The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Vitali, on final passage.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to HB 2019. I would point out that the administration has stated its formal opposition. It is the position of the administration that this bill is unnecessary, that it would cost the general funds of this Commonwealth perhaps \$1 million a year.

The bill as drafted is overly broad. While the intent of the bill is to relieve a certain project of the maker of the bill from paying a \$750 fee, the actual effect of the bill, because of its overly broad language, could really apply to a multiplicity of structures that border the water, including things as broad as bridges.

In addition, as we speak, a regulation is moving through the regulatory process which will provide relief to the constituent of the maker of the bill. That regulation has passed the EQB (Environmental Quality Board) in proposed form and is moving towards final passage.

For those reasons, Mr. Speaker, I would ask for a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Wentling, on final passage.

Mr. WENTLING. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just want to take a moment to discuss this issue, HB 2019. First and foremost, this is not specific to a constituent that came to me with this issue; this is specific to constituents across all of the Lake Erie shoreline. In fact, I am very honored to have the entire Erie delegation as cosponsors of this bill, both Republican and Democrat. And I received much correspondence from many of those members of the Erie delegation's constituents who reside along Lake Erie. So this is not, again, specific to a constituent that I am honored to represent.

There are currently 26 groins, I believe is the number. I believe a number of those may be exempt. There was a mention of \$1 million-plus. It is actually the bottom line of the State, with the DEP (Department of Environmental Protection), would be actually right around \$20,000.

I just want to take another quick moment to discuss this process and how this has kind of played out, really for the folks at home that perhaps do not understand how this entire bureaucratic issue has kind of played itself out. Many of the things that were mentioned certainly have happened, and I wanted to touch on that.

I had a constituent come to me in August of 2018, explained the situation to me, and we actually went to DEP. We went to DEP for consideration, just simply charging \$250 for the groin structures, just like docks are assessed, the fees are assessed for docks. We were told we needed legislation to do such a thing. I went and I worked to craft legislation to define a "groin" and to exempt the excessive fee because this constituent specifically had gone from \$25 all the way up to \$750 annually.

So we brought that bill out of committee last session, and the comment from DEP was very simple: it was not needed. These individuals can be exempt. So we immediately, on the behalf of the constituent, worked with the constituent to ask the Secretary of DEP to exempt this specific structure. We never received a correspondence back.

What happened, which was mentioned by the last speaker, was eventually this issue did go in front of the EQB board and was voted upon. It is going to take a number of years for that regulation to be finalized. In the meantime, \$750 a year, that is a lot of money. I have another individual, another constituent, that is actually currently being pursued by the Attorney General's Office for the \$750; \$750 annually is an excessive fee.

So let us continue on this journey, and I will wrap up with this. We were very fortunate to have an opportunity again this session to have this bill considered in committee, and here we are on third consideration on the floor of the House. There was mention in committee, once again on DEP's behalf, that these are somehow environmentally unfriendly and its costs – I believe the last speaker mentioned a million or millions of dollars in environmental damage. From my perspective, that is certainly not the case. And I would very much just once again remind you, as members of the General Assembly – Democrat, Republican – that this is a bipartisan bill; very honored to have that support, and I would very much appreciate an affirmative vote. Thank you so much.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Vitali, for the second time on final passage.

Mr. VITALI. So I just wanted to put a slightly finer point on the argument I just made, and I salute the maker and his efforts to help the people of Lake Erie.

But here is the problem. Here is the definition cited in his bill of " 'Groin structure.' A shore structure that may affect shore erosion, wave action or inundation." And actually, that is so broad that that can include things like – according to the DEP – almost any structure on submerged lands, including private and commercial docks, jetties, wharfs, marinas, and even bridges.

The maker wants to deal with something very specific, and just to define his term, picture a jetty, and just picture a series of shorter, smaller jetties along the shoreline. You see that at the Jersey Shore. That is what he is getting at. But the problem is, the bill has such a broad definition that includes a whole host of things and not confined to Lake Erie, but the entire Commonwealth.

So the problem, really, here is a drafting problem. It is really overly broad. That is why the administration opposes it. They oppose it because of this overbroad definition that could encompass so many things that it could cost over \$1 million in revenue per year.

I salute the maker of the amendment, but the bill is just too broad in its drafting.

Mr. B. MILLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of HB 2148, which will allow a political subdivision that properly submits an advertisement to a newspaper of general circulation, and simultaneously also posts the same language on their publicly available Internet Web site, to count the Internet Web site advertising as having met the legal advertising requirements in the case when a newspaper fails to publish the public notice in a timely fashion.

Municipalities and other political subdivisions are required by law to advertise public meetings, special notices for ordinances, loan commitment letters, budgets, land development applications, etc. When a political subdivision fails to properly advertise, there are negative consequences, which include the inability of a governing body to take action to avoid default on a loan arrangement, thus subjecting the municipality to hefty penalties or a bad loan deal, or the inability to vote to disapprove a land development application due to the clock running out and the application being considered deemed approved. Beyond these examples, in the big picture, the work of a political subdivision essentially comes to a halt when proper legal notice has not been given.

The consequences to political subdivisions for failure to advertise are significant, but what happens if the governing body does submit an advertisement to a newspaper of general circulation, but the newspaper fails to print the advertisement? Should the political subdivision suffer the consequences I just mentioned even though they properly satisfied the law's requirements?

This is the situation that occurred in my district. A municipality properly advertised the borrowing of money and also a forthcoming land development application decision. The newspaper failed to properly print the advertisement, leaving the municipality on the hook for both negative consequences. Thankfully, the municipality avoided trouble because the lending

institution worked with them and the applicant withdrew the application; however, had this not been the case, the consequences to the municipality would have been extremely negative. Since these types of scenarios can occur anywhere in Pennsylvania, all political subdivisions should have protection against the negative consequences that result from a newspaper's failure to advertise.

Since the ability of counties, towns, townships, boroughs, school districts, and municipal authorities to conduct the business of the people depends on giving proper notice to the citizens through legal advertising, it is essential that the law provide them with the redundant advertising safeguards in this bill that would allow them to seamlessly operate, while also ensuring that the political subdivision continues to fully inform the public.

Mr. Speaker, no municipality or other political subdivision should be put in the untenable situation of not being able to act on critical matters before them, nor should they have to endure costly litigation because of a newspaper's failure to advertise.

Please join me by voting "yes" to HB 2148 to provide political subdivisions with additional means to notify the public of pending business so that they can conduct government business in a timely and efficient manner.

I will be a "yes" vote in the hopes that dialogue will continue on this issue.
