The term "tax collector" shall mean a tax collector as defined in section 2, a delinquent tax collector as provided in section 26.1, an alternative collector of taxes as provided in section 201.1 of the act of July 7, 1947 (P.L.1368, No.542), known as the "Real Estate Tax Sale Law," an employee, agent or assignee authorized to collect the tax, a purchaser of claim for the tax or any other person authorized by law or contract to take action against the person or property of the taxpayer for the real estate tax.

Mr. C. WILLIAMS. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to support the trilogy of bills that you have today with respect to addiction and alcoholism. I wanted to tell you very briefly about my experience with this, because just last summer, I lost my brother to addiction. It happened right in the middle of our campaign. I chose not to raise it during the campaign because I did not want to be accused of politicizing his death, which of course, was very personal to our family. But it was not just last summer; it was 30 years of dealing with addiction.

He was the stereotypical story that you would imagine of an addict. He was the funniest kid in the family. He was the smartest kid in the family. At a very young age he had read all the Star Wars books and had all the characters memorized and could tell you any conversation in the story. He was the light of the family. We all expected that he was the one going to an Ivy League school and would set the world on fire. He memorized, at a very young age, schematics of airplanes – smart as a whip. And then in junior high school in Anchorage, Alaska, he found marijuana.

High school ensues, and it is more marijuana and more drugs. Many of you mama bears in the room would know that if your boy was facing that situation, you would be at the high school to make sure that he graduates. And he never should have graduated, but he did graduate, and went off to a State school in Alaska, where his addiction accelerated at an astronomical rate.

This is all in his teens and early twenties. He moved to California, where it continued to accelerate. DUI (driving under the influence) after DUI; in and out of the State penal system – every single time coming out we are thinking that this is the opportunity that he is going to get sober. This is the moment that he is going to get sober, except we never knew when he was

coming out. Going to a program, we never knew when he was coming out. Asking for help, we have a bill here now with HB 220 that would require facilities to admit people without a positive drug test, treatment opportunities for people like my brother. I can tell you that it is not just the alcoholic or the addict that is suffering, in this case, for 30 years. It is his wife and four kids, who every time he came out of the penal system, every time he came out of a program, thought this was the moment.

I am asking you to support these three bills because the families have a right to know where their loved one is when they come out of treatment, when they come out of a recovery home, when they come out of the penal system; it is a race against death. When my brother came out of prison last year after another DUI, we had no idea where he was until he was found.

I look on the electronic voting board and what I see in all of those names is our human tapestry. Each one of you has a story. And I sit there in the third row, second seat, and when you are telling me your story, I am listening, because I know how personal it is to you. I am asking you to hear me today about how personal this struggle is for addicts and their families. I just wanted you to know a piece of my tapestry and why I serve and ask you to vote "yes." Thank you.

Mr. HEFFLEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think one of the purest forms of legislating is when somebody comes into the district office and sits down and talks with you and tells you their story and then we are able to take that information and parlay that into good legislation. That is the story behind HB 741, or as I refer to it and we refer to it as "Justin's Law."

I want to thank my colleague from Delaware County for his remarks earlier regarding this package of bills that we are passing. Justin was a young man who was struggling with addiction, became addicted while playing athletics at the high school and collegiate level due to some sports injuries, and like many, suffered through relapses in his addiction and recovery. He spent time in treatment facilities, and his parents had come to me with a story that what had happened was the young man was in a facility, in a recovery house, and he was evicted from the recovery house for once again relapsing in his addiction, and then, unfortunately, 2 days later, he had passed away from a fatal overdose.

His parents had not known that he was evicted from the recovery house, and his parents pleaded with me that we not let this happen to another family, because they would have driven to the county where he was and they would have searched for him, they would have called him, they would have found him, and they would have tried to help him to get him back into some kind of treatment facility.

It is just heartbreaking to hear these stories, and we see it in all of our communities. Pennsylvania is set again this year to have – 2020 – to have record high overdose deaths. This legislation can help curb that. This would simply state that if somebody is evicted or leaves a recovery house, that the recovery house would then have to contact the person on the emergency contact and let them know that they had left.

I want to thank the chairman of the Human Services Committee for running this package of bills. I want to thank Erin Raub, our executive director, for working so hard on this proposal. This is about the fourth year we are working on this, and I am hoping that we can get this passed here unanimously through the House today and over to the Senate and onto the Governor's desk.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would ask for an affirmative vote on HB 741.

Mr. E. NELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Thank you for the opportunity to be able to vote this legislation again. We were fortunate last session to be able to pass this bill, and this session it is HB 944, which I refer to as "Heather's Law."

This bill is a result of several years of hard work with not just DDAP (Department of Drug and Alcohol Programs) and members of the Human Services Committee, but also recovery organizations, treatment providers, and recovery individuals themselves.

Mr. Speaker, this is bottoms-up legislation, and today I would like to take a moment and have this chamber recognize two visitors we have from Sage's Army. Several years ago, Sage's Army, which is an addiction recovery organization in Westmoreland and Indiana and multiple counties through the west, came to Harrisburg to share what we will be touching on as Heather's story. They really are a backbone in our region for addiction recovery, and I would like to welcome both Carmen Capozzi and Katrin "Kat" Fieser with Sage's Army, up in the balcony.

Mr. Speaker, when we talk about this legislation, which I refer to as "Heather's Law," this is one of the many examples of lives lost that we are hoping to prevent moving forward. When Heather entered into her addiction recovery facility, she had a backslide, and shortly after that backslide, she checked herself out against medical advice, or AMA. Unfortunately, her facility did not provide notification to the loved ones that were listed when Heather was there, and in the short 12 hours, she went from the facility to her dealer's house, where she overdosed, and unfortunately, her life was lost.

This woman was taken too soon. Within 12 hours, lives were changed, and recently, Mr. Speaker, in meeting with our representative from the Capitol Commission, he brought up

Hosea 4:6, which said, "My people are destroyed from lack of knowledge."

Our goal with this legislation, Mr. Speaker, is to allow families and loved ones who have been authorized to be notified, to ensure that they are notified in a timely manner if their loved one leaves a facility against medical advice. We cannot bring Heather back, but we can help someone else to stay alive, to recover, and to live addiction-free.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I urge a positive vote on HB 944.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. The Speaker thanks the gentleman.

The question is, will the bill pass finally? On that question, the gentleman, Representative Longietti, is recognized.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to thank the prime sponsor, the gentleman from Westmoreland County, for offering this legislation and for including me as a prime sponsor. And, you know, I do not think any of us could more eloquently state the importance of this legislation than what we heard a couple speakers previously.

This bill has the power to save lives. And I think many of us have encountered it, and in my case, I heard from a constituent. Fortunately, their loved one did not perish, but they checked themselves out against medical advice. The parents were emergency contacts, they were not notified, and unfortunately, the gentleman relapsed, and, you know, it was a terrifying time and a difficult time, and I think this legislation has the opportunity to avoid that, to save lives, and so once again I want to thank the gentleman for offering it. I believe it will get an affirmative vote in the House. I certainly ask for your vote, and let us work towards an affirmative vote in the Senate and make this law. So thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. This Speaker thanks the gentleman.

Their dedicated hard work, and sometimes life experiences, speak volumes to an issue that sometimes gets shadowed, sometimes put away, but it is not put away for those families who continue to wonder where their loved one is when they come out of one of these centers and they may not have been told by them, not knowing where they sleep at night. I cannot imagine being a family member and not knowing where my loved one is. With that, I want to thank these members for their hard work.

I would ask our members to stand strong with them and remember those families who still struggle having someone battling addiction, and most of all, those families whose battle that young one or loved one may have lost. Let us all stand together in full support of 944 as they did the previous two House bills.

I thank you, Mr. Speaker, and thank the members.
