The PRESIDENT. Absolutely. I think many will appreciate the opportunity to have you do that, and we will be open for that, Senator.

Senator AUMENT. Mr. President, I do thank the gentleman from Chester County for giving me the opportunity to welcome Reverend Jesse Johnson here to the Senate as he served as guest Chaplain today. Jesse and I went to high school together. He also participated in my wedding ceremony in 2008 providing a message at that time. It is a real thrill to have him here. He is a 1995 graduate of Solanco High School in Quarryville, Pennsylvania; a 1999 graduate of Grove City College; and then went on to Bethany Theological Seminary in Richmond, Indiana, where he graduated in 2003. For the past 14 years, he has been senior pastor at Media Mennonite Church in Oxford, as has been mentioned, and he is joined today by his lovely wife of 15 years, Melanie. Please join me in welcoming our guest Chaplain to the Senate.

The PRESIDENT. Pastor JOHNSON. We need some time.

**PERMISSION TO ADDRESS**

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Erie, Senator Laughlin.

Senator LAUGHLIN. Mr. President, I rise today to ask my colleagues to join me in honoring former Senator William G. Sesler, who passed away May 22 at the age of 89. Senator Sesler served three terms in the Pennsylvania State Senate representing the 49th Senatorial District from 1961 through 1972. He served as assistant Majority Leader in this Chamber before leaving politics to pursue his law and real estate career back home in Erie.

As a Member of the Senate, he played a key role in the enactment of legislation that created the Pennsylvania Public Television Network. So, in a way, all of the generations who grew up enjoying and learning from Fred Rogers and the colorful characters on Sesame Street can thank Senator Sesler for that experience. He also worked to reform Pennsylvania's mental health laws, streamlined the Commonwealth's school districts, and allowed for the creation of small wineries, which are now such a vital part of our Lake Erie region and many other areas throughout this State. Senator Sesler was a decorated war veteran. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his heroic actions during the Korean War and for his service as first lieutenant with the United States Air Force Special Forces Unit.

In addition to his government and military service, Senator Sesler was a true civic leader as well, one who displayed a deep and passionate concern for the welfare of all the members of the Erie community. He co-founded the Martin Luther King Center, the JFK Center, and was also a board member of the Booker T. Washington Center for over 40 years. Senator Sesler helped organize the Community Health Net, which provides vital medical services to many Erie families.

Senator Sesler was an avid reader and enjoyed gardening, cooking, wine tasting, sailing, hunting, and fishing. He and his wife, Cecily, definitely enjoyed traveling, having visited 6 continents and 66 countries in their 59 years of marriage. In addition to his wife, Senator Sesler is survived by sons, Greg and Doug, and his daughter, Liz Sesler-Beckman, and eight grandchildren.

Mr. President, I ask my colleagues to join me in honoring the life and legacy of Senator William G. Sesler. Thank you.

The PRESIDENT. At Senator Laughlin's request, we will now observe a moment of silence to remember our colleague, Senator Sesler.

The PRESIDENT. Thank you, Senator Laughlin. I got a chance to meet Senator Sesler when I was running in the primary statewide, and every time I came anywhere near Erie, he phoned

me to tell me how we should be running the campaign. So, I followed most of his instructions. He really knew Erie and he knew a lot of people, but mostly, what a great guy, very down to earth, and cared about Pennsylvania more than anything. Thank you, Senator.

Senator LAUGHLIN. Mr. President, he was a great guy.

### PERMISSION TO ADDRESS

The PRESIDENT. Also to remember a passing colleague, the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Allegheny, Senator Costa.

Senator COSTA. Mr. President, I also rise to say a few words about a former Member of the Senate who passed away last week.

Senator Frank Pecora, who represented the 44th Senatorial District for 16 years, was an individual and a Member who employed his charisma to represent his district very, very well during his time here in the Senate. Frank Pecora was a person with deep ties and friends on both sides of the aisle in the Senate. Frank Pecora was smart and he was effective in serving the eastern suburban communities outside the city of Pittsburgh. Mr. President, he mentored a number of people who have continued to work in government and in this Commonwealth. His former aide, Congressman Mike Doyle, once described Senator Pecora as having a Ph.D. in street smarts and in people. He knew governors, frequented with Presidents and other dignitaries, but, Mr. President, he was most comfortable moving among the working men and women of his district. Senator Pecora made it a point to know people, not only their names and their faces, but also their interests, and he was always asking about family, because he legitimately cared about the individuals he spoke with. Some called him a throwback to a different era in politics. In a lot of ways he was that. Mr. President, he recognized and realized that all politics are local, and it was in local politics that he thrived. He touched people in many ways and they reciprocated, simply because he was genuine.

Family was very important to Senator Pecora. He was married to his beautiful wife, Barbara, for 60 years, and they had two beautiful children, Frankie and Barbara. Mr. President, Senator Pecora believed it was important to treat each person in a special way. He did not hesitate to reach across party lines, and although there were many more Democrats than Republicans in his district, he gained support from citizens in both parties because he took the time to try and understand the issues that were important to them, and he did so at the grassroots level. Organized labor, Mr. President, always provided a big constituency for Senator Pecora and supported him in his efforts and the work that he did for the people in his communities. Over the years, Senator Pecora sponsored more than 180 bills, and 16 of those became laws. He served here in this body, and what he accomplished for back home still reverberates in those communities, the things that he did. He was heavily involved in the Committee on Local Government and worked hard on education matters as well as transportation issues in the Senate. He played a leading role in pushing legislation to eliminate the inheritance tax for spouses. He worked to fully fund State mandates on local governments, and he was an integral part of implementing the PACE program and imposed tough drug sentences for drug dealers in the Commonwealth.

Senator Pecora was born in the East Liberty section of Pittsburgh. He became involved in local politics when he was elected to the council in Penn Hills municipality. It was from that post, after his local government service, that he was first elected to the Pennsylvania Senate in 1978. Mr. President, Senator Pecora served as a tribute in a turbulent time in the Senate. A great many controversial issues were dealt with during the time that he served here, but during that turmoil, Mr. President, Senator Pecora always knew and always kept the citizens of his district in mind. They knew that he would be here fighting for them, being their voice here in Harrisburg, and addressing the issues that were important to the men and women of his district.

He was a gentleman and a friend to me. Over the years he was a mentor who was willing to offer his thoughts about people, about issues, and about politics. For that and so much more, Mr. President, I am very grateful for the friendship and the relationship that I had with Senator Frank Pecora. Mr. President, Pennsylvania today has benefitted from his services. My condolences go out, as I mentioned, to his wife, Barbara, of 60 years, their children, the Pecora family, and all of their friends as they deal with the loss of a good man.

Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Montgomery, Senator Greenleaf.

Senator GREENLEAF. Mr. President, I rise, not to repeat what Senator Costa said so aptly and covered much about Frank Pecora, I want to talk about him in regard to his friendship. He was my friend when he was here. When I think of him, a smile comes on my face because he was such an outgoing guy, he was an honest guy, and he was a guy who did his job. Those of you who were here when he was here, everyone liked him and enjoyed his fellowship. He would always ask about my family when I would see him. The first thing out of his mouth was all about you and about how you were doing and that sort of thing. He was a wonderful friend, very supportive, a person who would encourage you, and responded well to the Members here in this Chamber. He was from an area of humble beginnings, but he finished as a great statesman, a wonderful person, and a good, good friend.

The PRESIDENT. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Chester, Senator Dinniman.

Senator DINNIMAN. Mr. President, one day Senator Pecora called me up and said, I am now the new Senator from Chester County. So I said, Senator Pecora, with all due regard, how did this happen? I do not remember you being on the ballot, and he said, well, they switched my district and they sent me to your area. At that point, I think he had become a Democrat, actually. So I said, we have never had a Democratic Senator before, so welcome. So he said, well, let us go out to lunch. I went out to lunch and he explained the whole story to me. We had a great lunch and he was very helpful whenever I would give him a call.

His assistant was Mike Doyle, and Mike later went on to win, I think it was an 11-person race for Congress in Allegheny County, and Mike is still sitting in the U.S. Congress. So I rise because he was my Congressman for a period of time and express my condolences to his family.

Thank you, Mr. President.

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Philadelphia, Senator Street.

Senator STREET. Mr. President, I offer this resolution because it commemorates one of the times when our country became a more perfect union. We have not always recognized the values and rights of every citizen, and Juneteenth commemorates the freeing of the final slaves in Galveston, Texas. When the Emancipation Proclamation was adopted, it was declared that all men would be free and that slavery had ended, but that news took time to travel across the country. It was over 2 years later in Galveston, Texas, when we finally ended the terrible institution of slavery. The adoption of the Juneteenth resolution is this body's recognition of this important day, a day which symbolizes the emancipation of enslaved African people and a day that recognizes our country moving towards being a more perfect union, recognizing a time when all men would indeed be treated equal.

When the slaves were freed, they still encountered a number of challenges in the Jim Crow Laws, but after June 19, 1865, and the ending of the institution of slavery, we had the first election of African Americans to Congress, we had the first election of African Americans to the United States Senate, and we had a greater engagement of participatory democracy by more Americans than we had ever seen previously. With that, I ask all people throughout the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania to celebrate this important occasion that is not only important for African American people, but is important for people throughout the Commonwealth and throughout the country, because, as Dr. King said, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere." It is a reminder that while today we are a better country than we once were, we have not always been what we could be. I thank you for your continuous support of this resolution, and I thank Members throughout this body and people throughout the Commonwealth who have enjoyed supporting this event, which has become a holiday observed by many.

**PETITIONS AND REMONSTRANCES**

The PRESIDING OFFICER. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Fayette, Senator Stefano.

Senator STEFANO. Mr. President, today I rise in regard to Senate Bill No. 592, which passed earlier today. Last year, Auditor General DePasquale released a disturbing audit of the Connellsville School District, where I reside. Along with his many criticisms, he cited a shocking lack of transparency in the hiring of the current superintendent, which came days after his auditors were assured that a nationwide search would be undertaken to fill the position. Instead, a last-minute addition to the agenda was made to hire the present superintendent without public notice. As the Auditor General stated in his press release, quote, "This is outrageous, especially since the public was not notified before the board voted on the superintendent's hiring." This legislation will give taxpayers an opportunity to examine the terms of an employment contract that the local school board extends to its key administrative employees and provide their feedback, concerns, or support for their elected officials. In a time of tight budgets and taxpayer concerns over rising property taxes, it is imperative that the hiring process be as transparent as possible.

Under Senate Bill No. 592, when a school board extends an offer of employment to a district superintendent, assistant district superintendent, associate superintendent, or any principal, it must first post the terms of the employment on the school district's public Web site. This posting must include the details of the final offer, including salary and the length of the employment contract. Information must be posted after the offer of employment is made for at least 2 weeks prior to the school board formally approving the accepted offer.

I thank my colleagues on the Senate Committee on Education and the Committee on Appropriations for their previous support

of this bill. So far it passed 11-1, and 25-1, respectively. I thank my colleagues on the Senate floor, where it passed by a vote of 36-14 today. This strong bipartisan vote is a testament to this body's commitment of transparency and good government. I look forward to this bill hopefully making its way through the State House and to the Governor's desk.
