TO LEIGH M. CHAPMAN, ACTING SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH, AND TO RICH FITZGERALD, BETHANY HALLAM, AND SAMUEL DeMARCO, III, CONSTITUTING THE BOARD OF ELECTIONS OF ALLEGHENY COUNTY.

GREETINGS: WHEREAS, A VACANCY EXISTS IN THE OFFICE OF REPRESENTATIVE OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA FOR THE NINETEENTH LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT OF THE COUNTY OF ALLEGHENY CAUSED BY THE RESIGNATION OF JAKE WHEATLEY, JR., THE REPRESENTATIVE FROM SAID DISTRICT, ON THE 31ST DAY OF JANUARY, TWO THOUSAND TWENTY-TWO.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BRYAN CUTLER, SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES BY VIRTUE OF THE AUTHORITY VESTED IN ME BY THE CONSTITUTION OF THE COMMONWEALTH OF PENNSYLVANIA, AND BY THE ACT OF ASSEMBLY IN SUCH CASE MADE AND PROVIDED, DO HEREBY COMMAND:

THAT YOU CAUSE AN ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE SAID COUNTY OF ALLEGHENY, ON THE 5TH DAY OF APRIL, TWO THOUSAND TWENTY-TWO TO CHOOSE A PERSON TO REPRESENT SAID LEGISLATIVE DISTRICT IN THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF PENNSYLVANIA, FOR THE REMAINDER OF THE TERM EXPIRING NOVEMBER 30TH, TWO THOUSAND TWENTY-TWO, AND THAT YOU GIVE DUE AND PUBLIC NOTICE OF SAID ELECTION THROUGHOUT SAID DISTRICT, IN THE FORM AND MANNER DIRECTED BY LAW.

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 979, Printer's Number 1706.

This legislation is an attack on local governments who take action to find commonsense solutions to gun violence and is yet another bill that shows indifference to the safety of Pennsylvanians.

During a time when injuries and deaths from gun violence are spiking, House Bill 979 would discourage local jurisdictions from attempting to regulate firearms. In addition, it provides an opportunity for individuals to challenge local ordinances and sue a county, municipality, or township that violates the prohibition on stricter firearms laws. Under House Bill 979, Philadelphia, which saw more gun violence-related deaths than days in January, may have difficulty enforcing local laws that were created to curb the violence and save families and communities from continued heartache.

When I vetoed Senate Bill 565 of 2021, a bill that would have allowed unvetted gun owners to carry concealed weapons through our streets, I stated that these victims and communities deserve to have meaningful legislation passed to address the scourge of gun violence. I stand by that. I have offered many ideas that would help keep Pennsylvanians safe while respecting the rights of responsible gun owners, including legislation to require safe storage, authorize extreme risk protection orders, enhance reporting requirements for lost or stolen guns and close gaps in the background check system – and yet, I have not received a bill from the General Assembly that seeks to address this issue in a meaningful way. Instead, I have received a bill that seeks to attack local governments who wish to find solutions for those that they serve. I urge the Republican-controlled General Assembly to stop enabling the problem and step up to be a part of the solution.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 979, Printer's Number 1706.

TO THE HONORABLE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 2146, Printer's Number 2541.

This legislation fails the test of fundamental fairness. The result of a partisan political process, HB 2146 does not deliver on the Pennsylvania Constitution's guarantee of free and equal elections. The people of Pennsylvania deserve a fair election map that promotes accountability and responsiveness to voters and is drawn in an open and honest way. Instead, HB 2146 adopts a map selected by politicians to take advantage of the process and choose their own voters. This directly contravenes a "core principle of our republican form of government" identified by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court: "that the voters should choose their representatives, not the other way around." *League of Women Voters v. Commonwealth*, 178 A.3d 737, 740-41 (Pa. 2018).

Last year, I convened a Pennsylvania Redistricting Advisory Council made up of six members with expertise in redistricting, political science, and mapmaking, to establish a set of Redistricting Principles to help guide my review of maps considered and ultimately passed by the General Assembly. The Redistricting Advisory Council met numerous times, and subsequently held a series of in-person and virtual public listening sessions across the state to take public feedback on the Redistricting Principles and the redistricting process. The Redistricting Principles were finalized and made public in late November and consist of (1) Legal Principles, *i.e.*, directives for compliance with legal requirements, such as ensuring that population deviations between districts comply with the United States and Pennsylvania Constitutions; as well as (2) Principles of Representation, *i.e.*, guidance to ensure that communities of interest are maintained, that representation is fair, and that the public can participate meaningfully in the process. This bill fails to comply with the Redistricting Principles outlined by the Redistricting Advisory Council.

First, the revised map splits multiple communities of interest, including splits in Luzerne, Dauphin, Philadelphia and Chester counties that do not appear to be motivated by compelling legal principles, but rather by a desire to make districts more favorable to Republican candidates. Second, the Redistricting Advisory Council recommended that I review proposed maps to determine whether their expected performance is consistent with statewide voter preference. The HB 2146 map falls short on this basic measure of partisan fairness, giving a structural advantage to Republican candidates that far exceeds the party's voter support. A comparison of the HB 2146 map to prior election results and to neutrally drawn maps, using rigorous mathematical methodology, has demonstrated that the HB 2146 map would unnecessarily create noncompetitive districts unresponsive to Pennsylvania political trends and prevailing voter preference. Third, the HB 2146 map does not adequately satisfy the traditional redistricting criteria identified by the Pennsylvania Supreme Court in *League of Women Voters*. Last, despite promises of an open and transparent process, Democratic members of the General Assembly were completely cut out of the process of selecting the map from start to finish. As recently as January 18, 2022, as HB 2146 moved out of committee, the Pennsylvania Senate Republican Caucus issued a press release alerting the public that "[a]dditional amendments are expected," in an effort to reach bipartisan compromise. Ultimately, these repeated promises of bipartisanship were only kept to the extent that several Republican members of the House of Representatives crossed the aisle to vote against this unfair map.

After this bill was introduced, I made my strong objections to the congressional redistricting map clear and urged bipartisan cooperation. I even provided the General Assembly with two congressional redistricting map options as examples of the type of map I would support – free of gerrymandering, consistent with the principles of the Redistricting Advisory Council, and in full accord with the Voting Rights Act and United States and Pennsylvania Supreme Court precedent – and to show that there are multiple ways to draw a fair map that meets the Redistricting Principles. Instead, the HB 2146 map was the only map considered by the General Assembly despite all the time they had to introduce maps for public comment and debate. The public deserves a fair map completed in a bipartisan manner; the General Assembly failed to adopt one.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 2146, Printer's Number 2541.

**MOTION TO REVERT
TO PRIOR PRINTER'S NUMBER**

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentlewoman, Representative Fiedler, rise?

Ms. FIEDLER. Mr. Speaker, I rise to make a motion that we revert to the prior printer's number for SB 291.

The SPEAKER. The gentlewoman, Representative Fiedler, has made the motion to revert to a prior printer's number.

So that we can appropriately place it on the board, could you please specify which printer's number you are referring to?

Ms. FIEDLER. I make a motion that we revert to the prior printer's number, 294, for SB 291.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

Representative Fiedler has made the motion to revert to prior printer's number 294.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the motion?

The SPEAKER. Representative Fiedler has made the motion to revert to a prior printer's number, and on that motion, the Chair recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative Fiedler.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SB 291 is a capital budget bill which authorizes debt to pay for capital projects during the fiscal year. The original printer's number contained an extra \$1 billion in the RCAP debt authorization and increased the total RCAP debt cap. This debt authorization increase is needed to make a massive investment in toxic schools across the Commonwealth, as the Governor proposed in last year's budget. By reverting to the prior printer's number, we have an opportunity to finally do something to fix toxic schools across our State. Many communities have schools that are literally crumbling and clearly unsafe for children and educators.

If I may say, just briefly, an elementary school—Mr. Speaker, I am having trouble with the audio right now.

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady will please suspend.

We will turn your microphone up. I ask members to please take their seats. Move any conversations off the floor of the House into the rear.

You are in order and may proceed.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you. An elementary school in the Wilkes-Barre School District has a shifting foundation and overcrowded classrooms separated by dividers, with occupational therapy services being provided in a closet. Former students described roaches in the cafeteria, chipped ceilings, no air conditioning, and uncomfortably hot temperatures in the winter.

In Philadelphia, there are toxins, outrageous temperatures, collapsing structures, and lifelong educators across the city are asking if their illness is related to their workplace. Indeed, educators across the State are asking that question. In Philadelphia, there are 320 buildings with an average age of 70 years and a cumulative deferred maintenance cost of \$4.5 billion.

Mr. Speaker, last year Governor Wolf proposed using \$1 billion through the RCAP program to start to fix these problems that exist in all of our districts. Printer's number 294 of SB 291 contained that investment. It authorized an extra \$1 billion for RCAP, which we can use to fix toxic schools, and adjusts the RCAP debt limit accordingly. If we go back to the prior printer's number, we can actually make progress on this issue. Why do we continue to accept schools with lead, mold, leaky roofs, nonfunctioning heat, and lack of air conditioning?

In closing, I would say that if you would accept those conditions for your children and the children in your community, then do not support this motion to revert. But if you want to finally, finally start to fix toxic schools in Pennsylvania, please join me in voting to revert to the prior printer's number, 294, for SB 291.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Saylor, on the motion to revert to prior printer's number.

Mr. SAYLOR. First of all, Mr. Speaker, I want to report that the Senate voted this bill out 50 to nothing. So Senate Democrats and Senate Republicans agreed on the bill as before us today.

And what I find interesting in the lady's comments is the fact that she just pointed out the failures of school boards in the areas that she cited to do what all of the rest of our school boards have been dealing with for a long time – fixing the asbestos problems,

fixing those problems in our school districts, and doing it locally. What she is asking us to do is to saddle all taxpayers of Pennsylvania for the failures of school boards to address these issues. What they need to do is elect officials who are willing, willing to spend their dollars in the proper way rather than sit here and ask the taxpayers of Pennsylvania to continue to increase our debt at the risk of raising taxes. We have tried that; it does not work.

So I ask for a negative vote on this. Let us not try and reward failures in school boards across this State in fixing their own problems when many – if not 95 percent, 99 percent – of our school districts have fixed these kinds of problems. Our school boards who have acted responsibly in dealing with issues throughout their history, these few examples are a perfect example of why local taxpayers need to get more involved in their school districts to make sure, to make sure that their students are safe and that what they are teaching in schools is proper.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

The gentlewoman, Representative Madden, is recognized to speak on the motion to revert to prior printer's number.

Ms. MADDEN. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I rise in support of my colleague's motion. And I would just like to say, on behalf of all of the 501 school districts who are desperately underfunded, as we spend more than 46 other States on funding and are dead last in equity, that the Appropriations chair is not correct. Let us start funding our schools equitably so that our schools can afford to make the appropriate changes and the appropriate improvements, and let us not keep putting it on the backs of taxpayers. Let us in this body start funding education properly. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Kenyatta, on the motion to revert.

Mr. KENYATTA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I want to say that I find it particularly offensive that the majority Appropriations chair believes that if his preferred candidate is not running the school board that Pennsylvania kids should go to schools where there is lead, asbestos, and mold. I find it particularly offensive that we have billions of dollars sitting in a Rainy Day Fund when we know there are school buildings right now that are in desperate need of repair. Now, if the majority Appropriations chair does not think that it is his problem or his concern, I am sure people in his district would love to hear about it. I hope they hear these comments. These are disgraceful, despicable comments that have no place in this body.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will please suspend.

While I appreciate the prior speaker's passion for the topic, it saddens me that I once again need to remind the body that you cannot go after the motives of individual members on why they would or would not support issues, or in this case, a motion. And I would urge the members to please abide by the House rules that were adopted at the beginning of session regarding the proper subject matter of debate being the underlying issue and not subscribing motive to individuals, which is simply counterproductive, and in many times, inaccurate.

The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative Kinkead, on the motion to revert.

Ms. KINKEAD. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in support of this motion, and I would just like to remind this body that school board members are not the only elected officials that were elected in order to fund our schools; 203 of us were also elected to do that, and that is what all of the people who

live in Pennsylvania have charged us with doing. We are failing to do that. So please vote in favor of this motion. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

Seeing no one else seeking recognition, we will return to the maker of the motion prior to recognizing the leaders.

And, Representative Fiedler, you are in order and may speak for the second time on the motion to revert.

Ms. FIEDLER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I think it is important for all of us in this body, as you have heard from some of my colleagues, to remember whose lives we are really talking about. We are talking about the lives of educators who have devoted themselves for decades to educating the children in our communities. They are sitting at home wondering if the cancer diagnosis or their increasingly worse asthma is the result of building conditions because of choices made by this legislative body.

In the Panther Valley School District, 75 kindergartners share one bathroom; 75. Across the State, across my district, and across the city of Philadelphia, across William Penn School District, from east to west, children, educators, and school staff are enduring these conditions because of choices made in this legislative body. As my colleague said, we value the lives of children, youth, teachers, nurses, and guidance counselors, and if you do as well, if you truly do, then I would encourage you to vote "yes" to revert to the prior printer's number for SB 291.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman, the majority leader.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would ask the members to vote "no" on reverting to a prior printer's number, but also keep in mind that the Commonwealth has given over \$13 1/2 billion last year to public education. We continue to increase it more every year. And there were three different iterations of Federal dollars that went out to the schools in the past couple of years, totaling over \$6.5 billion. I do not know how you run your household, but I would suspect that most schools, like many other entities, have a 1-year, 5-year, 10-year, and 20-year deferred maintenance program, and these things should be part of their overall spending plans. And when new influxes of money come in, I know oftentimes we encourage them, use these for these types of things where you can and divert other moneys toward that if you have to be using these specifically.

At the end of the day, Mr. Speaker, I think we need to stick to the plan here. These might sound like some fun additional amendments, but right now I would ask for a "no" vote on reverting this SB 291 to the prior printer's number. Thank you.

The bill will address some of the unintended negative consequences of the changes to the CPSL, and will provide fair and equitable hiring standards that will meet employer and employee needs, while offering robust protections for children.

The bill previously passed the House and Senate unanimously, and I am very appreciative of all the stakeholders for their valuable input to this bill. Please join me in supporting HB 764 to provide provisional hiring parity for all employers and employees who work with children throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

These practitioners are already board certified, and more than 30 other States recognize them with licensure-entitled protection. I have heard from many families who have benefited from applied behavior analysis, which is commonly called ABA. ABA helps not only the patient, but the person's family and friends. The benefits of ABA therapies can be felt through the household. ABA can help our youngest residents who have a diagnosis like autism and our oldest residents like those with Alzheimer's disease. There are many reasons we should license practitioners of ABA. The main reason is that it protects Pennsylvanians when they are at their most vulnerable condition.

As you know, I have been working on this for 5 years and will continue to work through the process. I ask for an affirmative vote on HB 19.
