I ask the Members of the Senate to join with me in a moment of silence to honor the life and the sacrifice of a true American hero, First Lieutenant Travis Manion, and all those who have lost their lives in defense of our liberties.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Senator Rafferty.

Senator RAFFERTY. Mr. President, I stand today with my friend and colleague from northeast Philadelphia, Senator Stack, to once again have the privilege of introducing a resolution before the Senate of Pennsylvania recognizing the week of May 2 through May 18, as "National Police Week," and May 6, 2013, as "Police Officers Memorial Day." Once again, I have the distinction of representing the Senate of Pennsylvania, along with Senator Stack, at the memorial service next Monday held here at the Capitol.

Since the beginning of law enforcement within this Commonwealth, approximately 774 officers have made the ultimate sacrifice while in the line of duty, Mr. President, including the following 5 law enforcement officers who died in 2012: Trooper First Class Blake T. Coble, Pennsylvania State Police; Police Officer Bradley M. Fox, Plymouth Township Police Department; Patrolman Avery Freeman, Chester Police Department; Police Officer Brian Lorenzo, Philadelphia Police Department; and Police Officer Moses Walker, Jr., Philadelphia Police Department.

Mr. President, I long for the day when we attend the Police Memorial and add no new names. These are ordinary individuals performing an extraordinary function day in and day out, laying their lives on the line for the protection of the citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and the property of the citizens of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. We need not recognize them just one day a year, but every day. Take the opportunity to say thank you to the police officers, the men and women who put on the uniform, the badge, and the gun, and who lay their lives on the line for us.

Last week, we saw on the news what happened in Boston. As everyone ran away from the explosion, the police officers and the firefighters were running toward the explosion. We saw in west Texas, as the explosion occurred and people were fleeing for their lives, the fire department and the police officers were heading toward the explosion, risking their own lives to save the lives of individuals. There is no greater love than to lay down one's life for one's friends. I read the names of five friends of everyone in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Mr. President, Monday will be a solemn day. I ask the Senate to please remember the fallen police officers.

Before we vote on passage of this resolution, I defer to my friend and colleague from northeast Pennsylvania, Senator Stack.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Senator Stack.

Senator STACK. Mr. President, I am humbled to stand in favor of this resolution along with my colleague and friend, Senator Rafferty. We can never do enough for our police. We have the best police in the world in Pennsylvania. Their families support them knowing that it is one of the only jobs that when their loved one goes out that door, there is a chance they may not come home. We are reminded on a daily basis just how heroic and brave they are, and how they put it on the line for us every day.

So I am honored to stand with Senator Rafferty to introduce this resolution designating the week of May 12 as National Police Week and Police Officers Memorial Day. As I said, these folks risk their lives daily and we can never do enough to stand up for them. Last year in the United States, 160 peace officers paid the ultimate sacrifice while protecting and serving. As Senator Rafferty pointed out, once again, in Pennsylvania five officers died in the line of duty last year. Last July, Philadelphia Police Officer Brian Lorenzo, one of my constituents, a 48-year-old man who was headed home after his shift at around 3:15 a.m., when a car traveling the wrong way slammed into the officer's motorcycle. Officer Lorenzo was killed immediately in a head-on crash on I-95 at the Cottman Avenue interchange. The driver, predictably, was charged with DUI, and is now on trial for murder. Officer Lorenzo, a 23-year veteran of the force, lost his life. His family lost a husband, a father, and a brother.

When our heroes make the ultimate sacrifice, we stop to honor those police officers as well as those officers who put their lives on the line every day. So I know I really do not even have to worry about how this resolution is going to go, but I still ask my colleagues to honor the service of our men and women who protect the Commonwealth each and every day by passing this resolution. Once again, I give thanks to my colleague, Senator Rafferty, and all of my colleagues on both sides of the aisle for their support of this issue.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Senator Dinniman.

Senator DINNIMAN. Mr. President, 70 years ago, on the eve of Passover in April 1943, the Jews in the Warsaw ghetto rose up

against the Nazis. We commemorate this occasion as an example and symbol of the strength of all people against tyranny and evil in the world. In 1939, the Nazis invaded Poland. By 1940, they had confined almost a half-million Jews into a 3.5-square-mile area known as the Warsaw Ghetto. Starting in 1942, they took hundreds of thousands of the Jews to the extermination camps, so that by 1943, there were only 60,000 Jews left in the Warsaw Ghetto. The remaining Jews soon realized that it was their fate too to go to the concentration camps. On the first night of Passover in April 1943, the Nazi tanks came into the ghetto, along with artillery planes and flamethrowers. The Jews held out heroically for 28 days against the Nazis and the fascists in order to maintain their freedom.

Mr. President, this 70th anniversary represents and is symbolic of the strength of all people against tyranny and evil. Pennsylvania was founded on tolerance and acceptance of law. We here in Pennsylvania proclaimed our own freedom by standing up to the King. We here in Pennsylvania stood up to slavery in the Civil War. And our soldiers from Pennsylvania fought and ultimately defeated the Nazis and the fascists, and today we continue in our struggle against terrorists. We understand in this Commonwealth the fight of all people against tyranny, against evil. I present this resolution so that we can proclaim here in this Commonwealth that we follow William Penn's willingness and his insistence that we respect the dignity of each and every human being.

I ask the Senate to approve this 70th year commemoration as an example of people standing up for themselves and standing for freedom so that it might be a symbol in all the years to come for any peoples who stand up for freedom. They would know that we here in the Senate of Pennsylvania proclaim our support. We stand as brothers and sisters with all who stand up to evil.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Dauphin, Senator Teplitz.

Senator TEPLITZ. Mr. President, every April 28, Workers Memorial Day is celebrated by our friends in organized labor. The day honors workers killed or injured while at work, and recognizes that the struggle continues for safer and healthier workplaces. I had the honor of spending this morning with the Harrisburg Region Central Labor Council, with its representatives of the 19,000 workers that it represents, and remembering the workers who have been killed or injured at work over the last year.

Mr. President, 2 million workers die from work-related accidents and diseases each year. That is 14 a day from preventable incidents. Clearly, as a State and as a country, we can do better. We have to take this opportunity every year to remember the fallen and call attention to the need for safety on the job. Federal regulations, such as OSHA, are not enough. We have to make sure to have State support for this important issue as well. This touched me this morning when I laid the wreath in the Susquehanna River honoring those who have passed. I bring this up, Mr. President, to you and my colleagues because over the next few months, we are going to be making some very tough decisions for our State budget. I hope that we can make sure that, among the tough decisions that we make, we do not sacrifice the health and safety of our workers or of any Pennsylvania families.
