## RECOGNITION OF CHIEF CLERK DAVID REDDECLIFF

The SPEAKER. Members, please take your seats. Move any conversations off the back of the House. We will be moving to the special portion of our opening ceremonies here this morning. As many of you know, our Chief Clerk is retiring. I want to thank him. I have a couple remarks for him, and we also have a very special opportunity for some other individuals to also share remarks.

It is my great honor and pleasure to recognize and congratulate our Chief Clerk, Dave Reddecliff, on his retirement from the House of Representatives. Dave has served this institution loyally for 38 years. He is retiring with an exemplary record of service which began in 1982, when he was hired as a district staff assistant to Representative Paul Wass. Paul represented Indiana County and Dave was a recent graduate of the Indiana University of Pennsylvania. From there he would move to Harrisburg to continue building his distinguished career with the House. He worked with Representative George Hasay and the House Republican Conservation Committee, and then with a host of caucus leaders that included Representatives Harry Bowser, Howard Fargo, Dave Argall, and finally, Speaker Turzai.

The culmination of his career came on December 9, 2015, when Dave was sworn in as Chief Clerk and assumed the responsibilities for overseeing our daily operations here in this chamber. For the past 5 years he has held this position with distinction. He is well known for his outgoing personality and strong personal virtues. He assumed the role of Chief Clerk with a reputation for forging positive relationships with members and staff and managing operations efficiently and cost-effectively. I will let him share his own experiences on the cost-effectiveness. I saw a recent quote where he called himself the "Cheap Clerk," and I got a good chuckle when I saw that. If you know Dave, he is very approachable with a sense of humor like that.

You know his work ethic is impeccable and tireless and that he is always looking for ways to do things better, whether it is better utilization of space or more efficient light bulbs, Dave's mind is always working and focused on improving. He is a great collaborator. He welcomes ideas and suggestions from others and is receptive to outside-the-box thinking. These kinds of collaborations have resulted in improvements to our House chamber, to our committee rooms, to the technology that we use, and to the contracts that provide our services.

Dave worked long hours with the Bipartisan Management Committee to keep us safe during the pandemic. He led efforts to ensure that all members and staff had adequate personal protective equipment. Remote access capabilities were installed in the House chamber and in committee rooms. He was here each and every day the House was in session during the pandemic, and many other days when we were not.

Part of Dave's legacy will undoubtedly be the millions he saved the Commonwealth in contract, personnel, and operations costs. However, as Dave prepares to leave this institution – one that I know he loves dearly– I think he will be remembered most for his personal attributes. Dave has an extraordinary ability to connect with people. He has a remarkable rapport with staff, matching abilities to positions and bringing out the best in people throughout the process. His humble demeanor and broad and friendly smile immediately put you at ease. After a few minutes of conversation, Dave has discovered something you hold in

common, and he will be your friend forever. This is what makes Dave unique and what has made him especially well-suited and successful in the various positions that he has held here over the last 38 years.

Dave, as we bid you farewell, I want to sincerely and personally thank you, on behalf of all the members, for your outstanding and selfless service to the House of Representatives. Thank you for making this institution a better place and for positively impacting all of our lives. You will most assuredly be missed.

We wish you the very best as you enter the next phase of your life, which I understand will involve quite a bit of traveling to see your three children, and maybe a little bit of time on the golf course. You have earned it, my friend. We will miss you.

#### REMARKS BY MAJORITY LEADER

The SPEAKER. At this time I would like to recognize the majority leader for some remarks as well.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I never like farewells or goodbyes, David, so bear with us. But, Mr. Speaker, we do appreciate the opportunity to share a couple comments.

I do rise with great pride to recognize our outgoing Chief Clerk, David Reddecliff, and we wish him and his family well in retirement. Your mark on us and on this building will never be forgotten, and you will be cherished both collectively and individually.

On a personal note, I would have to say that my life is truly better because you were in it and being able to say that we have a friendship. So, Mr. Chief "Cheap" Clerk, you have my many thanks, as well as that of the chamber, and I wish you, your lovely wife, and your family the best in the future. Do not forget us; come back and visit. Thank you for your service. We are truly honored.

#### REMARKS BY DEMOCRATIC LEADER

The SPEAKER. At this time the Speaker recognizes the Democratic leader, Representative McClinton.

Ms. McCLINTON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Chief Clerk, is it okay if I take my mask off? It is a joke.

Now I know why the heat was never on in my office, because you are the "Cheap Clerk."

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On behalf of the House Democratic Caucus, including our former retired members who are all very affectionate and fond of Dave Reddecliff, we are grateful for your service as our Chief Clerk. While this position is not well understood by people outside of our institution, it is a very important role for all of us who are so blessed and privileged to serve inside of this institution. The work done by our Chief Clerk is very important. It allows all of us to do our work as legislators, and when done right, it should not be an office that pushes a partisan agenda; rather, it is the job of the Chief Clerk to protect and advance the House as an institution and to provide all of us the tools that we need to fulfill our constitutional duty.

Dave, you worked on the Republican side of the House staff for many years before becoming our Chief Clerk, but when you took this job, you took it very seriously. That is more than we can say about some. But you have looked out for us in many ways, and for that, we will be grateful. And you have made my transition – which has been very swift and brief – very easy into this role as Democratic leader.

So speaking for our entire caucus, we salute you, we congratulate you, and we thank your family – who has had to make many sacrifices, because we used to have lots of long nights with the gentleman from the 26th District – but we appreciate your hard work.

#### REMARKS BY MS. HELM

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative Helm.

Ms. HELM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today is a bittersweet day for the House of Representatives as we say goodbye to our Chief Clerk and friend, Dave Reddecliff. An employee of the Commonwealth since 1982, Dave's steadfast commitment to his role has shone through the multiple positions he has held during his career. I first had the pleasure of meeting Dave in 1988 when he came to work for me at my real estate office. From day one his dedication and work ethic were clear, and I knew he would be an asset to any team lucky enough to have him. And while Dave never worked for me personally during my time in government, I have been fortunate to call him a friend and colleague. In fact, I would say that Dave has played a large part in the fact that I am standing here today.

When I was running for my first elected position in 1988, I had a scheduling conflict for the day that the candidates draw for ballot position. Knowing the situation, Dave volunteered to draw my number on my behalf. I still remember seeing the look of dread on his face later that day when he told me he drew last ballot position. He knew – but this being my first election, he did not know if I knew – if you cannot be first, it is best to be last. I won that election, and that was the start of my political career. Over the next few years I made countless friends and connections thanks to Dave, one of whom became chief of staff for Governor Ridge. Through that connection, I was able to gain my footing in Pennsylvania politics.

When Dave first met with me about selling real estate on a part-time basis, he made it a point to tell me that when he and Carole had their first child, he would not continue with real estate. True to his word, Dave chose to leave real estate in 1992 after the birth of his first child, Andrew.

Dave is exactly the type of colleague you hope to have: intelligent, honest, and dedicated. He helped me navigate my way through my early days in Pennsylvania politics, and I thank him for that.

I would like to tell one funny story. Dave and several of his neighbors were unhappy with the builder/developer of their community. I get this call from the builder asking me to have Dave remove the signs he placed in his yard. I said, "Oh, Dave wouldn't do that. I know Dave wouldn't do that." So I called Dave and I asked him if he really does have signs in his yard, and his reply was "Yes, I do." That is our Dave, as honest as they come. And he not only removed the signs, but he and his wife, Carole, purchased a second home from that same builder. I called the builder to refresh my memory as to what those signs said, and the builder's reply was, "I can't remember. All I remember are good things about Dave Reddecliff."

And now, Dave, it is time for you to enjoy the fruits of your labor. We will certainly miss seeing you on the House floor and around the Capitol, but you have more than earned your retirement. Thank you for your friendship and for your many years of service to our wonderful Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

There is no one in the Hall of the House to whom I will not talk and to whom I will not listen...I will talk and I will listen and I will learn." In my own career, I have purposefully attempted to abide by rules like this each and every day. I talk and listen to all. I stay positive, regardless of the circumstances, and I treat everyone with respect. Another verse from Ecclesiastes that I embrace reminds us all that "there is nothing better for people than to be happy and to do good while they live."

The first former member that had an enormous impact on me was Representative Paul Wass. He was my first boss; a very caring, generous man of faith who hired me as a recent IUP grad in the 62d Legislative District office to get my foot in the door. Ironically, his was the final condolence resolution that I had the honor to read just last week. Over the years I called and visited Paul regularly, so he knew how much our friendship meant to me.

In 1983 I met Sam Hayes, the former majority leader and minority whip, who assigned me to the research staff. Sam is a smart, straightforward, and focused guy. He saw something in me when I was just a young man. I am forever grateful for his willingness to take a chance on me. Sam, if you are watching, thank you.

My first chairman, George Hasay, was kind and decent and got along with everyone. Unfortunately, he, too, recently passed away.

Harry Bowser, a grape farmer, barber, and an outstanding boss and good friend, was the first to give me a shot working in leadership. He could be gruff on the outside, but I saw a compassionate and fun-loving person on the inside who loved to take his staff to the Carsonville Hotel, a little town in northern Dauphin County.

From 1988 to 2000 I worked for Howard Fargo, another wonderful mentor, close friend, and golfing buddy. Howard and I developed a close bond almost immediately, even though we were over three decades in age apart. We had many things in common, but most of all I enjoyed golfing with him more than anyone else on the Harrisburg scene. I still visit him and his wife, June, when we travel to Florida.

I spent the next 8 years with Dave Argall's team before he abandoned us for the other chamber. Interestingly enough, Dave and I became friends much earlier when we both served in the Research Department. I felt a little guilty at first not going with him to the Senate, but my heart has always been in this chamber, and upon further reflection, things turned out pretty well.

In 2010 I got the infamous call from Mike Turzai when I was in Phoenix, Arizona, shortly after he became majority leader. I say infamous because he mistakenly called me the next day to ask when I would be back in Pennsylvania. At that point, not telling me what he wanted, I thought perhaps he was getting rid of all the old guys. Little did I know that a new and exciting adventure was around the corner. Mike, along with his former top advisers and good friends, Sara Kennedy, Krystjan Callahan, Neal Lesher, and Steve Miskin, are with us today, and I cannot express enough what it means to me to have you folks join us. Thank you.

As I reflect on the years I have served, today may be the most difficult day of my career. Saying goodbye is never easy, especially when I have thoroughly enjoyed the tasks and challenges of each and every day and consider you all such good and great friends. While I may soon be forgotten - after all, I do know how this place works – each of you and my time here will be on my mind for quite a while. Someone once said that you never really leave a place you love, you take part of it with you and leave part of you there. I knew from the very beginning that I would never be perfect in this job, but what I did recognize immediately was this position was perfect for me.

It has truly been my honor and privilege to serve this institution and the citizens of our Commonwealth in this historic role that dates back to 1682. I am blessed in so many ways and cannot thank you enough for providing me the career of a lifetime. I sincerely hope our paths cross again soon. Thank you.

Section 2. Definitions.

The following words and phrases when used in this act shall have the meanings given to them in this section unless the context clearly indicates otherwise:

"COVID-19." The novel coronavirus as identified in the Governor's Proclamation of Disaster Emergency issued on March 6, 2020, published at 50 Pa.B. 1644 (March 21, 2020).

"COVID-19 vaccine." A vaccine for COVID-19 that has received an emergency-use authorization from the United States Food and Drug Administration.

Section 3. Administration.

Notwithstanding any other act to the contrary, an individual authorized to administer a COVID-19 vaccine by the United States Department of Health and Human Services under the Seventh Amendment to Declaration Under the Public Readiness and Emergency Preparedness Act for Medical Countermeasures Against COVID-19 shall be permitted to administer vaccines in this Commonwealth, including:

- (1) A midwife, paramedic, advanced or intermediate emergency medical technician, physician assistant, respiratory therapist, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist or veterinarian licensed, registered or certified to practice under the laws of this Commonwealth.
- (2) A physician, advanced practice registered nurse, registered nurse, practical nurse, pharmacist, pharmacy intern, midwife, paramedic, advanced or intermediate emergency medical technician, respiratory therapist, dentist, physician assistant, podiatrist, optometrist or veterinarian who has held an active license, registration or certification under the laws of this Commonwealth within the last five years, which is inactive, expired or lapsed, if the license, registration or certification was active and in good standing prior to the date it went inactive, expired or lapsed and was not revoked by the licensing authority, surrendered while under suspension, discipline or investigation by a licensing authority or surrendered following an arrest, and the individual is not on the List of Excluded Individuals/Entities maintained by the Office of Inspector General.
- (3) A medical, nursing, pharmacy, pharmacy intern, midwife, paramedic, advanced or intermediate emergency medical technician, physician assistant, respiratory therapy, dental, podiatry, optometry or veterinary student with appropriate training in administering vaccines as determined by his or her school or training program, and under the direct supervision of a currently practicing health care professional who is licensed,

registered or certified in this Commonwealth and who is experienced in administering intramuscular injections. Section 4. Requirements.

Individuals who gain authorization to administer COVID-19 vaccines under this act are subject to the following requirements:

- (1) Individuals must have documentation showing:
- (i) Current basic life support certification, commonly known as basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation or CPR.
- (ii) Completion of an immunization training program endorsed or provided by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Accreditation Council for Pharmacy Education or any similar training approved by the Secretary of Health that, at a minimum, includes:
  - (A) Hands-on injection technique.
  - (B) Clinical evaluation of indications and contraindications of vaccines.
  - (C) Recognition and treatment of emergency reactions to vaccines.

(2) (Reserved).

Section 5. Observation period.

Health care professionals and students who gain authorization to administer COVID-19 vaccines under this act must have documentation of an observation period by a currently practicing health care professional experienced in administering intramuscular injections, and for whom administering intramuscular injections is in their ordinary scope of practice, who confirms competency of the health care provider or student in administration of COVID-19 vaccines.

Section 6. Recordkeeping.

Health care professionals and students who gain authorization to administer COVID-19 vaccines under this act must comply with recordkeeping and reporting requirements as determined by the Secretary of Health.

Section 7. Expiration.

This act shall expire 60 days after the termination of the Governor's COVID-19 emergency declaration order, or December 31, 2022, whichever is earlier.

Section 8. Effective date.

This act shall take effect immediately.

- (7) A description of how the formula or allocation criteria under paragraph (6) was developed.
- (8) An estimate of the total population in each county which are eligible under each category of eligibility for doses of vaccine for COVID-19 established by the Department of Health.
- (9) An estimate of the population in each county under paragraph (8) which have not received a dose of vaccine for COVID-19 at the time of the publishing of the chart.

I please ask you for an affirmative vote on this amendment so that family members will not have to be separated from their loved ones in a congregate care setting during another pandemic.

On the question,

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Heffley.

Mr. HEFFLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Amendment A00471 would remove language that was put in through an amendment that would have to do with moving radar. While I fully support our men and women in uniform and I think that the Pennsylvania State Police is probably the finest law enforcement agency in the nation, and at a time when so many have been berating law enforcement and putting them down,

I think it is just great that we have such great men and women who are putting their lives on the line every day to protect us.

However, the reason for this amendment is because I do not think that the residents of the Commonwealth are ready for or need moving radar to keep them safe on the highways. I think that the underlying bill dealing with getting radar in the hands of our local law enforcement officers could provide them opportunities to provide public safety in their communities – I think that is a noble bill and I fully support it - however, I feel that if this amendment goes in, that bill will have a better opportunity of making it to the Governor's desk. So I would ask for an affirmative vote on this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Rothman, on the amendment.

Mr. ROTHMAN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, with all due respect to my good friend and colleague, I am opposed to this amendment. Our State Police have used radar for 50 years, and if you could imagine, the roads that they are patrolling are the roads where people are really speeding. So imagine being on the Pennsylvania Turnpike or 81 or 78 and a car – the State Police officer is sitting on the side of the road and a car goes by at 90 miles an hour. That police officer has to then get onto the road, causing danger, potential danger to other people in traffic, and chase down this person speeding. Right now a police officer tailing a speeder can use his speedometer or her speedometer to figure out whether or not the person is speeding. Why not let them use the technology that exists?

This underlying bill and part of the problem with this amendment is we need to give technology to the people that keep us safe. That is what this is about. This is about changing behavior, slowing people down. We lose 40,000 people a year on our highways to deaths and 4 million to injuries. So I would ask my colleagues to vote "no" on this well-intentioned amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Carroll, on the amendment.

Mr. CARROLL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I, too, rise to oppose this amendment. Mr. Speaker, the language in the bill with respect to moving radar was inserted in the committee level at the request of the Pennsylvania State Police, and their support for this bill evaporates if this amendment, 471, were to be included in the bill.

Mr. Speaker, nearly every other State allows their State Police, their State troopers and State highway patrol to use moving radar. This is nothing new. And in fact, in Pennsylvania currently, the State Police can enforce speed by tailing a vehicle and measuring their speed on the calibrated speedometer of the police vehicle.

So, Mr. Speaker, I ask for a negative vote on this amendment. If we are serious about getting radar to local police officers, this amendment must be defeated. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Heffley, for the second time.

Mr. HEFFLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just am very concerned that the residents of this Commonwealth are not going to support radar. What is going to happen is, if you are going westbound, and maybe you are going a little bit over the speed limit, a vehicle coming at you, you are going to get a ticket, officers are going to get a call, people are going to be discouraged. We did a lot of work and did a lot of research when we put cameras in work zones, and I think that is tremendous for public safety and also for those workers in those areas. There has been a lot of research done on this. I just I think this— Maybe it is a good idea, but at this time I think it is premature. I do not think we have done enough research. I do not think there has been a single hearing on this issue. And I believe the residents of this Commonwealth do not want this legislation passed. So I would ask for an affirmative vote on this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Jozwiak.

The Chair would simply remind the members, it is typically a courtesy to allow the prime sponsor of the amendment to speak immediately prior to the prime sponsor of the bill; however, the gentleman, Representative Jozwiak, was seeking recognition so I will recognize him. I would just ask the members to please make an effort to be recognized prior to the prime sponsors of the amendments and bills speaking their final time generally as a courtesy of the House.

The gentleman is in order and may proceed.

Mr. JOZWIAK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

While in talking with the State Police on this moving radar, I just want to point out a couple things. You know, in the world today – in the United States, police officers are being attacked all over the country. They are being shot, they are in their cars, they are parked, there are different things. Today when a police officer runs radar, he is parked and everybody gets on their cell phone and they get on their Waze and they show right where the police officer is sitting. If somebody wants to injure that police officer or attack him, they know exactly where he is. With the moving radar, it is a safety factor for them. And by the way, Pennsylvania is the only State in the United States that the troopers do not have the moving radar. So I would ask you to keep the moving radar in this bill and vote "no" on this amendment.

And thank you, Mr. Speaker, for indulging me.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Lawrence, on the amendment.

Mr. LAWRENCE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the maker of the amendment stand for interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will, and you are in order and may proceed.

Mr. LAWRENCE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it was just stated here on the House floor that if your amendment goes in that the support of the Pennsylvania State Police for moving forward with municipal radar, quote, "evaporates." That is what was just said here on the floor. Now, this is interesting, Mr. Speaker, because I recall from Appropriations hearings last year, the State Police said they were supportive of moving forward with municipal radar and I did not recall any conditions being put upon that support. So I wanted to ask the maker of this amendment if he had any thought on that, because I have not heard anything like that. That is new information to me.

Mr. HEFFLEY. I would just say that it is my understanding that has been said from time to time. However, I think it is important that we would provide our local law enforcement every opportunity so they can safely patrol their streets; at the same time, I do not think we should pit one agency against another. So I would ask for an affirmative vote on this amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Amend Bill, page 3, lines 5 through 11, by striking out all of said lines

On the question,

Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Emrick.

Mr. EMRICK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

My amendment removes the Delaware River Port Authority and the Delaware River Joint Toll Bridge Commission from the ability and power to use radar for speed enforcement. There are a number of reasons why this amendment is proposed. First and foremost is the issue of safety as motorists cross the bridges – cross the Delaware trying to navigate tollbooth lanes, E-ZPass lanes, exits – and so that is one reason. I do not know where in many cases over the bridges the law enforcement would have the ability to pull cars over, so that adds another safety issue. And there is no reason to give these two bistate compacts another excuse to charge people and raise revenues. So with that, I ask for an affirmative vote.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

On the amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Carroll.

Mr. CARROLL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, if the underlying sponsor of the amendment is not for radar for police and speed enforcement, I understand that. But, Mr. Speaker, in terms of safety, I would offer that having vehicles' speed monitored going across the Walt Whitman Bridge or the Commodore Barry Bridge is important. And it is especially important because on the New Jersey side, as you approach the bridge and come up to the approach ramps on the New Jersey side, there is speed enforcement; however, on the Pennsylvania side, the Pennsylvania State Police cannot and the DRPA Police cannot use radar to enforce speed on the Walt Whitman, the Commodore Barry Bridge, and others.

Now, in effort to try and strike middle ground, Mr. Speaker, I filed amendment A540, which would have given the speed enforcement authority to the DRPA folks in southeastern Pennsylvania and exempted the bridges into New Jersey from the Lehigh Valley to the New York State line, but the adoption of this amendment will make that amendment out of order. So if we are indeed interested in making sure that the safety of the traveling public on the bridges, including the Walt Whitman Bridge, does not have vehicles traveling at excessive speeds because of the lack of speed enforcement by the Pennsylvania State Police and the DRPA on those bridges, then I suppose you will support this amendment. But if we are truly interested in safety and advancing Pennsylvania into the 21st century, I think that is fair to say that we ought to have speed enforcement on bridges like the Walt Whitman Bridge to make sure the traveling public is safe.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Those in favor of the amendment will vote "aye"; those opposed, "no." Members will proceed— Oh, I apologize. I did not see the whip seeking recognition.

Mr. HARRIS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I am concerned about the expansion of who can use radar in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. My reasoning for that is because while we have made some, made some progress and had some success on what we do with regards to police reform, we have not, we have not gotten to a place where we have trust between police and community. And my concern with this is that this is giving police more of an opportunity to pull people over and increase the interaction that police have with the public.

If you look at the Inquirer in Philadelphia, it showed an article that said that police stops have become the new stop-and-frisk in the city of the first class. It talked about how police stops are being used as an additional way to racially profile in the city of the first class.

So while I am concerned about safety, we also have to – unless we are going to actually deal with police reform and grab it by the horns and get to a place where we can address all of those issues, I am cautious about increasing the opportunity for police and community to interact.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I would like to fill in my colleagues with a little of the history on this amendment. This amendment successfully went out of the House about 2 years ago when former Representative John Taylor from Philadelphia was doing the Route 1 (Roosevelt Boulevard) speed camera as a pilot project. For those of you who do not know, that particular arterial is a 12-mile, 12-lane thruway that traverses the city of Philadelphia where there had been an unbelievably high rate of speeding accidents and accompanying fatalities. Representative Taylor had agreed to put this amendment in. Henry Avenue, located in the 194th, has very similar issues, although it is a four-lane arterial running for just under 5 miles in the 194th Legislative District, through numerous residential neighborhoods where property destruction and occasionally fatalities have occurred, all due to speed. The highway cannot be, or the thruway – the street cannot be reengineered.

This amendment somehow found its way out when it got to the Senate, although nobody was clear as to the reason why even though I had talked to some of the Senators about the amendment. And then Senator John Rafferty had agreed to help me get it through on a subsequent session. Senator Rafferty lost his general election, so here is this opportunity to put this back in.

I am very grateful for the gentleman from Cumberland County, the prime sponsor of the bill, who is supportive of the amendment, and both the majority and minority Transportation Committee chairs, and I am happy to answer any questions.

It seems to me that this is a section of Henry Avenue in Philadelphia which does have a high incidence of speeding and we ought to give the pilot program a chance to work in Henry Avenue as well. Thank you.
