An Act amending the act of July 19, 1979 (P.L.130, No.48), known as the Health Care Facilities Act, in licensing of health care facilities, providing for ambulatory surgical facility permitted surgical procedures; and abrogating regulations.

Will the House agree to the bill on second consideration?

Ms. **RAPP** offered the following amendment No. **A05170**:

Amend Bill, page 3, lines 5 through 7, by striking out all of lines 5 and 6 and "(3)" in line 7 and inserting

(2)

Amend Bill, page 3, lines 9 through 30; page 4, lines 1 through 22; by striking out all of said lines on said pages and inserting

(b) Review period.

(1) Upon receipt of a request for an exception or waiver under subsection (a), the department shall, within 60 calendar days, provide a written response to the ambulatory surgical facility that approves or denies the request or shall provide notice that the department is unable to issue a determination because a substantive element is missing that is necessary for the department to approve or deny the request.

(2) If the department denies the request, the department shall include the basis for the denial, including statutory or regulatory citations that form the basis of the denial.

(3) If the department determines that it is unable to issue a determination, the department shall specify the substantive element that is needed for the facility to resubmit its request. Upon receipt of the facility's resubmitted application, the department shall approve or deny the resubmitted application within 60 calendar days of receipt of the resubmitted application. The department shall deny an incomplete resubmitted application.

(4) If the department does not approve, deny or provide notice that the department is unable to issue a determination on an initial application or does not approve or deny a resubmitted application within 60 calendar days, the request shall be deemed approved and the ambulatory surgical facility may proceed as if the request has been approved by the department.

(c) Permitted surgical procedures.—An ambulatory surgical facility may perform surgical procedures permitted under Federal or State law or regulation and surgical procedures specified on the ASC-CPL on the effective date of this section that do not otherwise conflict with State regulations relating to license classification, construction and design standards, personnel, equipment, governance and management and notification requirements. The department may not require an ambulatory surgical facility to request an exception or waiver or receive an approval of an exception or waiver to 28 Pa. Code § 551.21(d) (relating to criteria for ambulatory surgery) from the department for surgical procedures specified in ASC-CPL.

Amend Bill, page 4, by inserting between lines 28 and 29 "Substantive element." Material information necessary for the department to approve or deny a request for an exception or waiver.

Amend Bill, page 4, lines 29 and 30, by striking out "§§ 51.22 AND 551.21(D)(1), (2) AND (3)" and inserting § 51.22

Amend Bill, page 4, line 30; page 5, lines 1 through 7; by striking out "28" in line 30 on page 4 and all of lines 1 through 7 on page 5 and inserting

28 Pa. Code § 551.21 are abrogated insofar as they are inconsistent with the addition of section 822 of the act.

On the question,
Will the House agree to the amendment?

The SPEAKER. On that question, the Chair recognizes the gentlewoman, Representative Rapp.

Ms. RAPP. Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for the opportunity to speak on the amendment.

My amendment is a result of several months of negotiations among Republican and Democratic members of the House, the Senate, stakeholder groups, the administration, and the Department of Health. My amendment provides that the Department of Health will have 60 days in which to review a request for a waiver. If the department needs additional information, it will be required to inform the ambulatory surgical facility of what information is missing.

The department will have an additional 60-day timeframe in which to render a decision once the waiver request is resubmitted with the requested information. If the department fails to render a decision within 60 days, the request will be deemed approved.

The amendment further specifies that ambulatory surgical facilities may perform surgical procedures permitted under Federal or State law or regulation, and surgical procedures specified on the 2022 ASC-CMS (ambulatory surgical centers-Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services)-approved list. Ambulatory surgical facilities will still be required to meet standards under State law and regulation, such as having the proper licensure classification to perform a procedure, having proper equipment and sufficient personnel, and using a facility that meets construction and design standards for an ASF.

During the height of the COVID-19 pandemic, hospitals had to limit procedures. ASFs, which could have performed many of these procedures, were unable to do so because of an outdated ASF law and regulations. With this bill and the accompanying amendment, ASFs will be able to perform more procedures, thus providing patients and practitioners with more choice in where to

have procedures performed. At the same time, the amendment clarifies that ASFs must still meet certain standards to perform these additional procedures, thus ensuring that procedures will be performed in ASFs that are equipped to do so.

I want to thank my colleague from Allegheny County for continuing to discuss this bill and for coming to an agreement on this amendment. I would also note for the record that the prime sponsor of the bill, Senator Judy Ward, agrees with this amendment, as well as relevant stakeholder groups who brought this issue to the General Assembly for consideration.

I ask my colleagues for an affirmative vote on this amendment.
