Mr. Speaker, the reason I have this bill is that as you know,
today it is called the Independent Regulatory Review
Commission, and if the members would read the bill, they would
realize that there are two extra positions added to it. They are
partisan positions. They will be done by the House and the
Senate; the leaders will appoint.

Now, the reason I want to change it to the Partisan – let me
say that again – I want to change it to the Partisan Regulatory
Review Commission, and I want to explain to you why. You see,
when you take it away from "independent" and you add two
partisan positions, you have a partisan committee, and we see
how partisan committees work. If you come to a committee,
whether it is in the House or in the Senate, you see the majority
has more members, so it becomes a partisan group which is able
to pass an agenda which the majority wants.

Now, let me put this into light for you. To keep from people
getting upset or the public being upset, imagine, just think what
happened to Coke when they changed the recipe. Coke got into a
lot of trouble. They had to go back to Coke Classic. Mr. Speaker,
think about if you are buying a gallon of white paint and
somebody decides to add a little bit of black into it, you do not

have white paint anymore, Mr. Speaker. It is another shade. Or,
Mr. Speaker, if you are trying to do Grandma's recipe and you
add a little extra salt to it and it is a little bitter, Mr. Speaker, you
do not have Grandma's recipe anymore, you have an entirely
different thing.

So I think rather than the public being confused by the
independence in it, they should realize that now we are putting
together a committee that is much like the committees that we do
in the House, that it has a partisan overtone.

So for that, Mr. Speaker, I am going to ask my members in
this building to please help me rename this what it should be. And
again, I want to tell you, it should be the Partisan Regulatory
Review Commission because it is no longer independent. So let
us call it for what it is. Let us not confuse the public and make
sure that when people see this, they know exactly and they are
not in any way confused by what is happening within that
commission.

I ask the members for an affirmative vote for this amendment,
and I thank you so very much knowing that soon we will be able
to call it what it is, the partisan. Thank you.

The **SPEAKER**. The Chair thanks the gentleman and
recognizes the gentleman, Representative Grove, on the
amendment.

Mr. **GROVE**. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I would agree that the Independent Regulatory Review
Commission has actually become a partisan regulatory review
commission, thus the underlying amendment to return it to its
roots of independence – an independence of one, primarily, in
charge of the General Assembly, appointed by the General
Assembly because the power to regulate is actually a legislative
power, Mr. Speaker.

Now, some would say this is a hokey amendment; it is a funny
amendment. I do enjoy my colleague's great sense of humor. We
have many laughs before and after every committee hearing, but
we do have important work before us. I would ask my colleagues
to please reject this amendment, as it is a nonserious amendment,
and we can move on to the merits of the underlying bill.

So I reject the argument from York County that somehow
putting one party in charge is independent. No; the opposite is
true. Having an equal number of Representatives from each party,
as we have had for decades, that is nonpartisan; that is
independent.

An Act amending Title 27 (Environmental Resources) of the Pennsylvania Consolidated Statutes, providing for decommissioning of alternative energy facilities.

On the question,

Bill was agreed to.

(Bill analysis was read.)

The SPEAKER. This bill has been considered on three different days and agreed to and is now on final passage.

The question is, shall the bill pass finally?

On that question, the Chair recognizes the good lady, Representative Rapp.

Ms. RAPP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

This bill, HB 2104, is really a landowner, farmland, and prime farmland protection bill, Mr. Speaker. This legislation is necessary to assure that the continued growth of alternative energy within the Commonwealth does not incur problems for our landowners and communities in 20 to 30 years once the facilities lose their utility, the leases end, and the decommissioning must then commence.

HB 2104 amends Title 27 through the addition of a new chapter 43: "DECOMMISSIONING OF ALTERNATIVE ENERGY FACILITIES" to provide for the bonding and decommissioning of alternative energy facilities. The facilities impacted by this legislation are those utilizing solar energy or wind energy to produce or distribute alternative energy. A progressive bond is assessed every 5 years, over a total period of 25 years, by a certified engineer, and is to be used in the decommissioning of a solar or wind alternative energy facility following the end of a lease agreement, the bankruptcy of the grantee, or the failure of a grantee to comply with the decommissioning plan.

These certified engineers, Mr. Speaker, would be approved by DEP (Department of Environmental Protection.) Proof of the bond is held with the county recorder of deeds and reported to the DEP. There are certain things that decommissioning shall include, and it is important to note, Mr. Speaker, this legislation does not impact in any way a citizen or a business installing solar panels or turbines on their own property.

This bill is supported by the Solar Energy Industries Association and the Farm Bureau. And, Mr. Speaker, I would like to thank the staff of the ERE (Environmental Resources and Energy) Committee. We have been working on this piece of

legislation for several months. There has been a lot of research that has gone into this bill, so I would also like to take the opportunity, Mr. Speaker, to thank the staff for assisting in drafting this legislation.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the lady and also appreciates the kind gesture to our House staff. They certainly work very hard and I appreciate that you recognized their efforts.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Vitali, on final passage.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise in opposition to HB 2104. I will note that this bill is opposed by the Department of Environmental Protection and the administration, and I will quote. "...the administration remains opposed to HB 2104 largely due to the...inclusion of wind. There are significant differences between the wind and solar...and this bill does not differentiate them." And I think then they make a key point. They say, "It is odd" – and it surely is odd – "to focus so much attention on full cost bonding of solar and wind installations while bonding requirements remain far below actual costs for much more environmentally" damaging "impactful industries, like" wind and oil. And the DEP notes in their letter of opposition, in "...2022, DEP had to issue nearly 80 notices of violation to operators who attempted to abandon wells without plugging them."

You know, Mr. Speaker, I have not found and my staff has not found—

POINT OF ORDER

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will please suspend.

For what purpose does the lady rise?

Ms. RAPP. Mr. Speaker, this bill addresses wind and solar. It has nothing to do, Mr. Speaker, with fossil fuels. So the gentleman from Delaware is off topic—

The SPEAKER. The gentlelady's objection is noted and the Representative is correct.

I would simply encourage the gentleman to limit the remarks to the underlying issues contained in the bill, which in this case is the decommissioning of solar facilities. I know that we have some other bills regarding the plugging and decommissioning of wells, which we can debate that topic at that time.

The gentleman is in order, and you may proceed, sir.

Mr. VITALI. And I will note that I was simply reading the DEP's position paper on this bill. They mentioned this sort of oddity between requesting full bonding of solar and ignoring something much more impactful, a competing energy source like wind.

I will also mention that this is opposed by the Sierra Club, and they state in their letter of, actually, today, quote: "We're a lot more concerned about gas well abandonment than wind and solar..." The bill "...would create a significantly...stringent decommissioning/restoration/bonding regulatory regime than exists for... fossil" fuel "power plants or fracking activities."

You know, Mr. Speaker, if you had to view this bill simply in isolation, it would not be that bad. But the reality is, you cannot and should not view this bill in isolation because there are competing sources of fuel to produce electricity. They include renewables, but they also include oil and gas, they also include coal, they also include nuclear. So they are all interrelated. They are all competing to produce electricity.

So when the lady, the maker of the bill whose district contains an oil refinery and who is in the middle of the conventional oil patch, totally ignores the bonding the requirements of such an impactful activity like conventional gas drilling and focuses in on wind—

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will please suspend.

Mr. VITALI. —I find that rather curious.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will please suspend.

The gentleman is dangerously close to impugning the motives of the member, which as we all know is directly contradictory to the rules.

However, the gentleman has also been counseled to please stick to the underlying issue of the bill, which is the bonding requirements for the decommissioning of the solar facilities. I believe the gentleman's points might be better suited for other bills that have been before the House at different times and not this one.

Mr. VITALI. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will suspend.

I ask the gentleman to please confine his remarks to the bill. I appreciate the consideration of that request.

You are in order and may proceed, sir.

Mr. VITALI. Right. I just wanted to make it clear the interrelationship between competing sources of fuel for electricity and the requirements we are placing on them and the interrelationship between them.

You know, we have searched, and I could not find a single example of an abandoned or orphaned solar or wind farm. This is not the immediate problem, such as the problem of the continuing, continuing abandonment of oil and gas wells and the problems they cause.

Mr. Speaker, all energy – you know, I have heard so many times in this chamber that we should not be picking winners and losers, and that is just what this lady's bill does. Until we impose the same requirements on competing sources of energy, we should reject this bill, and I would ask for a "no" vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

Seeing no one else seeking recognition, we will go to the prime sponsor of the bill for the second time on final passage.

Ms. RAPP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Mr. Speaker, I believe on the Republican side of the aisle, I am the longest-serving member on the Environmental Resources and Energy Committee. I have been to many hearings regarding all the issues concerning the environment and energy, and I have heard hearings, been in hearings both under a minority chair and a majority chair, Mr. Speaker. I know the problems that we have had with the coal industry and how we are looking, Mr. Speaker, and trying to rectify all of those problems from coal mining and the problems from oil and gas, and we have taken steps with legislation as recently as yesterday, Mr. Speaker, trying to correct the problems of the past.

Mr. Speaker, what this bill does – which I have been thinking about this bill for several years, Mr. Speaker – this bill tries to get ahead of another problem of solar panels being strewn across private properties in the State of Pennsylvania, with solar and wind industries expecting, without this piece of legislation, the landowners to clean up from solar panels at the end of their life cycles, trying to figure out, Mr. Speaker, what we are going to do with those wind turbines, with the blades, which right now, Mr. Speaker, most States are shipping out to Wyoming, and they are being buried in some huge trench out in Wyoming because no State wants to put them in a landfill.

Mr. Speaker, this bill addresses an issue and hopefully, Mr. Speaker, planning for the future so that we will not be at the point, our children and our grandchildren will not be facing an issue like we are facing today with the leftover problems with coal, gas, and oil – which is still a great fossil fuel for energy, Mr. Speaker. But I do not want my children and grandchildren having to figure out, having to figure out where the dollar is going to come from, Mr. Speaker, to clean up solar panels that are strewn across our landscape, wind turbines, wind blades, trying to figure out, Mr. Speaker, how they are going to be decommissioned and how we are going to dispose of all of that material – and especially for solar panels, much of which is toxic.

So, Mr. Speaker, again, this legislation will ensure that ever-growing wind and solar alternative energy facilities will not cause undo harm to PA landowners and their property once the facility reaches the end of the lease agreement or the end of their useful lives.

This legislation is intended to protect private property owners from the very ability of a growing industry to preserve the nature of their property, to create a comprehensive, statewide standard for alternative energy industries; and to encourage better utilization of our resources in the future. And it is amazing to me that these so-called environmental groups are opposed to this bill when the solar industry itself supports this legislation, and I can say the same about the department, Mr. Speaker. But I ask for an affirmative vote so that our children and our grandchildren do not have to clean up a toxic mess.

And just one more note, Mr. Speaker. Several years ago we passed a piece of legislation that said that any of your electronics have to be disposed in a special way. It does not just go to a landfill. This is another bill, Mr. Speaker, trying to protect the environment.

So thank you, Mr. Speaker. I ask for an affirmative vote.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thank thanks the lady. And going to the leaders, the Chair recognizes the majority leader on final passage.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Very briefly, I think the chairwoman covered things pretty well. This is a pro-environmental bill. I think it is important to also note that she said about trying to be preemptive on this, trying to make sure we do not have this environmental waste laying around unattended to. But in addition, I just want the members to know that we actually received a letter, sent to the majority and minority leaders' offices, in support of HB 2104 by the SEIA, the Solar Energy Industries Association. I think those who produce these things are supportive of this. They see the importance of it, and therefore, I would ask for unanimous support.

To provide some background, as everybody is aware, a great deal has been going on in the pension systems, and then in January of 2022 the State Government Committee's Subcommittee on Public Pensions, Benefits, and Risk Management held a public hearing with SERS (State Employees' Retirement System) and PSERS (Public School Employees' Retirement System) to provide and discuss information on legislation, and this HB 2010 was a result of that and it was one of the bills discussed. The bill was passed unanimously out of committee.

But what the bill does is important. It is aimed at improving the qualifications and the professionalism of those who serve in a fiduciary relationship to the beneficiaries of certain Commonwealth funds, as well as State and local pension plans. This includes PSERS, SERS, PMRS (Pennsylvania Municipal Retirement System), and local pension plan board members, trustees, designees, and administrators, who are charged with investing and protecting the pension benefits of many thousands of schoolteachers, paid firefighters and police officers, and other State and local public employees.

HB 2010 requires the completion of fiduciary training by any "...trustee, board member or other appointed or elected official that stands in a fiduciary relationship to the members and beneficiaries of a State fund or a fund of a..." State and local pension system. It also provides board members and designees covered by the bill must complete at least 2 hours of fiduciary training within the first year of their date of appointment, and 1 hour annually thereafter. Those currently serving in the fiduciary capacity must complete 1 hour of annual fiduciary training going forward.

The bill also entitles board members, trustees, and other officials who are fund fiduciaries to an important protection, the payment of legal fees in matters involving their role as a fiduciary, unless their conduct is found, by a court, to constitute a criminal offense, willful misconduct, and self-dealing.

Mr. Speaker, if I could just ask, given the impact fiduciaries have on our systems, I want to thank the members of our staff – Susan Boyle, Jill Vecchio, as well as members of the Democratic Caucus – for their assistance in pulling together what I believe to be an extraordinarily important bill to help us understand the fiduciary responsibilities that all members serving in that position have. And I would ask for an affirmative vote, Mr. Speaker.

DISCHARGE RESOLUTION

The SPEAKER. For what the purpose does the gentleman, Representative Schweyer, seek recognition?

Mr. SCHWEYER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

I rise today to call up Discharge Resolution No. 5.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman, Representative Schweyer, has called up Discharge Resolution No. 5, which will be read by the clerk.

Mr. SCHWEYER called up **Discharge Resolution No. 5**, entitled:

In the House, June 15, 2022

Discharging Committee on Judiciary from further consideration of House Bill No. 717.

On the question,

Will the House adopt Discharge Resolution No. 5?

The SPEAKER. For the information of the members, the content of this debate should be constrained to the reasons for or against discharge and not the underlying merits of the individual bill.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman, Representative Schweyer, on the discharge resolution.

Mr. SCHWEYER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, and I will try my best.

Mr. Speaker, I rise today to call up Discharge Resolution 5, which will bring HB 717, as amended in committee, to the floor for a vote.

Now, for the benefit of the members who do not serve on the House Judiciary Committee, HB 717 originally was drafted to raise the legal age to own an assault rifle from 18 to 21. However, as you know, Mr. Speaker, today in the House Judiciary Committee, it was amended. It was not amended with a few tweaks to try to improve language or make a concession, but by scrapping the entire bill and replacing it with legislation that would eliminate the already required background checks for someone to have a concealed carry license. I believe we considered similar legislation earlier this year.

And a little background, Mr. Speaker. Of course in Texas, we know about a young man who turned 18 years old, and for his birthday, he purchased 2 AR-15s, thousands of rounds of ammunition, and celebrated his birthday by murdering 19 children and 2 teachers at Robb Elementary School. These purchases were made legally, which is the reason why I introduced HB 717 in the first place.

POINT OF ORDER

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Point of order.

The SPEAKER. The gentleman will please suspend.

For what purpose does the leader rise? You may state your point of order. I apologize, Mr. Leader.

Mr. BENNINGHOFF. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

It would appear to me that the point of order is that the gentleman is straying pretty far away from what his underlying comments were supposed to be about. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. The leader has raised a point of order regarding the underlying merits of the bill versus immediate consideration.

I would simply encourage the gentleman to bring the debate back to the necessity for the discharge. If he could focus there, that would be great. Thank you.

Mr. SCHWEYER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

Kind of proves my point as to why I would like to bring up HB 717 today.

Despite the fact that the bill was amended in committee, as was mentioned before, I still want to vote on HB 717, and I would like another vote on it by the full body, which is why I am executing or calling up Discharge Resolution 5.

And for the benefit of all members – not to recap any further what happened in committee – I have drafted and will file an amendment to restore the original intent of this bill, raising the legal age to possess a military-style assault weapon, with the hopes that we can have a debate on the floor. We could have a conversation about the original intent of the bill and not, frankly, hide behind a parliamentary movement to try to silence our opportunity, our voices, and our chance to have a conversation about who should legally own an assault rifle in the first place.

Mr. Speaker, our constituents deserve to see how their State Representatives vote on this issue. They deserve to find out if their State Reps stand with 75 percent of Pennsylvanians who support this idea. They deserve to know if their State Representatives stand with the families who were so tragically torn apart, not only in places like Texas and Buffalo, but across Pennsylvania.

The SPEAKER. The gentlemen will please suspend.

Mr. SCHWEYER. Really?

The SPEAKER. The gentleman is once again venturing into the merits of the underlying bill, which would be more appropriate if and when the discharge resolution was successful.

I believe the gentleman has focused on the immediacy of the need for the discharge resolution and would encourage you to stay on focused on that point alone, not the actual fundamentals of the bill.

I would also caution the gentleman regarding the comments about any actions taken in committee, just not to get too close to questioning the motives of other members as well.

Mr. SCHWEYER. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. The Chair thanks the gentleman.

You are in order and may proceed, sir.

Mr. SCHWEYER. Once again, Mr. Speaker, this is exactly the reason why we need to call up this bill, why we need to support, a "yes" on the discharge resolution so that perhaps we could actually have an honest and open conversation about the merits of this and similar legislation.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER. This Chair thanks the gentleman for concluding your remarks.

For what purpose does Leader McClinton rise? The gentlelady waives off. The Chair thanks the lady.

We have a process in where we try our very best to have bills amended in their entirety so what needs is done before they come out of committee, and I would ask the members to honor that process and vote "no" to Discharge Resolution 5. Thank you.

The SPEAKER. That is correct.

Mr. STEPHENS. And just the constitutional carry language?

The SPEAKER. That is correct.

Mr. STEPHENS. Does this body have the ability to rule on the constitutionality as it relates to a change from the original purpose of the bill in committee?

The SPEAKER. The issue that is currently before the House is the discharge resolution. I believe that the gentleman's question would be more appropriate if the bill were actually before the body.

The discharge resolution is actually the step before that, or a routine calendaring of the bill, as opposed to, you know, when the bill itself is before the body, that question can certainly be raised by any member of the body. That is a question that is solely the purview of the body and that can be utilized at that time, but it would not be appropriate as we are just currently debating Discharge Resolution No. 5.
