They also say the amendment may – this is the administration – the amendment may require agencies to disclose information related to critical infrastructure or protected systems, i.e. dams, energy, food and agriculture, information technology, nuclear, chemical, and transportation. The administration also asserts that the amendment may require agencies to disclose portions of emergency operation plans which are not publicly available. And finally, the administration asserts that the amendment may require agencies to disclose techniques, procedures, and information that could compromise investigations, prosecutions, and enforcement proceedings.

I will be voting "no" on this. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, mental health parity essentially says that for an insurance company that offers coverage for health care, that they have to cover depression and bipolar and post-traumatic stress in the same magnitude as they would cover a broken arm or diabetes. In the real world, Mr. Speaker, sometimes that does not play out so fairly and sometimes an individual, a loved one, a constituent that is struggling with a mental illness, a disorder, will only get two or three visits with a therapist when they might need 2 or 3 years' worth of therapy to come to grips with a struggle that they are having with a behavioral health issue or challenge.

Essentially, this bill, Mr. Speaker, improves the assessment of mental health parity. There are two ways to assess mental health parity. One is through the complaint process, the other through market conduct audits. A market conduct audit, just like any audit, is very cumbersome, very time-consuming, very labor-intensive – so labor-intensive that our Department of Insurance sometimes has to hire auditing firms to come in and help with these market conduct audits. This bill requires some pro forma reports from our insurance companies to assure compliance with mental health parity. Mr. Speaker, I am proud to say that the stakeholders have participated in the drafting of this bill.

And the final thing I want to say, Mr. Speaker, is that we do not mention staff too much on the floor of the House here. But in the Insurance Committee, the executive director, Garth Shipman, has been devoted to this bill, to this legislation, and to this concept for a very long time, and I want to give him credit for bringing it to the finish line today. I also want to thank Chairwoman Tina Pickett, chairperson of the Insurance Committee, for the great work that she has done in this area. Thank you to my colleagues, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, HB 2455 allows a county or municipal health department to pursue COVID-19 testing that comports with the appropriate FDA (Food and Drug Administration) guidance. This bill has been amended to include COVID-19 testing reporting provisions required under the Federal Paycheck Protection Program and to provide the administration's COVID-19 testing plans to the legislature.

Mr. Speaker, I drafted HB 2455 in response to challenges my county commissioners face in moving forward with COVID-19 testing. We need to cut through the red tape. HB 2455 gives any local health department, including those in Philadelphia and Allegheny County, the ability to move forward with testing that complies with the appropriate FDA guidance, a copy of which I will submit for the record. Chester County intends to use thousands of test kits that they have purchased to test our heroic first responders and medical personnel, and I encourage an affirmative vote.
