Senator STEFANO. Mr. President, today I rise and ask the Senate for support of Senate Bill No. 1166. This bill, as amended, would allow the Pennsylvania Game Commission to set their own license fees and continue to allow the legislature to fulfill a very necessary oversight role, as such is important in the organization of the Commonwealth. This important legislation will help address, in a responsible way, the severe financial strain the Game Commission currently finds itself in. It has been 17 years since the legislature has granted the Game Commission a license increase. A lot has changed since 1999. Back then the price of gasoline, which drives most of our consumer price increases in the cost of doing business, was \$1.30 and a stamp was 33 cents.

The Game Commission has been able to survive this long gap for four basic reasons. Now, coming from the private sector, I cannot imagine running a business like this. The Game Commission is a user fee-supported entity, yet, they cannot set their own fees. Instead, they must come to the legislature, which works so hard to achieve anything, let alone an increase in fees. The long gap in license increases means they have to go a long span of time in order to catch up from their last increase, and then prepare for another long gap after that. This depresses license sales further. In the private sector, we prefer to have smaller, incremental increases rather than large ones that have a very detrimental effect.

So, at this point, I am very grateful to the many sportsmen's groups that have come out in support of this legislation. They include the Pennsylvania Federation of Sportsmen's Clubs, the United Bowhunters of Pennsylvania, the Pennsylvania chapter of National Wild Turkey Federation, the Keystone Elk Country Alliance, Pheasants Forever, the Pennsylvania State Fox & Coyote Hunters Association, and other national sportsmen and conservancy groups. I also thank Senator Scavello, the chairman of the Committee on Game and Fisheries, for moving this bill, and the committee for their unanimous support of this bill. I also thank Senator Eichelberger and his staff for all of their work on similar legislation for the Fish and Boat Commission.

Mr. President, today the State Senate can make a giant leap forward in managing our wildlife and promoting the historic tradition of hunting in our Commonwealth. I ask my colleagues for support of Senate Bill No. 1166. Thank you.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Blair, Senator Eichelberger.

Senator EICHELBERGER. Mr. President, I want to take a moment before we vote on the bill to thank a number of Members who have done a lot of work to get this bill to the floor. Senator Wozniak, who was the co-prime sponsor of this bill, we both recognized that this was an issue that should have been addressed a long time ago when we were at a meeting in Bedford

County together. Senator Brewster, who had a bill on behalf of the Fish and Boat Commission, who was willing to pull his bill, sign on to this bill, and work with us to accomplish something that, I think, was a little better than what the initial thoughts were about simply raising fees. And thank you to Senator Scavello, who is the committee chairman who worked with us throughout this whole process; and Senator Stefano, who worked on a very, very similar bill for the Game Commission.

The Fish and Boat Commission has done a wonderful job in Pennsylvania for a very long period of time. In fact, this year they are rated nationally as the most efficient game or fish agency in the country. They have been a stalwart in protecting our waterways and our fish species and other things that they control. They do it, I think, as competitively as they can to keep as many anglers at the streams and on our lakes as we could afford here in Pennsylvania. We attract people from around the country and around the world to fish in Pennsylvania, we are very proud of that, and I applaud them for the work that they have done and will continue to do.

These bills--we just did one for the Game Commission, and this one for the Fish and Boat Commission--will give these agencies more flexibility and a better way to address their cost needs so that they can do their duties in a more businesslike fashion. There are some protections in there for the taxpayers so that there cannot be runaway costs with fees because there are controls put in, in many different ways, including things through the legislature. So, I think that it is a good final product. I ask my colleagues to support it today, and I hope we get it to the House and that the House will support it as well.

Thank you, Mr. President.

Senator WOZNIAK. Mr. President, I thank Senator Eichelberger for being the prime sponsor. He articulated the issue very well. We have language in there that was added as a fail-safe mechanism, but I think most of us have heard this, if we have heard it once, we have heard it a thousand times, why does government not operate like a business? So, I think what we have done in the past two bills is to give what really are autonomous agencies within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania that autonomy to make their own decisions on how to govern themselves, how to finance themselves, and how to make sporting and fishing even better here in Pennsylvania. I ask everyone for an affirmative vote. Thank you.

And the question recurring,

As rebels fled the area, the rebellion soon disbanded. This event marks the only time in American history that a sitting President took command of Federal troops.

In an effort to properly recognize the Whiskey Rebellion, the city of Washington, Pennsylvania, annually hosts a week-long festival the second week of July. The events are to honor the period of America's early days through historic re-enactments, period exhibitions, family fun, frontier art, and more, shining a national spotlight on the city, county, and region.

Senator AUMENT. Mr. President, I am pleased to offer the following resolution with my colleague, Senator Vulakovich, which will designate June 27, 2016, as "Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Day" in Pennsylvania, and June 2016 as "Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Month" in Pennsylvania. The brave men and women of the United States Armed Forces who proudly serve the United States and risk their lives to protect our freedom deserve the investment of every possible resource to insure their lasting physical, mental, and emotional well-being. The challenges of serving in combat for many of our veterans does not stop when they return home. A new challenge begins for many of our servicemen and women, one they must fight every day and can cause them to struggle, often in silence.

For those who are not familiar with it, post-traumatic stress injury occurs after a person has experienced a trauma, and can result from not only the stress of combat, but also rape, sexual assault, battery, torture, confinement, child abuse, car accidents, train wrecks, plane crashes, bombings, or natural disaster. Post-traumatic stress is a very common injury to the brain that is treatable and repairable. The diagnosis, now known as post-traumatic stress disorder, or PTSD, was first defined to commonly and more accurately understand and treat veterans who had endured severe traumatic combat stress. Post-traumatic stress has historically been viewed as a mental illness caused by some pre-existing flaw in the individual's brain or character, and the term "post-traumatic stress disorder" carries a stigma that perpetuates this misconception. Additionally, referring to post-traumatic stress injury as a disorder perpetuates the stigma of and a bias against mental illness that it discourages those who are suffering from post-traumatic stress from seeking proper and timely medical treatment. Making the condition less stigmatizing and promoting more understanding can favorably influence those affected and encourage them to seek help without fear of retribution or shame. We know that proper and timely treatment can decrease suicide rates, and additional education awareness can help to encourage most people suffering with post-traumatic stress injury to seek help.

Please join us to raise awareness for post-traumatic stress injury by designating June 27, 2016, as Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Day in Pennsylvania, and June 2016 as Post-Traumatic Stress Injury Awareness Month in Pennsylvania.
