WHEREAS, The House of Representatives of Pennsylvania wishes to honor the memory of the Honorable William Russell Robinson, a former member of the House of Representatives of Pennsylvania who served the 19th Legislative District with honor and distinction and passed away at the age of seventy-eight on June 9, 2020; and

WHEREAS, A lifelong resident of Pittsburgh, Mr. Robinson was the son of Annie Kemp Robinson and the late George Robinson. A graduate of Schenley High School, he earned a bachelor's degree from The Ohio State University and a master's degree from Duquesne University, and he attended law school at Howard University. He began his political career as a member of the Pittsburgh City Council from 1978 to 1985, and he also served two consecutive terms on the Allegheny County Council. Mr. Robinson was elected to serve the 19th Legislative District of the House of Representatives from 1989 to 2002. During his tenure, he was a member of the Appropriations, Intergovernmental Affairs, Health and Welfare, Urban Affairs and Tourism and Recreational Development Committees, and he served the Educational Committee as the Democratic Chair of the Subcommittee on Higher Education. Mr. Robinson will be remembered as an outstanding citizen who was dedicated to his family and his community; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania proclaim with enduring sorrow the passing of the Honorable William Russell Robinson; and extend heartfelt condolences to his children, Nyota and William R. REMARKS BY MR. WHEATLEY

The SPEAKER. Representative Wheatley, you are recognized.

Mr. WHEATLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to take this opportunity to, one, wish the family of Bill Robinson my sincere condolences and sympathy and prayers, because rarely do you get a chance to say some kind words to an individual who was once your competitor. But over the years, Bill and I, we were able to work through some of our difficulties, and for those who knew Bill – Mr. Robinson – you know he had a very interesting and unique life.

He was one of the deans, the original deans, of our African-American politics in our region. As you heard, in 1978 he began his career on city council when Pittsburgh was first going from a citywide election to district elections. He then went on to be the second African-American ever to represent the 19th District, which he succeeded our late former Speaker, K. Leroy Irvis. So he served here for 14 years, and then right after leaving here, he was on our county council as a newly formed districtwide county council.

So he was definitely a trailblazer. He was one of our original political thinkers and I had a lot of respect for him. And again, I just wanted to wish his family sincere condolences, and certainly in our region, we have lost one of our titans in the political world. So I definitely appreciate all of your support in recognizing his life and legacy.

REMARKS BY MR. DAVIS

The SPEAKER. The Chair now recognizes Representative Davis. Thank you.

Mr. DAVIS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would like to thank Representative Wheatley for allowing me to join him in cosponsoring this resolution. I had the honor and privilege of knowing Bill Robinson when he was a county council member and I was a young staffer in the Allegheny County Executive's Office, and at that time he always showed an interest in young people who strove to be in politics, who strove to be in public service, and I can tell you, he was truly a trailblazer.

When Bill came to the State House, he had big shoes to fill, those of our late, great Speaker K. Leroy Irvis, and he was a tireless advocate for minority rights, and oftentimes Bill stood alone in defending the rights for African-Americans to get contracts, whether it be through the city of Pittsburgh or Allegheny County, and really blazed a lot of trails. So it is just a true honor to recognize somebody who has given so much to us as a region, and he will be truly missed.

So my condolences go out to his children and his mother on his passing, and just know that Bill Robinson will live on, not just in the halls of this Capitol, but the courthouse in Allegheny County and the City-County Building in the city of Pittsburgh. So thank you, and God bless him and his memory.

First and foremost, condolences to the late Bill Robinson's family. Colleagues, one thing I learned about being up here is that it is an institution, and everybody in the Commonwealth does not get to serve in this great body. And whenever we lose somebody from our distinguished great body, such as here in Harrisburg, I think we all need to pay a lot of respects to who came before us, for they paved the way for many of us to be here. And today I do not look down at the fact that Mr. Robinson has passed away, but I celebrate because of the things that he accomplished. Even when he had to stand alone to ensure that diversity was made whole in the city of Pittsburgh, he had no problem. And at the end of the day, he fought a good fight.

And as being a member of the General Assembly, I understand how precious this moment in time is for us to be here. And so with that, I just ask everybody in your own time to take a moment of silence for Bill Robinson, and just say a prayer for one of our great colleagues that came here, did the work of the people, and made a difference in the lives of many people back home in the city of Pittsburgh. Thank you.

He was a good friend, he stayed a friend when he was on the county council, he was a great member here, and I would just like to make those remarks and send my condolences and our caucus' condolences to the Robinson family.

STATEMENT BY MS. HELM

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the lady, Representative Helm, and the gentleman, Representative Kinsey, under unanimous consent.

Ms. HELM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I hope all of you over the last weekend had a chance to celebrate Juneteenth National Freedom Day. Representative Kinsey and I had hoped to speak about it before June 19, but because of the importance of the day, we thought we should speak today and just talk about Juneteenth, which to me is extremely important.

One year ago, on June 19, 2019, I experienced my best day ever in the 14 years of being a member of the Pennsylvania House of Representatives, when Governor Wolf signed into law HB 619. This year's celebration was a special one, because it was the first year that Juneteenth is an officially recognized holiday in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

For those who may be unfamiliar, Juneteenth commemorates the June 19, 1865, announcement of the abolition of slavery in the State of Texas, which marked the completion of emancipation throughout the former Confederate States of America. This came nearly 3 full years after the Emancipation Proclamation was issued by President Abraham Lincoln in 1862.

When we talk about the abolition of slavery, we are often led to believe that the Emancipation Proclamation was the end-all, be-all of abolition, but to omit Juneteenth from this story is to leave out a crucial part of history. That is why this holiday is so important. It is my hope that Juneteenth, being an officially recognized holiday, will bring more awareness to this incredibly important date in our nation's history.

The Juneteenth holiday provides all Americans a sense of togetherness. Slavery of any kind is intolerable. Unfortunately, throughout the history of the world, slavery has been an institution in almost every geographic region. People of all races, colors, and creeds have fought tirelessly to end it, and their efforts should not go unnoticed. The end of slavery in America in 1865 was the beginning of our togetherness, and although it continues to grow slowly throughout history, I have no doubt that the generation of children and future generations will do a better job of watering the plant of freedom. By celebrating Juneteenth National Freedom Day, you are celebrating a holiday just as important as the Fourth of July or Memorial Day, for without the end of slavery, the United States of America would not have been possible.

I want to thank you all, the Speaker and members of the House and Senate, for voting unanimously for this bill last year so that this year we could all celebrate Juneteenth National Freedom Day as a Pennsylvania-observed holiday.

I, too, want to thank the gentledady from Dauphin County for her gallant effort in authoring HB 619, which last year was signed by Governor Tom Wolf, recognizing June 19 as "Juneteenth National Freedom Day" here in the State of Pennsylvania.

Juneteenth National Freedom Day is a day that will forever commemorate the end of slavery. It will serve as a reminder of those forcibly taken into bondage from their homeland, to the freeing of those last enslaved in Galveston, Texas, on June 19, 1865. Juneteenth National Freedom Day will serve as a remembrance of our ancestors who came before us, those whose very shoulders we stand upon today, but will also serve as a reminder that we have far to go as a Commonwealth, as a nation, and as a people.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes Representative Kinsey, under unanimous consent.

Mr. KINSEY. So, Mr. Speaker, you just heard the gentelady and I talk about people coming together, and, Mr. Speaker, I have served here for 8 years and I cannot be more grateful or more thankful for the members here in this chamber today. Four days ago I buried my daughter, my second oldest daughter, and I just want to say thank you for the love and support that I received from the members. So as we talk about coming together, we all have it within us to come together, because I mean, the love that I received was coming from the sincerity and the heart of every member here, and if we can do that in times when individuals are going through personal tragedies and struggles, it is my belief that we can do it as we serve the people of this Commonwealth.

So I just wanted to say thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the love and support and us coming together to make life a little bit better for my family. Thank you.

Let us make HB 1841 a unanimous vote today right now to help law enforcement hiring procedures and assist the public in having faith in those hiring procedures.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker. I ask for a "yes" vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the lady, Representative Davidson.

Mrs. DAVIDSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, police officers have been given a place of undeniable trust in our society. They are charged with the high honor to protect and serve every member in their jurisdiction. Because of this trust, Mr. Speaker, which in some cases is unparalleled, and the high honor of service to which they pledge, they must be held to the highest standards, as well as be given the tools to meet those standards, as we will do later in HB 1910.

It is difficult, Mr. Speaker, to maintain these standards without the proper tools. Right now municipalities do not have a complete record of police officers' performance when they are making those critical hiring decisions. Currently there is no uniform way for local police departments in Pennsylvania to share instances of officer misconduct with other agencies. To find the best people for our hometowns and our municipalities, we must be able to share employment records, and that is currently not happening.

This measure, however, would help eliminate problems before they start by helping to reveal red flags during the hiring process. When there are red flags, the burden shifts to the organization that hires an officer with a troubling track record to explain their rationale. We have too often, Mr. Speaker, been horrified to learn that an officer involved in an excessive force incident or criminal behavior has a documented past of troubling behavior. So-called bad apples will spoil the barrel if they are not plucked out before the rot spreads. We have to address a culture, Mr. Speaker, where bad actors go unpunished—

The SPEAKER. The lady will please suspend.

Will the House please come to order. This is a very important issue and the lady deserves to be heard.

Mrs. DAVIDSON. We have to address a culture, Mr. Speaker – thank you – where bad actors go unpunished or move on with their baggage to new communities to exact increasingly bad actions upon unsuspecting communities.

As evidenced by the many protests around our Commonwealth and the nation, we must begin to hold people to account that should exude the highest standards in our society. This bill is part of a necessary first step to restore confidence in a law enforcement system that will demonstrate equal justice for all, Mr. Speaker, and I urge the members for a "yes" vote on HB 1841, and I am encouraged today that it is also supported by the police associations.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. You are welcome.

The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the lady, Representative McClinton.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank you to my colleagues.

I am asking all of you to unanimously support HB 1841. What we have seen in recent weeks is not new. It is not the first time people have been crying out for justice. It is not the first time people have been saying that our nation has forfeited certain parts of the community, certain people, particularly those in Black and Brown communities who look like me. Whether you are thinking about our Pledge of Allegiance, which we say on this floor, or the Preamble to the Constitution or the Declaration of Independence, over and over again we are supposed to be providing justice, but too many times there has not been justice and fairness, particularly as it relates to policing.

So I look forward to this being the first of many steps that we take in this chamber, bold steps where we work with the stakeholders, where we work with members of law enforcement, and most importantly, where we work with members of the community who are crying out across this nation demanding change finally.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Davis.

Mr. DAVIS. Mr. Speaker, I rise today in support of HB 1841, but first I would like to thank the prime sponsor of this bill, but also a number of my colleagues, particularly Representatives Miller, Lee, Rabb, and Dawkins for their work on the House Judiciary Committee to negotiate this bill.

Mr. Speaker, this bill is merely a strong first step to reforming our policing practices here in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. It is a small deposit to truly living out our creed that all men are created equal. However, there is still significant work that needs to be done. This bill alone will not merely appease the thousands of individuals who have been marching and demanding systemic change in our systems throughout this Commonwealth and throughout this country. Until we go further and address issues like use of force, arbitration, and others, we will truly not begin to see the systemic change that we want to as a society.

I am proud to cast a vote today for HB 1841. It is important. It is important for the people in my district and Black and Brown communities across this Commonwealth, and it is important for good police officers to know that the people they are serving with are held to the same standards that they are. But merely I am here to say that the work continues. We have more work to do, and

I look forward to more bipartisan bills coming out of the House Judiciary Committee.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Kenyatta.

Mr. KENYATTA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What we are about to do here today is a first step, as has been said, a first step to reforming a system that we know is badly broken. Every Black and Brown person in this chamber and outside of this chamber knows what it feels like to see those red and blue lights pull you over on a road and not know whether or not that encounter is going to end with you safely getting to your destination. We know what that feels like. I know what it feels like to be stopped and frisked, to be thrown to the ground by an officer, asked where I am going, asked what I am doing, asked why I am out. That happened a block away from the house I live in right now with my partner when I was still a student at Temple University, and I think having that Temple ID with me averted, potentially, an incredibly bad situation.

The reality is, and the statistics back it up, that Black and Brown folks are more likely to have engagements with police officers that turn deadly, and George Floyd was not the first person who the country watched be murdered on our phones, on our Facebooks, on our TV screens. Breonna Taylor is not the first person to be murdered in their home by an overzealous police officer. But we have an opportunity with this bill to begin the long, arduous process of ensuring that they are the last, that there are no more George Floyds, that there are no more Breonna Taylors, that there are no more Antwon Roses. We have an opportunity to do that, and the fact that we have not had that justice is why we are so often reminding folks that Black lives matter.

But the power of this moment is that it is not just Black folks fighting for Black lives. For now 24 days consistently, folks all across this Commonwealth have come out in communities – not just in Philadelphia, but they have come out in Venango, they have come out in Butler, they have come out in Mercer, they have come out in Clearfield, they have come out in Cambria, they have come out in Potter County, they have come out in Centre County and in Clinton and in Union and in Snyder and in Wyoming and in Luzerne and in Delaware County and Montco and Bucks. All of them have come out because they recognize that our system is broken and we need change, and the bipartisan vote that we have an opportunity to put on this board lets them know that we are listening, lets them know that we are hearing them, lets them know that we are actually doing the work that we had an opportunity to do a long time ago.

And so this is a first step. But we should not leave this chamber thinking we have fixed the issues that still exist in policing just with this one vote. This is an important step. I encourage everybody to vote for this bill, but there is still so much more that we need to do and I look forward to getting it done, and I want to thank all the folks who have helped make this happen, and thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Gainey.

Mr. GAINNEY. I want to thank my colleagues. Today is a big step. It demonstrates that we can really work together to be bipartisan on an issue that is very, very sensitive as well as very important.

Today is just the first step. It is not the ending, but it is a beginning of a relationship that we can build, one that begins to build the necessary trust that is necessary between police and community relations. As the colleague before me has said, we still have a lot of work to do. We still have the use of force that is out there that we need to discuss. We still have other bills that we need to discuss to ensure that we are doing what is best for the residents of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. But today, today, Mr. Speaker, in the General Assembly, thank you for this effort that we are putting forward today. Thank you.

I need to thank my colleagues that helped work on this – Rep. Dawkins, Rep. Lee, Rep. Miller, and Rep. Rabb – to make this day even possible. But I also want to thank you, because today we have got an opportunity to show that we can do something better for the people of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. So before we take this vote, I just want to say thank you for a new beginning. Thank you for a beginning that demonstrates that we as the General Assembly can come together to work together. Let us make this the first step of rebuilding our Commonwealth. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Representative Harris. Mr. HARRIS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, today is truly a momentous day here in our Commonwealth. As a legislative body, we stand poised to pass legislation that will increase safety for members in our communities with regards to their interactions with law enforcement.

Mr. Speaker, there has been an outcry of communities from all across this Commonwealth, from Erie County to Philadelphia, from Berks to Bucks, about a desire for change and how police interact with the communities that they serve. The people that we represent have taken to the streets. They have taken to the streets in big cities and small municipalities and towns across this Commonwealth. Places where you would not expect rallies to happen, they have taken place. And the first people we have to thank, Mr. Speaker, are all of the activists who have taken to the streets, all of those who have thought that enough is enough, all of those who, as Fannie Lou Hamer would say, are "sick and tired of being sick and tired." We have to thank the activists for taking to the streets.

Mr. Speaker, we also have to thank our White allies for standing with those activists, for taking to the streets, being willing to be arrested, being willing to be detained, being willing to, as I call it, take part in one of the most patriotic things that we have, and that is open rebellion. Oftentimes we forget, Mr. Speaker, that this very nation, the flag that many of us salute, was founded on rebellion. It is as patriotic as anything we can do, to raise our voice and allow people to understand that the way things are going cannot continue to happen.

Now, Mr. Speaker, this bill did happen in a bipartisan manner, so I have to thank the good chairman of the Judiciary Committee on the Republican side of the aisle, Chairman Kauffman. I thank our chairman, Chairman Briggs, and his staff for their help. I thank our Speaker, I thank our majority leader, I thank our minority leader. But let us be clear about this, Mr. Speaker: This is not the end goal. We are not at the end of the ramp way. We cannot take a victory lap. This is a deposit, a small deposit in a bank account that has been empty for far too long for black and brown people in our communities. This is a deposit in the bank

of bipartisanship that says that we can put Democrat and Republican aside and work on Pennsylvania. This is a deposit to say to the mother who fears for her child's life every time that child walks out the door because of a possible interaction with police. This is a deposit to her to say, "We hear you."

I saw something that touched my heart, and it was posted, that said when George Floyd screamed for his mother, all mothers came to his aid. This is a deposit for those mothers.

So, Mr. Speaker, let us celebrate the fact that we are here, but let us not forget that this is not where we should end. We still must deal with use of force. We still must deal with mandating reporters. We still must deal with arbitration. We still must deal with decertification. We still must deal with the fact that as American as rebellion is, the foundation of this country was also racism and systemic racism that must be weeded out. We are charged to do this work, and no, it will not be easy, but being leaders is not about taking the easy course. It is about taking the right one. Dr. King, whom many people often like to quote, Dr. King often talked about not doing what was politically correct, not doing what was expedient, but doing what is necessary because your conscience told you it was the right thing to do. All I ask is, through this process, let us lead with our hearts. Let us lead with our hearts – not with our political affiliations, not with where we come from – but let us lead with our hearts, understanding that when any mother has to bury her child, when any father has to bury his child, at the hands of a law enforcement officer who went rogue, that every mother and every father should feel that pain.

This is the moment, this is the opportunity for all of us to be greater than we have ever dreamed we could be. It is the defining moment that many of us will have in our legislative careers. In 10, 20 years from now, people will ask you, what did you do to address this issue? What did you do with the power that you had? Let this deposit not be the only deposit, but let us join arms and hands and finally get to a place where we can together work to reform a system that for far too long has divided the us and them, the haves and the have-nots, the Black and the Brown. If we are all Pennsylvanians, let us all be treated like that, and that is why we should pass HB 1841 and send it to the Senate so that it can go to the Governor's desk so we can make a deposit necessary in the bank of justice for all of Pennsylvanians.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Rabb.

Mr. RABB. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I had not intended to be here today. I have been with my son, who is not well. But I wanted to come for him and for you. I wanted to look in the eyes of all the people today who will be voting "yes" on HB 1841 and to thank you. This is personal to me. You see, 167 years ago it was written that we asked that in our native land, we shall not be treated as strangers and worse than strangers. We asked that being friends of America, we should not be treated as an enemy of America. We asked that speaking the same language and being of the same religion, worshipping the same God, owing our redemption to the same savior, and learning our duties from the same Bible, we shall not be treated as barbarians. Those words I stumbled across just a matter of weeks ago, written by my great-great-grandfather, Rev. Amos Noë Freeman, who was an abolitionist, and after whom my firstborn son was named, who is now in the

hospital. So I am here because of him. Because when I think of public service, when I think about community, when I think about family, when I think about faith, I think about my children and the type of role model I seek to be. And if I can look at my sons in the eye and see pride, I know I am doing the right thing.

I love that boy, and I love this institution because I know its potential. And in this moment— in this moment – I am proud because we came together. We found common cause. We do not agree on all things. That is okay. But in this moment we are acknowledging and affirming everyone's humanity and belief that everyone should be held to the same high standard of excellence, that we believe in transparency and accountability. And in this moment, because of all of the fingerprints that are on this seminal piece of legislation that will put the Keystone State not just on the map, but at the very top in terms of what policing and responsibility looks like, we can take great pride.

And so I am here to thank all of you for those who support HB 1841. It is a step in the right direction. It is a big step. There are more to come. But in this moment, thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Kauffman.

Mr. KAUFFMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And to the gentleman from Philadelphia, your son will certainly be in my prayers. We wish you and him well and that he will be restored to full health. In His name, thank you.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today on HB 1841, and our law enforcement, the thousands of law enforcement officials throughout the Commonwealth, they have truly one of the most difficult jobs in our society at this moment in time. And their jobs are made very difficult by those in their ranks who are not qualified or who have ill intent or who are rogue. And so with this legislation, this is an effort to make sure that communities across Pennsylvania are able to have the full disclosure and the knowledge that they are hiring the absolute best for their communities, those who have their communities and the law and order of their communities at heart.

And so I am pleased and proud to be able to stand up and support this legislation today. This has certainly been a work in progress and something that I thank the gentleman from Philadelphia, who just rose, as well as the gentleman, the minority whip from Philadelphia, and the minority chair from Montgomery County. I thank you all as we have worked together over the last 2 weeks to put together what I think is a piece of legislation that we all can be proud of, that it will serve to benefit all Pennsylvanians. It will serve to benefit those in law enforcement. It will serve to benefit those in all of our communities, including the minority community, which definitely has concerns that have been raised and have been heard.

And so I thank you very much, and I appreciate you working with us and I look forward to continuing the conversations as we move forward, and I encourage everyone to support HB 1841.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1910, PN 4012**, entitled:

An Act amending Titles 42 (Judiciary and Judicial Procedure), 44 (Law and Justice) and 53 (Municipalities Generally) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in selection and retention of judicial officers, further providing for continuing education credit; in other officers, providing for mental health evaluations; and, in employees, further providing for powers and duties of commission.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Speaker recognizes Representative Williams.

Mr. WILLIAMS. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

My HB 1910 would reform our police force by providing education and specialized training to Pennsylvania's police men and women. My bill would enhance protections for our Commonwealth's youngest residents by requiring officers to undergo training on how to recognize the earliest signs of child abuse and how to appropriately report those suspicions.

Now, some may say that child abuse is really not a major problem in Pennsylvania, but that is because it can easily go undetected, particularly with an untrained eye. Oftentimes instances are not brought to light until significant damage has been repeatedly inflicted upon victims or the child may not be able to verbalize what they are experiencing or even comprehend that they are being abused. In 2018 the Department of Human Services told us that 44,000 reports of child abuse in the Commonwealth had taken place, and so, obviously, we need to improve the training of frontline workers like police officers who are most likely to interact with these victims.

But secondly, my HB 1910 would update police training on de-escalation and harm-reduction techniques; interacting with individuals of diverse racial, ethnic, and economic backgrounds; and appropriate use of force. These are imperative first steps we need to take in reforming our police training procedures. There have been too many instances of excessive use of force against

innocent Pennsylvanians, and my bill helps provide the much-needed education to officers on how systemic racism impacts their roles and everyone in Pennsylvania.

I introduce HB 1910 so that our police can better serve every resident of this Commonwealth, including those who cannot speak for themselves. This legislation would make the most significant changes to Pennsylvania policing that we have seen in more than four decades, and would serve as an example to the rest of our country. We have all heard demands from Pennsylvanians calling for change, and it is time we act so not one more innocent life is lost.

I would like to thank fellow lawmakers for their support on this legislation, especially my colleagues from Philadelphia and Montgomery Counties, Representative Dawkins and Representative Stephens. I am proud that we are working towards making Pennsylvania a safer place for all, with a stronger and more informed police force.

An excruciating 8 minutes and 46 seconds has galvanized the attention of the global community, this Commonwealth, and this chamber. James Baldwin is right. He reminds us that not everything that is faced can be changed, but nothing can be changed until it is faced. And so simply by voting "yes" on this legislation, you, we become a part of a solution to address systemic racism in Pennsylvania, to help deliver justice on behalf of the survivors of child abuse and work towards creating a more effective and efficient police force. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Kauffman.

Mr. KAUFFMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to rise to thank the gentleman from Chester and working with us on this legislation. It is important to note the good work that this legislation does to continue to improve the training and the skills of those in law enforcement as they do what I already referred to as probably the toughest job in our society. It is important that we support them with the right training, to assist them as they serve us and so that they do it well within the communities that they serve.

This – I think that it has already been mentioned, but so that I do not miss anything – this training includes child abuse, interacting with individuals of diverse racial, ethnic, and economic backgrounds. It also requires training on deadly force and de-escalation, and harm-reduction techniques. It also includes implicit bias training and discussion of reconciliation techniques. And I think one of the most important concepts and additions to this bill is the idea of screening for PTSD (post-traumatic stress disorder), because we know those on the front lines, whether they be serving our country abroad or serving our country on the home front, see things that many of us would never want to see and are a part of things that many of us would never want to be a part of, and it is important that we are able to recognize and screen them and give them the support and assistance they need as they serve in our communities.

So I again want to thank my friends on the other side of the aisle, and Chairman Briggs, my counterpart on the Judiciary Committee, as well as the gentleman from Chester whose name is on HB 1910. And thank you very much. I encourage a unanimous vote on HB 1910.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Briggs.

Mr. BRIGGS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It was not my intent to speak today. I have been trying to listen, and this has been a tough time for all of us. I want a special thank you to the Legislative Black Caucus for making me listen even more. To all my community members who have been calling me and bugging me and blocking intersections, it has really been inspiring and it has been an amazing time to be in the House.

But I did want to thank the chairman for Judiciary, Rob Kauffman. He has been a good partner. He has been listening. He has been creative on trying to get to a commonsense place where we can be together. But this would not have been done without the great work of our executive director. Tim Clawges and Tom Dymek really came together for probably every day – late in the night, early in the morning – trying to come up with consensus with stakeholders to get really good bills done for Pennsylvanians, and it should not be unnoticed that we are here because of the work that they do.

We will keep listening, keep making us do more. I want to be part of this. It is definitely the work that we were sent here to do. I urge everyone to vote for HB 1910. Everyone involved in it really made it better. We have a lot more work to do and we will keep fighting. So thank you so much.

I think we would all agree that the government has the responsibility to provide a safety net for individuals and families who have fallen on hard times and ultimately help them get back on their feet. And right now there are a lot of families in our communities that have fallen on hard times. However, the government has a responsibility as well to the taxpayers who foot the bill for the safety net and to stop bad actors who are trying to game the system, taking resources away from the people who truly need them and from the people who work hard to earn a living and support their families.

Mr. Speaker, HB 2354 calls on the State Treasury to work with the Governor's Budget Office to establish a Commonwealth Do-Not-Pay Initiative modeled after the one created at the Federal level. This system will identify and detect any improper payments before they happen so that we can make sure that we stop them before they go out. The Do-Not-Pay system is designed to streamline the process to make sure that we are using a variety of data sources to determine if someone is eligible to receive taxpayer funds.

Stopping improper payments before they happen has the potential to save the Commonwealth millions of dollars not only by avoiding payments to those that are ineligible, but also by avoiding the cost associated with trying to recover funds that were improperly paid out. That means more money is available to help the folks who truly need it and to fund the core functions of our government that the taxpayers expect and deserve.

The State of Oregon reported that participating in a Do-Not-Pay program saved Oregon \$286 for every dollar spent. I am not an investor, but that sure seems like a good investment. And this is a good bill, this is good government, and I ask my colleagues to please support HB 2354.

Mr. MURT called up **HR 518, PN 2542**, entitled:

A Resolution honoring the legacy of Richard "Dick" Anthony Allen as a standout baseball player and his contributions to the Philadelphia Phillies and calling for the voters on the veterans committee to elect Mr. Allen to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2020.

On the question,
Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes Representative Murt.

Mr. MURT. I will be brief, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it has been many years that we have considered and pled to the committees of the Baseball Hall of Fame. It is time. In fact, it is long past time to induct Phillies star Dick Allen.

Mr. Speaker, this is a no-brainer. Born and raised in Wampum, Pennsylvania, Lawrence County, the former Philadelphia Phillies slugger graduated from Wampum High School in 1960, and was signed by the Phillies at that time. After

a few years in the minors, Allen was called up to the Phillies lineup on September 3, 1963, where he played his first game as a Philly in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

Mr. Speaker, I am sorry to say that while playing in the minors in places like Little Rock, Arkansas, where he was the first Black player the team ever had, Dick Allen experienced some of the worst racism imaginable. Allen had never been to the South when the Phillies sent him there in 1961, and the team provided very little in the way of support for the young ballplayer.

Dick Allen remained with the Phillies for six seasons, making history by hitting an estimated 529-foot home run that cleared the Coca-Cola sign in Connie Mack Stadium's left-center field. I will add that our colleague, Representative Jim Roebuck, witnessed that home run.

Dick Allen received many awards during his career, Mr. Speaker. He was named "Rookie of the Year" in 1964 and the American League's "Most Valuable Player" in 1972, and an all-star for seven seasons, yet he has not been inducted to the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame. HR 518 calls on the Veterans Committee to elect him to the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York, in 2020. In 2014 he fell one vote shy of getting elected to the hall in 2014 by the Golden Era Committee.

Mr. Speaker, I think it is important that we make this right for this son of Pennsylvania who has earned his way into Baseball's Hall of Fame. It is the most appropriate way to recognize a career filled with record-breaking home runs, athletic achievement, and sportsmanship.

And during the pandemic, obviously, ensuring that there was continued power and electricity to our first responders, our hospitals, our businesses, our homes, and home offices was critical, and in order to ensure that they were able to continue that mission, many of the staff at PJM, who have very specialized roles in ensuring the reliability and continued operability of the electric grid, were actually sequestered for 10 straight weeks so that they could ensure that they remained safe and able to continue to provide that electric service to all of our essential, as I said, EMS (emergency medical services), hospitals, and everyone else.

In addition to the 10 straight weeks of sequestration, PJM also stood up a third control room in the event that any of the first two became contaminated and were unable to be used. They stood up a third control room that would be available just in the event that it was necessary.

So I just wanted to congratulate and thank the folks at PJM for their continued dedication to not only the people of this Commonwealth, who obviously required their power and electricity throughout the height of the pandemic, but also those in the neighboring States who rely on PJM for their services.

So if the House could join me in just a round of applause and congratulating and thanking PJM for their work, I would appreciate it. Thank you.

STATEMENT BY MR. MURT

Mr. Speaker, I just wanted to make a comment or two about HB 1597, which names some of the roads and bridges in Pennsylvania for some of the men and women who have died in service to our nation and our Commonwealth, and, Mr. Speaker, two of the road-namings are related to my district.

Mr. Speaker, in the small town of Hatboro, the Borough of Hatboro in Montgomery County, population under 3,000, 7 men lost their lives in the Vietnam war, and two of them are going to be permanently memorialized through HB 1597, and I want to make reference to these men.

One is Capt. Will Ahlum of Hatboro, who was killed on March 23, 1969. Captain. Ahlum served in the Army and was a commissioned officer. He was commissioned through the Pennsylvania Military College, which is now Widener University. Captain. Ahlum was in Vietnam for only a few weeks when he was killed in Binh Dinh Province, South Vietnam. At the time of his death, Captain. Ahlum was serving in the 1st Logistical Command, 184th Ordnance Battalion. Captain. Ahlum was the recipient of the Purple Heart, National Defense Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Vietnam Service Medal,

Distinguished Service Medal, Vietnam Gallantry Cross Unit Citation, and the Good Conduct Medal.

Mr. Speaker, Captain. Ahlum was actually my neighbor. I was 9 years old when he died, and I remember he lived on our street, and I remember how devastated our neighborhood was that this young man in the prime of his life was struck down in that very unpopular war.

Mr. Speaker, the other road-naming was for S4 Harold E. Cashman, known as Eddie Cashman. Eddie Cashman was drafted while he was attending Delaware Valley College, which is now Delaware Valley University. Mr. Speaker, Eddie Cashman could have claimed a student deferment. He was a full-time college student. He could have gotten a deferment, but he felt an obligation to serve our nation. He felt an obligation to go into the military, so he did not claim a student deferment. And after completion of his basic training, SP4 Cashman was assigned to the Elite 1st Cavalry Division and deployed to South Vietnam in August of 1967. In January of '68, he was killed in Quang Tri Province, on the very first day of the Tet Offensive.

Both of these men lived in my neighborhood. Of course, they were much older than I was, but because of this legislation, they will be permanently memorialized in our community, just blocks from where they lived, the road that they probably took frequently in their lives.

So I want to thank Representative Gillen and my colleagues for voting in the affirmative on this.

So we are requesting by this affirmative vote that we are recognizing "Foster Care Month" in Pennsylvania and encouraging families to please get involved in that program that helps children so vitally across the Commonwealth.
