Ashley Godshall, a granddaughter; Greyson Moore, a great-grandson, right in the stroller; Linsey Godshall Yothers, a granddaughter; Braeden Yothers, a great-grandson; Tanya Neuman, one of Bob's daughters – Tanya, thank you for being here – with her husband, Gary Neuman, son-in-law. Isaac Early, grandson – another cutie there; Elijah Neuman, grandson; Maggie Friedrich, a granddaughter, with her husband, Dave Friedrich; Caroline Neuman, granddaughter; and Matthew Godshall, grandson.

CONDOLENCE RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The House of Representatives of Pennsylvania wishes to honor the memory of the Honorable Robert W. Godshall, a former member of the House of Representatives who served the 53rd Legislative District with honor and distinction and passed away at the age of eighty-six on November 24, 2019; and

WHEREAS, Born in Souderton on May 15, 1933, Mr. Godshall was the son of the late Enos and Bessie Wambold Godshall. He graduated from Souderton High School and Juniata College and attended the University of Pennsylvania Wharton Graduate School prior to beginning his career with Godshall's Hatchery, which he served as President until 1990. In 1963, Mr. Godshall was elected to the Souderton Area School Board, and he served as the Montgomery County Open Space Director from 1975 to 1979 and as Montgomery County Controller from 1980 to 1983. He was elected to the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania in 1982, where he served the 53rd Legislative District for thirty-six years prior to his 2018 retirement. As a Representative, Mr. Godshall was instrumental in the construction of the Point Pleasant Pumping Station and served as Chair of the House Tourism and Recreational Development Committee during the development of the National Constitution Center. He was the recipient of numerous awards and honors, including the 2011 American Hero Award from the National

Kidney Registry. An avid sportsman, Mr. Godshall enjoyed hunting, fishing, playing golf and supporting Philadelphia professional sports teams; and

REMARKS BY MR. MALAGARI

The SPEAKER. The Chair calls upon Representative Steven Malagari. Representative Malagari succeeded Chairman Robert Godshall in the 53d Legislative District, which is completely contained in Montgomery County.

The Chair calls upon Representative Steven Malagari. Thank you, sir.

Mr. MALAGARI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My apologies for my voice. I have been suffering through a cold, so bear with me. But I thank you for allowing me to be here.

Today we are honoring a true community leader. As we stand here in the House, I know that many people here mourn the loss of a professional colleague, a friend in Robert Godshall and Representative Godshall.

I also offer my deep condolences to his family, who are here today, as they have lost a beloved family member.

Personally speaking, Representative Godshall was my State Representative, and more than that, he was also a kind source of professional knowledge and guidance. And in the 53d District, we have lost a friend, a community member, and a profoundly respected leader. Representative Godshall will always be fondly remembered by the people of the 53d District. I have actually learned a lot about what people care about through how they recall the work that Representative Godshall did for them. He did many great things, but it is the little things he did for the 53d that people often recall to me – a memo, a call, help with a local issue. Sometimes the little things have the greatest impact, and that is part of his legacy to our community.

He supported and championed many local projects. He cared for his people, and he often got personally involved to help them when they needed something from the State. That level of commitment is a model that we should all be emulating for our communities.

I know I am by far not the only member of our community to have a huge amount of respect for the work that he did, but I certainly have a renewed appreciation for, and personal insight into, just how hard he worked over the years. I was fortunate to speak with him regularly in the past year, and I am personally grateful to him for his continued commitment. He was committed to the 53d District all this time, even after his retirement. I know that he wanted to make sure that his community, his people were being supported in all the great, and most importantly, all the little things.

So today we honor a true community leader. We should all honor his legacy by working together to do great things, but we should also honor his legacy by remembering the importance of the little things.

And, sir, right at the end, I am going to have you present that citation.

REMARKS BY MRS. TOEPEL

The SPEAKER. The majority caucus chair, Representative Marcy Toepel, for some remarks with respect to the passing of Chairman Bob Godshall.

Mrs. TOEPEL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My comments are going to be directed to the Godshall family today. I did get to meet some of you at your luncheon, and I spoke to Bob's brother, which is a little disconcerting when you walk in there and you see someone who looks so much like Bob.

But I first got elected in 2010. And I was always impressed with Representative Godshall's keen intellect and his memory. When I first got elected in 2010, we were undergoing redistricting, and one of the first things that Bob said to me is, "Ray Bunt stole Salford Township from me and I'm taking it back." And he told me that every time we ran into one another. And I laughed and I said, "Of course, Chairman, you have seniority and you can take Salford Township back." Well, at that time Ray Bunt was still a lobbyist, and I ran into him a few times here in Harrisburg, and I said, "Ray you're causing me a lot of grief. Every time I run into Representative Godshall he recounts that you stole Salford Township from him." And Ray said, "Well, in fact, I did." So of course, I had to give Bob— He had a keen recollection of how that transpired, and indeed, Ray Bunt, I guess, did steal Salford Township from him and he took it back. So I did lose Salford Township.

But I did get in Representative Godshall's good graces because I found a way to his heart, and I started to bake cookies and cupcakes and bring them to the House floor in the back where Montgomery County sat. Bob had a sweet tooth, which I am sure you know, and he would never turn down a treat.

So I have come to respect Bob over the years. I served with him as the chair of Consumer Affairs. You could not have asked for a better chair of a committee. He really was a brilliant man. And we cannot say enough how much we miss him, not only in Montgomery County, but in this legislative body, because we

could never recount all the accomplishments that he had here for the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. I want to thank you for sharing him with us.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Chairwoman Toepel.

REMARKS BY SPEAKER

The SPEAKER. To the members of the Godshall family, Bob retired, as you know, in 2018. At the time he was the most senior member in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, with 34 years of service to the citizens of Montgomery County and to the entire State of Pennsylvania. He was chair of Tourism and Recreational Development for 12 years, and then chair of the Consumer Affairs Committee for 11 years. During his tenure there were 23 of his bills that were signed into law, and he, I can honestly say, fostered, moved forward, advocated hundreds of other bills that had a significant impact in a positive manner on the citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

The great thing about Chairman Godshall – we meet in the caucus, either Democrats or Republicans, to go over bills, and then also here on the floor. I know you know this, and I do not know if you ever got to see him in action, as Chairwoman Toepel said, but he was brilliant, unbelievably well-prepared. He could not suffer fools well sometimes, but in a good way, because he would always be kind, but if you were not listening to the facts and the narrative from his facts, he could be frustrated.

He was somebody that was truly able to take complex public policy issues, particularly as chair of Consumer Affairs, which regulates broad aspects of publicly regulated entities. In the 21st century, new services, new technologies come into play; a mind like Bob's was able to learn those new industries and where they were headed and how they impacted customers and investors and consumers, just able to pick up the complexity and the direction into which that particular technology or process or industry was headed. And he could bring all the folks from that Consumer Affairs Committee, Republican and Democrat – always had a great working relationship with his Democratic colleagues as the Republican chair, always did – able to take those complex issues and make everybody kind of walk through them together and look for ways that you could be fair and get the best effectiveness out of your regulatory authority without being too intrusive or of a hindrance.

I will tell you that as majority leader and as Speaker, I, in helping to foster legislation, would take problems to him as chair and say, "Bob, what do you think? Can you manage this? Can you move this forward? Do you think we can get to a solution?" Sometimes these were like years in the making, by the way.

All members come here with good purpose and wanting to do good work and diving into the details, but I can honestly tell you – I want you to know this – he was amongst the very, very best ever to serve in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania's House of Representatives, one of the best.

We miss him. I miss being yelled at. But he could also be one of your very best friends – exceptionally loyal, thoughtful, caring.

He loved his family. Doctor, I knew you were an orthopedic surgeon for quite some time because he would talk about you and what you would bring to the table when we were dealing with issues that dealt with the practice of medicine. The chicken hatchery – am I saying it correctly? Do I call them egg hatcheries or chicken hatcheries? I hope I am saying it correctly; you will

correct me. But he would actually bring basic common sense to agriculture for many of us that do not have a background in agriculture like myself. I have learned it from many of my colleagues. He was amongst the best.

His understanding of fundamental constitutional rights. Bob was really just a bright light amongst many bright lights that have served here in the Pennsylvania House of Representatives and a fine, just a fine individual. I do not think I ever saw him not in a suit and a tie and looking prim and proper. He knew the importance of the position, back home and here. He talked about those communities – what Chairwoman Toepel said is actually emblematic of how well he knew his constituents back home. He knew his communities so well.

I just have to say, we are so blessed that you took the time to come in here. And with this condolence resolution, we want to tell you how much he will be missed. He was missed the day he said he was not going to run again. And Representative Malagari will do a great job, as will all those that will follow him. But I just want to you how much he is missed. God bless you and the family, and thank you for being with us today. Thank you.

At this time Representative Malagari and Chairwoman Marcy Toepel are going to bring down the resolutions to you. We actually have two, one to each of, I know, the son and daughter. We could give them to you if that would work, if that would be okay. They will present them to you, and the whole delegation will come down and greet you. And thank you for being with us. Thank you.

The Sergeants at Arms will open the doors of the House.

Cecilia McCormick is with us today. Please come on up to the rostrum. Would members please take their seats. We have a number of important items we have to cover.

CECILIA McCORMICK PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative David Hickernell, chair of the Professional Licensure Committee, has a guest. The new president of Elizabethtown College, Cecilia McCormick, is the 15th president of Elizabethtown College and is the first woman to be president. President McCormick also has with her a member of her administrative team, Ryan Riley.

President McCormick served at an executive level in academic affairs, financial management, advancement, legal affairs, facilities management, and community and economic development throughout her career. She recently held the position of vice provost for academic strategy and special programs at Thomas Jefferson University. She served as the chief of staff to the senior vice president for finance and administration and chief operating officer at Johns Hopkins University. She held positions at Widener University. She received her bachelor's degree from St. Joseph's University and her juris doctorate from Delaware Law School of Widener University. She resides in Elizabethtown with her husband, John; is the proud mother of three sons, Timothy, Daniel, and John; and a grandmother of two, Archer and June.

At this time I am going to invite President McCormick to the rostrum to just say a few words, and I would like us all to give her a great welcome here to the Pennsylvania House of Representatives.

President Cecilia McCormick.

Ms. McCORMICK. Good afternoon, everyone.

Greetings from Elizabethtown College. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the introduction. I just want to say that things are changing at Elizabethtown College, and doing so quickly. We are matching new academic programs to workforce development and making sure that we can make the town of Elizabethtown great.

We are very, very interested in working with all of you, as well as people in industry, to understand what education needs to be and what we need to do to grow it to respond to the needs of the workforce and our world for future work as well as the work that needs to be done today.

Thank you so much. It is my distinct pleasure, and I have been a native Pennsylvanian all my life, so it is wonderful to be a part of the great Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Thanks so much.

The SPEAKER. President McCormick, all the best to you and your entire team and the students and faculty at Elizabethtown College. What an amazing place. We are honored that you would take the time to visit with us today. Thank you.

Representative Sanchez, sir. We are going to briefly open the doors, and then I am going to close them again because this is a bridge naming for a United States Marine that lost his life. So we are going to briefly open, if anybody wants to come onto the House floor. The family members are here.

STATEMENT BY MR. SANCHEZ

The SPEAKER. At this time, Representative Sanchez, I am going to turn it over to you. I know this bill already passed. It was HB 1719, but you will be telling us about whom it was honoring.

Representative Sanchez, please, sir.

Mr. SANCHEZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to honor and extend our grateful thanks to a family who has made the ultimate sacrifice for our Commonwealth and our country. I will introduce the Schultz family in a moment, but first let me tell you about their son, Marine Capt. Samuel Schultz.

During our last session day, Mr. Speaker, we unanimously passed HB 1547, and I sincerely thank my colleagues for their support. In that legislation, we dedicated several bridges in the Commonwealth to various hometown heroes, one of which was naming the Edge Hill Bridge over Route 611, also known as Old York Road, which is located in Abington Township, Montgomery County, as the Captain Samuel Schultz Memorial Bridge.

I direct everyone's attention to the relevant findings set forth in HB 1547. A native of Huntington Valley, Capt. Samuel Schultz graduated from Abington Senior High School in 2008. Following in his family's footsteps to become a pilot, Captain Schultz received his private pilot's license by 18 years of age. After graduation, Captain Schultz enrolled in the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps (ROTC) Program at the Pennsylvania State University.

Captain Schultz joined the United States Marine Corps in 2012, serving as a pilot assigned to Marine Heavy Helicopter Squadron 465, Marine Aircraft Group 16, 3d Marine Aircraft Wing, Marine Corps Air Station Miramar in San Diego, California. On April 3, 2018, at 28 years of age, Captain Schultz was one of four marines killed as a result of a CH-53E Super

Stallion helicopter crash during a training exercise near El Centro, California.

Mr. Speaker, with the naming of this bridge right in the center of Abington Township, we will continue to keep Captain Schultz in our hearts and minds forever. And if I may ask them to please rise, it is now my distinct honor to introduce to the House of Representatives the parents of Capt. Samuel Schultz, Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell and Julie Schultz. Please give them a round of applause.

And joining and supporting the Schultz family here today are their dear friends, William "Bill" Major, John Beck –and you can all rise as I call you – Neil Gordon, and Michele Gladstone. And we have an Abington Township Commissioner, John Spiegelman, here today; and we have Dave Corrigan, who is the Veteran and Military Affairs Representative for U.S. Congresswoman Madeleine Dean, himself a Marine captain; and also from my district office, Morgan Selkirk and C.C. Carpitella. Thank you all.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Sanchez, thank you so much, and to the Schultz family, I hope that you get to travel over that bridge in Abington Township in Montgomery County often. We are so honored to have named that bridge, at Representative Sanchez's request, in the honor of Capt. Samuel Schultz. We are so sorry that you lost him. Thank you for his service and thank you for your service to our country. Let us all give them a round of applause. Thank you so much.

At this time we are going to be inviting up a number of teams that have traveled some distance. There are three of them, and we are going to start with Representatives Malagari, Stephens, and Hanbidge. Please bring up the North Penn Girls and Boys Water Polo Teams. We are going to start with the water polo teams, then I will be bringing up the boys soccer team subsequent to that, but we are going to bring up the North Penn Girls and Boys Water Polo Teams first.

So we have Representative Malagari, Representative Stephens, and Representative Hanbidge. So Representative Malagari will start us off. These are two separate teams, but it is amazing that they have both the girls and the boys that won the championship.

NORTH PENN HIGH SCHOOL BOYS AND GIRLS WATER POLO TEAMS PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Please, Representative Malagari. Thank you. Mr. MALAGARI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is my pleasure to once again honor the two best water polo teams in the State of Pennsylvania, and once again it is my honor to welcome an outstanding group of young men and women from North Penn High School in Lansdale – actually in Towamencin Township.

Today we are joined by the North Penn Boys and Girls Water Polo Teams. If some of these young men and women look familiar to you, it is because this has become somewhat of an annual event for the North Penn Knights. The North Penn Girls team won its sixth – sixth – consecutive State championship in November. It defeated Cumberland Valley in the championship game, with Paige Mitchell scoring on a no-look shot in the final

minute. Several people have assured me this morning that I can learn to do the same thing if I practice for 10 or 20 years.

These girls talked about being a family and they proved it in the pool with their outstanding communication and desire to work together. Six players earned All-State honors, and another two players earned spots on the All-State freshman team. Meanwhile, the North Penn Boys team has been making some history if its own. This group of young men won its third consecutive State championship in October. This year's team consisted of 11 seniors, each of them determined to finish his high school career with another championship. They made that goal a reality when they defeated Cumberland Valley in the State final.

Five of this year's seniors earned All-State honors. This group of young men and women accepted the challenge of trying to continue the legacy and success of prior teams, and in the process, they carved out some history of their own. This is a talented group of student athletes, dedicated to putting in the hours of work needed to succeed in the classroom as well as in the pool.

It has been my privilege to honor these young men and women, many of whom will leave high school after winning multiple State championships. Congratulations to both teams. And while I do not want to add any extra pressure, I will not be surprised to see North Penn return to the Capitol in the near future. Maybe this room needs a pool.

Will you please join me in honoring this group of young men and women with a round of applause.

Representative Hanbidge or Stephens? Representative Hanbidge, please proceed.

Ms. HANBIDGE. There is little doubt that North Penn rocks and dominates at water polo, and we are so, so happy to have you here. We are impressed by your success, and we share, probably, your gratitude with your family, your friends, your coaches – all the people that have seen your sacrifice and have sacrificed along with you to make sure you succeed. So good luck in the future. I hope to see you again soon here, and it is a privilege having you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Todd Stephens.

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Like my colleagues, I am thrilled to honor the North Penn Knights, celebrating yet another victory in the pool, both the boys and girls water polo teams. It is such an exciting event to have championship teams here just for their first championship, but many of you have been here before. This is kind of old hat for you, right? You are getting used to coming up here – taking the bus, hanging out in the Capitol, getting recognized on the House floor. It is just another day in your life, right? No, I think it is just a terrific opportunity for us to say thank you and to recognize the hard work and determination and dedication that it takes to excel and become State champions again year after year.

So thanks so much. My hat is off to you, and best of luck for a bright and vibrant future. Take care.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative.

Up here to my left, the captains of the girls water polo team – please raise your hand – Brigid Huebner and Jane Montague. And then the captain of the boys team, Sage Trautz. Now, I asked them who they beat – both the North Penn Boys beat, Representative Rothman, Representative Gleim, they beat Cumberland Valley. And what was the score of the boys' game? Oh, 12-3. And then how about the girls' game? What was the girls' game, 7-6? And both the boys and the girls beat Cumberland Valley? Oh my goodness.

Hey, anyhow, you are outstanding young men and women. Thank you for being with us. We are going to get your team photos right down here, and we are going to have the women line up on one side, the men line up on the other side, because they are going to take separate team photos, and the Representatives will be with you. Thank you, Representatives.

We are going to bring up the soccer team as soon as we take this photo, and then I think Representative/Chairman Keith Gillespie has a champion as well. And then Representative Gleim, Representative Ecker, and Representative Keefer have some taekwondo champions.

The North Penn Boys Soccer Team; we are going to bring the captains up here and the rest of the team in the well of the House. Members, please take your seats. This team has traveled some distance. There are two citations; one is going to be for the coach and one for the entire team.

PAUL DUDDY PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Representative Malagari is going to start off with the citation for the coach.

Mr. MALAGARI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Well, standing in this position seems kind of familiar. I was just here a few moments ago honoring two teams from North Penn. Well, we have a third team from North Penn here. However, their coach was honored with a very distinct award that I wanted to read.

The SPEAKER. Please hold up, Representative Malagari. All members, please take your seats. The team has traveled some distance to be with us. It is exciting when these young people come up here to be honored by the Pennsylvania House of Representatives. Everybody, please take your seats. Please proceed. We are going to honor the coach first.

Thank you, Representative Malagari.

Mr. MALAGARI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As I mentioned, coach Paul Duddy was honored recently with a very distinguished award, and we have a citation to present to him today. Coach Duddy is a constituent of mine and a resident of Hatfield Township.

"Whereas, Paul Duddy is being honored with the 2019 W. Gene Davis Memorial Award as the Boys' Coach of the Year in the AAAA Division by the Pennsylvania Soccer Coaches Association; and

"Whereas, Head Coach of the North Penn High School Boys' Soccer Team for the past twenty years, Mr. Duddy recently led the team to its first State title in program history. The success of this Commonwealth, the strength of our communities and the overall vitality of American society depend, in great measure, upon the dedication of individuals such as Mr. Duddy who use their considerable talents, energies and resources to serve others. He truly exemplifies the best qualities of the human experience, and his spirit of giving and dedication has greatly impacted the lives of others."

And I would like to present him with this citation signed by myself, Speaker Turzai, and our Chief Clerk. Congratulations.

The SPEAKER. Coach, congratulations. Thank you.

NORTH PENN HIGH SCHOOL BOYS SOCCER TEAM PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Please go right ahead. Thank you, Representative Malagari.

Mr. MALAGARI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This has been a very special one. Several schools in my district have experienced success at the highest level in the State, and this week I will be introducing several of them. I already started out with two of them, so right now it is my pleasure to welcome the North Penn High School Boys Soccer Team.

In November the North Penn Knights capped a championship season by shutting out Central Bucks West in the State title game. The team's defensive display was nothing new. The Knights allowed just one goal in their final three games of the season. On offense, the Knights featured stellar play all season long. As senior Ryan Stewart said, "...we know we're going to score goals...."

This team was led by 14 seniors, and many of them will tell you, this is a championship 3 years in the making. They have overcome adversity, falling short in their two previous State tournament appearances, yet this group managed to grow closer instead of letting losses tear them apart. They remained committed to lofty goals. And they once again set a goal of winning the State championship. North Penn did not lose confidence after an early season loss, and it captured the District 1 championship.

Led by head coach Paul Duddy, this year's North Penn team made school history by securing the program's first boys soccer State championship. Just last week North Penn announced Duddy has been named the State "Coach of the Year." In telling fashion, Duddy credited his players, who he said help keep him young. And he credited his coaching staff, including Chris DePeppe, Pete Phiambolis, and Jesse Scheetz. His remarks are fitting. This program has no individual stars; rather, they are a group. They are a collection of young men focused on being the best team in the State.

Congratulations, North Penn Soccer. Every team in the State dreams of experiencing what you experienced in November. You are one of the very few to achieve your goal. And may you always remember, the setbacks you experienced earlier in your high school careers helped you this season in reaching the biggest stage. May each of you learn from the experience, opting to never give up and keep working alongside others to reach a common goal.

Everyone please join me in giving these young men a round of applause.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you so much.

Representative Hanbidge, followed by Representative Stephens.

Ms. HANBIDGE. Gentlemen, welcome. We are glad to have you for your first-ever State championship. Your 25-1 record this season is a testament to your ability to persevere and be consistent, and we hope to see you next year. Our gratitude to you for coming here. Our pride in your accomplishment – and that of, I am sure, your families, your coaches, the people supporting you – is huge. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Representative Stephens.

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Again, it is such an honor to be here to recognize another North Penn championship team, the soccer team, winning that championship in November of this year. You know, the tenacity, the dedication, the teamwork, and the commitment that it takes to reach the level of excellence that you all have achieved is really remarkable. So my hat is off to you. Congratulations on a great season, and we look forward to seeing you back here in the Capitol celebrating another championship next year. Right, guys? All right. Thanks so much.

The SPEAKER. And the captains of the team, please raise your hand: Ryan Stewart, Carter Houlihan, Mike Chaffee, Jamie Stewart, and Jack Durkin. What was the final score for the championship game? Two to nothing. Who scored those goals? Congratulations. That is great. To the team, outstanding job. Thank you for coming up and joining us.

Coach, keep up the great winning ways. Thank you, sir. Hey, they are going to take a group photo down there with everybody. Please feel free to go down.

Representative Gleim, Representative Ecker, and Representative Keefer, please come on up to the rostrum. We have several taekwondo champions. Please come on up. Please bring up the taekwondo champions, all the way up to the rostrum.

And then Carson, where is Carson? Oh, good. Okay, so bring Carson right on up with Representative Gillespie, Chairman Gillespie, and then just hold the taekwondo champions right there for a second and we will bring them immediately after.

CARSON BACHA PRESENTED

The SPEAKER. Chairman Gillespie, you may proceed.

Mr. GILLESPIE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We are here today to acknowledge the achievement of Carson Bacha, who won his first PIAA State Golf Title on October 21-22 at the Heritage Hills Golf Resort.

Mr. Speaker, a couple of weeks ago I was at an event and I had this green blazer on, and somebody asked me if I won the Masters. I said, "No, I don't golf." But he does.

Carson has been golfing competitively for many years, playing scholastically as a member of the Central York High School Golf Team. He has won three York-Adams Interscholastic Athletic Association titles, two District 3 titles, and a regional title, before finally achieving his ultimate high school goal of winning the PIAA State championship. The tournament featured the full 71-par course being played twice, and Carson finished the 2-day tournament with a score of 134, or 8-under par, to beat the next closest competitor by 3 strokes.

In addition to earning the State title, his score also gave him the PIAA tournament record, beating the previous record by five strokes. Carson has competed in many American Junior Golf Association events, and has accumulated three tournament wins as well as numerous top 10 finishes. He was a member of the 2017 American Junior Golf Association's Junior All-Star Team, and was the 2018 PA State junior champion.

These incredible accomplishments have earned Carson the position of the number 1 ranked junior golfer in Pennsylvania, and 41st in the United States. In addition to his impressive athletic resume, Carson excels in the classroom as well. He has been on the distinguished honor roll every semester since the

seventh grade, and will graduate in May already having accumulated 15 college credits.

As far as Carson's future plans, he has committed to play golf at Auburn University, where he will be majoring in business. Carson has brought tremendous pride to his hometown as the first Central York golfer to win a State title, and the first York County golfer to win the title in 35 years. He is a shining example of where hard work, determination, and grit can get you in life.

Carson, on behalf of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, congratulations on your incredible athletic and academic achievements, a job well done.

Thank you, colleagues. And just to wrap things up here, I would like to introduce Mom and Dad, Kerri and Kevin Bacha – if you folks would please stand – and grandparents Maryann Bacha and James Kohr. Thank you all so much. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Jonathan McNatt is a constituent of Representative Torren Ecker, and he has won several competitions throughout the last years.

Through hard work and dedication, all five of these individuals have captured numerous gold medals over the last few years, even capturing medals at the INAS Global Games, held in Brisbane, Australia.

Representative Nesbit was first elected in 2014 to represent the 8th Legislative District, serving parts of Mercer and Butler Counties. He has admirably served on the Judiciary, Children and Youth, Gaming Oversight, and Insurance Committees. We have with us today his parents, Tom and Betsy Nesbit; please stand.

And at this time I am honored to present to you Representative Tedd Nesbit. Sir.

Mr. NESBIT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, leaders, members.

And I admit, it is a lot different standing up here, so it makes me a little bit nervous. I promise – it has been a long afternoon – so I will try to be brief, but there are many people that I have to thank, so I appreciate your indulgence in allowing me to take a few minutes of your time to thank everybody.

I want to start with my family. He has already introduced my mom and dad. I have been blessed to have parents that have supported me through my entire life and every endeavor that I have tried. It has been a long afternoon for them. They have a 4-hour drive. I appreciate them coming down. Truly, I could not be any more blessed to have greater parents that loved me, supported me, and have encouraged me throughout my life. My kids were not able to make it today, but as all of you know, they are the ones that sacrifice when we have this job, you know, especially some of us that have further trips to make. They have seen me miss choir concerts and swim meets and things like that. I am close with the kids. I want to thank them for all of their time, and they have been out doing all the campaigns, the parades, the signs, going to events. It is not always the most thrilling thing to do as a teenager, especially when your dad is in public life. So I want to thank them. My sister, Margy, and her husband; they have also done all those things, as have my nieces and nephews throughout these many years of campaigning.

I also want to thank my staff, my district staff, for taking care of the constituents and doing the outreach. My Harrisburg secretary, Vickie Trostle. I was truly blessed and lucky to get such a person helping me. She has been tremendous. Apparently, I am not the easiest person to work with because I do not sit still and I am always constantly moving, but Vickie has done a great job in taking care of myself and Paul Schemel. I could have not asked for a better office person than Paul. He and I came in together and he has been great to work with. And Brooke Haskell is my PR (public relations) person, has also done a tremendous job, and Christi Martone, who is sitting with my parents, has helped me both here in Harrisburg and at home. She has done the campaigns for me and basically, you know, sacrificed a lot of her own life to make sure that she is out helping me do some of the things we have been able to do.

You know, as a high school sophomore – 1983 for the year; I am 52 years old – I was in a student council countywide meeting, and it was in the papers. So I got a laminated picture from the paper, the Sharon Herald, from Howard Fargo, who was my State Representative at the time and worked with Dave Reddecliff, and to show you how good of a State Representative he was, he has not been there in almost 20 years, and I had somebody within the last 2 weeks say to me, "Well you're no Howard Fargo." But anyhow, I had a great role model growing up and I said to myself, "I wouldn't mind being a State Representative." And that was 30 years ago. I had that burning little flicker of a light that that would be a good thing to do. Well, it has been a long and winding road that I ended up here, and I am so blessed that I had the opportunity. I have been here for 5 years. I managed to pass five bills. We are working on another one this week. I am proud of the accomplishments, several of which were very good bills. We have one of the strongest bills now on sexual extortion in the country, but it took a lot of people helping. Senator Brooks, but also Joanna McClinton, prime sponsor of several of the bills with me, and I think we have been able to manage to do some bipartisan things to move forward, specifically on criminal justice reform, but I also had an electronic prescription bill, battling the opioid crisis.

So I would encourage you to find ways to work together to get things done. We live in a cynical time, but we have managed to pass significant legislation these last few years. It is possible, despite some of the rancor and some of the other things going on, to get things done, and I am proud of the work that we have done

and it has been a team effort, and I am honored to work with many of you in this room and some of the ones that have recently retired.

So I guess the final thing I would like to say is thank you to the voters of the 8th District. You put your faith in me and allowed me to come down here and fulfill a childhood dream, and now you have a new adventure. So the Mercer County voters have trusted me to take over as common pleas judge. I am looking forward to it. I admit, it is going to be a completely different role for me. Most of you know that I do not sit in my seat very often – I am over talking to everybody trying to get these bills passed that we are working on – so one of the most difficult portions is going to be actually sitting still, but I am up for a new challenge.

So from the bottom of my heart, thank you to all of you. Thank you to my family. Thank you to my staff, and God bless you. Merry Christmas, and thank you.

And I am sure that the citizens of Mercer County are looking forward to you serving in that very, very important role, and I do think that having worked on legislation and getting it over the goal line into law will serve you very, very well as a judge. Thank you very, very much, judge-to-be and Representative Tedd Nesbit. Thank you.

(3) Beginning July 1, 2022, and each July 1 thereafter until the sum of the outstanding obligations for redevelopment assistance capital projects equals \$2,975,000,000, the sum of the maximum amount of outstanding obligations for redevelopment assistance projects shall be decreased by \$50,000,000.

Section 2.2. Repeals are as follows:

(1) The General Assembly declares that the repeal under paragraph (2) is necessary to effectuate the addition of section 2.1.

(2) Section 317(b) of the act of February 9, 1999 (P.L.1, No.1), known as the Capital Facilities Debt Enabling Act, is repealed.

The SPEAKER. Representative Stephens, on the amendment.
Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this amendment is substantially similar to legislation I introduced in the 2015-16 legislative session – that was HB 1089 – that passed the House with 152 "yes" votes; and it also is identical to HB 285 from last session, which passed the House with 144 "yes" votes. So this legislation is critically important for the victims across Pennsylvania.

Mr. Speaker, there is \$185 million in restitution owed by inmates in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania – \$185 million. And what is interesting is, at the commissaries at our prisons, these same inmates who owe \$185 million in restitution can go out and buy things like poker chips and playing cards; oh, and televisions and cable TV, and all kinds of other goodies over at the commissary, without necessarily paying back the amount of restitution that they owe to the victims of the crimes. In other words, someone could steal a TV – steal a TV – go to State prison for it, never pay the victim back, but go to the prison commissary and purchase a TV, and that to me is absolutely absurd. It is something that we have to change.

AMENDMENT WITHDRAWN

Mr. STEPHENS. Mr. Speaker, I have had some good conversations with the good gentleman from Franklin County, and I expect we will be able to move my legislation again this session as a stand-alone bill. And I look forward to the same bipartisan, overwhelming majority support we received in the past moving that bill to the Senate again this session. So I will withdraw this amendment, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, there is no question we have a gun violence problem across this Commonwealth. And, you know, I got some interesting data from the Pennsylvania Commission on Sentencing just this weekend as it relates to penalties, the sentences that criminals are receiving for – these are felons who illegally possess firearms. And I thought this data was compelling.

We have sentencing guidelines in Pennsylvania. And let us just take Allegheny County, for example. In 2018, 95 percent of the sentences for felons who illegally possess handguns were below the recommended standard range of the sentencing guidelines – 95 percent. In Philadelphia it was 87 percent; 87 percent of the sentences were below the standard range of the sentencing guidelines. Overall statewide in 2018, 67 percent of the sentences for felons who illegally possess guns were below the sentencing guidelines.

Again, Mr. Speaker, this is a problem that we have to address. This is a serious problem. In the city of Philadelphia, over 108 children have been shot this year; 108 children have been shot this year in the city of Philadelphia alone. This is an issue that demands our attention. And we will have some bills moving on Wednesday that will address this issue, and I again look forward to the members' bipartisan support.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

STATEMENT BY MR. POLINCHOCK

The SPEAKER. Representative Todd Polinchock is recognized on unanimous consent.

Mr. POLINCHOCK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

We all know that the members of the military have one of the most stressful jobs imaginable. They are deployed to the most dangerous corners of the world, they spend months away from loved ones, and they live in the line of fire. But those stressors are no excuse for abusing one's family, and we in the military recognize that.

Unfortunately, current State law does not require Child Protective Services to identify military families in cases of child abuse and neglect, nor are they required to report these cases to the appropriate military authorities. HB 1290 takes a major step forward in protecting families by recognizing the Defense Department's Family Advocacy Program. This was designed and created to shine a light on child and domestic abuse within military communities. This legislation will require Child Protective Services to immediately notify the Family Advocacy Program by contacting the program's representative for the Commonwealth or the service member's assigned military instillation if the service member is the subject of a report due to an investigation. In addition, my bill requires this information to be passed to the service member's duty station.

The best way to stop abuse is to expose it, and that is exactly what HB 1290 does.

I want to thank my colleagues for standing with the victims of child abuse and domestic abuse.

HR 527 is designated to recognize the role newspapers play in providing us with credible, factual news and highlights why newspapers continue to be the trusted source for information that is critical to our democracy. The fact that Pennsylvanians are concerned about fake news and disinformation reinforces the need for media literacy.

Newspapers have been the foundation of news and information for more than 300 years. While the delivery of the product has transitioned from black ink on newsprint to the Internet to smartphone applications and social media outlets, no other industry is as firmly rooted in the foundation of our nation or the commitment to the free press.

It is not a secret that newspapers have faced critical times. According to the University of North Carolina's research, the country has lost nearly 1800 newspapers since 2004. Many have survived and are struggling to cover their communities. This is especially true in rural areas, where an estimated 500 newspapers have gone out of business since 2004. Newspapers cannot thrive without our support as readers, as business owners, and as citizens. We should always stand up for the importance of informative information that can help us in our daily lives.

Since 1940 the U.S. Newspaper Association Managers have sponsored and supported a weeklong celebration emphasizing the importance of newspapers. Thank you very much for your responsiveness.
