SB 708, PN 1744 (Amended) By Rep. KAUFFMAN

Mr. **CONKLIN**. I want to thank the Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, as always, I want to thank the gentleman for bringing this bill forward, but this is a very important amendment. It is strictly your voice. It is your freedom of speech. It is about giving individuals, no matter where they are or what they have done, that opportunity to still have that American freedom.

Mr. Speaker, without our freedom of speech, without our freedom to be able to protect ourselves or to be able to give the input, the very crux of democracy could be taken away. So for that reason, Mr. Speaker, I am asking the members of this fine chamber to please give every individual that freedom of speech, give them the right to be able to work out any differences they have, but most of all, give them that right to be able to protect themselves or individuals that they know or love.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The **SPEAKER**. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Schmitt, on the amendment.

Mr. **SCHMITT**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Let me just first say that I think that incarcerated individuals are indeed fortunate to have an advocate in the person of the chairman from Centre County who just spoke.

On ballots, though, Mr. Speaker, I think that the more compelling argument is that section 508, relating to incarcerated individuals, needs to stay in my bill for a number of reasons. Number one, it only is in force when an institution does not have their own policies or procedures. Most institutions have them; some do not. In the case where an institution does not have their own policies and procedures, this would provide the inmate with access to an expansive list of documents. They would be entitled to records relating to the criminal commitment of them, institutional housing information, financial records, work records, educational records, disciplinary records, disciplinary housing and other policies adopted by the correctional institution, records relating to any Federal or State benefits received by the inmate or for which the inmate might be eligible, the inmate's tax records, the inmate's voting records, and records relating to any license issued to the inmate by a Commonwealth or local agency.

That is an expansive list, Mr. Speaker. It may not be exhaustive, and so my bill sets it as a floor. Agencies and institutions are free to produce even more information than that. So this gives – and by the way, this would be produced to inmates at no cost.

In these situations, where an institution does not have policies and procedures in effect, inmates have no idea what they are entitled to. This would make it very clear to them what they are entitled to. It is a comprehensive list of documents that would have to be produced to them. It would make it clear, not just to the inmate what they are entitled to, but it would make it clear to the institution and the agency as well. I think that this is a positive section for inmates and for agencies and for the Right-to-Know Law, and I ask for an affirmative vote.

BILLS ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 2404, PN 3204**, entitled:

An Act amending the act of November 26, 1978 (P.L.1375, No.325), known as the Dam Safety and Encroachments Act, providing for issuance of and conditions for continuous maintenance permits.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the bill on third consideration?
Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

And on that question, the Chair recognizes the good gentleman, Representative Owlett.

Mr. OWLETT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

HB 2404 is very simple and a commonsense bill that will empower our counties, municipalities, townships, boroughs, and PennDOT to maintain their bridges regularly without going back to DEP (Department of Environmental Protection) after every high-water event, even just after a normal spring or summer rain. HB 2404 would require DEP to create and issue a 10-year permit for ongoing maintenance to our valuable infrastructure.

Maintenance – anyone who owns a home or a vehicle knows the importance of maintenance. When you buy your house, you buy it, and an engineer drew some plans for that house. When you buy a car, there were engineered plans for that car. And maintaining the schedule or a plan to ensure that your home continues to provide shelter and your car continues to run, you must maintain it. It is very, very important to protect your investment.

The same goes with our bridges. They also have engineered plans, and in that engineered plan, there is an existing stream channel where the water is supposed to be hitting the bridge, and that matters. And when it starts to gather debris, it will fail. It is maintaining that stream channel that will make sure that the structure will continue to be there and serve the community. It will protect the investment that the community has made, and that is very, very important.

For decades now, the policies at DEP have made it impossible for the owners of these structures to do the work that they need to do to maintain the channel in a form that matches the way that the bridge was designed. This maintenance needs to be done regardless of what has washed into the channel and has been there for decades. Right now when you have a high-water event, structures will fail here in the Commonwealth. Not only is this incredibly dangerous, but it also in turn costs the taxpayers an incredible amount of money to replace these structures.

That is exactly what happened in my district last summer. A \$2.5 million bridge collapsed into the creek below, and it was because of the failed policies of DEP. This is exactly why HB 2404 is needed. Sadly, I could show you dozens of structures in my district alone that will fail in the future just like the Grubb Road bridge did just north of Knoxville. I hope that the Secretary of DEP will come and actually pay a visit to my district and look at these ongoing issues.

We simply cannot continue to go down this road. No, it is time for the owners of these structures to maintain them to the specifications that the engineers drew them in a standing permit. DEP knows that this needs to be done, but they just continue to say, let us let water do what water does.

I know this sounds simple and it is, because it very much is simple. But just like maintaining your home, just like maintaining your car to the specifications of the manufacturer, we need to allow these owners of these bridges to maintain them to the way that the engineer drew them. Let us pass this commonsense legislation and finally allow our local officials to do what they need to do to maintain our bridges and our infrastructure here in the Commonwealth. I ask for an affirmative vote on HB 2404.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the good gentleman, Representative Vitali, on final passage.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to HB 2404, although I respect the gentleman's efforts to improve conditions with regard to the streams of his district. And I am happy to hear, if I am correct, that the DEP will be meeting with the gentleman later on this week to see if some resolution can be made to this issue. But the bill as it stands erodes the Department of Environmental Protection's authority and jurisdiction with regard to our streams, and for that reason it should be rejected.

The DEP has said, "This bill is unnecessary. Permittees are already granted the ability to maintain structures like a bridge or a culvert within 50 feet upstream and downstream." The concern is that dredging in these streams could have unintended consequences, both upstream and downstream, with regard to erosion and aquatic life.

So I am asking that members vote "no," and hoping that the meeting later on this week will be productive and we can have some agreed-upon solution here. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Sturla, on final passage.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Will the gentleman rise for brief interrogation?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman indicates he will. You are in order and may proceed, sir.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, it was indicated that a bridge in the gentleman's district collapsed and had to be replaced to the tune of \$2.5 million. I guess my question would be, if the municipality takes over the maintenance of the stream and removing any debris, if the bridge still collapses, is it then the municipality's liability to replace the \$2.5 million bridge? Or if they fail to do the maintenance that would be required, are they then liable for the \$2.5 million bridge, or is it still PennDOT?

Mr. OWLETT. So currently the bridge that I am speaking of is a county-owned bridge. It has not been maintained for decades above. The water channel changed. It actually washed the pylon under because the water was hitting it at a different angle. So the county owns the bridge. The county would love to be able to maintain that, would have loved, but because of the debris that was above it, they were not allowed to maintain the channel the way that that bridge was drawn, which is why it failed.

The county would love to replace the bridge, but why would the county do that if the policies from DEP are not going to allow them to actually maintain the channel that that bridge was drawn at? That is what we are trying to address. So they would love to be able to maintain their structures. That is why the Boroughs Association, that is why PennDOT – or, I am sorry, that is why the County Commissioners Association, that is why PSATS (Pennsylvania State Association of Township Supervisors) are supportive of this legislation, because they would love to protect the infrastructure that they own, but they currently cannot do that with the policies to the extent that they need to to maintain the channel that was drawn by an engineer for that structure.

Does that answer your question?

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. OWLETT. Thank you.

Mr. STURLA. Mr. Speaker, if I may make comments?

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

If you have concluded your interrogation, you may speak on final passage.

Mr. STURLA. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I grew up with a stream running behind my house. It was part of the headwaters of the Conestoga River. And during Hurricane Agnes, the stream that used to run through the farm meadow behind my parent's house, which had little islands because the stream broke into several different places and ran all over the meadow and wound back and forth, that meadow flooded like crazy and there was debris everywhere. And the local government decided, in their inevitable wisdom, that the best way to make sure that that kind of thing did not happen in the future was to dig a trench down through that stretch that used to meander through a meadow. And that trench still exists. And there is no meandering stream and there is no riparian buffer and there is no flooding in that meadow anymore, but that is because there is flooding downstream because all they did was move the water down to somebody else's property.

Mr. Speaker, this is why it needs to be more than local planning of what happens in the couple of hundred feet to the upside of a bridge. This is about complete infrastructure as it relates to an entire watershed, not about maintenance of one bridge. I would urge a "no" vote.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. OWLETT. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I appreciate the debate on this bill.

I think it is important to note that this is a permit. This is a 10-year permit. This is not just municipalities doing what they want to do. They still will have to go through a permitting process, working with DEP, but they will not have to go back after every high-water event to do that same work that they are going to do to maintain that structure each and every time. This costs them a lot of resources to continue to work through this process. And it also does not, under the current statutory requirements and policies with DEP, they are not allowed to do the work that they need to do, and that is the problem.

I also, you know, it is unfortunate that it is being deemed as like, you know, letting streams do what streams want to do. That is not what we are trying to do here. This is about infrastructure itself and protecting that infrastructure the way that it was drawn to take water. That is what it is about. The way that the engineer drew that structure to accept water. If we allow water to just hit it however it is going to, it will fail and it will cost the taxpayers here in the Commonwealth a ton of money. I appreciate your support of HB 2404.

REMARKS SUBMITTED FOR THE RECORD

The SPEAKER. For what purpose does the gentlewoman, Representative White, rise?

Ms. WHITE. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I just wanted to thank the members for their affirmative vote, and I would also like to submit my remarks for the record. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady, and your remarks will be spread upon the record.

Ms. WHITE submitted the following remarks for the Legislative Journal:

In 1991 the city of Philadelphia was a financial disaster. Due to years of mismanagement, Philadelphia faced unpaid bills, mounting debt, an expanding operating deficit, and credit ratings plunging below investment grade. The quality of municipal services eroded as a result of hiring freezes and other draconian budget cuts that forced its tax base into the suburbs. With its ability to borrow crippled, the city turned to the State for help, but found few in the Capitol willing to hand good money to city officials who showed no ability to pass a responsible budget that would stop the reckless spending and reverse the hemorrhaging.

The compromise was the Pennsylvania Intergovernmental Cooperation Authority, which would help the city with short-term financing and long-term financial planning in order to restore investor confidence so the city could attain financial stability through proper financial planning and budgeting practices. The key was that PICA would sign off on the city's spending plans. The Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement provides PICA with broad access to the city's financial data so it can conduct independent audits to give Philadelphia fiscal integrity.

HB 1935 extends this oversight until January 2, 2047, or 1 year after all its bond liabilities are met. It also requires the city to submit its revised 5-year plan to PICA for as long as the authority retains existence.

This legislation is necessary as the city continues to face financial uncertainty with questionable budget projections and limited choices. Without PICA, the city could quickly return to the days of catastrophic deficits and crushing debt. And that would force the State to funnel more money into a city without a plan to stop the self-destruction. The Pennsylvania Intergovernmental Cooperation Authority makes this scenario far less likely and protects Pennsylvania taxpayers.

BILL ON THIRD CONSIDERATION

The House proceeded to third consideration of **HB 2586, PN 3100**, entitled:

An Act amending Title 38 (Holidays and Observances) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, in veteran recognition, providing for Tuskegee Airmen Commemoration Day.

Ms. BOBACK. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, HB 2586 amends Title 38, which is the "Holidays and Observances," by commemorating March 29 of each year as "Tuskegee Airmen Commemoration Day" in Pennsylvania.

The Tuskegee Airmen are a very storied African-American fighter pilot unit from World War II, which had several of their ranks visit this very House floor on several occasions in the past. These brave men not only fought air battles abroad, but also the battle of prejudice within the military and in our country itself.

Many of these brave pilots and airmen resided in the Commonwealth either before or after the war, thus I find it especially important for Pennsylvania to honor both their accomplishments and legacy with a day of recognition.

I would like to thank Representative Carol Hill-Evans and Representative Dan Williams for joining me as co-prime sponsors of this very important piece of legislation, and I ask the members for an affirmative vote on HB 2586.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Dan Williams, on final passage.

Mr. D. WILLIAMS. Mr. Speaker, thank you.

Let me take a moment to also say thank you to Chair Boback and to Chair Sainato.

I also want to express gratitude to Representative Steve Kinsey, who initially introduced the Tuskegee Airmen to the General Assembly.

The strength of a tree is not in its branches but in its roots, and sometimes we celebrate branches. These men were at the root of making the country respect Black courage, excellence, and intellect. And it is an honor to recognize both their bravery and their integrity. The Tuskegee Airmen are indisputable heroes of World War II and much more. They fought to achieve double victories against fascism overseas and racism at home, and it remains a powerful story of moral fiber in the midst of adversity and achievement against the odds. These were Black lives that saved hundreds of lives, and lives that mattered and made a difference, and it is right to celebrate and honor them for their courage, their commitment, and their model to this nation. And so I am honored to be a part of legislation that accomplishes that and ask you for an affirmative vote.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman and recognizes the gentleman, Representative Kinsey, on final passage.

Mr. KINSEY. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

And, Mr. Speaker, I want to also thank the chairwoman as well as the two co-prime sponsors of this very important piece of legislation.

Mr. Speaker, just 3 years ago we had the opportunity to have the Tuskegee Airmen here with us on this House floor in recognition of the great work that they have done. Just recently, Mr. Speaker, I had the honor to talk to a few of the original Tuskegee Airmen and I want to acknowledge them because they are all from Pennsylvania. That is Mr. Roscoe Draper, who is 103 years old. He was an instructor. Ms. Alma Bailey, 97, and she was a cadet nurse. Ms. Callie Gentry, who is also 97, and she was a stenographer. I also want to recognize Dr. Eugene Richardson, who joined us here on the House floor 3 years ago, 96 years old. He was a pilot. And, Mr. Speaker, also, a good

friend from the northwest section of Philadelphia, Mr. Nathan Thomas, who is also 96, who joined us here on the House floor. He was also an operator – he was in charge of operations back then, back in the 1940s.

So again, Mr. Speaker, I just want to applaud the gentlelady as well as the cosponsors of the bill, and also urge my colleagues for their affirmative vote.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
