Senator FERLO. Mr. President, I believe I support the intent of the bill, I think it is certainly well-intended. I just have a concern, I do not understand why this bill--we are on Senate Bill No. 1290, I believe, right? I want to be clear. I am a little bit confused as to why whatever appropriate law enforcement agency cannot appropriately communicate an approach, the appropriate court of jurisdiction, which I believe in most local cases would likely be the local police, local sheriff's department approach, or a Court of Common Pleas judge to get the appropriate order. I believe, if I understand this bill, it would circumvent that. I have no problem, if someone wants to stand and correct me, but basically, that would be circumvented and they would immediately go to Verizon, AT&T, and to the company. I just want to note my objection to that. If that is to be the case, my objection, and if that is the case then I would be respectfully voting "no" on the legislation. Thank you.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair takes note the presence of the prime sponsor on the floor. Would the gentleman like the prime sponsor to stand for interrogation?

Senator FERLO. Mr. President, I was just expressing my concern, I was not necessarily asking for an interrogation. If anyone wants to speak on the bill, they are more than welcome to do that.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Senator Vulakovich.

Senator VULAKOVICH. Mr. President, the reason for this bill is that normally what police officers have to do is obtain a subpoena. A subpoena can take a couple of days. The idea behind this is, if someone is missing, whether abduction, kidnapping, or however you want to refer to it, it is immediate attention. Most times, with young children, it is within 3 hours to find out that location of that child. For older adults, sometimes 24 to 48 hours, they are the crucial times. What this does is pretty much take away from someone sitting at one of the wireless phone corporations, and sitting there and deciding whether they are going to honor the subpoena and what time elements are involved. Even in exigent circumstances, they can do a certain thing, they can even turn that down. This puts the power and the authority on the police department to make that request that this information be given to them in a very adequate, effective time period so that they can find out the location of those people missing. The power goes in with the police departments. Otherwise, it could drag on for several days.
