(1) An absentee ballot cast by any absentee elector as defined in
section 1301(a), (b), (c), (d), (e), (f), (g) and (h) of the act of June 3, 1937
(P.L.1333, No.320), known as the Pennsylvania Election Code, shall be
canvassed in accordance with section 1308(g) of the Pennsylvania
Election Code if the ballot is cast, submitted and received in accordance
with the provisions of 25 Pa.C.S. Ch. 35 (relating to uniform military
and overseas voters).

(2) An absentee ballot cast by any absentee elector as defined in
section 1301(i), (j), (k), (l), (m) and (n) of the Pennsylvania Election
Code shall be canvassed in accordance with this subsection if the
absentee ballot is received in the office of the county board of elections:

(i) by hand delivery by an authorized representative designated by
the elector or any other individual authorized to deliver an absentee
ballot on behalf of the elector under section 1302.1(a.3)(4) or (5) of the
Pennsylvania Election Code no later than eight o'clock P.M. on the day
of the primary or election;

(ii) by hand delivery by the elector no later than five o'clock P.M.
on the day immediately preceding the primary or election; and

(iii) by mail no later than five o'clock P.M. on the seventh day
following the primary or election if the absentee ballot is postmarked no
later than the Friday immediately preceding the primary or election.

Section 2. Repeals are as follows:

(1) The General Assembly finds that the repeal under
paragraph (2) is necessary to effectuate the addition of section
816 of the act.

(2) Section 1308(g)(1) of the act of June 3, 1937
(P.L.1333, No.320), known as the Pennsylvania Election Code, is
repealed.

The SPEAKER. Representative Kenyatta, you are recognized. Mr. KENYATTA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Here is the reality—

The SPEAKER. Please, suspend, sir, just for a moment.

Members, the good gentleman, it is his amendment; he is entitled to be heard, please.

Representative Kenyatta, you may speak. Thank you, sir.

Mr. KENYATTA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Here is the reality. In Pennsylvania your race, whom you worship or do not, how you identify, whom you love is still an impediment to folks being treated fairly in the Commonwealth. We have an opportunity to ensure that it does not happen at sports clubs, and, Mr. Speaker, I will call on this body beyond this amendment to ensure that it does not happen anywhere. In Pennsylvania your race, your religion, your ethnicity, your sexual orientation should not be a barrier to your being treated fairly, and that is what this amendment is all about, and I would ask for an affirmative vote, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. On the amendment, Representative Bill Kortz.

Mr. KORTZ. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the clubs that we are talking about, the sportsmen's clubs, are private clubs, and in the particular case of the one I belong to, the Clairton Sportsmen's Club, we do have a set of bylaws, and in those bylaws, we talk about the nondiscrimination. We have a nondiscrimination clause in our bylaws. So this is duplicative, but I would still urge a "yes" vote.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The majority leader.

Mr. CUTLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, regarding this underlying amendment, I think it would be informative for the members to know that there is currently a case pending before the United States Supreme Court that deals with this very issue, *Harris Funeral Homes v. EEOC*. Given that that ruling will be coming down between now and the end of June, depending on that ruling, this language could be constitutionally deficient. I would urge a "no" vote until we see

that case and its decision so that we can have constitutionally consistent language.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Representative Kenyatta, for the second time, sir.

Mr. KENYATTA. And I think the leader just made my point, that right now, depending on who you are, your rights are up for debate. Mr. Speaker, we know that is wrong. Come on. Let us be real. We know that is wrong. I appreciate the maker of the bill supporting this amendment, and our rights should not be up for debate. I would ask that the majority and that the majority leader support this, and if the Supreme Court makes what I would consider the wrong decision, then we will deal with that when that comes up. But right now we have an opportunity to say in Pennsylvania, regardless of who you are, who you love, you are going to be treated fairly in the Commonwealth. We have an opportunity to vote on that right now. We do not have to wait for the Supreme Court to press the buttons in front of our faces.

The SPEAKER. Representative Frankel.

Mr. FRANKEL. Mr. Speaker—

The SPEAKER. Please hold on, Representative Frankel, just for a moment.

Members, everybody is entitled to be heard.

You may proceed.

Mr. FRANKEL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of this amendment. Regardless of what the majority leader said, what we do know is nearly half of the States in our country provide nondiscrimination to all their citizens, including sexual orientation, gender identity, and expression. This is not something that is going to be overturned by the Supreme Court. We can do this here, as a State law, in this very small way that Representative Kortz's bill, who has generously agreed to this amendment, that we ought to do this. Counties and municipalities across Pennsylvania, in spite of our reluctance to provide civil rights protections for everybody, have moved forward to do this while we have sat on our hands. Here is a small way to begin to move our State forward into the daylight of nondiscrimination for every citizen in our State.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Yes. Representative Sims, my apologies. I did not see—

Mr. SIMS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I am going to be very brief.

Mr. Speaker, we are often reminded in this chamber that we are a very separate body from the Supreme Court. I find it somewhat antithetical to how we ourselves operate. I find it antithetical to the messaging that we hear every day in this body that we are a separate government entity than the Pennsylvania Supreme Court. Now, I agree with the speakers who have spoken before me that while this bill will not undo decades of discrimination and will not put in place protections for millions of LGBTQ Pennsylvanians, it can put in place some small protections for us in just this one way.

Mr. Speaker, the maker of the bill supports this amendment. I urge my colleagues to support this amendment. In the 2-hour drive that I have from home to here in the Capitol, I drive in and out of places where I am protected as an equal citizen in Pennsylvania, four different times. Mr. Speaker, depending on where I get gas or where my car breaks down, both of which have happened as I have been a legislator, I am either an equal citizen in the State that I represent or I am not.

This is a very simple bill that in a very simple way protects Pennsylvanians in their home, and that is what we are here to do. We are not here to guess about what the Supreme Court will do and we are not here to guess about what the Governor will do. We are here to do what we can do as the House of Representatives, and this is something that we can do, and I urge the members to support the maker of the amendment.

This term also includes any time an employee is required to be on duty or to be at the prescribed work place, time spent in traveling as part of the duties of the employee during normal working hours and time during which an employee is employed or permitted to work; provided, however, that time allowed for meals shall be excluded unless the employee is required or permitted to work during that time, and provided further, that time spent on the premises of the outdoor sportsman club for the convenience of the employee shall be excluded.

Amend Bill, page 2, line 24, by striking out "4" and inserting 5

Notwithstanding any law or regulation to the contrary, consistent with the inviolate rights enumerated under sections 21 and 25 of Article I of the Constitution of Pennsylvania, shooting ranges, sportsman clubs, hunting facilities and firearm and ammunition product manufacturers, retailers, importers and distributors, inclusive of their employees and agents, shall always be constituted as life-sustaining businesses in this Commonwealth, which shall never be shuttered or limited in their ability to produce, provide, sell or otherwise offer firearms, ammunition, firearm accessories, component parts of firearms, ammunition and firearm accessories, and all services, training, safety and practice related to firearms and hunting.

Section 3. Effective date.

This act shall take effect immediately.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

When Governor Wolf held his virtual press conference on March 16 and declared that effective at midnight all nonessential stores are to close in Pennsylvania as well as bars and restaurants, it had people wondering what the definition of "nonessential" is. The record of the Governor and various agencies changing the definition, moving the goalposts, makes legislative action enactment of law, to provide that definition necessary. It is especially so when we are discussing and the government is acting with the use of force against its citizens regarding the rights which are enumerated in the Constitutions of Pennsylvania and the United States.

Article I, section 25, of the Pennsylvania Constitution, "Reservation of powers in people," specifically states: "To guard against transgressions of the high powers which we have delegated" – we, the people, have delegated to the government – "we declare" – that is, the people declare – "that everything in this article" – Article I – "is excepted out of the general powers of government and shall forever remain inviolate."

Article I, section 1, "Inherit rights of mankind," states in part: "All men are born equally free and independent and have the certain inherent and indefeasible rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, of acquiring, possessing and protecting property and reputation, and of pursuing their own happiness."

Protecting their life, protecting their property; again, this is in the Bill of Rights. Those of us who choose to take an active stance to be armed and capable to protect our lives and those of our neighbors and our property under this article usually choose to ensure that we have the proficiency necessary to ensure that we do not put others at risk when exercising that right. Police and sheriff departments around the Commonwealth have

requirements for their armed personnel to have such training and practice to ensure this type of proficiency. Firearm ranges are where most of those go to obtain the training and the practice to ensure that we exercise that right in a way that is responsible.

Mr. Speaker, section 2 says, "All power is inherent in the people and all free governments are founded on their authority and instituted for their peace, safety and happiness."

Section 21, "Right to bear arms": "The right of the citizens to bear arms in defense of themselves and the State shall not be questioned."

The people have spoken through the Constitution. First principles dictate that those things that are first within the Constitution have primacy over anything which follows, and I will reiterate Article I, section 25: "...We declare that everything in this article is excepted out of the general powers of government and shall forever remain inviolate."

Mr. Speaker, amendment 05411 – I am sorry; A05426 reiterates the constitutional right, makes it plain that the Hunting, Firearm and Ammunition Life-Sustaining Business Act, that it designates as "life-sustaining businesses," the firearm ranges, shooting ranges, sportsmen's clubs, hunting facilities, and firearms and ammunition product manufacturers, retailers, importers, distributors, inclusive of their employees and agents, shall always be constituted as life-sustaining businesses in this Commonwealth.

Mr. Speaker, again, Article I, section 21, says, "The right of the citizens to bear arms in defense of themselves and the State shall not be questioned." There has been far too much questioning of this right.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of A05426 and ask for a unanimous vote. Thank you.

The bill, as currently written, is fairly redundant. We already have a House body delegated with subpoena power; the newly formed House Government Oversight Committee has subpoena power. I do not believe that we should be handing out subpoena power from this body like candy, so I urge adoption of this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. And the majority leader, on the amendment.

Mr. **CUTLER**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I believe the gentleman is partially correct regarding the subpoena power of the Oversight Committee. The rule also, however, limits the role of that committee to certain components of the legislative process. This committee, however, would have the ability to both review policy and funding, which the Oversight Committee does not. Appropriations issues are reserved to the Appropriations Committee in our existing rules.

Furthermore, it would empower this body to exercise the legislative duty of oversight, which our own Supreme Court has labeled as a necessitous component of lawmaking. Mr. Speaker, it is certainly our hope that we never need to use subpoenas, but in order to have the full strength of this body behind it, I do believe it is something that they should have in the event that they need it. As we search for information, I think it is important that we get timely information and that is something that I have personally expressed to the Governor in some of my own discussions with him regarding the Oversight Committee, which the gentleman correctly referenced, in the event that they would look into any single component of this. This proposal, however, is meant to be a broader review of the entire response and how we could be better situated in the future should it happen again.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I urge a "no" vote.

While it is certainly our hope that this does not return in the fall or in a subsequent cycle or become a seasonal flu, I think it is totally reasonable that we review how we have done so far, but more importantly, what items we could do better. If you believe the current response and the current construct is working, I respect that opinion and you can certainly vote against this resolution. But I believe that we should dig into this. That is a core function of the legislature, that of oversight, and this is merely one more tool in the toolbox for us to do that. We are committed to doing the best on behalf of our constituents and this resolution does that. I urge a "yes" vote.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. Representative Mackenzie has requested the opportunity to submit remarks on HR 661, which is Greek-American Heritage Month. Those will be accepted.

Mr. MACKENZIE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HR 661 designates the month of March as "Greek-American Heritage Month" in Pennsylvania. This annual legislative recognition highlights the role Greek-Americans have played in the economic and cultural development of the United States and Pennsylvania. March is significant because Greek Independence Day is the national holiday in Greece that marks the start of the Greek War of Independence in 1821 and is celebrated annually on March 25.

As to the role Greek-Americans have played in the United States, it is important to note that they have served with great distinction in all branches of the U.S. military during World War II, and through the American Hellenic Educational Progressive Association raised more than \$253 million in war bonds for the U.S. In the 20th century, Greece

also was one of only three nations to partner with the U.S. in every major international conflict and to this day remains a reliable, strategic partner and steadfast ally.

Furthermore, my resolution recognizes that ancient Greece was the cradle of early democracy. Ancient Greeks in the city-state of Athens made vital contributions to democratic governance by inventing the concept of citizenship where laws were proposed by citizen assemblies and subject to popular vote; by recognizing the principle of separation of powers in legislative, executive, and judicial branches; and by conceiving and implementing the concept of trial by jury.

The contributions of Greek-Americans are innumerable, which is why it is important each March to recognize them with the designation of Greek-American Heritage Month.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

Mrs. EVANS submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Despite efforts to mitigate the opioid epidemic in this Commonwealth, opioid and other drug-related overdose deaths continue to rise year after year. Pennsylvania experienced 5,456 drug-related overdose deaths in 2017, which represents a staggering 65-percent increase in overdose deaths between 2015 and 2017. Research indicates that increased fentanyl availability and misuse contributed to the significant increase in drug-related overdose deaths in our State.

It is for these reasons and more that I am introducing a resolution to recognize March 6, 2020 as "Black Balloon Day" in Pennsylvania. On this day, friends and families of those lost to drug addiction nationwide will tie black balloons outside their homes and businesses to raise awareness of drug-related overdose deaths.

Particularly in the dark world of opioid abuse, it is important to take to task those who bear responsibility for mass producing and deceptively marketing dangerous and addictive painkillers like OxyContin. But it is even more important to focus our energies, especially in the legislative realm, on finding solutions. We need to work with doctors and nurses, with law enforcement, and with local leaders to find the best ways to treat addiction, to help our friends and family members who are struggling every day with drugs.

An event like Black Balloon Day, with visual representation of the worst addiction has to offer, allows us to better understand the depth of the problem. This is not a city, suburban, or rural problem. This is not a Black or White problem. It is not a poor or rich problem. It is not a young or old problem. It is all of those things. Addiction infects every inch of our society, and we need to continue focusing our attention on combating it with long-term care and recovery. We can do that even better by fighting on behalf of those who lost their battles, by learning from their heartbroken friends and families so their struggles were not for naught.

Together we can win this continuing fight and bring about an age of long-term recovery for those with substance use disorder.

That is why I propose we recognize March 2020 as "National Social Work Month" in Pennsylvania.

This year's theme is "Social Work: Generations Strong" and highlights the fact that social workers have been working for generations to improve the lives of every single American. Many of the myriad benefits Americans enjoy today – including more access to health and mental health care, a minimum wage, and Social Security – are because of the work of social workers and their partners. Social work is also a profession that allows people across many generations to make a profound, positive impact on the lives of millions of people each and every day. You will find social workers from the Silent Generation and Baby Boomers to Generation Z who are doing the hard, often unsung work to make our nation and the world a better place.

Please join me in giving proper recognition to our social workers for the skillful and unselfish work they perform 365 days a year. Your support is appreciated.
