I understand, therefore, why concerned family members might wish to keep a closer eye on their relatives, hoping to ensure that the conditions in which they live are clean, safe, and nurturing; and yet we must also balance the need for privacy, consent, and autonomy of our older adults.

Given that many older adults may not realize that by giving their relative power of attorney, they would also be enabling their relative to potentially place cameras in their bedroom, it seems imperative that we must remove that option from this legislation. We must do so to make sure that we are respecting the dignity, privacy, and freedoms of older adults in our Commonwealth.

I urge a "yes" vote on this amendment.

(iii) The reasons that the claimant cannot provide any additional evidence of the amount of the claimant's wages.

(iv) Information about the uninsured employer, including the name of the employer and the names of any individuals known to the claimant who supervised or managed the claimant's work, along with any other identifying information for those individuals of which the claimant is aware.

(c) Limitation on wage loss payments.—If a judge accepts testimony and finds it to be credible under subsection [(b)(7)] (b)(8) as the sole basis for determining wage loss payments, without supporting evidence established in subsection (b)(1), (2), (3), (4), (5) or (6), the wage loss payment rate shall be 66.6% of the average weekly wage for the claimant's occupation. The judge may reduce the average weekly

wage loss payment upon the submission of evidence indicating a lesser wage amount or based on the claimant's length of employment with the employer. For the purposes of this subsection, the term "average weekly wage" is the average weekly wage for the claimant's occupation by metropolitan statistical area, as determined by the United States Department of Labor for the calendar year prior to the year in which the claimant's injury occurred, and shall be based on the metropolitan statistical area in which the claimant's injury occurred.

Amend Bill, page 3, by inserting between lines 22 and 23

(3) The department shall investigate the information provided in an affidavit provided under subsection (b)(8). The following shall apply:

(i) If the department finds evidence of material misstatements by the claimant, the department shall submit the evidence to the workers' compensation judge and make a report to the appropriate district attorney.

(ii) In addition to any reports required under paragraphs (1) and (2), if the department has reasonable cause to suspect that the uninsured employer has violated any other Federal or State law, the department shall make a report with the applicable Federal or State agency.

So this amendment, very simply, offers new employees that may not have received a paycheck yet so may have struggles meeting the proof of wage requirement, this allows those employees to still receive the compensation portion of their payment by signing an affidavit that lists their employer and the information about their employer so that employer can be held accountable.

So I would ask members from both sides, please support this amendment and make sure that we allow new employees the opportunity to receive compensation should they be injured before they receive their first paycheck.

Mr. MULLERY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Amendment 1519 is a very simple amendment. It simply removes the proof of wages language from the underlying bill. Without my amendment, we are giving criminals more rights than our injured workers. The underlying bill eliminates an injured worker's right to present testimony as to what they were earning at the time of their injury and instead defaults to a criminal employer who knowingly knew that they were operating without a workers' compensation insurance carrier. That is a crime in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, punishable by a fine of \$2,500 and 1 year in prison for every day that they failed to carry insurance. Yet that is who we are defaulting to over our own constituents who are injured through no fault of their own while on the job.

My amendment retains the two notice provisions that the good gentleman included in the underlying bill for very good reason — we want to prosecute these criminal employers, and the number one tool that the department has to get information to criminally prosecute these businesses is help from the injured worker. We are removing any obligation they have, any incentive they have to assist our department in putting these individuals out of business, criminals out of business by removing their right to wages.

For that reason, Mr. Speaker, I would ask for an affirmative vote on amendment 1519.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Eric Nelson, on the amendment.

Mr. E. NELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And I do share the good gentleman's concern that he wants to be able to protect employees and I share the concern to be able to protect lawful employees who have the ability to show proof of wages. But, Mr. Speaker, the amendment that we just passed creates a very clear incentive that should an employee not be able to present a check, a tax return, an unemployment record, a bank statement, a written document created about the proof of wages or testimony from the uninsured employer, that employee can sign an affidavit for the judge to be able to say, this was my employer, this is who I was working for. But, Mr. Speaker, we also have to realize that this fund is running insolvent and continues to run insolvent because it has morphed into the default insurance carrier of our underground economy.

Mr. Speaker, over half of the claims that are in this account cannot show proof of wages. One in five of these workers are not even Pennsylvania citizens. So, Mr. Speaker, what happened a few years ago, is we increased the assessment or fees that our legitimate contractors and employers have to pay in order to offset the loss and it still was not enough, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, with the addition of my amendment that protects new employees, this allows an employee a voice before a judge in an existing process and makes sure that those new employees are protected while holding those employers accountable.

I completely agree with my colleague who says we must go upstream, but we also must confront the underground economy and signing an affidavit that would be a potential perjury or false-swearing charge ensures we can hold both the employers accountable and protect the workers who need to be protected.

So I urge my colleagues a "no" vote on this amendment.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Mullery, for the second time on the amendment.

Mr. MULLERY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

What the good gentleman left out is one important point, that it only applies to folks who are injured in the first 30 days of their employment.

The second problem I have with what he just said was, he allows for the provision of an affidavit. There is nothing better for a judge than having the testimony of the claimant live and in person and subject to cross-examination. That far outweighs the acceptability of an affidavit. So let us let them come as they do right now and provide proof of wages in person right before the workers' compensation judge with the ability to be cross-examined and let the judge determine whether or not they are a credible witness.

And finally, since it was brought up, you are darn right the UEGF (Uninsured Employers Guaranty Fund) is running out of money because we have failed to properly fund it here year after year.

Mr. Speaker, this is a very simple choice: we either side with our constituents who are injured through no fault of their own on the job or we side with a criminal employer. It is very simple.
