HB 975 seeks to address problems in the current law that have allowed caretakers to exploit care-dependent persons by using the power and influence of their position to coerce the victim into engaging into sexual intercourse. The current institutional sexual assault statute applies to situations such as in prisons and schools, where those in power, such as prison guards and teachers, are prohibited from engaging in sexual activity with prisoners or students, because when such a power discrepancy is applicable, true consent cannot really occur.

A startling example of this occurred in *Commonwealth v. Federici*, where a victim in her eighties relied on caretakers to meet her basic needs— Okay. I am sorry.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

Ms. DelROSSO. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I am very sorry to the House. I am a freshman, so I am learning and I am very excited to be up here today. So thank you, thank you, thank you.

The SPEAKER. Quite all right. You have a busy day with two bills. I understand.

Ms. DelROSSO. In western Pennsylvania they call it a BOGO; it is a buy one, get one.

Okay. So HB 1082 establishes an early detection and diagnosis of Alzheimer's and other cognitive decline-related disorders. I would have to bet everyone in this Pennsylvania House chamber knows someone who has had a loved one diagnosed with a cognitive brain decline. Not only does it affect the individual diagnosed but the family or caregivers who question why their loved one is just not responding the same as

usual. HB 1082 was written to provide preventive medicine which will not only help our friends and aging loved ones but also will play a critical role in planning for the future if indeed cognitive decline is recognized.

On a personal level, I have two very close friends who both dealt with their mothers diagnosed with Alzheimer's abruptly, one having survived the disease for almost 30 years, while the other survived only 1 year. As some forms of Alzheimer's and related disorders can only be diagnosed with brain scans, unfortunately, it might be too late once your loved one ceases to respond to your requests.

I am ecstatic to see how quickly we have been able to move this bill. It affects 780 million Pennsylvanians, including both those who live with the disease and those who are caretakers. The best way to handle the growing public health challenge is to enhance public awareness and early detection. Alzheimer's is the most expensive disease, not only in Pennsylvania but America, and one of the most heartbreaking. Watching a loved one slowly forget who you are is something that I would wish on no one. That is why we must act on this now. An early diagnosis would allow people to prepare emotionally and financially.

I would like to acknowledge my two local friends of Allegheny County, Kristin and Heather, whom I know this legislation will assist with future planning, rather than be addressing decisions in a reactive way. I pray for my aunt personally who is currently suffering, but I know my family in Florida is doing all they can to work through this cognitive decline.

The FDA (Food and Drug Administration)-approved new drug along with this legislation is one more step in the right direction. I urge my colleagues in the House to vote in support of this bill as another step in the right direction.

STATEMENT BY MR. RABB

The SPEAKER. Turning to rule 17 speakers, the Speaker recognizes the gentleman, Representative Rabb, to speak regarding minimum wage. The gentleman is in order and you may proceed.

Mr. RABB. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The Commonwealth has not had a raise in 15 years. Raising the minimum wage is a raise for Pennsylvania. Raising the minimum wage is a matter of providing dignity to hardworking people – some of the hardest working people in our Commonwealth – and in so doing, prioritizing equity for people who are very often the most vulnerable among us.

There are a lot of misnomers out there that, paired with misinformation, skew how some people who oppose raising the minimum wage view this issue. But at its essence, ensuring no one is paid a poverty wage in the richest country in world history is of great importance. One misnomer that too often derails such conversations is the term "small business," especially in data that government entities use when considering changes in minimum-wage laws. Most people believe that small businesses are mom-and-pop shops; however, the Federal government defines "small businesses" as entities with fewer than 500 employees, which is a massive number. This means that in the U.S., 99.7 percent of all businesses are considered small businesses. That is like saying I like puppies with heads. Just say you like puppies. So you cannot compare a company with 450 employees with one that just has 4 or 5 employees despite them both being defined as "small businesses." So there is a distinction between neighborhood businesses and community-centered businesses and the government term "small business" because the former are likely to be more invested in their employees than much larger corporations whose products and services are not marketed to the locations where they are headquartered and oftentimes do not hire people locally.

Another common misconception is that mostly teenagers get paid the minimum wage or that most people who get the minimum wage are teenagers. But the reality is, the average age of a minimum-wage earner in Pennsylvania is 35. Worse, the contrast between the misconception and the facts surrounding who is working for minimum wage in Pennsylvania contributes to the lack of humanity the issue is shown. Most of the people who earn minimum-wage pay are people with bills like rent and utilities, and many of them have children to care for. They cannot make ends meet and fulfill their financial obligations being paid a minimum wage even if they are working multiple minimum-wage jobs. There are only so many hours in a week, and when someone is earning a meager hourly wage per hour, there simply are not enough hours in the week for them to pay their bills. That needs to change.

No one should be working 40 hours or more a week and still be unable to pay these bills. This is certainly true for our fellow Pennsylvanians who earn the tipped minimum wage of \$2.83 an hour, a relic of former enslavers who refused to pay Black people for their labor after emancipation. But there is also another subminimum wage that we must eradicate that allows incarcerated workers, gig workers like Uber drivers, and workers with disabilities to earn even less than the tipped minimum wage. If employers see fit to employ people to benefit from the value of their labor, that value must be dignified with one fair wage.

STATEMENT BY MR. WEBSTER

The SPEAKER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Webster, to speak regarding election integrity.

Mr. WEBSTER. Thank you.

Mr. Speaker, Pennsylvania has serious, Pennsylvania has large, very, very, very large challenges in front of us – challenges in public education; in jobs and economic growth; in health care; in equity issues – racial equity, gender equity, pay equity, LGBTQ rights. Pennsylvania has very large challenges in terms of quality of life, meaning basic infrastructure, transportation, clean air and water – quality of life for everyone. Underpinning every one of those issues is our basic belief in democracy, fundamental democracy, the foundation that our country is built upon.

We have spent in the United States at least 40 years of my life arguing for small government, small thinking. Well, we have done that. It did not work. We need big ideas – big challenges; big ideas. It is time for those big ideas and a very, very large majority of Pennsylvanians know that. The time for small ideas is over. You cannot solve big challenges with small ideas. It is time for big ideas. And the majority of Pennsylvanians know this.

So what do we do? In the 2020 Presidential election, 72 percent of Pennsylvanians turned out to vote. Now, you know, another 6, 7 months later, we are going to make the attempt to diminish that majority. We are going to make the attempt to avoid democracy, to sort of sidestep that outpouring of voters themselves, with a voting reform bill that is anything but reform. We should be talking about those education challenges, those kids. We should be talking about jobs, health care, equity, quality of life. Instead, we are trying to undermine our election services capabilities, our ability to conduct broad and sweeping elections with great turnout that would enable us to take on the really big challenges we face.

Mr. Speaker, Pennsylvania has a \$3 billion budget surplus this year. We should be talking about how to invest that \$3 billion budget surplus in our schools, because when we do that, we take and give the money back to our taxpayers in our local communities. Pennsylvania has \$7 billion in Federal dollars from the American Rescue Plan. We should be talking about how to invest that \$7 billion from the COVID relief to fix toxic schools; to rebuild, to create jobs; to empower businesses, update our infrastructure, and grow our economy. We need to be talking about infrastructure writ large – sure, roads and bridges, roads and bridges, but also water and sewer, airports, passenger rail service, broadband Internet across every community in Pennsylvania, and other things – other things that in today's world are fundamental infrastructure to support a modern world and a modern workforce. Instead, we are rehashing the last Presidential election, still.

We have done the statistical audit. We also did a larger audit to include 63 of 67 counties in Pennsylvania. We spent over 30 hours in State Government Committee hearings listening to expert testimony, and what we learned is that Pennsylvania can do some things a little better. But we learned, those experts, over 50 experts testifying from across Pennsylvania and from other States, what we learned is that our 2020 election was solid, fair, secure, and we learned that we also owe a great debt of gratitude to the county election services people who made that happen. We could thank them with some real support for those big, for those really big issues: better schools for their children, jobs in their

communities, health care, equity. Instead, we got a voter restriction act.

The proponents of this bill are going to use words like "reform" and "improved access." Here is what they will be saying: If we limit voter registration, we create more access. If we limit mail-in ballots, we create more access. If we limit drop boxes, we create more access.

The SPEAKER pro tempore. Representative Mercuri, would you like to come forward for comments on election integrity.

Mr. MERCURI. Thank you, Madam Chairwoman.

My story is a Pennsylvania story. I grew up in a dedicated, hardworking, middle-class family, playing football on Friday nights. I know the powerful endowment of self-worth that only the unconditional love of a family provides.

I earned the opportunity to go to West Point. I joined the Army and fought for freedom on the battlefields of Iraq alongside my brothers and sisters in arms, losing 14 classmates and many others wounded visibly and invisibly by the cost of war. I witnessed the destructive impact of tyranny and terror on communities.

I came back from overseas with a degree and experience, and put that to use in the private sector, learning financial services and starting a business of my own in our town. I have experienced the power of the free economy to change lives and livelihoods.

There are 12.8 million other Pennsylvania stories just like mine. In our shared history in Pennsylvania, we have a tradition of grit in our way of life: from the Founding Fathers in Philadelphia to the battlefields of Gettysburg, to freedom's forge and our Pittsburgh steel industry, to our world-class teachers, our many veterans, our first responders, and families. We have a sense of gratitude for all that we have been handed by our predecessors. We take responsibility for ourselves, our families, and our communities to ensure the value of hard work and freedom is handed down to the next generation. We value innovation in our economy: inventing new ways to grow and harvest crops, create advanced manufacturing, and utilize information technology in our workplaces and schools. And Pennsylvania grit is also tolerance and respect for every single person, every single day, regardless of their background, religion, gender, sexual preferences, and racial or ethnic heritage.

In Pennsylvania we are a free people. And free societies need free and fair democratic processes. To ensure trust in our Republic, we must know with certainty that our voice will be heard in the public places and the mechanism of government is truly representative of all citizens. That means free access to casting every vote, without exorbitant wait times, confusing processes, or unaccommodating polling places. To ensure trust in

our Republic, we must also know with certainty that every vote has been counted accurately and that the mechanism of government is accountable to the people themselves, not the elites or the powerful of society. That means modernized election processes, with checks and internal controls, including independent audits to ensure no corruption or undue influences creep in. It means voter authentication to ensure one person and one vote, and that in a day of modern technology we watch over our process with modern means as well, to guarantee no outside influence.

Each generation has its challenge in helping to ensure we pass the Republic intact to our children and grandchildren. In our time this is our challenge. To honor my friends who gave their lives on the battlefield of Iraq, I will be thinking about their sacrifice for our Republic as I vote "yes" on HB 1300 to ensure election integrity for ourselves and our next generation. It honors Pennsylvania's tradition of grit that we have the most innovative and most secure election proposal in the country, and I urge our Governor to sign and implement this law as soon as it is passed with haste so that we might move beyond our most recent challenges and into our bright and promising future.

On June 19, 2019, the Governor signed my HB 619, making Juneteenth an official State holiday. This Act 9 of 2019 made Pennsylvania the second State to have an official Juneteenth law. Since that day I am very happy to say we have seen an extraordinary increase in community engagement, education, and celebration of the holiday. It is my hope that as years pass we see this trend continue until Juneteenth is as commonly known as any other holiday.

Just this week the U.S. Senate passed a bill to make Juneteenth a Federal holiday, known as Juneteenth National Independence Day, and the House is expected to do the same. This is exactly the kind of progress I had hoped this bill would promote, and I am very glad to see it coming to fruition.

Juneteenth National Freedom Day is a landmark moment in our nation's history, playing a pivotal role in reconstruction and the ultimate unification of the United States. I will be forever proud to have played a role in its official observance here in Pennsylvania. Thank you, and Happy Juneteenth.
