## SENATE

MONDAY, June 14, 1976.

The Senate met at 1:00 p.m., Eastern Daylight Saving Time.

The PRESIDENT pro tempore (Martin L. Murray) in the Chair.

## PRAYER

The Chaplain, The Reverend RICHARD WOLF, Pastor of St. James Lutheran Church, Coopersburg, offered the following prayer:

The PRESIDENT pro tempore. At this time we have present with us guests of the gentleman from Lebanon, Senator Manbeck. They are the Reverend Charles Marshall and Mrs. Marshall from the Mother Presbyterian Church, Donegal, Ireland, who are guests of the Reverend Robert Murphy, Pastor of the Donegal Presbyterian

Church, R. D. 1, Mt. Joy, Pennsylvania. We also have as our guests Mr. George Gantos and Mrs. Gantos. If these guests would kindly rise, the Senate will give them their usual warm welcome.

(Applause.)

The PRESIDENT pro tempore. At this time I would like to call on the Reverend Charles Marshall for a few words.

Reverend MARSHALL. Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen:

It is a very great honor indeed for me to address this Senate. I come from the County of Donegal, Ireland, a county of mountain, lake and river and kindly people, too, to represent, first of all, my church, which is the Donegal Presbyterian Church in Donegal County at the site of Donegal County at the Bicentennial Celebrations with our sister church and daughter church, Donegal Springs Presbyterian Church in Pennsylvania.

We have received, both my wife and myself, a right royal welcome, and we are enjoying every moment of our stay here. It is not only, first of all, of course, because of the great friendship shown to us by the folk of Donegal Springs and by their minister, the Reverend Robert Murphy, and the fraternal associations which have grown up between the two churches here in Pennsylvania and my church in Ireland, but it is also because I am very conscious and indeed, very proud, of the part that men from the North of Ireland played in the establishment of the United States and particularly the part that they had in the drawing up and the signing of the Declaration of Independence. I think a good many of the names appended to that great document are men who came from the North of Ireland.

So it is a very, very great honor indeed for me to address you today.

I also bring greetings, not only from my own folk, my own church, but from all the people of all creeds and classes south of the gap in Donegal, as we say, from Donegal right down to Ballyshannon to the banks of the Erne. They have all expressed their good wishes to us as we left and they have asked to extend their good wishes to the folks here.

I also bring greetings from the Parliament of the Republic of Ireland, from the Dail, because one of my committee members in Ballyshannon, Mr. James White, is a member of the Dail. He was elected a couple of years ago and actually he is a member of the present government, in our Mr. Cosgrove's government, and he particularly asked me to extend his good wishes and the good wishes of the government of the Republic to you here.

So, it is with very, very great pleasure indeed, that I appear before you; and to the end of my days, I will remember this occasion, this great privilege that was given

to me to address this Senate. In this Bicentennial year may I, on my own behalf and on behalf of all whom I represent, wish you God's blessing on all your work here in this State in the years that are to come and I wish, too, for your great country, God's blessing, guidance and direction that, in the years that lie ahead, as in the years that are past, you may be a blessing to the whole world and that you may be one of the greatest holders of democracy amongst the nations. Thank you very much indeed.

(Applause.)

The PRESIDENT pro tempore. Thank you very much Reverend Marshall. We appreciate your kind remarks. You come from a very beautiful country and I want you to know you are always welcome in the State of Pennsylvania.

## REMARKS ON 200TH ANNIVERSARY OF PENNSYLVANIA GENERAL ASSEMBLY'S VOTE IN FAVOR OF INDEPENDENCE

Senator FRAME. Mr. President, I think it might be appropriate for me to interrupt the usual proceedings of this Senate today to call to the attention of the Members of the General Assembly the event of two centuries ago.

All of us look forward to the celebration next month of our Nation's Declaration of Independence. I think it would behoove us to note that today, June 14, 1976, is the two-hundredth anniversary of the Pennsylvania General Assembly's vote in favor of independence, without which action the Declaration of Independence could hardly have become a reality.

Before June 14, 1776, Pennsylvania's delegation to the Continental Congress was laboring under a restriction passed by the Pennsylvania General Assembly the previous November, which read, in part:

"Yet we strictly enjoin you, that you, in behalf of this Colony, dissent from and utterly reject any proposition should such be made that may cause or lead to a separation from our Mother Country or a change of the form of this government."

Two hundred years ago our predecessors in the General Assembly of Pennsylvania revoked that mandate, that prohibition, and authorized its delegates to vote for independence. I would, with the kind indulgence of this Senate, therefore like to read and submit for the record the instructions to the Pennsylvania delegates to the Continental Congress passed by the General Assembly two hundred years ago today, on June 14, 1776.

The instructions to the delegates of this Province to Congress, being transcribed according to order, were signed by the Speaker. The words were as follows:

### GENTLEMEN:

*WHEN, by our Instructions of last November, we strictly enjoined you, in Behalf of this Colony, to dissent from and utterly reject any Proposi-*

tions, should such be made, that might cause or lead to a Separation from Great-Britain, or a Change of the Form of this Government, our Restrictions did not arise from any Diffidence of your Ability, Prudence or Integrity, but from an earnest Desire to serve the good People of Pennsylvania with Fidelity, in Times so full of alarming Dangers and perplexing Difficulties.

The Situation of public Affairs is since so greatly altered, that we now think ourselves justifiable in removing the Restrictions laid upon you by those Instructions.

The Contempt with which the last Petition of the Honourable Congress has been treated:—The late Act of Parliament, declaring the just Resistance of the Colonists, against Violences actually offered, to be Rebellion, excluding them from the Protection of the Crown, and even compelling some of them to bear Arms against their Country-men:—The Treaties of the King of Great-Britain, with other Princes, for engaging foreign Mercenaries to aid the Forces of that Kingdom, in their hostile Enterprizes, against America; and his Answer to the Petition of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, manifests such a determined and implacable Resolution to effect the utter Destruction of these Colonies, that all Hopes of a Reconciliation on reasonable Terms, are extinguished. Nevertheless, it is our ardent Desire, that a civil War, with all its attending Miseries, could be ended by a secure and honourable Peace.

We therefore hereby authorize you to concur with the other Delegates in Congress, in forming such further Compacts between the United Colonies, concluding such Treaties with foreign Kingdoms and States, and in adopting such other Measures as, upon a View of all Circumstances, shall be judged necessary for promoting the Liberty, Safety and Interests of America: reserving to the People of this Colony the sole and exclusive Right of regulating the internal Government and Police of the same.

The Happiness of these Colonies has, during the whole Course of this fatal Controversy, been our first Wish. Their Reconciliation with Great-Britain our next. Ardently have we prayed for the Accomplishment of both. But, if we must renounce the one or the other, we humbly trust in the Mercies of the Supreme Governor of the Universe, that we shall not stand condemned before his Throne, if our Choice is determined by that over-ruling Law of Self-preservation, which his divine Wisdom has thought fit to implant in the Hearts of his Creatures.

RESOLVED, That the committee may hold hearings, take testimony, and make its investigations at such places as it deems necessary. It may issue subpoenas under the hand and seal of its chairman commanding any person to appear before it and to answer questions touching matters properly being inquired into by the committee and to produce such books, papers, records and documents as the committee deems necessary. Such subpoenas may be served upon any person and shall have the force and effect of subpoenas issued out of the courts of this Commonwealth. Any person who willfully neglects or refuses to testify before the committee or to produce any books, papers, records or documents, shall be subject to the penalties provided by the laws of the Commonwealth in such case. Each member of the committee shall have power to administer oaths and affirmations to witnesses appearing before the committee; and be it further

RESOLVED, That this committee report its findings and recommendations to the General Assembly as soon as possible.
