The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Longietti, on the amendment.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, these tax credit programs have been around for decades, and a 20-percent administrative fee – the maximum fee that is in statute – is an outlier amongst States that have similar programs. So what my amendment would do is limit the administrative costs to 5 percent. That means more money for the students and the families. That is the whole goal of the program is to put that money into the hands of students and families and not suck it up on administrative fees, and it could potentially save about \$36 million and direct that money to students and families.

Now, the Independent Fiscal Office looked at this issue a few years ago, and what they found was, when they looked at other States that have similar programs, Florida's administrative cost is capped at 3 percent; there are a number of States that limit it to 5 percent, which is my proposal; there are some that have 10 percent, but none that have 20 percent, which is in our statute currently. And the IFO, in their report, specifically recommended that the current law, quote, "...should be amended to reduce the allowance for retained funds to a share that is in line with limits set by other states." That is what the IFO said. That is what my amendment does.

The Legislative Budget and Finance Committee also looked at this issue back in 2009, and what they found at that time was that 62 percent of these scholarship organizations charge zero. They do not have any administrative fee. So they are doing the right thing. But they did find at that time that 5 percent of them charged the full 20 percent, and there is no explanation as to what they are using that money for. And the Legislative Budget and Finance Committee also found that there is no pattern here amongst those organizations in terms of their size, in terms of the geography of where they are located, in terms of how long they have been involved in the program; they just charge the full 20 percent. We do not know why and we do not know what they are using it for.

So my amendment, if we adopt this amendment, we are going to make sure that these funds get to the students and the families and not to excessive administrative fees. So I urge the members to support this amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Sonney, on the amendment.

Mr. SONNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, while the gentleman's comments might sound very reasonable, the simple fact of the matter is that the current legislation allows for up to 20 percent, but it does not mean that you must keep 20 percent. And quite frankly, we know that a number of these organizations are not keeping the entire 20 percent, but unfortunately, we do not know just how many. We do not what the organizations as a whole are charging overall.

I think that it absolutely deserves merit to something that we can look into, but we do not know those answers, and so I would ask for a "no" vote on the gentleman's amendment, amendment A04328.

Mr. Speaker, I want to provide for dual enrollment programs for all of our students, public and private, and that is what the purpose of this amendment—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will please suspend.

Members, the Speaker is being told that several members are having difficulty hearing the discussions of the amendment and

the underlying debate. Please take your seats. Move any conversations from the rear of the House into the anterooms and off the floor.

The Chair thanks the gentleman. You are in order and may proceed, sir.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

As I was saying, Mr. Speaker, I want to provide for dual enrollment programs for all of our students, public and private, and that is the purpose of this amendment. Dual enrollment programs allow a high school student to take a course that is certified and receive credit both for high school and for college. But we used to fund dual enrollment in our budget here in Pennsylvania, and at one time we funded it almost at \$12 million, but that was eliminated in the 2011-12 budget. It has been 10 years ago.

If we do not adopt this amendment, we are going to end up putting the cart before the horse. My amendment makes sure that we have the proper order. We should make sure that we fund dual enrollment for our public school students if we are going to provide for dual enrollment funding for our private school students. After all, 90 percent of our students are in the public schools. That is where our constitutional obligation lies. And we need to provide for both sets of students.

Adopt my amendment and we can fund dual enrollment for both sets of students. Reject my amendment and we will leave our public school students out in the cold. Mr. Speaker, I urge members to adopt this amendment.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the good gentleman, Representative Sonney, on the amendment.

Mr. SONNEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Unfortunately, Mr. Speaker, I am going to also oppose this amendment. You know, the EITC/OSTC (educational improvement tax credit/opportunity scholarship tax credit) program has always been for those that cannot afford on their own, and anything that we can expand on those opportunities for our students is a good thing. I do agree that, you know, we should bring back funding for dual enrollment for all of our schools, and I hope that we can continue those conversations as we develop this budget for this next fiscal year. But with that being said, I think it is important to always expand upon the opportunities that we can prevail upon all of our students, and so therefore, I would ask for a "no" vote on amendment A04329.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, a couple of amendments ago, we heard from the gentleman from Erie County about the lack of data. This amendment addresses that shortcoming. So currently we spend hundreds of millions of dollars on this tax credit program every year, but we prohibit in law the Department of Community and Economic Development from collecting basic information that is needed so that we can understand where this money is going to, who is benefiting from it, and whether or not the program is effective. And this is something – again, the Independent Fiscal Office looked at this and they pointed out the fact that this data cannot currently be obtained, and they recommended that we change the law so this data can be collected.

So specifically, some of the missing metrics that we have that we need this information to evaluate the program is, number one, change in student outcomes after switching to a private school. Would we not want to know that? Number two, scholarship awards by family household income: is it benefiting the people that need it the most or is it going to folks that really do not necessarily need it? The share of tuition offset by the scholarship: so is it really filling the gap or not? The school district where the scholarship recipient resides; that is pretty innocuous information. We ought to know that to get an understanding of where students are coming from in terms of accessing this tax credit program. And whether students who were denied an EITC scholarship attended the school regardless, because we hear that argument all the time. "But for this help, they can't attend." Well, we need to know, is that true or not?

So these are— This is a transparency piece of, an amendment. The language, it is all about transparency. We are talking about tax credits, which really are tax dollars. It really is public money that is involved. And so let us allow the Department of Community and Economic Development to obtain that information and let it come to the light of day. We hear all the time about the importance of how the light of day is the disinfectant, that it keeps us all honest.

And so that is what this amendment does. By the way, other States collect this type of information; Pennsylvania ought to too. So please adopt my amendment. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman, and on the amendment, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Sonney.

(i) six (6) members shall be selected from the residents of this Commonwealth [and five (5)];

(ii) three (3) members shall be selected from trustees of constituent institutions, except that no more than one trustee may represent a constituent institution[.];

(iii) one (1) member must be a member of the State system bargaining unit of the American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees and selected from the membership of the bargaining unit; and

(iv) one (1) member must be a member of the State system bargaining unit of the Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties and selected from the membership of the bargaining unit.

A member appointed under this paragraph must have expertise or substantial experience in at least one area, including postsecondary education, finance, business, nonprofit management, law or public administration.

* * *

Amend Bill, page 2, by inserting between lines 4 and 5

Section 2. The amendment of section 2004-A(c)(2) of the act shall apply to members of the Board of Governors of the State System of Higher Education appointed by the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Senate, and whose terms of office commence after the effective date of this section.

The SPEAKER. And on that question, the Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Longietti.

Mr. LONGIETTI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, my amendment makes sure that 2 out of the 20 members of the PASSHE (Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education) Board of Governors are representatives of the two PASSHE bargaining units – the APSCUF (Association of Pennsylvania State College and University Faculties) bargaining unit for the faculty, and the AFSCME (American Federation of State, County and Municipal Employees) bargaining unit for the support staff. And what my amendment would do is it would reduce the number of the Governor's appointments from the various university boards of trustees from five to three to accommodate those two new reserve seats.

Now, we are in the midst of a historic consolidation of six of the PASSHE universities into two entities. And in that process, we have asked the employee bargaining units to be partners in that, and they have been partners. Now it is time for us to make them full partners.

Now, if you go back in history to the 1980s, in somewhat similar circumstances, we saw Chrysler Corporation do the same thing. Lee Iacocca was the CEO (chief executive officer) of Chrysler. They were facing potential bankruptcy. They needed cooperation from all hands on deck and they got it. And Iacocca was wise enough at that time to make a change in the Chrysler board. He added a seat for the UAW (United Auto Workers) president, Douglas Fraser, who served on that board for a number of years, and it worked well. It was an example of management and labor working together. We need to emulate that model, and so that is what my amendment does.

You know, in 2020 Cindy Shapira, who served as the chair of the PASSHE Board, she established a Commission on Faculty Shared Governance, faculty shared governance, and that effort led to the establishment of a faculty liaison to the board. But the liaison is not a full board member. They do not have the ability to vote. And the commission's report recognized that the PASSHE Board can only go so far in this endeavor. There would have to be a change in the statutory language to allow that seat to be a voting member, a full board member.

And so my amendment takes that next step by making the statutory change that is necessary to reserve 2 out of 20 seats on the board for the 2 bargaining unit representatives. It is a good-government measure. It is something that has been applied in the private sector, as I mentioned, and it would solidify the partnership that is needed to move PASSHE forward and make it grow and successful. And so I urge the members to adopt this amendment.

Mr. Speaker, the Greatest Generation will be remembered not only for answering the call to duty during World War II, but for returning home to serve and build their communities and create the thriving towns that flourished throughout our Commonwealth. So it was with Jim Doherty.

Jim joined the United States Air Force in 1943, 1 year before the D-day invasion would demonstrate to the world the fearless determination of young men like Jim who were committed to the fight against fascism and tyranny. For Jim, it would be a 13-year commitment. He became a bomber pilot at the age of 18, serving in both the European and Pacific Theaters as a second lieutenant. He continued in the Reserves for an additional 5 years as a first lieutenant pilot and was called back to serve in the Korean conflict. His service extended another 5 years in the Air National Guard.

On returning to Pennsylvania and making Horsham Township in Montgomery County his home, Jim served his community in many roles. He sat as a member of the Horsham Township Council, guided young lives through the Horsham Little League, and demonstrated a commitment to keeping Horsham pristine and environmentally safe through the Horsham Water and Sewer Authority, the Horsham Township Parks and Recreation Board, the Horsham Township Environmental Advisory Board, and the Horsham Township Vacancy Board.

As if that was not enough, Jim also served as a member of the Hatboro-Horsham School District Board of Directors for 20 years, receiving many awards throughout his service. Yet somehow, he found time to serve as a member of the Horsham Lions for 10 years and the Horsham VFW (Veterans of Foreign Wars) for 20 years. He was elected to the Hatboro-Horsham Hall of Fame for his outstanding community service.

Jim was also dedicated to his faith and played many roles at St. John's Lutheran Church in Hatboro, including as its finance chairman, a council member, teacher, and as a member of the communion team. And through it all, he was a dedicated family man, married 72 years to his beloved wife, Elizabeth, leaving behind the legacy of children and grandchildren.

When Jim passed away on February 10, 2021, he left behind an enormous imprint on all our lives. It is no exaggeration to say Horsham would not have been the same thriving, livable community without Jim Doherty.

It is why it is my pleasure to join my friend, Representative Meghan Schroeder, in offering legislation to rename the portion of County Line Road in Bucks and Montgomery Counties, from Meetinghouse Road to Blair Mill Road, as the U.S. Air Force Major James Doherty Memorial Highway. In the future, as families drive along this roadway, children will ask who Jim Doherty was, and they will learn the true meaning of service to one's country and community. That is the legacy of U.S. Air Force Major James Doherty. And I thank the members for their support.
