THE SPEAKER (MIKE TURZAI) PRESIDING

The SPEAKER. Happy new year to each and every one of you.

PRAYER

The SPEAKER. We are so honored today to be joined by Rabbi Seth Frisch. He is with The New Shul of America, Sunrise of Abington, Pennsylvania, and he is the guest of our good friend, Representative Jared Solomon, and our good friend, Representative Sanchez.

Rabbi.

RABBI SETH FRISCH, Guest Chaplain of the House of Representatives, offered the following prayer:

Eternal One, You who have blessed us and brought us to this day, we have just in moments in time, in less than 1 week, the important day which commemorates the legacy of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King – not only the youngest recipient of the Nobel Prize, but teacher, preacher, prophet, one who brought Americans together after so much division and so much that divided us. We have this week in front of us to recognize all that has happened since those days.

There is a teaching in the Psalms.

(Prayer in Hebrew.)

This is the day that the Lord has made joyous and we will profoundly find joy within it, but it is not without the suffering and the division that came before it.

We in the Commonwealth here are so blessed with the diversity and the nations and the religions and the peoples that make up this hallowed ground. After so many years of fighting over such hallowed grounds, we have come together, but we recognize so much more needs to be done and must be done to nurture and to continue us becoming closer to one another, recognizing each other as a member of the greater family of the Commonwealth, of the State of Pennsylvania.

Dr. King once remarked, "I Have a Dream." He repeated it over and over again with the hope that he would inspire the dream to come true. He said that he envisioned a day in which Black people and White people, Catholics and Protestants, Jews and

Gentiles, and all of God's children would here one day join hand in hand to achieve the dream. The dream, of course, to paraphrase, was that each and every human being, each man and each woman, be judged not by the color of their skin but by the content of their character. That dream is realized each and every day, but we have so much more to go.

I am reminded of the teaching in a collection called "Pirke Avot: Ethics of the Sages." Those sages inspired us with these words: It is not our duty, each and every one of us here today, it is not our duty to complete this task in realization of this dream. But it is our duty to work toward it, toward that realization, and always to remember that we are never free to desist from it.

There is a wonderful teaching in the Bible, in the first five books referred to in our tradition as the Torah, the Five Books of Moses. And in those five books is found the following blessing: The blessing begins with the words in Hebrew for the sake of tradition.

(Prayer in Hebrew.)

May the Lord bless you and keep you, all of you, on the road to realizing this dream of Dr. King. May God be among us and teach us and guide us.

And so we ask You, dear God, in front of this sacred Assembly here in this sacred Commonwealth in a state of hallowed ground with so much more to go, bless us, keep us, guide us, teach us, and remain with us forever. Amen.

STATEMENT BY MRS. SNYDER

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes at this time the prime sponsor, Representative Pam Snyder, on unanimous consent. Members, please, please give the good lady our attention.

Mrs. SNYDER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank my colleagues for their affirmative votes, and I would like to submit remarks for the record. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, Representative Snyder. Those will be accepted.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mrs. SNYDER submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to thank my colleagues for their vote on HB 44. This legislation will give the Pennsylvania Parole Board an accurate and current depiction of an inmate's path to rehabilitation. Inmates seeking parole should be judged not just on their time served, but on their actions and behavior inside the institution. This legislation allows the men and women working inside the walls of SCIs (State correctional institutions) across the Commonwealth to testify to the character and behavior of the inmates seeking parole. Who better to testify than the men and women that walk shoulder-to-shoulder with these inmates every single day.

Too many times inmates are released on parole and once again commit heinous crimes. Meanwhile, the corrections officers knew that these inmates were violent and not ready to be released based on their behavior in the institution. This bill is for the safety and security of the people of this Commonwealth – so that another child does not get murdered by a parolee; so that another woman does not have to bear the horrendous pain of sexual assault by the hands of a parolee.

Again, I want to thank my colleagues for their affirmative vote on this important piece of legislation.

The SPEAKER. Members, we are going to turn to resolution votes. We will be moving through these quickly. MOMENT OF SILENCE FOR CONGRESSMAN MICHAEL FITZPATRICK

The SPEAKER. Members, at this time I am going to close the doors of the House and I invite Chairman Frank Farry and the Bucks County delegation members to come up to the rostrum. We are going to close the doors of the House. I am asking all members to please come onto the floor and to take your seats. Staff, I am going to ask you to take your seats. We are going to be doing a condolence resolution. So please, please come onto the floor and take your seats. Staff members, if you could, please take your seats.

At this time I am going to be calling on our good friend and colleague, Representative Frank Farry of Bucks County, also chair of our House Ethics, and he is joined by the Bucks County legislative delegation.

Representative Farry, please proceed.

Mr. FARRY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today we are here to memorialize someone who was a statesman, quite a leader in Bucks County, and I think amongst my colleagues behind me they would agree with me, a good friend, and that is Michael Fitzpatrick. Congressman Fitzpatrick served for 10 years as a Bucks County commissioner, was recognized for his efforts in preserving thousands of acres of open space, as well as the great fiscal work he did running our county. Congressman Fitzpatrick also spent 4 years serving Bucks County, a portion of northeast Philly, and then ultimately a portion of Montgomery County in the United States Congress.

Mike was recognized by numerous groups ranging from veterans organizations to law enforcement groups, too many to even mention, for his efforts in advocating on behalf of the residents of his congressional district. Something that is near and dear to my heart was Mike's efforts advocating for Danny McIntosh's family.

A brief synopsis of that story is, Danny McIntosh was a paramedic in Bensalem, Pennsylvania, Representative DiGirolamo's former district, and Paramedic McIntosh died tragically chasing a suicidal subject. He had a massive heart attack and died on the spot. He left behind a wife and I believe it was two daughters. Because Paramedic McIntosh was employed by a nonprofit EMS (emergency medical services) provider, much the same that protect a lot of our communities, and not a municipal employee, he did not receive a Federal death benefit. After many, many years of battling, Congressman Fitzpatrick was successful in changing the Federal law, so now the men and women in our EMS providers who are not municipal employees but who die in the line of duty will receive that Federal death benefit, and Danny McIntosh's family did ultimately receive that benefit.

Mike was known for so many things, as he was eulogized, and then as the numerous speakers spoke after his service at his lunch, there were just so, so many stories you hear, and I know whenever somebody that is very influential in your community

passes, you end up hearing some stories that you wish you knew when they were alive so you could talk to them about it, and the stories were just so overwhelming. But I think one of the most telling aspects of Mike's life was that no matter what the issue was, there was no issue too small. That was a theme that we heard repeated numerous times, whether it was through his funeral Mass or, as I said, during the speeches afterwards.

I would not be standing here today if it was not for Congressman Fitzpatrick. He actually, in between his terms in Congress, had announced he was going to run for this State House seat. He actually called me one afternoon and said, "Hey, I'm not going to run. I had some things pop up. But I just talked to the Bucks County Courier Times. I told them you're the best qualified candidate. I asked them to give me 5 minutes and they are going to be calling you to get your opinion on running for office." Well, here I am 12 years later. So we have a very strong connection.

Mike served as my campaign chairman during every one of my elections and I have to say was a personal friend and a great role model to all of us. No matter what your party is, no matter what your background is, Mike always, always led from the front and always tried to do what was right. Mike leaves behind his wife, Kathy; three daughters; three sons; two grandchildren; his parents; and seven siblings. And I must say Mike leaves behind a big hole in the Bucks County community because, I am sure my Democratic colleagues behind me would agree, it did not matter what your party was, it mattered about doing what was right and that is the way Mike lived his life.

So, Mr. Speaker, it was with great sorrow that our community had to deal with the passing of Congressman Fitzpatrick this past week. He was actually buried with honors at the Washington Crossing National Cemetery, which he was responsible for actually fighting and ultimately having located in Bucks County. He fought for that and the men and women of our military in our community are much better off by having that cemetery there, and now Mike will be lying with them, the men and women that have served our country.

So it is with sorrow, Mr. Speaker, that we are here to recognize the passing of Congressman Fitzpatrick. We issue condolences to his family, and I think it is important that we try and keep that legacy, that statesmanship, and that spirit that he so readily displayed. I think it is important that we try and keep that moving forward.

And this, having done criminal defense work many years ago, whether a sentence is served consecutively or concurrently, has always been the province of the sentencing trial judge because he is in the best situation to assess the defendant, assess the crime, get into the facts and circumstances of each case, and do justice.

We elect judges to do justice. They, in their courtroom, after hearing days of testimony, no offense, are in a better position to know what is justice than we are sitting right here. So let us let the judges do justice and let us oppose this. Thank you.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The **SPEAKER**. Representative DeLuca will be submitting remarks on HB 726, PN 762, which passed the House.

Mr. DeLuca submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HB 726 requires consecutive, back-to-back sentences when an individual is convicted of a violent crime with a firearm. I learned some time ago that plea bargaining practices currently allow for sentences to be served simultaneously, and I believe this is wrong for violent crimes. Allowing for a sentence from one crime to be served at the same time as the sentence from another crime diminishes the importance and value we place on the law and diminishes the seriousness of the violent offense itself. This bill recognizes the seriousness of the crime and makes sure that the offender is punished appropriately. The sentence should be served on its own.

I first introduced this bill several years ago – it was a good idea then, and it is a good idea now. Last session it passed the House overwhelmingly but died in the Senate. Let us get it across the finish line this time.

Please vote "yes" on HB 726.

The Chair recognizes Representative Greg Vitali.
Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to make sure the members were aware that this bill is opposed by the Governor's Office, CeaseFire PA, the PA

Association of Criminal Defense Lawyers, Families Against Mandatory Minimums, the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office, and the ACLU of Pennsylvania.

Essentially, the bill provides that crimes of violence be served consecutively to other crimes of violence. What makes that even a bit worse is that multiple offenses in the same course of conduct also would be required to be served consecutively, which could result in unjust outcomes. Again, the trial judge is in the best position to do justice and this takes away from the trial judge's ability to do justice by taking away his discretion to review the facts and circumstances of each case.

The SPEAKER. Representative Todd Stephens, on the bill, please.

Mr. STEPHENS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, this bill is narrowly tailored to focus on crimes of violence where there are multiple victims. That is what this is about. When you have multiple victims – maybe there are multiple victims of rape; maybe there are multiple victims of armed robbery – you know, multiple victims in each of those victims' cases, justice demands that they each, each have a sentence applied to that defendant who committed that crime.

You know, this idea of a bulk discount for violent criminals needs to end, and it ends by adopting HB 1852 to ensure that where multiple victims are involved from violent crimes, a defendant is receiving multiple sentences. That is what the bill does very narrowly and very focused on violent crimes and multiple victims, and I urge the members to support it.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

Representative Briggs, yes, sir. Representative Briggs, on the bill.

Mr. BRIGGS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It was less than a month ago that we passed the Justice Reinvestment 2 package. The JRI2 reforms will result in lower crime rates, lower recidivism rates, safer streets, and substantial savings. Groups from across the political spectrum supported JRI2, and for a brief moment there was hope that the failed "tough on crime" approaches of the past would not see the light of day.

Mr. Speaker, unfortunately, here we go again. It must be political season in Pennsylvania. Let us roll out old, stale ideas that do not help people, do not make our streets safer, do not value redemption and rehabilitation. Let us throw people in jail and throw away the key, Mr. Speaker. Does the Pennsylvania legislature and its majority put punishment, retribution, and revenge above all else? Because the research and data is not on their side.

Mr. Speaker, it is 2020 and we have the data and research we need and it is crystal clear: the "tough on crime" era was an abject failure. We can and we must do better.

The fact is, Mr. Speaker, I would argue that every one of us in this chamber has read a newspaper article or a study that concludes that mandatory minimum sentences do not make our community safer, do not reduce recidivism, cost the taxpayers billions of dollars, destroy families and communities, and disproportionately affect poor people and people of color. Mandatory minimums are bad public policy, and we should reject them.

I understand we are living in an era of alternative facts, but the fact is, mandatory minimum sentences are a failed relic of the past and passing new mandatory—

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. STEPHENS. Mr. Speaker, point of order.

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir. Please, Representative Briggs, if you will suspend.

Representative Todd Stephens, point of order, please.

Mr. STEPHENS. HB 1852 does not contain a mandatory minimum sentence. So I would ask the speaker to stay on the bill. HB 1852 deals with consecutive sentences for victims. It does not contain a mandatory minimum sentence.

The SPEAKER. Representative Briggs, it is a fair point raised by the prime sponsor. The issue in front of us is, as he indicated, it provides that any sentence imposed for a crime of violence be served consecutively to any other sentence for a crime of violence that involves a different victim.

Sir, you may proceed, but the good gentleman does raise a fair point.

Mr. BRIGGS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It does mandate the concurrent and takes away the ability to do the consecutive.

So in wrap-up, Mr. Speaker, punishment without rehabilitation does not work. People are worth saving, and our communities are better off when we invest in people. Justice can only be accomplished when it is administered fairly, with compassion and common sense.

I implore my colleagues to vote against HB 1852. Thank you.

Members, I try to make sure that I recognize everybody.

Representative Dush.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What I wanted to talk about was the fact that we do have some issues with some of the judiciary, and in particular, when I was working in the Department of Corrections on sentencing, the inmates had one particular judge, they used to call her "Let 'Em Loose Lisa," and I am sure everybody that was serving back in the nineties and early 2000s, all those inmates know exactly whom I am talking about. There are problems, when somebody is doing a separate crime—

The SPEAKER. Representative, just for a second. Members, everybody is entitled to be heard, please. The good gentleman has the floor, and you may proceed, sir.

Mr. DUSH. Separate crimes affect separate victims. If you have a serial rapist who is taking advantage of individual women, children, and the judge sentences for one and then sentences another offense and says, "You're going to serve that time concurrently," what justice is that for that 2d or 3d or 4th or 5th or 6th or 10th victim? There is no justice for those individuals. Justice may have been served for one, but not for all. And the thing of it is, those offenders, those offenders are the ones who do not rehabilitate in general. Those offenders are the ones who actually get back out on the street and continue.

If you have people who are going to commit and commit and commit offenses, they have established a pattern within their lives, and a very small minority of those end up rehabilitating, but they only do it if they have the want to. But those who are the serial offenders are the ones that are hurting people, causing damages to individuals, and then turning around and coming back out on the street and doing it all over again.

We had one guy up at SCI Houtzdale, we were trying to find a way to keep him in – he maxed out – simply because everybody knew the minute he got back out on the street, he was going to kill somebody and it was going to be a child, and he told us point blank, "When I get out, this time I won't leave a witness." And sure enough, up in Erie County just days later after he was discharged, they were calling us up wanting his records and wanting to find out how he was out on the street because there was an 8-year-old child lying in a ditch. Fortunately, well, she survived, but these are the types of people – evil does exist – these are the types of people that this bill is meant to address.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
