A Resolution recognizing the accomplishments of Rocco Colavito, Jr., and recommending his nomination to the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

On the question,

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes Representative Jozwiak.

Mr. JOZWIAK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

When I say the name "Rocky," I know what most people think. Most of my colleagues, especially those from the southeast, think of the fictional boxer portrayed by Sylvester Stallone. But what most people do not realize, Mr. Speaker, is that Pennsylvania is home to a real-life sports hero named "Rocky."

Rocco Domencio Colavito, Jr., the "Iconic Slugger." Rocky Colavito is a former Major League Baseball player who currently resides in Berks County. He is actually a neighbor of mine.

But Rocky Colavito was not just any Major League Baseball player. Rocky was born in the Bronx in New York City. At the age of 16 when most teenagers are thinking about getting their driver's license, Rocky Colavito signed a contract to play with the Cleveland Indians. He was originally drafted as a pitcher when he arrived at Daytona Beach for their spring training. He began playing with the Minor League Indianapolis Indians, where he hit 38 home runs and drove in 116 runs batted in.

Rocky played for the Reading Indians where he met his wife, Carmen Perroti, and they were married in 1956. At Reading, in only one season, he hit 28 home runs.

He made his Major League debut with the Cleveland Indians in 1955. He finished that year tied for American League Rookie of the Year. Rocky not only could hit the ball, he was an accomplished right-fielder who could throw the ball to home plate with extraordinary accuracy to the amazement of other teams' players.

With a name like "Rocky," it is little surprise to learn that he was a great power hitter. He hit for a career high of .303 batting average in 1958 with 41 home runs – only 1 run behind the league leader, Mickey Mantle – and 113 runs batted in.

On June 10 of 1959, he became only the eighth player in Major League Baseball to accomplish one extraordinary feat. He not only hit one, not two, not three, but four home runs in a single game. He played professional ball for an additional 9 years.

Rocky Colavito retired from Major League Baseball on September 30, 1968. By the time he was finished, he finished his career with a .266 batting average. He hit a total of 374 home runs, and he amassed 1,159 runs batted in. And he was named an All-Star nine times during his career.

Rocky Colavito remains a hero to this day. The people of Cleveland, Ohio, absolutely love Rocky. They are honoring him by erecting a statue of him at their baseball field, Progressive Field, later this year.

Mr. Colavito was inducted into the Cleveland Indians Hall of Fame in 2006. His accomplishments as a baseball player are superior to some players already in the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame. There are many stories and accounts of Rocky Colavito during his baseball career, too many to mention, but I can tell you this, Rocky Colavito is one of the greatest Major League Baseball players of all time, and not only that, he is a great human being.

Mr. Speaker, I ask my colleagues for an affirmative vote on HR 669. Mr. Speaker, I also want to tell you to please join me in honoring the baseball life of Rocky Colavito and help nominate him into the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame.

Rocky and his wife, Carmen, wanted to be here with us today for this momentous vote, but unfortunately, at age 85 he is very concerned about the COVID-19 issues. Rocky is a very proud man and sends his apology and his gratitude to all the members of the House of Representatives.

A Resolution recognizing the week of September 20 through 26, 2020, as "Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week" in Pennsylvania.

On the question,
Will the House adopt the resolution?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the honorable gentleman Representative Williams.

Mr. WILLIAMS. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

I am proud to stand here today to introduce HR 870, which recognizes September 20 through 26, 2020, as "Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week."

Since the 1800s, historically black colleges and universities have played a crucial role in American society by providing a space where African-Americans and others can develop their talents and thrive. HBCUs have been a potent force against injustice. They have been a means of fulfilling the gaps within the American ideal that "all men are created equal." These educational institutions helped to lift up the African-American community when most colleges and universities refused to admit or limited the admission of African-Americans prior to the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964. I need you to pause and soak in the significance of that.

For a century after the Civil War, colleges and universities were allowed to participate in the restriction of the intellectual and cultural development of American citizens. These institutions were a haven for people hungry for knowledge, for achievement, for a way out of the servitude society imposed on them. The HBCUs offered a place for thousands of African-Americans and others to develop their God-given talents and so provided them with opportunities to serve their community as well as their country.

Though most HBCUs were established after the Civil War, Pennsylvania's own Cheyney University of Pennsylvania has the distinction of being the first HBCU to be established in 1837. A short time later, in 1854, our own Lincoln University was founded. HBCUs have produced leaders that have helped the African-American community through Jim Crow and the segregated South and North. These institutions have been a light in the midst of darkness, a testament to the best of the human spirit and a fulfillment of the promise of the equality of all people.

HBCUs have produced leaders in business, law, government, academia, religion, and the military. They have played an important role in building a thriving African-American presence in Pennsylvania, and HBCUs have been an intellectual haven to other minorities as well.

In the 1930s when many Jewish intellectuals had to flee Europe after the rise of Hitler and faced anti-Semitism at other American institutions of higher education, they found an intellectual home at historically black colleges. From 1933 to 1945, more than—

From 1933 to 1945, more than two-thirds of the faculty hired at HBCUs had come to the United States to escape Nazi Germany. Albert Einstein received an honorary degree from and taught classes at Lincoln University. These institutions have a long and illustrious legacy of providing students, regardless of race or gender, a chance to grow and reach their potential. HBCUs' rigorous educational standards and commitment to diversity have contributed to our national economic competitiveness and prosperity.

According to the United States Department of Education, these institutions welcome students from all backgrounds, including more than 8,000 F-1 international students. They have helped to make the United States a beacon of intellectual freedom and economic opportunity to the world. These institutions have also helped develop the diverse character of the United States – the source of its greatness and the hope of its future.

Today the United States has more than 100 historically black colleges and universities. Needless to say, HBCUs are a source of great pride for the African-American community and the entire nation.

So please join me in recognizing September 20 through 26, 2020 as "Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week," during which we reaffirm our support for HBCUs and acknowledge the influence they have had and will continue to have in our Commonwealth.

Mr. Speaker, since the early 1800s, historically black colleges and universities have served the educational needs of Black Americans at a time when many schools actually barred their doors to these students. Most often, historically black colleges and universities were the only opportunity for higher education for Black college students.

Mr. Speaker, today in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania students at Cheyney University and Lincoln University study and work in empowering educational environments. Students find that the courses offered at Lincoln and Cheyney offer a one-of-a-kind opportunity to study and explore various academic disciplines as well as African-American history and experiences. The students at Cheyney and Lincoln Universities work with devoted faculty and staff, many from similar cultural backgrounds, Mr. Speaker, which creates an atmosphere of community and collaboration. Most importantly, Cheyney and Lincoln give lower-income and first-generation college students the opportunity to become first-generation college graduates. Every day we read news articles about students questioning the value of a college degree, but schools like Lincoln and Cheyney show that there is a pathway that is financially responsible, an educational investment, and academically invaluable.

That is why, Mr. Speaker, we should be pleased to support HR 870 in declaring the week of September 20 "Historically Black Colleges and Universities Week" in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

BILLS ON CONCURRENCE IN SENATE AMENDMENTS

The House proceeded to consideration of concurrence in Senate amendments to **HB 256, PN 4054**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 18 (Crimes and Offenses) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in assault, further providing for the offense of assault by prisoner; in sexual offenses, further providing for the offense of institutional sexual assault; and, in registration of sexual offenders, further providing for sexual offenses and tier system.

On the question,
Will the House concur in Senate amendments?

The SPEAKER. Moved by the gentleman, Mr. Metzgar, that the House concur in the amendments inserted by the Senate.

The Chair recognizes Representative Metzgar for a brief description of Senate amendments.

Mr. METZGAR. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The Senate amended to bring the penalties for assault in line with the aggravated assault code as it exists, and secondly, amended that the offense of institutional sexual assault cannot be waived by consent when committed by a peace officer. I encourage the members to vote in the affirmative.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Delaware County, Representative Vitali.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you.

Will the maker stand for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman agrees. You may proceed.

Mr. VITALI. I had a question based on an e-mail I recently received. In caucus it was my understanding that this increased the assault by a prisoner without a deadly weapon and without intent to cause serious harm from an M-2 to an F-2, and it also increased the penalty for a crime committed by a prisoner on a corrections officer with a deadly weapon or with intent to commit serious crime to an F-1. But I got an e-mail that seemed to reflect that this may not have been an actual increase, but an attempt to consolidate two disparate statutes.

Does this bill that we will be voting on today result in an actual increase in these penalties, or not an increase but just some sort of consolidation or reconciliation in some way?

Mr. METZGAR. Mr. Speaker, the offense to which the good gentleman is referring to is actually already an F-1 offense. However, the bill lowers the threshold from "serious bodily injury" to simply "bodily injury." That was in the original bill as we sent it over from the House to the Senate.

Mr. VITALI. So if one – under this bill the action committed by a person on another person which would normally be an M-1 – rather, an M-2 – under this bill will be elevated to an F-2 if it is committed by a prisoner on a corrections officer, substantially increasing the penalty?

Mr. METZGAR. The offense was not a misdemeanor-2. It already was a felony offense.

Mr. VITALI. So it increases it to an F-2 from— I am trying to get at if this is an actual increase in a penalty. I think you are saying yes, but I am not quite—

Mr. METZGAR. Mr. Speaker, the bill as amended increases the threshold from "serious bodily injury" to – decreases the threshold from "serious bodily injury" to "bodily injury," but the offense that you are referring to, I believe what you are referring to, was never an M-2 offense, it was a felony.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Thank you.

Okay. And just to sum up, you are essentially increasing a penalty here – or you are lowering the standard, which I guess is essentially the same thing. You are penalizing an action that did not involve an intent to cause serious bodily injury, you are giving that the penalty of an action that actually there was the intent to cause serious bodily injury.

Mr. METZGAR. The underlying bill – the purpose is to protect corrections officers from attacks from inmates, and in recent history, Sgt. Mark Baserman was murdered by an inmate. The prison system, by accounts from the union that represents the prison guards, has been out of control. We are trying to bring control back to the corrections facilities and avoid another murder by an inmate on a corrections officer.

This bill would lower the threshold of harm that is required from "serious bodily injury" to "bodily injury," and I think that it will do a good job of protecting our corrections officers, but the bill also has language within it that helps protect inmates from a corrections officer that might be out of line, where in this case institutional sexual assault is being penalized, and in addition to that, with regard to peace officers, there is no affirmative defense of consent that would be allowed in there.

So you know, it is a broad-sweeping bill that, you know, again the main target on the underlying bill was to regain control of our prisons and make them safer for both inmates and corrections officers, to limit the assaults that occur, and the way that we were going about doing that was to lower the threshold for injury that would require this charge to be brought.

Mr. VITALI. Okay. Thank you. I do not have any other questions.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Dan Miller.

Mr. D. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I want to thank the good gentleman not only for his efforts but also his comments during interrogation to which I have none.

So I just want to speak on the bill today. Obviously, I have in its previous incarnations voted "no" on this bill, and let me say as someone who has worked in many prisons and jails, I very much appreciate the challenges that are inherent in that work, in that job, in that environment. There is no doubt there are many good-hearted people both who wear a badge and who otherwise serve the population that is there, especially those who are trying to work on the types of services that will help them find success when the people transition back out.

There is a lot of good work that is done, and again, I do not want to rehash certain things and I do not want to go into interrogation. I do appreciate the gentleman. I think where it comes down for me on this is that we just seem to have a difference of opinion on how best to make a prison more safe, how best to make a prison more safe. So, you know, in my

previous work I had a chance to be a public defender and serve Allegheny County in that regard. During that time I obviously represented clients to the best of my ability to make sure their constitutional rights and our system worked in a way that we could be proud of as Americans. That being the case, I never met, in my years of working in the public defender's office, a person who was a defendant in a case who told me that they were going to commit a felony, but then they looked at the Crimes Code and they said that it is too much of a penalty, therefore I decided to go with a misdemeanor. That does not happen. It is a fiction scenario for us to talk about, to act as if somehow increasing penalties is a deterrent, especially in regards to those who are already incarcerated. Too much has already been said and told as to how best we can improve not just the safety in prisons for all who work there and live there but the outcomes of our system as well, the outcomes of our prisons and jails, and this continues to be something that in reality this body has not really addressed as to what we can do to improve safety and improve outcomes in our prisons and jails.

In reality, of course, again, with all due respect, I just do not believe that doubling-down on felonies is the way that we are going to create that better tomorrow. We want to be sure that every correction officer gets home safely, there is no doubt about that, just like we want to be sure that each person who is in that facility is treated with respect and given the opportunity to better themselves so they have a chance to find a greater level of success when they are done being incarcerated.

Again, for me, the challenge that comes up is we took a bill that I believe has both Democrat and Republican support in relation to sex assaults, we took that bill and shoved it in here, and this continues, I think, to be something that sets us back. We end up taking one step forward as if somehow asking people who put people in custody to not sexually assault them was somehow a big bridge that we needed to do, that somehow was something to which was like a big deal for us to say. It is not. It is not worth trading anything for. It should be a reality of how we look to conduct ourselves as a society that we say, look, no matter whether that person is in official detention or whether that person is in custody, you do not sexually assault them.

I do not think it is radical. I do not think it is tough to understand. I do not think, to be honest, it probably needed all the attention here that we have done today or kind of shoved into this bill, but yet we are told, look, the deal is we will somehow send the message for those who I guess were thinking about sexually assaulting somebody in their custody that now you should not, and in that tradeoff we will then create an entirely new felony, in essence, that by the way covers just exactly what is already done by aggravated assault. There is no difference. All we have done now is created a new way for more felonies to be charged, a new way for sentences to be stacked in Pennsylvania.

I hope I am wrong, and I hope with the good gentleman's intent to which I very much appreciate that this bill brings justice through our prisons and safety home for everybody who works and lives there. My belief, though, is that it is the wrong approach. It is the wrong approach for our system, and it is disguising the real discussions we should be having regarding supporting social services, regarding everything that would be needed to make our prisons safer and more effective. That is the real discussion we should be having: What type of resources can we put into those prisons and jails that can make it so that when

they come out, they are more likely to find success, not let us find another way to stack a felony on top of you and hope somehow that, I guess, makes it right.

So again, I very much appreciate the gentleman and his efforts with it. I voted against this bill twice before. I will do so again.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman from Jefferson County, Representative Dush.

Mr. DUSH. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of HB 256 as it came back on concurrence, and I thank the maker of this bill. As someone who has actually served as a corrections officer within the Department of Corrections, I would like to correct one of the things that was recently said – actually, a couple of things.

First of all, these inmates plan attacks, and if they have something to think about as far as an increase in their time, it makes a difference. It does not matter if it is just a misconduct that— I will give you an example. We opened up SCI (State Correctional Institution)-Forest. They had a number of inmates from a certain institution that had transferred up to open that prison up. The cell block that had the dietary workers, they consistently held up count every single day. I walked in there – and this was a small level – but I walked in there, when I finally got to be down there, and I wrote up over 18 misconducts, a bunch of block cards, and showed progressive discipline on these guys.

The next time I came back in there, we called for standing count and there was the usual language and I said, "It's all right. It is Dush. I have got my pen." We were done in 5 minutes instead of 25. Watching guys that when I was up in that tower being the first person to actually pull the rifle on an incident, there was a difference after I pulled that rifle. They take into consideration consequences. I never had another assault on the walk after I pulled that rifle. You cannot stand there and actually tell me that these inmates do not consider the consequences of their actions.

So with that, Mr. Speaker, I think this is a great deterrent. We will never know – the thing about prevention is you never know how many lives you saved, how many incidents you prevented when you are doing preventative action, but this is an excellent preventative measure to help protect the safety and welfare of our corrections staff.

The Senate amended the bill to provide that a limited power of attorney specifically for manufactured homes, which generally has a short lifespan of 90 days, is still valid if the 90th day occurs during a disaster declaration and for 10 days after the declaration has been – the disaster has been declared over. And the Senate also amended the bill to say that an insurance company and licensed dealer can transfer a manufactured home with a secure power of attorney when the manufactured certificate of origin for a new vehicle is in possession of the lienholder.

The Chair now recognizes Representative Lawrence for a brief description of Senate amendments.

Mr. LAWRENCE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, the Senate amended HB 2455, which itself amends the Administrative Code, to include language that in essence ratifies an agreement between the city of Pittsburgh and the Pittsburgh Water and Sewer Authority on how the two entities will deal with one another over the next several years.

Mr. Speaker, the House will recall that HB 2455 passed this chamber earlier this year by a vote of 201 to 1 and is now before us on concurrence after passing the Senate unanimously. The bill adds language to the Admin Code to require regular reporting regarding COVID-19 testing in this Commonwealth, including the acquisition of testing supplies by the State, costs involved, limitations experienced by the State laboratory, and data derived

from testing including demographic information. This information is of vital public interest as we face the unprecedented challenges associated with the coronavirus. I ask for an affirmative vote on concurrence.

Mr. Speaker, climate change is an existential threat to our planet. It is already here. We see it on a regular occasion now with extreme weather events.

Just a few weeks ago I learned about a new kind of storm; it is called a derecho. It is characterized by damaging winds of greater than 58 miles per hour, and it is like a tornado except the winds are horizontal versus circular. In my own backyard a probably 20-year-old oak tree took a tumble, and thankfully, none of our kids were outside. But my neighbors down the street, the Downeys, had one of those large oak trees fall on their home. Their daughter was in her bedroom, and thankfully, she was able to get out safely, without injury, but they are now homeless for the next 6 to 9 months while their home is repaired.

Derechos occur in parts of Australia and Africa, not in North America. Climate change is a threat to every Pennsylvanian's health, safety, and welfare. And under Article I, section 27, of the Pennsylvania Constitution, we have a responsibility to uphold every Pennsylvanian's right to clean air, pure water, and preservation of our natural resources and the esthetic value of the environment. The Governor and his administration already have the authority under the Air Pollution Control Act of 1959 to take measures to reduce pollutants in our air and to increase air quality in Pennsylvania.

This amendment would reduce the amount of time for the public comment period. I am a big proponent of public comment periods, and therefore I do believe we have to have a reasonable amount of time, but just like many other projects, like oil and gas projects, 30 to 60 days, 60 to 90 days, is plenty of time for the public to comment on these kinds of regulations.

We do not have more time to act on climate change. Now is the time. Please vote "yes" on this amendment.

Specifically, this legislation acknowledges that as a matter of Pennsylvania law, statutory and constitutional authority currently exists that authorizes a State agency to regulate or impose a fee on carbon dioxide emissions. Therefore, it is the responsibility of the General Assembly to work together with the Department of Environmental Protection, the Environmental Quality Board, the Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission, and other important stakeholders, to regulate or impose a fee on carbon dioxide emissions.

This amendment also clarifies the authority of "...the Governor, the Environmental Quality Board, the Department of Environmental Protection or any other agency or official to adopt regulations, implement a policy or take...other action to authorize the Commonwealth to join or participate in a State or

Ms. INNAMORATO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I actually agree with the maker of the bill on the one point, and
that is the point of understanding the economic impact of joining
an initiative like RGGI. I would like to understand what the job
loss would be and what the impact would be on the fossil fuel
industry. I would also like to understand what we can gain from
joining a program like RGGI and what the ecological and public
health costs would be, including the years of life lost due to
increased pollution.

That is why my amendment would require an environmental
impact study and cost analysis to be conducted by the Legislative
Budget and Finance Committee relative to the reduction and use
of fossil fuels in the Commonwealth, including the impact of the
production and use of fossil fuels on air quality, job markets,
carbon emissions, water quality, and public health. The findings
of the study would be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin and
available to the General Assembly. It is very important when we
are doing this job to understand the full spectrum of costs related
to the production and use of fossil fuels in Pennsylvania so we
can understand how much the negative externalities, the status
quo, is costing the people of the Commonwealth.

Fossil fuels are on a significant decline, with coal generation
in the State dropping almost 79 percent from 2007 to 2019,
leaving only five large conventional coal plants. These plants will
likely retire before 2022 without joining RGGI. We have an
overabundance of cheap fracked gas to blame and nothing else.
And if you have been paying attention to fossil fuel markets, you
may have seen that the gas industry has been a part of some high-
profile bankruptcies and recent criminal investigations, leaving
our communities bearing the financial, social, and health costs
generated by these private industries and leaving workers without
jobs. We can no longer trust the private sector to do the right thing
without intervention and oversight from the public sector.

This sort of analysis is especially important for our records
given the magnitude of tax expenditures and fossil fuel subsidies
that benefit these industries, including the lack of extraction tax
and recent proposals like HB 1100 to subsidize fossil fuel
consumption. We must be a more informed legislature and stop
allowing our constituency to bear the risk and consequences of
the fossil fuel industry while private companies keep the profits
without paying their fair share.

HB 885 amends the Contractors' Bond Law of 1967 to remove the ability for municipalities to accept alternative and oftentimes less secure securities.

Pennsylvania taxpayers should not have to pay for government's failure to oversee itself, and this legislation would close a loophole that would clarify the security for all levels of government equal to the contract amount in the form of a performance bond, a payment bond, or irrevocable letters of credit, or an escrow account.
