HB 822, PN 1818 (Amended) By Rep. GROVE

A Joint Resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, providing for an initiative to recall certain elected local officers.

HB 1181, PN 1237 By Rep. GROVE

An Act authorizing the Department of General Services, with the approval of the Department of Corrections and the Governor, to grant and convey to Alexander Delmont Bard and Melissa Marie Bard, certain lands and improvements situate in the City of Pittsburgh, Allegheny County.

HB 1300, PN 1760 By Rep. GROVE

An Act amending the act of June 3, 1937 (P.L.1333, No.320), known as the Pennsylvania Election Code, as follows: in preliminary provisions, further providing for definitions, providing for legislative authority over elections, establishing the Bureau of Election Audits and providing for special standing in challenges to the Election Code; in the Secretary of the Commonwealth, further providing for powers and duties of the Secretary of the Commonwealth and providing for reports on implementation of elections; in county boards of elections, further providing for powers and duties of county boards and providing for county boards of elections and satellite offices; in district election officers, further providing for compensation of district election officers; providing for registration of electors; in ballots, further providing for form of official election ballot and for number of ballots to be printed and specimen ballots; in voting machines, further providing for examination and approval of voting machines by the Secretary of the Commonwealth, for requirements of voting machines, for preparation of voting machines by county election boards and for delivery of voting machines and supplies by county election boards to election officers; in electronic voting systems, further providing for statistical sample and providing for requirements of accessible voting machines; in voting apparatus bonds, providing for voting system defects, disclosure, investigations and penalties; in preparation for and conduct of primaries and elections, providing for voter's bill of rights, for senior voter's bill of rights, for disabled voter's bill of rights and further providing for time for opening and closing polls, for manner of applying to vote, persons entitled to vote, voter's certificates, entries to be made in district register, numbered lists of voters and challenges and for deadline for receipt of valid voter registration application; in voting by qualified absentee

electors, further providing for applications for official absentee ballots, for date of application for absentee ballot, for delivering or mailing ballots, for voting by absentee electors, providing for supervised voting by qualified absentee electors in certain facilities and further providing for canvassing of official absentee ballots and mail-in ballots; in voting by qualified mail-in electors, further providing for applications for official mail-in ballots, for date of application for mail-in ballot, for delivering or mailing ballots and for voting by mail-in electors; in Pennsylvania Election Law Advisory Board, further providing for Pennsylvania Election Law Advisory Board; providing for early voting by qualified electors; in returns of primaries and elections, further providing for returns to be open to public inspection and exceptions and for computation of returns by county board, certification and issuance of certificates of election; in recounts and contest, providing for powers and duties of the Attorney General relating to elections; in penalties, further providing for disobeying lawful instructions, for perjury, for false affidavits of candidates, for refusal to permit inspection of papers, destruction or removal and Secretary of the Commonwealth, for refusal to permit inspection of papers, destruction or removal and county boards of elections, for insertion and alteration of entries in documents, removal and refusal to deliver, for refusal to permit overseers, watchers, attorneys or candidates to act, for driving away watchers, attorneys, candidates or overseers, for refusal to permit election officers, clerks and machine inspectors to act and driving away said persons, for refusal to administer oath and acting without being sworn, for violation of oath of office by election officers, for peace officers, failure to render assistance and hindering or delaying county board members and others, for nomination petitions and papers and offenses by signers, for false signatures and statements in nomination petitions and papers, for nomination petitions, certificates and papers, destruction, fraudulent filing and suppression, for offenses by printers of ballots, for unlawful possession of ballots and counterfeiting ballots, for forging and destroying ballots, for tampering with voting machines, for destroying, defacing or removing notices, et cetera, for police officers at polling places and for peace officer, failure to quell disturbances at polls, hindering or delaying election officers and others, for election officers permitting unregistered electors to vote, challenges and refusing to permit qualified electors to vote, for election officers refusing to permit elector to vote in proper party at primaries, for frauds by election officers, for prying into ballots, for interference with primaries and elections, frauds and conspiracy, for persons interfering in other districts, for assault and battery at polls, for unlawful assistance in voting, for election officers permitting unlawful assistance, for failure to keep and return record of assisted voters, for unlawful voting, for elector voting ballot of wrong party at primary, for repeat voting at elections, for removing ballots, for commissioners to take soldiers' votes, for fraudulent voting by soldiers, for bribery at elections, for receipts and disbursements of primary and election expenses by persons other than candidates and treasurers, for receipts of primary and election expenses by unauthorized persons, for contributions by corporations or unincorporated associations, for failure to file expense account, for prohibiting duress and intimidation of voters and interference with the free exercise of the elective franchise, for failure to perform duty, for hindering or delaying performance of duty, for violation of any provision of act, for violations of provisions relating to absentee and mail-in ballots and providing for unlawful collection of ballots; providing for reimbursements and withholding; and making a related repeal.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and good afternoon.

SB 445, the prime sponsor is a Senator from Montgomery County, and we are very grateful for his efforts to raise this particular issue up. SB 445 will permit the opportunities, when folks renew their driver's licenses, to check a box on that renewal to make a contribution of \$5 to breast cancer research. It will be the Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition responsible for administering those contributions, and this will help them further their work, which has been ongoing toward breast cancer research. To date they have awarded nearly \$5 million in grants to research organizations based in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania toward breast cancer research.

On average, 37 women a day in the Commonwealth are diagnosed with breast cancer; about 13,000 women per year are diagnosed in the Commonwealth with breast cancer. The gentlelady from Dauphin County and myself are in fact breast cancer survivors, and we have achieved, respectively, a 6-year and a 5-year mark, so we plan to be around for a while longer serving the Commonwealth.

The gentlelady and I have walked this particular journey and we have urged our own constituents and every woman in the Commonwealth, and gentlemen who are concerned about the women in their life, to make sure they get mammograms timely.

This can be a very scary prospect to make this journey, but it is very important that early diagnosis and screening can really help produce positive outcomes. The gentlelady and I are living, walking, talking examples of that.

So thank you to the gentlewomen from Luzerne County and from Bucks County for helping to get this bill to the floor of the House here. So a group effort is always a bipartisan effort that we are very proud of. We are grateful for the PA Breast Cancer Coalition, who is going to keep moving this forward.

I know that at my own checkup in March, my oncologist – who is a researcher – was very clear that if we pull together on research, as we have done to produce the vaccinations for COVID-19, she is extremely confident that we could cure breast cancer, and that would be just simply amazing. So we ask you all to produce an affirmative vote on SB 445.

This is an amendment that addresses a couple of issues that we need to do to be aligned with the Federal government. So this amendment allows the Medicaid program to get reimbursed by the Federal government by mandating that the department pay for medication that is approved for inclusion under the Medicaid prescription drug program and has been approved for use by the Pharmacy and Therapeutics Committee for inclusion on Pennsylvania's preferred drug list.

This amendment strengthens the bill by providing important parameters around which drugs must be covered and making sure that the Commonwealth is not footing the whole bill when it comes to payment for the medication. The amendment makes sure that anti-obesity medication is treated like all other medications paid for in the Medicaid program, and this amendment I believe is agreed to.

BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 1428, PN 1790**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130, No.48), known as the Health Care Facilities Act, adding provisions relating to resident care monitoring.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.
The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative DeLissio.
Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
Mr. Speaker, will the prime sponsor rise for interrogation?
The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he is willing to be interrogated.

The House will please come to order so that the good member can hear the questions that will be asked of him. Members, please take your seats.

The gentlewoman is in order, and you may proceed.
Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, under the definition of "Guardian" it states, "A fiduciary who has the care and management of the estate or person...." I want to clarify that in this particular situation, it would only be applicable if the guardian is "of the person" because "of the estate" would simply mean they are handling their financial matters and the person is quite capable of making decisions of their own accord. It is the word "or" that causes me concern.

Mr. MASSER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
The definition of "Guardian" is pulled from Title 20, chapter 55.

Ms. DeLISSIO. And again, Mr. Speaker, I will reiterate. I can appreciate where the definition is pulled from, but this particular application, it appears as if – and I want to be really clear about this on record – that if a guardian has only estate guardianship and not guardian of person – because you could have either or

both – this context should only apply if a guardian is appointed and has the person guardianship, not just the estate only.

Mr. MASSER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

That is the intention of the bill.

Ms. DeLISSIO. The intention of the bill; thank you.

Next question, Mr. Speaker. I would also like clarification that only a court – because it does say "judicially declared" – only a court can make the determination regarding capacity as it pertains to this bill. So no other individual – for instance, an individual or a physician – can make the determination as to an individual's capacity. It is limited only to the judiciary. Is that correct?

Mr. MASSER. That is correct. Yesterday's amendment made that fix.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Further down on page 3, line 22, says: "If the electronic monitoring device records activity visually..." It is actually the word "if" that concerns me here. What else would the electronic device do? So again, clarification that this is an electronic monitoring device that records activity visually. So there is nothing else that this device is anticipated to accomplish or to do? It is limited to recording visually only.

Mr. MASSER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

That is correct. That is to ensure that the date and time are stamped on the video.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you.

Further down in the legislation, Mr. Speaker, it talks about unobstructing or obstructing the camera "...in specified circumstances to protect the dignity of the resident." Mr. Speaker, who is responsible for obstructing the camera, and who specifies those circumstances?

Mr. MASSER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It is the residents' choice of whether it is obstructed.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So the resident or their guardian is responsible for deciding if the camera gets obstructed as it pertains to any specifics, or who specifies the circumstances? Mr. Speaker, is that part of the process here so that that can be put forth when somebody is alerting the facility that they want this?

For instance, if it is a guardian, how is the guardian going to know – and who is physically going to obstruct this camera? Who has access to it, Mr. Speaker? So that if for, say, this is a bed bath situation and they want this obstructed for the bed bath or some other personal hygiene task, what is the nature of how this camera gets obstructed? Is it only limited to the resident touching the device, the guardian touching the device? And, I mean, clearly, operationally how does that work? Because I find often in legislation we say these things and the practical application of them is not doable.

Mr. MASSER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think I could hear the gentlelady's question.

It is up to the resident to make that decision for obstruction. It would be on the form, those specific parts of what is done, but it is up to the resident of how and when it gets obstructed, and it will be on the form, which gives them permission.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So okay, I appreciate – I think I heard, Mr. Speaker. I feel like I am shouting.

But how does that obstruction occur? Who is blacking out the camera at those times? Is it the care staff? Is it the resident or guardian? This is a very important question, Mr. Speaker, because who is touching the camera? And how is that done? Is that done by draping something over the lens? What if they are in a hurry and forget to undrape it?

Mr. MASSER. I would think that it would depend on the patient itself. So if the patient is unable to do it, the care staff could do it, but I think that would be defined in the instructions on the form. So I think there are going to be cases where the patient himself – him or herself – could not do it physically, but there are instructions on when the obstruction should occur so that the care staff could take care of it.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Mr. Speaker, it is just a little hard to hear the answer.

The SPEAKER. Members, please move any conversations off the floor of the House.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So I think I got the gist of that—

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady will please suspend.

She deserves to have her questions answered; an important component part of that is having the gentleman hear them. Members, please move any and all conversations off the back of the House so that the interrogation can continue.

The gentlewoman is in order, and you may proceed.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I believe the answer was that the instructions will be provided for when it should be obstructed. I am still left wondering how that instruction will be carried out, and I do not think there is an easy way to carry that out. And for those who may not realize, my background is actually long-term care, so I come out of this field.

Further down in the legislation, Mr. Speaker, it talks about the permission of any other resident or residents in the room in order to put this electronic device in the room. What if that other resident is not capable of consenting? It does not speak to the ability of someone to consent on behalf of that other resident. So I would like to understand the intent if in fact the other resident or residents in the room are not capable of giving consent?

Mr. MASSER. Without consent, it cannot be done. It would be an unauthorized use, so the resident would then have to seek a room change if they were intent, wanted to keep pursuing having that in their room. So if the other person could not give consent, it would not be possible in that room.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it is also my understanding that due to another statute that is in place, audio recordings are not permitted, that this is simply visual recording. My concern here is that I am not sure what the intent and the purpose of these video recordings would be for, but I can assure you that without an audio recording, there is no context. So if somebody – a visitor, a caretaker, etc. – was a very passionate person of, for instance, say Italian heritage like I am and uses a lot of hand gestures, perhaps that could be interpreted as hostile or even aggressive, but in fact I may be just sharing a particular event that I am happy about or proud about, etc. So without any audio, there is no context to this visual, and I find that highly concerning.

I do have further— So I would like to confirm that there is absolutely – well, I know the answer to it, so I am not asking it as a question. Where it says, Mr. Speaker, "No person or entity may intentionally hamper, obstruct, tamper with or destroy..." a monitoring device, it does not specify that the resident or guardian can in fact remove that device. So this is no person or entity – it is not specific as to whether or not that permits that guardian or person, then, to remove it. I know they are able to revoke it, but I just want to be clear that that revocation then does not allow them to fall into section 808-A (a). Is that correct? That these are other than the resident or guardian?

Mr. MASSER. I am sorry. I am having a hard time— Could you repeat that question, please.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Under section 808-A, both sections (a) and (b), subsections (a) and (b), it talks about no person can destroy a recording or a monitoring device. My concern is, it does not allow for the guardian or the resident to destroy a recording, because it is my understanding that this is their recording.

Mr. MASSER. So the device is the personal property of the residents and they could remove it at any time. So I am guessing if they wanted to eventually get rid of the data that is on that device, I guess if it was removed, it could be.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So, Mr. Speaker, I just want to clarify that the guardian or the resident is entitled to destroy a recording at any time despite what the legislation here says otherwise?

Mr. MASSER. Well, that is not – I am saying if they removed it. So it is their personal property, so they are able to remove the recording device at any time.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So they can remove the device, but there is a recording and that recording is stored somewhere, I would imagine. We do not even speak to where this recording is at, what it is stored on, how access is gained – none of that is addressed here. So I want to clarify that a resident or a guardian can destroy this recording at any time?

Mr. MASSER. So I think the language in the bill is for people who it is not their property, who knowingly and intentionally damage that recording device or the data on it.

Ms. DeLISSIO. So that section pertains to those who are not either the resident or the guardian.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker. On the bill?

The SPEAKER. The gentlewoman is in order, and you may proceed.

Ms. DeLISSIO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I appreciate always watching out for those members, those citizens, our constituents who are vulnerable and in fact have diminished capacity and have been adjudicated such and that we want to ensure their safety.

Mr. Speaker, I do not believe that this is the vehicle to get that particular job done. I have seen no data or any evidence that this happens with any type of frequent occurrence. I would say we never want to hear of it occurring at all, but, Mr. Speaker, this is an invasion of privacy.

The way the legislation is drafted, this is fraught, absolutely fraught with things that do not serve the true goal of this.

I am a "no" vote for this, and I would ask my colleagues to carefully consider as to whether or not they want to be an affirmative vote on this piece of legislation on third.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative Otten, on final passage.

Ms. OTTEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise to oppose HB 1428. Genuinely, I tried to get to a "yes" on this bill, but I think about my personal experiences, both as a caregiver for my grandmother who passed away at the age of 97 in a nursing home, and I think about my current responsibility as a caregiver for my father-in-law, who lives in senior care. I feel like the idea of putting cameras in a senior citizen's bedroom is infantilizing our wisest and most respected family members. We are making the assumption that care workers are in some way inherently intending to do harm and we are replacing living wages and safe staffing limits with cameras. Our seniors deserve the respect and dignity of their privacy in their bedrooms, whether they are living independently in their own homes or under our care, and we, as their caretakers,

when they put that responsibility in our hands, have a responsibility to respect their dignity and respect their rights to privacy.

Please join me in voting "no" on this legislation.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentlewoman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Masser, on final passage.

Mr. MASSER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This legislation permits residents in nursing homes to install and use an electronic monitoring device. Consent is required from every resident in the room prior to the device being used. The footage of the device will be the property of the resident and may only be released by them. This bill was the product of a constituent who had concerns about the care for her mother in a nursing home – the care that ultimately resulted in death. But I look at it as protection for both the family of the loved one and the nursing home, because the nursing home could say that they are providing the care and could very easily be backed up by having a device such as this in there. For many residents, the choice to have these cameras will give them and their families the peace of mind they may need to make sure they get the care that they deserve.

And I think this legislation has never been more timely. This past year, all nursing homes in the State restricted in-person visitation for family, friends, and even a State long-term care ombudsman who would otherwise be able to check in to make sure everything was all right. This bill ensures that those residents who wish to have electronic monitoring have a way to implement it. I think this is a good bill for the protection of our population that is most vulnerable, and I would ask for your support.

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Eric Nelson.

Mr. E. NELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I appreciate the opportunity to bring a public vote to the floor on this issue. It is important to continue a bipartisan effort to confront our underground economy. Unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, right now that economy is funded at the expense of our legitimate employers and contractors in each of our districts. I recognize this bill does carry some resistance from some groups, and that is unfortunate, but we should all want a safe and healthful workplace, Mr. Speaker.

This bill does two things. One, it requires a worker to show proof that he or she was actually employed, and they can do that through a pay stub, a paycheck, a tax return, a piece of paper from their employer, testimony from their employer, or even a new employee signing an affidavit, which was an amendment we added yesterday. The second thing, and more importantly, this bill does is pursue the employer. It refers the district attorney, the IRS (Internal Revenue Service), and the Pennsylvania Department of Revenue so we can continue to pursue the bad actors in our economy.

Mr. Speaker, the underground economy and our misclassified workers cannot have it both ways. Picture 10 workers beside me, all of whom are receiving wages and benefits through the UEGF (Uninsured Employers Guaranty Fund). That is a fund for employees who have been hurt but do not have insurance. Right beside me, Mr. Speaker, two of those workers are from out of State; they do not even live in Pennsylvania and our employers are paying wages and medical benefits for them. Five of those workers, Mr. Speaker, do not show proof of wages at all. None of the options are selected to use, and why? Mr. Speaker, the question is not so much why, it is why not? They do not show wages, Mr. Speaker, because they do not have to. They can receive weekly compensation benefits without showing any proof of wages, without running the risk of having to pay taxes for work that they have done and wages that they have earned that they chose not to submit.

Mr. Speaker, they also have to turn in their employer. It creates a process, Mr. Speaker, so that we can continue to confront our underground economy and our misclassified workers. Pennsylvania benefits when everyone is working and playing by the same rules, and so that is why, Mr. Speaker, I appreciate an affirmative vote on this bill today. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Mullery, on final passage.

Mr. MULLERY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in opposition to HB 1387. I think it is important that we just quickly take a look and break down the relevant facts of a UEGF claim in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The first thing that we know in every single one of these cases is that we are dealing with an employer that has broken the law in failing to carry workers' compensation insurance. We know that; it is a fact. This General Assembly feels so strongly about that crime that we have assigned a punishment to it of a \$2,500 fine and 1 year imprisonment for every single day that that employer fails to carry workers' compensation insurance – fact number one. Fact number two is that that same employer has violated another law by paying their employees under the table. Again, that is something that we have taken so seriously here that we have ascribed a penalty of financial

penalties, incarceration, and potential loss of your business. The third thing we know that happens in these cases is that an employee is injured on the job. We take that so seriously that we have created a no-fault humanitarian law to protect those people, yet in these cases, where we have an employer who has violated at least two laws and an employee whom we have sworn to protect, whom do we punish? The employee.

This bill violates the humanitarian purpose of the Pennsylvania Workers' Compensation Act, and in case you need a reminder as to what it is, let me read it to you. The Workers' "...Compensation Act is remedial in nature..." and its purpose is "...to benefit the worker..." of this Commonwealth. The act is to be "liberally construed to effectuate its humanitarian objectives." And while we see that ingrained in the Workers' Compensation Act in section after section, I have yet to find a provision of the Workers' Compensation Act – a regulation or a case – that promotes deferring to a criminal employer over an injured worker, and we should not create one here today. And for that reason I am asking for a "no" vote on HB 1387.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative Gleim, on final passage.

Mrs. GLEIM. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of 1387. This bill brings much-needed accountability into the cash-only business employer and employee interaction within our State, and will put guardrails on the UEGF claims, which have over half of their recipients receiving wage loss benefits with no documentation to prove their receipt of wages. Mr. Speaker, I really appreciate my colleague worrying about the employers' responsibilities in this matter, but we really need to put some guardrails around both the employee and the employer. We ask for documentation in this State for just about everything, and the documentation that is requested here could easily be presented. So for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I ask everybody for an affirmative vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

Seeing no one else seeking recognition, the Chair will recognize the prime sponsor for the second time on final passage.

Mr. E. NELSON. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Short and sweet, short and sweet: \$16 million underfunded in this account. Short and sweet: insolvent, over \$1 million short every year because our underground economy is outpacing the amount of assessment our legitimate employers are paying.

Mr. Speaker, this is the first of a series of steps to continue to pursue our illegitimate workers and our illegitimate employers, and I ask for an affirmative vote.

Ms. TOOHIL. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise to request of the members an affirmative vote on this bill. We are hoping that it will be bipartisan and unanimous.

I would like to thank the chairs of the Professional Licensure Committee, as well as the staff. This bill has been a long time coming. It has actually been multiple sessions where this piece of legislation has been in the works. Prior to me being the prime sponsor, the good gentleman from Lancaster County, the now Speaker of the House, was the prime sponsor. I would especially like to thank him for his work on this bill in those prior sessions.

This legislation is extremely important, as it creates title protections for certified registered nurse anesthetists in Pennsylvania. Currently Pennsylvania is one of only two States that does not have a formal recognition of CRNAs in some form. This legislation will provide that title protection, and it will allow CRNAs the flexibility to use their skills to participate in multistate crisis response and military service.

We are very thankful for bringing up this bill today and we ask the members for an affirmative vote. Thank you so much.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady for her comments, as well as the recognition.

The Speaker now recognizes the gentleman from Lancaster County, Representative Mentzer, on final passage.

Mr. MENTZER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Today I rise in support of HB 931. This legislation has been the subject of extensive negotiations between the Pennsylvania Society of Anesthesiologists, this General Assembly, and the Pennsylvania Association of Nurse Anesthetists. Through negotiations with both groups, and as the prime sponsor mentioned, thanks to the hard work from the staff of Professional Licensure and Chairman Hickernell, there is now an agreement. This agreement creates a legally recognized title for certified

registered nurse anesthetists which maintains patient safety. HB 931 protects patient safety standards by clarifying that certified registered nurse anesthetists do not have the ability to practice independently and are subject to oversight and overall direction by a licensed anesthesiologist or surgeon. This is an issue that has been debated for over two decades in Pennsylvania. It is incredible for both groups to come together and find a compromise that not only accomplishes their goals, but more importantly, protects Pennsylvanians by ensuring they receive the safest and highest quality of care.

I urge all of my colleagues to vote in the affirmative on HB 931 to ensure that Pennsylvanians receive the best and safest anesthesia care possible. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
