds, who exemplified a love for life and who died at age 51 from pancreatic cancer, and Kevin's sister, Nora Edmonds, who always was filled with a love for life and also died from pancreatic cancer also at the age of 51. Both Kevin and Nora were only 49 when they were diagnosed.

Christine and Anne Marie made it their missions to celebrate life and friendship and adventure while funding pancreatic cancer research. Christine and Anne Marie and A Love for Life are dedicated to funding research. In fact, they raised nearly a million dollars for pancreatic cancer research at the Abramson Cancer Center at Penn Medicine. In raising awareness of the critical lack of funding for pancreatic cancer, which has an average survival rate of only 180 days, Christine and Anne Marie are determined to improve outcomes for those who are struggling today and those who will face this challenge in the future. Let us hope and let us work, colleagues, that through the legacies of Kevin and Nora and the efforts of Christine and Anne Marie and their friends and supporters, that someday we will be here commemorating not Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month, but rather Pancreatic Cancer Cure Month.

Mr. **HEFFLEY** offered the following amendment No. **A03878**:

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 1 through 4, by striking out all of said lines and inserting

Amending the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), entitled "An act to consolidate, editorially revise, and codify the public welfare laws of the Commonwealth," in public assistance, further providing for medical assistance pharmacy services.

Amend Bill, page 1, lines 7 through 17; pages 2 through 6, lines 1 through 30; page 7, line 1; by striking out all of said lines on said pages and inserting

Section 1. Section 449 of the act of June 13, 1967 (P.L.31, No.21), known as the Human Services Code, is amended to read:

Section 449. Medical Assistance Pharmacy Services.—(a) Any managed care [entity] organization under contract to the department must contract on an equal basis with any pharmacy qualified to participate in the Medical Assistance Program that is willing to comply with the managed care [entity's] organization's pharmacy payment rates and terms and to adhere to quality standards established by the managed care [entity] organization.

(b) The department may conduct an audit or review of an entity. In the course of an audit or review under this subsection, a managed care organization utilizing a pharmacy benefit manager shall provide medical assistance-specific information from a pharmacy contract or agreement to the department.

(c) A contract or agreement between an entity and a pharmacy may not include any of the following:

(1) A confidentiality provision that prohibits the disclosure of information to the department.

(2) Any provision that restricts the disclosure of information to or communication with a managed care organization or the department.

(d) An entity shall maintain records sufficient to disclose, upon the department's request, information regarding the provision of pharmacy services eligible for payment by the medical assistance program.

(e) Information disclosed or produced by an entity to the department under this section shall not be subject to the act of February 14, 2008 (P.L.6, No.3), known as the Right-to-Know Law.

(f) If an entity approves a claim for payment under the medical assistance program, the entity may not retroactively deny or modify the payment unless any of the following apply:

(1) The claim was fraudulent.

(2) The claim was duplicative of a previously paid claim.

(3) The pharmacy did not dispense the pharmacy service on the claim.

(g) A managed care organization or pharmacy benefit manager may not do any of the following:

(1) Mandate that a medical assistance recipient use a specific pharmacy or other entity if any of the following apply:

(i) The managed care organization or pharmacy benefit manager has an ownership interest in the pharmacy or other entity.

(ii) The pharmacy or other entity has an ownership interest in the managed care organization or pharmacy benefit manager.

(2) Provide an incentive to a medical assistance recipient to encourage the use of a specific pharmacy.

(h) A pharmacy benefit manager or pharmacy services administration organization may not do any of the following:

(1) Require that a pharmacist or pharmacy participate in a network managed by the pharmacy benefit manager or pharmacy services administration organization as a condition for the pharmacist or pharmacy to participate in another network managed by the same pharmacy benefit manager or pharmacy services administration organization.

(2) Automatically enroll or disenroll a pharmacist or pharmacy without cause in a contract or modify an existing agreement without written agreement of the pharmacist or pharmacy.

(3) Charge or retain a differential between what is billed to a managed care organization as a reimbursement for a pharmacy service and what is paid to pharmacies by the pharmacy benefit manager or pharmacy services administration organization for the pharmacy service.

(4) Charge pharmacy transmission fees.

(i) A managed care organization or pharmacy benefit manager shall provide payment for a pharmacy service that is a covered benefit if the pharmacy service is performed by a licensed pharmacist in accordance with all of the following:

(1) The pharmacy service performed is within the scope of practice of the licensed pharmacist.

(2) The managed care organization or pharmacy benefit manager would cover the pharmacy service if the pharmacy service was performed by a physician, an advanced practice registered nurse or a physician assistant.

(j) As used in this section, the following words and phrases shall have the meanings given to them in this subsection:

"Entity" means a pharmacy, pharmacy benefit manager, pharmacy services administration organization or other entity that manages, processes, influences the payment for or dispenses pharmacy services to medical assistance recipients in the managed care delivery system.

"Pharmacy benefit management" means any of the following:

(1) The procurement of prescription drugs at a negotiated contracted rate for distribution within this Commonwealth.

(2) The administration or management of prescription drug benefits provided by a managed care organization.

(3) The administration of pharmacy benefits, including any of the following:

(i) Operating a mail-service pharmacy.

(ii) Processing claims.

(iii) Managing a retail pharmacy network.

(iv) Paying claims to pharmacies, including retail, specialty or mail-order pharmacies, for prescription drugs dispensed to medical assistance recipients receiving services in the managed care delivery system via a retail or mail-order pharmacy.

(v) Developing and managing a clinical formulary or preferred drug list, utilization management or quality assurance programs.

(vi) Rebate contracting and administration.

(vii) Managing a patient compliance, therapeutic intervention and generic substitution program.

(viii) Operating a disease management program.

(ix) Setting pharmacy payment pricing and methodologies, including maximum allowable cost and determining single or multiple source drugs.

"Pharmacy benefit manager" means a person, business or other entity that performs pharmacy benefit management. The term includes a wholly-owned subsidiary of a managed care organization that performs pharmacy benefits management.

"Pharmacy services administration organization" means a person, business or other entity that performs any of the following:

(1) Negotiates or contracts with a managed care organization or pharmacy benefit manager on behalf of its pharmacy members.

(2) Negotiates payment rates, payments or audit terms on behalf of its pharmacy members.

(3) Collects or reconciles payments on behalf of its pharmacy members.

Section 2. The amendment of section 449 of the act shall apply to any agreement or contract relating to pharmacy services to medical assistance recipients in the managed care delivery system entered into or amended on or after the effective date of this section.

Section 3. This act shall take effect in 60 days.

Gubernatorial nominees should be able to choose their running mates, but we need to be able to do it right. Party bosses should not be able to veto this election of the nominees of each party for Governor. So I urge support for this amendment. Thank you.

Mr. **EVERETT**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Senator Argall, the prime sponsor of this bill, does not support this amendment; believes it is unnecessary, that the occasion that this would be possibly required is very remote. I would ask for a "no" vote on this amendment.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to support the Boyle amendment. I think what the gentleman, Mr. Boyle, has provided for us here is a safeguard to ensure that party bosses do not have a veto over the selection of a Lieutenant Governor candidate by the nominee of each party for Governor. That nominee would have been chosen in a primary, chosen by the rank-and-file members of their party to be their nominee for Governor. They are in the best position to decide who should be their running mate.

If we allow State committees to veto that choice, what good can come of that? It only allows for the kind of bargaining and political machinations that can undermine the integrity of that selection process. It is important to note that when a Governor would choose a Lieutenant Governor running mate, it affords them the opportunity to bring balance to the ticket, to reach out perhaps to a faction of their party, to unify their party in going forward in the general election. That is a decision that should be made by the gubernatorial candidate and not by the State committee.

In addition, we should also remember that by allowing the Governor to pick their running mate without party interference, we ensure a more unified executive branch in terms of their service to this Commonwealth.

I wholeheartedly support the Boyle amendment and urge a "yes" vote.

**BILL ON CONCURRENCE  
IN SENATE AMENDMENTS  
AS AMENDED**

The House proceeded to consideration of concurrence in Senate amendments to the following **HB 49, PN 2893**, as further amended by the House Rules Committee:

An Act amending the act of March 10, 1949 (P.L.30, No.14), known as the Public School Code of 1949, in school security, further providing for definitions, for school police officers, for training, for powers and duties, for school resource officers and for school security guards; in high schools, further providing for courses of study; in miscellaneous provisions relating to institutions of higher education, further providing for Public Higher Education Funding Commission; and, in fostering independence through education, further providing for fostering independence waiver program.

On the question,

Will the House concur in Senate amendments as amended by the Rules Committee?

The SPEAKER. So it was a House bill, it went to the Senate, the Senate amended it, it came back to the House, and the House amended it. We are sending the bill back to the Senate if it passes.

So it is HB 49, PN 2893. It is on concurrence in Senate amendments and as amended by the House amendments.

Hold on. We do not have that yet. It is on your screens however. The amended bill is on your screen. I am just going to give you a brief summary. It is a bill that provides for definitions, for school police officers, for training, for powers and duties, for school resource officers and for school security guards. Anything else you want to add to that?

Okay. So this bill was brought up by Representative Rosemary Brown. She is going to speak on both the Senate amendments and the underlying bill, the Senate amendments and the House amendments.

Representative Brown, please proceed.

Mrs. BROWN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Not an easy process. The underlying bill, HB 49, as many of you know I have worked on for several years, is regarding financial literacy for our students before they leave high school and it allows a financial literacy coursework to be applied for graduation requirements; to satisfy the student's social studies, family and consumer science, mathematics, or business education credit requirement.

So I think that is a very positive piece. I am very happy that we have gotten this far, and I think it will really help our students gain further real-life experience before they leave school.

Continuing with that, because it is the School Code, we had made some changes in regards to our school police officers and some of our school safety training, which had a negative impact on our schools and really was not functioning correctly, so this is some fixes to that.

The school police officers, what it does for that – just give me a second – we actually are returning arresting powers to our school police officers that are employed by the school district, which is extremely important for us to have response times. It extends the school security training deadline required by the National Association of School Resource Officers or an

equivalent course for those hired before September 2, 2019, to the beginning of the 2020-2021 school year.

This does nothing to change the training. It does nothing to alter that. It is truly just an extension so that we can realistically have our officers trained without making our schools less covered during that timeframe. And it also extends the Higher Education Funding Commission reporting deadline, which was supposed to be June/July 2020 and gives a few extra months until November 30, 2020.

And lastly, it requires a student seeking a fostering independence waiver to apply for all available Federal and State grants as qualification for the program.

So there are a couple different things added to this bill, but all very good things to help us kind of put through to the finish line.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

**STATEMENT BY MRS. EVANS**

The SPEAKER. Representative Hill-Evans.

Mrs. EVANS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Cigarettes kill 480,000 Americans every year, and more than 16 million Americans live with a smoking-related disease. Between the increased risks of heart disease, stroke, and various cancers and lung diseases, tobacco use remains the most preventable cause of death in the United States. As a result, these products cost our society more than \$300 billion every year, including more than \$170 billion in direct health-care costs and more than \$156 billion lost from lack of productivity.

Nationally, the Great American Smokeout started from an event in 1970 that called for one day of no smoking and the funds used to buy cigarettes would be donated to a local high school scholarship fund in Massachusetts by Arthur Mullaney. From there, events throughout the nation began that included Minnesota and California. Then local communities led smoke-free advocacy efforts, and legislation through local governments started to take hold, placing smoking restrictions in certain public places like the workplace.

Every year, on the third Thursday of November – this year of which happens to be my birthday – the American Cancer Society hosts the Great American Smokeout Day, which is used to encourage tobacco users to quit. Quitting this addiction may be a difficult battle, but the benefits are well worth it when you can lower your risk for lung cancer and other diseases, including respiratory issues and also eliminate secondhand smoke exposure to your family and friends.

On this day, we take time to recognize the health risks posed by these products. This year, this day is celebrated on November 21. It is in this spirit that I ask each of you to give me that birthday gift, for your support to recognize that day as "The Great American Smokeout Day" in Pennsylvania.

We need to educate the public about the truly harmful effects tobacco can have on an individual's health and society at large. Encourage your loved ones and friends to quit, and give them your full support. It could be the first step that leads them to a healthier and happier lifestyle.

Ms. HAHN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HR 507 would direct the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee to conduct a study and issue a report analyzing the cost-effectiveness and overall utility of our various Commonwealth agency hotlines. Right now we operate hotlines for the Department of Aging, Department of Drug and Alcohol programs, Department of Health, and Department of Human Services. These hotlines are meant to help Pennsylvanians get the information they need to take advantage of the various programs available to them.

This study would simply take stock of our existing hotlines and identify areas of which there are redundancies or opportunities for improvement. It is possible that there are overlaps in services. It is also possible that these hotlines could be working better for the people we represent. The fact is that we do not presently know, hence why such a study is so important.

With this analysis, we can garner, number one, the number of hotlines currently in operation; two, the operating hours of each hotline; three, the contact options for each hotline, such as whether the hotlines have corresponding Web pages or mobile apps; and four, the cost to the Commonwealth to maintain each hotline.

These hotlines are taxpayer-funded, which means that the people of Pennsylvania are paying for them. Let us make sure they are getting their money's worth.

**STATEMENT BY MS. OBERLANDER**

The SPEAKER. Representative Donna Oberlander, the majority caucus Policy chair, is speaking on HR 557.

Ms. OBERLANDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I wish to thank the members for their unanimous support of HR 557, which names November 10 through 16 as "Diabetes and Cardiovascular Disease Awareness Week." November is National Diabetes Month, and I wanted to share for a moment the reason why it is so important that we name the week "Diabetes and Cardiovascular Disease Awareness Week" during the month of diabetes awareness.

Approximately 1.4 million Pennsylvanians have diabetes. There are another 3.5 million who are prediabetic. The connection and the link between diabetes and cardiovascular disease is medically proven. Those with diabetes are more likely to develop heart disease and have a greater chance of a heart attack or a stroke. Over time, high blood glucose from diabetes can damage your blood vessels and the nerves that control your heart. Adults with diabetes are nearly twice as likely to die from heart disease or stroke as people without.

But there is good news, and this is the reason why we want to grow the awareness of this connection. There is good news in that if you take steps to manage your diabetes, you will also lower your chances of heart disease and stroke. You can manage your A1C, your blood pressure, and your cholesterol levels; you can develop and maintain healthy lifestyle habits; you can learn ways to manage your stress; you can stay on top of your medication and make sure that you take it; and you can stop smoking and using tobacco products.

Mr. Speaker, I am very thankful that our members also share this concern and want to grow awareness as well.

By adopting today's resolution, we have done just that.

### STATEMENT BY MS. BOBACK

The SPEAKER. Representative Karen Boback, the chair of the Children and Youth Committee, is recognized to speak on HR 572.

Ms. BOBACK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HR 572 recognizes November 23, 2019, as "National Adoption Day" in Pennsylvania and shines a special spotlight on the more than 2,500 children in this Commonwealth who are currently waiting to be adopted. Adoption provides children with a lifetime connection to a family, which profoundly changes the course of a child's life, offering them stability, security, love, and endless opportunities.

In recognizing November 23 as "National Adoption Day," we join the rest of the United States in a collective national effort to raise awareness of the more than 120,000 children across this country who are awaiting adoption. Similarly, we recognize the tireless commitment of adoption agencies and foster programs in advocating for the needs of these children.

Last year there were 4,000 children who had their adoptions finalized on the Saturday before Thanksgiving, in observance of "National Adoption Day." They joined nearly 70,000 children whose adoptions have marked the occasion since the holiday's inception in the year 2000.

All children need love and support to grow to their fullest potential, and all families deserve the opportunity to open their hearts to the love of a child. Thank you for joining me in recognizing November 23 as "National Adoption Day."

### STATEMENT BY MS. DELOZIER

The SPEAKER. Representative Sheryl Delozier is recognized to speak on HR 580.

Ms. DELOZIER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the opportunity to talk about why we need to recognize "Cardiac Arrest Awareness Month." More than 350,000 people in America die each year as a result of sudden cardiac arrest. That is one life claimed every 90 seconds. Among the victims, there are children, a majority of whom have detectable and treatable heart conditions that were undiagnosed because well-child visits with our doctors and with sports physicals have limited scope. Sudden cardiac arrest is not a heart attack. A heart attack is caused by impeded blood flow, while sudden cardiac arrest is a structural or electrical problem, usually stemming from an undetected heart condition.

Automated external defibrillators, as we know them as AEDs, are an important device to save someone who is experiencing sudden cardiac arrest. I thank the businesses, schools, and public locations that have installed AEDs as well as those who have been trained to use them.

The State of Pennsylvania has benefited from the work of a group in my district, the Peyton Walker Foundation, which was established in the memory of a 19-year-old whose life was stolen by sudden cardiac arrest in 2013. Julie, her mom, took possibly the worst event of her life – the loss of her beautiful daughter – and has used it to save so many others.

As we have seen, there are many strong and brave people in Pennsylvania who take a painful event to help others. The foundation reminds us that sudden cardiac arrest is the number one killer of student athletes in the United States. It provides CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) and AED classes, as well as heart screening for students. Education is power. If you know, you can be proactive. Together we can learn about sudden cardiac arrest and how to save someone who is experiencing it.

I appreciate that we are bringing the increased awareness to this issue by recognizing it, and on behalf of the Walker Foundation and the family, I say thank you for your support.

### STATEMENT BY MR. MULLINS

The SPEAKER. Representative Kyle Mullins is recognized to speak on HR 595.

Mr. MULLINS. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

And thank you to my colleagues for your vote in favor of HR 595, designating November 2019 as "Complex Regional Pain Syndrome Awareness Month."

A constituent came into our district office looking for assistance with her ongoing case with the Department of Human Services and her State insurance company. More so, she was looking for help from her local legislator in spreading awareness about her crippling disease. CRPS, which is also called reflex sympathetic dystrophy syndrome, is not well known. Although it affects a relatively small population, these people matter and are deserving of effective health care and they are in a tremendous amount of pain that is often dismissed or misdiagnosed, as there is still not enough awareness in the medical community.

The National Organization for Rare Disorders recently officially designated CRPS as a rare disease. This means that they have determined that there are fewer than 200,000 CRPS patients in the United States. But because so many people are misdiagnosed, we must assume that there are far more than that 200,000 number of people suffering. CRPS is called the suicide disease, as too often people have taken their own life rather than live one more day with the chronic pain. CRPS can be brought on by a simple injury or even by surgery, and the pain continues to spread until it takes over one's entire body – that is, if it is not properly treated. Early intervention is said to be one of the most important things for combatting the pain. My constituent shared that even getting bloodwork done caused her pain to spread more rapidly – the type of labwork that is no big deal to the rest of us.

While the pain disorder dates back to the Civil War, it was not until 2007 that medical literature was finally published and doctors started to become better equipped in treating this disease. But for my constituent, the closest specialist was all the way up in New York State. The bottom line is, there needs to be more awareness surrounding CRPS and better research must be done in order to help the people who are suffering. Therefore, I am proud to introduce this resolution designating November 2019 as "Complex Regional Pain Syndrome Awareness Month" and to acknowledge the critical need for more research on this condition.

### STATEMENT BY MR. DAY

The SPEAKER. Representative Gary Day is recognized to speak on HR 564.

Mr. DAY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, today I rise to recognize an American hero. When we think about heroes, we often think about people who run into burning buildings, like firefighters, police officers, on that thin blue line. We think about people who use their physical skills and abilities to maneuver in dangerous situations. However, some heroes use their intellect to help prevent dangerous situations. That was the case with Vincent Neil DiRenzo. Mr. Speaker, Vincent Neil DiRenzo played a significant role in a historic event that affected the balance of power in the world and forever changed the course of human destiny.

DiRenzo was born in 1928 in Shenandoah, Schuylkill County. That is why our colleague, Neal Goodman, and I worked on this resolution together. He graduated from J.W. Cooper High School and East Stroudsburg State Teachers College, as it was called at the time. He trained and served 4 years with the United States Marines, and while continuing his education as a graduate student at Clark University, DiRenzo was recruited by the Central Intelligence Agency. He joined the CIA as a photo interpreter with the National Photographic Interpretation Center in Washington, DC.

On October 15, 1962, DiRenzo was at the right place at the right time, with the right training. He and his team were reviewing aerial images taken by top-secret CIA-modified U-2 airplanes with a flight over Cuba. While analyzing those images, DiRenzo found something that would alter the course of history. His team found significant canvas-covered objects indicating ballistic missile installations on the island of Cuba. This meant that the majority of the United States was within reach of Soviet intermediate-range missiles, completely changing, if they stayed there, the power in the world.

DiRenzo and his team took this information directly to President Kennedy and explained what they saw and explained how they interpreted what they saw. DiRenzo and his team's discovery led to the tumultuous diplomatic period that we now refer to as the Cuban Missile Crisis. During that standoff, the world stood on the brink of all-out nuclear war. Through skillful diplomacy, President Kennedy and his team were able to negotiate a peaceful resolution to the standoff. The crisis came to an end on October 28, 1962, when the Soviet Union pledged to dismantle the missile installations in Cuba. This epic international crisis lasted 13 days, which forever changed the course of history. If DiRenzo's team had failed to identify those missile installations, it is hard to know just how much the balance of power would have tipped toward communism and away from freedom and democracy.

DiRenzo and his team were highly praised for their performance. DiRenzo later, much later, after I knew him, had received the Intelligence Medal of Merit from the CIA. Back at the time, President Kennedy extended to him a Presidential Commendation. In 2002 DiRenzo's team was inducted into the National Imagery and Mapping Agency's Hall of Fame. In 2018 DiRenzo was posthumously recognized as a Wall of Fame honoree by Shenandoah Valley High School. I say that because Vincent Neil DiRenzo passed away on July 17, 2017.

Mr. Speaker, Vincent DiRenzo was not recognized for running into burning buildings and was not recognized for his policing work. Instead, he became a hero by performing an important job behind the scenes where few people would see or notice his work. Rather than brawn or brute force, he relied on his intelligence and keen insight and training in the battle against evil. By doing his job, he enabled his bosses and everybody up through the chain of command, all the way to the President of the United States, to proactively address a dangerous situation.

Mr. Speaker, Mr. DiRenzo worked with me right when I came out of college and I did not know. He did not go around bragging, "Hey, I'm a Marine. Hey, I worked for the CIA." He did not talk about it at all. Yet he was a mentor of mine, like so many other veterans that go away and fight for freedom and then come back and fight to advance the next generation. He mentored me, worked with me, and he never explained all that. He did not brag or boast. He gave me advice on work, kids, and family. I remember he told me, "If you're going to have children, have a lot of them and have them close together." I do not know why I remember that, but I remember that. With work he told me, "Why are you here? Why don't you go to this top-notch place and get more training and more schooling and more job opportunities?" With family, he also pushed me and said he knew what my decision was going to be, and he said, "You know. Why don't you ask her to marry you?" And he was one of the people who knew what the best advice was for each person.

Mr. Speaker, based on his important role in a historic situation that altered the course of human events, I have introduced HR 564 to mark October 22, 2019, as "Vincent Neil DiRenzo Day" in Pennsylvania. I am grateful for the House's attention to this issue and appreciate the votes of my colleagues in support of this measure.

This means the show dogs must remain on assigned benches throughout the day when they are not being shown in competition, so you can actually go over and meet them.
