Ms. YOUNGBLOOD submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank my colleagues for their affirmative votes on and the successful passage of HR 648. This resolution honors the Philadelphia Police Department and their efforts during the shoot-out in Nicetown in Philadelphia that took place on August 14, 2019.

As police officers from the 39th District of the city of Philadelphia were attempting to serve a narcotics warrant in Nicetown, they came under gunfire. During the 7-hour police standoff, police officers from the 14th, 25th, 35th, and 39th Districts, along with police officers from the Narcotics Strike Force, responded to the call and worked diligently to protect the people in the area and apprehend the suspect. Six officers were shot and sustained injuries during the standoff, but thankfully, they have all fully recovered. These heroic men and women went into the line of fire and risked their own lives in order to save the lives of others. It is because of the bravery and skilled professionalism of the Philadelphia Police Department that no one was injured in the standoff – not even the suspect.

The fearlessness of Philadelphia's finest remains unmatched, and I, along with the people of Philadelphia and all of Pennsylvania, am grateful for their efforts on August 14, 2019, and every day that they so bravely serve.

STATEMENT BY MRS. THOMAS

The SPEAKER. Representative Thomas, you may proceed.

Mrs. THOMAS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Members, please remember to wear blue tomorrow for Human Trafficking Month.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker and colleagues, for the opportunity to speak to you all today regarding HR 618, which recognizes January 2020 as "Human Trafficking Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.

Following our adoption of HR 22 last year, I held a human trafficking hearing in my district. We heard the most moving testimony from a survivor. She shocked most of our audience with a story of going to work for an auto body shop and then being trafficked by the owner. We also heard from Dr. Rhodes, director and cofounder of Villanova Law's Institute to Address Commercial Sexual Exploitation. In her testimony, Dr. Rhodes stated that HB 12, better known as the Buyer Beware Act, is a critical step towards reestablishing the Commonwealth's position as a leading jurisdiction in the fight against human trafficking.

The exploitation of men, women, and children – especially children – is ranked by the FBI as the third largest criminal activity in the world. It has become a \$150 billion industry, destroying the lives of its victims of all ages and genders, but disproportionately impacting women and young girls. This is a global threat that affects people of all nations, including the United States.

Not only does human trafficking happen around the world, but it happens across our country and in every State, including Pennsylvania. There are trafficking cases that have been cited in the past year throughout the Commonwealth. According to the Pennsylvania National Human Trafficking Hotline, in 2018 there were 275 cases, 621 human trafficking victims identified, 215 traffickers, and 101 businesses that trafficked people. Various studies have indicated that many victims of sex and/or

labor trafficking are our most vulnerable citizens: runaways, those in foster care, those who have aged out of the system, and are homeless or left to fend for themselves. However, anyone can become a victim of human trafficking. The Internet and its myriad of social networking Web sites are rife with predators looking for their next victim.

It is our duty and our moral obligation as leaders in the State to do everything we can to protect those who have been victimized and to work diligently to prevent more men, women, and children from being victimized. With this resolution, which was previously sponsored by Representative Marguerite Quinn, I am proud to say this House has unanimously supported this legislation for years. We have been raising awareness of this horrendous crime. Additionally, we will have the opportunity – tomorrow, I hope – to pass seven human trafficking bills, not the least of which is Senator Phillips-Hill's and Representative Grove's Buyer Beware Act. I hope you will join me in supporting these bills, and if we pass them, we can call Pennsylvania a national leader in fighting human trafficking.

Public awareness is only one step, but it is a vital step that each of us can take. Thank you for your support of HR 618, designating January 2020 as "Human Trafficking Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania.
