Chairman Vitali, you may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Yes, sir.

Members, members, please, please provide Chairman Vitali the opportunity to be heard. He is entitled to be heard. All the conversations have to really— Come on; we need to give him an opportunity to be heard. If there are conversations that need to occur, please take them off the House floor. Please take them off the House floor.

You may proceed, sir.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I was not initially going to get up, but it just seems with the most important bill of the year, it should not pass without comment from someone.

I think from an environmental perspective this is not a good bill. The Department of Environmental Protection has been decimated over the years. Governor Wolf in his proposal in February had a modest, although inadequate, increase. This budget, even cognizant of the difficult times, simply does not give the agency the resources it needs to carry out its mission of protecting human health and the environment. These are appallingly low numbers.

As I am glancing down, I also see a very small point, but the river basin commissions – again the sanctions toward them continue. The Delaware River Basin Commission, for example, in this budget, which has a very important role in monitoring water levels in the Delaware River Basin, is getting a measly \$90,000, an appallingly low \$90,000 from this General Assembly to carry out its mission. Full funding for this agency, full funding for this agency, our share of the compact would be \$900,000. Governor Wolf in his proposed budget suggested, proposed more than that. This is simply retaliation for those conservatives who simply do not like the way it is carrying out its mission.

I think, I think those who craft the budget on both sides of the aisle, particularly ours, Democrats, need to be cognizant of the small details like the Delaware River Basin Commission, the Susquehanna River Basin Commission and the jobs they do. Things like this really should not go unnoticed. This is not a good environment budget from an environmental perspective, and I would urge a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. And the chairman of the Appropriations Committee, the majority chair, Stan Saylor, on HB 2387, PN 3837.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What we are considering today in HB 2387 is an interim 5-month temporary budget for the 2020-21 fiscal year. Since the beginning of this pandemic, we have focused on data-driven approach—

The SPEAKER. Mr. Chair. Mr. Chair, please just for a moment.

Members, the majority Appropriations chair and the prime sponsor of the bill is speaking. I would ask that you please take your seats or go and take conversations off the House floor. Please.

And the good gentleman will proceed.

Mr. SAYLOR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Since the beginning of this pandemic, we have been focused on data-driven information, trying to tackle the problems that our Commonwealth faces. The decision to take this step and enact a temporary budget is data-driven. It is a decision that we had to make. With the movement of the tax collection dates to July and August of this year and uncertainty about the reopening of Pennsylvania, we simply cannot have enough data at this time to make an informed decision about a full year's budget. As we begin to reopen our State, this budget will provide stability and necessary resources to ensure we can get back to the sense of normalcy in this State in a safe manner.

The House Republican Caucus insisted that we fully fund critical education line items like basic education and special education. It is critical for the well-being of our students that our schools open up this fall, and this budget will give our school districts the resources they need to open safely. Fully funding these education lines was a top priority of the House Republicans.

We fully fund the debt service of this Commonwealth. We fully fund higher education; basic education funding; special education funding; Ready to Learn Block Grants; Pre-K Counts is fully funded and Head Start; career and technical education; career and technical education equipment grants; nonpublic and charter school transportation; school food services; school employees' retirement; school employees' Social Security; services to nonpublic schools; textbooks, materials, and equipment for nonpublic schools is funded in this budget as well, as well as the safe schools initiative, as well as one of the most important things to every one of us in this Commonwealth who have children in college and that is the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency is fully funded. This is an agency that gives students grants so that they can seek a higher education after high school.

This crisis we are currently in is unprecedented in nature and requires new and innovative approaches to solving these challenges that we face. This budget provides stability and necessary resources to ensure that our society can begin to open up in a safe and proper manner.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. Thank you, sir.

And the minority Appropriations chair, Representative Matt Bradford.

Mr. BRADFORD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

These are sobering times and I want to thank my friend and my colleague, my Republican counterpart of the Appropriations Committee. As always, it has been a challenging time but always

a good time, and I appreciate your camaraderie and your hard work.

This budget is one that we never thought we would see, obviously. A 5-month budget is an exceptional break from what we would normally see in this building. But we recognize, whether one is for or against this budget, that these are extraordinary times, and that is why we have stood with our public health officials and our elected officials who have been doing a yeoman's job in unbelievably challenging times. One only look at our financial statement, the financial statement that HB 2387 will bring a reflection, to what the end of this 5 months will look like.

And I will not speak too much about the particulars of this budget, though I would note the gentleman represents full funding for education. I would notice that many in the House Democratic Caucus, and I think there is almost unanimity, are deeply concerned about the elimination of \$300 million of property tax relief. That is obviously the result of lost revenue in the casino funds, but we recognize that needs to be back-funded with some use of funds. We cannot say with a straight face that we are fully funding education if folks are going to see a \$300 million increase in property taxes come this year.

Also, we are deeply concerned on the education side about the failure to use the Costing-Out Study this year. We realize that when this experiment to get to a more fair funding formula began, that it would take some sacrifice, and while we recognize the desire to flat-fund the dollar amount, not driving it out in relation to most accurate statistics is going to be problematic for the long term. But again, I do not want to be critical of this budget or the gentleman; I want to be critical of what it lays ahead of us and the challenge before us.

The gentleman recognizes the flat funding of education, but human services at a time where DHS (Department of Human Services) and public health have never been more at the front of where people's minds are, they want to make sure that DHS is fully funded, and while this budget for 5 months does that, it leaves one huge cliff on the back end of this budget and we need to be sober in the reality of the challenge before us. Yes, it may be after an election, but we know now the challenges before us here in Pennsylvania. And we should recognize – again, not in the food fight that we have seen for 10 weeks in an argument over reopeners that I thought was largely a distraction, but this is what we should be paying attention to. How will we respond to the challenge before us? How will we provide for our public health officials, our counties, our small businesses, and those that have been impacted?

This budget is only the beginning of that story. There is much more to be written. I do not give this budget an A or an F; I might give it an incomplete. And I say that with all due respect to the members, and I ask that they please do what they see appropriate on HB 2387.

STATEMENT BY MRS. BROWN

The SPEAKER. Representative Rosemary Brown is recognized to speak on HR 760.

Mrs. BROWN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I know we have a tremendous amount of attention and concerns with our health and COVID-19 right now. However, it is important that we do not forget about other disease states that have been a concern long before COVID-19 and will also continue to cause us strong health risks.

While I am very sorry to bring another negative health concern to your attention today, it is extremely important. HR 760 creates Lyme Disease and Tick-borne Illness Awareness Month in Pennsylvania for the very reason of ensuring we continue to educate, protect, help prevent, and diagnose Lyme disease and tick-borne illnesses as early as possible. As many of you know, these diseases are transmitted by ticks which can often be as small as a poppy seed and difficult to see.

Over the last several years, Pennsylvania has been ranked number 1 for Lyme disease cases in the country. Pennsylvania residents need to know about our strong tick population and the disease risk, ways to utilize tick repellents before spending time outdoors, landscape measure recommendations to reduce the tick populations in their very own backyards, and the resources available, including the East Stroudsburg University tick lab.

As many of you know, I am an outspoken voice for the Lyme disease and tick-borne illness subject, and I will continue to look for ways to work with you and our government to partner and assist in measures to protect Pennsylvania residents who are at high risk.

I thank this legislative body and the leadership teams on a bipartisan level for supporting the free tick-testing program with East Stroudsburg University. I believe this program has proven over the last 2 years to be a tremendous service and investment for our Pennsylvania residents. This free tick testing allows a

patient to know if a tick found on them is positive for pathogens and an estimated time of how long it has been on them. Between these two parameters, a patient and their doctor can decide if treatment is necessary. Currently 38 percent of the ticks tested in Pennsylvania in the last year at the tick lab are carriers of at least one tick-borne illness. Not only is this service a truly beneficial program for patient care, but it also allows our science community to gather data and surveillance on the ticks to best serve medical research as we move forward. Information can be found at ticklab.org for this free tick testing.

Lastly, I would like to remind everyone that you may become infected with Lyme disease or a tick-borne illness and not be lucky enough to find a tick on you that can be tested. Ticks can often fall off well before you find them. For this very reason, it is important to pay attention to bouts of fever, unusual rashes, or an odd summer-type flu.

Please take this opportunity to communicate with each other, family, and friends of the importance of understanding ticks and the diseases they may carry as we all enjoy our beautiful outdoors. Building awareness, education, and prevention are the very reasons we create these House resolutions to bring attention.

Mrs. EVANS submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Up to 16 million Americans struggle with undiagnosed or untreated vision impairments. Combined with eye diseases, vision loss, and eye disorders, it creates an estimated \$6.3 million economic burden on Pennsylvania alone, according to PreventBlindness.org. PreventBlindness.org also estimates the number of Pennsylvanians with impaired vision, including blindness, could more than double over the next 30 years, with costs continuing to rise as the population ages and life expectancy increases.

Regular eye exams are the best defense against irreversible vision loss and can provide an optometrist with insight into a person's overall health and wellness. Every day, eye doctors examine asymptomatic patients during eye exams and diagnose them with serious eye and health issues, including identifying warning signs and manifestations of diseases like diabetes, hypertension, and cancer. Caught early through regular examinations, these conditions can be more successfully treated.

More than 30 million Americans with diabetes and another 84 million with prediabetes are at risk for developing diabetic eye disease, which is the leading cause of blindness among adults. Many Americans are not aware this disease has no visible symptoms. In 2017 doctors of optometry found more than 401,000 cases of diabetes-related manifestations in patients who were not aware they had the disease.

Save Your Vision Month creates awareness for this important cause, alerting folks of all ages to the significance of eye health. This year, in 2020, the AOA (American Optometric Association) is focusing on myopia, or nearsightedness, especially among children. More than 40 percent of Americans are myopic, and that number is increasing all the time. As AOA president Dr. Samuel Pierce says, "Eye and vision problems can become worse over time, so early diagnosis and treatment through comprehensive eye exams are essential to optimize children's eyes and vision health and prevent future vision loss."

Please join me in recognizing the efforts of the AOA and encourage all Pennsylvanians to be aware of the importance of obtaining regular eye examinations and maintaining good eye health.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

While our nation has made great strides in combatting tobacco use, there are roughly 16 percent of Americans who still smoke. Moreover, tobacco use continues to be the leading cause of preventable death, killing over 480,000 annually – more than alcohol, vehicle accidents, drug use, murder, and suicide combined. The continued prevalence is why I am introducing a resolution recognizing March 18, 2020, as "Kick Butts Day" in Pennsylvania. It is vital that we continue to highlight the effect smoking has on individuals and on society as a whole. Our nation spends over \$170 billion in health-care expenses related to tobacco use, and according to estimates by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), smoking results in \$156 billion in lost productivity each year. And every single day about 2,000 minors will try smoking for the first time. This year, our focus is on kicking Juul and e-cigarette or e-vaping products that have become enormously popular among our youth.

Within 20 minutes of quitting smoking, your heart rate and blood pressure begin to drop. Within 12 hours, carbon monoxide levels in your bloodstream return to normal. Within weeks or months, your circulation and lung function improve, and risk of heart attack begins to drop. You breathe easier, coughing less often. Within 2 to 5 years, your risk of mouth, throat, esophagus, and bladder cancers are cut in half, and your stroke risk matches that of other nonsmokers. And even more long-term benefits, outlined by smokefree.gov, continue in the time after you quit smoking. That is why I support recognizing March 18, 2020, as "Kick Butts Day" in Pennsylvania. We want a healthier, happier society, and this is one major way we can achieve that goal.

Our country has made tremendous strides in the battle against tobacco use, but we can always do better. Whatever methods you choose – whether it is with the help of gum or a patch, or perhaps with prescribed medical assistance, or even if you decide to go cold turkey – there is never a better time than right now to kick those butts to the curb. Do it for your friends. Do it for your family. Most importantly, do it for yourself.
