It is my strong belief that if we are going to have term limits for a district attorney, that term limit should be extended to all district attorneys in this State. I do not believe it should be one particular county that is singled out for a term limit and not hold all of our district attorneys to the same standard. So I hope that we agree that if it is good for Philadelphia, it is good for the State.

Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Speaker thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative White, on the amendment.

Ms. WHITE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This amendment does not comport with the intent of the legislation. Simply put, Philadelphia is a unique entity in its vast population and significant crime rate, making it analogous to other counties. Additionally, imposing term limits on smaller counties could cause problems, as there may not be enough qualified attorneys in those counties to fulfill this important position.

Along with that, I would also say that there are two other counties in Pennsylvania that already have, through home-rule charters, the ability to have their district attorneys term-limited, and that includes Luzerne County as well as Delaware County. So this is not an unprecedented initiative. This is a very important initiative for Philadelphia, our largest city in the Commonwealth, to ensure that there is a term limit in place for the current district attorney. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady.

And the notion to say that we do not have enough qualified attorneys in this State, I find that not to be founded considering that we have no data to support it. I believe this State is filled with a lot of talented people, and I believe if we have term limits, we would see how many talented folks we have in some of those smaller counties.

Pursuant to Article IV, Section 15 of the Pennsylvania Constitution, I am returning herewith, without my approval, House Bill 1184, Printer's Number 2928.

This legislation authorizes the creation of new boroughs from any area of a municipality by petition to the court of common pleas. Pennsylvania already ranks third in the nation for the largest number of local government units. Authorizing the creation of new boroughs as prescribed in this bill, which is opposed by the Pennsylvania Municipal League, will lead to further fragmentation of local governments. Ultimately, additional local governments will result in increased costs for taxpayers for the new borough as well as the former municipality. It is unfortunate that this controversial provision was amended into the legislation when the original bill was intended to modernize aspects of the Borough Code.

For the reasons set forth above, I must withhold my signature from House Bill 1184, Printer's Number 2928.
